Stewart, Peter Henry
1873/1878 NE – 1948 CA

Pvt. Stewart, 18th Co., 20th Engineers, survived the torpedoing & sinking of the troopship "Tuscania" on 5 February 1918 in the North Channel between Scotland & Ireland by German submarine UB-77.

He returned from World War I aboard the "Santa Paula" in May 1919 as a private 1st class in the same unit. On the "Tuscania," he listed his contact person as friend Stanley Kliemas, 1st Avenue & 2nd Street, Great Falls, Montana. On the return voyage, his friend's name is spelled Stanley Clements, at the same address.

The California Death Index lists his birth year as 1873. That date was also originally typed on his military headstone application, but crossed off and replaced with 1878. His Montana military records indicate he was 39 years, 5 months old, when he enlisted in the Army on 13 December 1917. His World War II draft registration (1942) gave a birth date of 28 June 1878, in Columbus, Nebraska.

In the 1930 census, Peter is in the Veterans Home of the State of California in Napa County, California. He indicates his father was born in the Irish Free State and his mother in Scotland. In the 1940 census, he is in the Veterans Administration facility in Beverly Hills Township, Los Angeles County, California. When he registers for the 1942 military draft, he is a resident of the National Military Home in Los Angeles, California.

The California Death Index enters his mother's maiden name as McDowell. His military headstone application indicates he entered the service from Montana, and was a private 1st class in the 18th Co., 20th Engineers. Peter's military serial number was 250,868.

DEPUTIES ARREST TWO MEN AND SEIZE STILL

Copper Wash Boiler Accom-
panies Several Gallons
of Moonshine.

Peter Stewart and Ernest Smith were taken to the county jail by Deputies Henault and Osborne and federal officers yesterday from a ranch known as the old "Sullivan" place, east of the city, after the officers discovered a whiskey still, seven barrels of fermenting cornmeal mash and about eight gallons of finished product. The men were charged with violation of the prohibition law.

The still was constructed from a copper wash boiler, and the cache was brought to the courthouse to await the orders of the district court concerning its disposition.

TWO PLEAD GUILTY AND GET SENTENCE

Smith and Steward Admit
Making Moonshine Be-
fore Disrict Court.

Peter Stewart and Ernest Smith, arrested by deputy sheriffs of Deer Lodge county Friday afternoon, pleaded guilty to a charge of manufacturing intoxicants, before Judge Winston yesterday afternoon and were sentenced to fines of \$300 and to serve 60 days each in the county jail. A few gallons of home-made liquor taken in their possession and a crude wash-boiler still will be destroyed. The men were arrested by Deputies Henault and Osborne.

Property seized by members of the sheriff's office from Dan Icancovich, recently and ordered sold by the court brought \$126.15 at public auction yesterday afternoon. The hammer was wielded by Deputy Henault. Some of the articles brought a reasonable price. A large bar mirror, probably worth originally considerable, was sold for \$22.

Men Shot In Gambling Row At Dooley On Wednesday Morning

Result of Poker Game at Dooley Tuesday Night—Stevens Shot Through Thigh—Hawley Shot Through Head and Chest and Left for Dead on Streets of Dooley.

HAWLEY MAKING A MIRACULOUS RECOVERY

Steevns Says That Hawley Tried to Hold Up Party and Got Shot As a Result—Hawley Says He Was Shot By Stevens After He Had Helped Him Into Car, Stevens Being Wounded By Accidental Discharge of Revolver.

OFFICERS NOT NOTIFIED FOR SEVERAL HOURS

After the Shooting, Stevens Was Brought to Grand View Hotel, Plentywood and Medical Aid Summoned and Sheriff Collins Was Not Notied Until Several Hours Later.

Barry Stevens of Outlook and Chester Hawley of Poplar, were shot in a brawl resulting from a big poker game last Wednesday morning at two o'clock. The game had started Tuesday afternoon at four o'clock and had lasted until early Wednesday morning when the shooting occurred, and Hawley was left for dead on the streets of Dooley by those who were implicated in his shooting.

As a result of the shooting, Barry Stevens of Outlook is at the Grand View hotel, Plentywood, with a bullet hole through his right thigh, and Chester Hawley lies in bed at Dooley with a bullet hole thru his chest and another one through his head and the bullet lodged in his neck, he still lives.

