These Have Fallen for the Cause of Liberty

One hundred four Oklahoma boys