Barry Stevens is recovering rapidly from his wound and Chester Hawley is making, to the surprise of both laymen and doctors, a most miraculous recovery, for after several hours of unconsciousness, he recovered his memory and shortly after was able to tell his story of the happenings of the previous evening. Hawley has since been holding his own and the chances for his complete recovery seem very hopeful and Hawley himself insists that he is going to be on his feet again soon.

There are two stories current as to how the shooting came about; one told by Stevens and his friends and the other by Hawley, who much to the surprise of everybody, being considered dead, came to, and told his story and the two stories do not gibe.

It seems that Barry Stevens of Outlook, Pete Stewart of Plentywood, and Harry Hoffman of Plentywood, had gone to Dooley Tuesday afternoon in a big automobile looking for a poker game and about four o'clock one was organized with Chester Hawley sitting in, Hawley also being a gambler and engaged in the poker-crap business. It is also claimed that there were others who sit in the game from time to time and stayed as long as their money lasted, and dropped out, as it is reported that the game was a big one, there being a thousand dollars in sight most of the time. The game broke up, according to both stories about two o'clock Wednesday morning.

STEVENS' STORY

The story of the affray as told by Pete Stewart and Barry Stevens, appeared today in the Pioneer Press and is as follows:

"As Messrs. Barry Stephens, Peter Stewart and Harry Hoffman were about to enter their automobile which was standing in front of the restaurant at Dooley about two o'clock Wednesday morning, a man stepped from between two buildings and covered them with a gun, ordering them to 'throw 'em up.' The men complied with the hold-up man's request and he proceeded to help himself to the money and valuables which they carried. As the robber turned his attention to the other men for a moment, Barry Stephens procured a revolver which was in the side pocket of the car, as he was reaching for the gun the robber turned upon him, firing once hitting Stephens in the leg. Stephens opened fire, shooting the man twice and he turned and fled."

HAWLEY'S STORY

Chester Hawley states that the party was gambling and that Barry Stevens, Pete Stewart, Harry Huffman, himself and other from time to time had been gambling from four o'clock Tuesday until two o'clock Wednesday morning when the game broke up in a row. He claims that the rest of the gamblers had framed on him and together had taken away his money by questionable means. He pulled his gun and demanded his money back and all were standing up about the little gambling room, and all were excited, when the automatic which he was holding was accidentally discharged, the bullet hitting the tongue of the stove shaker and glancing, passed through Stevens' thigh and into the wall.

Then after a few hot words, the game banker gave him back his money, threw him a roll of bills, which he picked up without counting, and put in his pocket. The whole matter was then patched and all had shaken hands on the settlement of the dispute and he helped Barry Stevens into his car. When Stevens had seated

himself, he pulled a gun and without warning commenced shooting, hitting him as set forth above, he falling to the ground between the car and the curbing and the car left him there.

The above story seems to be verified as far as the finding the bullet in the wall is concerned as it was found exactly where he said it was.

Hawley claims Havre as his home, but he has been working along the Soo Line during the fall. He is a sheep shearer by trade and belongs to the Sheep Shearers Union. He is a quarter breed Indian between 25 and 30 years old.

Wednesday afternoon, a brother, Alvin Hawley, who is employed as a clerk in the Indian service at Poplar, was notified and he came over to Plentywood immediately and is looking into the facts surrounding the shooting of his brother.

OFFICERS NOT NOTIFIED

The county authorities were not notified of the shooting affair until several hours after it had occurred. Barry Stevens was brought to Plentywood and taken to the Grand View Hotel, where his wound was dressed, and then Sheriff Collins and County Attorney Erickson were notified and all went over to Dooley, where they found Hawley in bed in a room in the Decker building, unconscious. Dr. Campbell was called and dressed the man's wounds and otherwise made him comfortable. In a few hours the man who was unconscious, regained his consciousness and seems now likely to recover unless unlooked for developments occur.

The wounded man was put under guard by the sheriff as was also the building and the sheriff's and county attorney's offices have been carrying on a very effective investigation of the matter and it seems likely that several arrests will occur.
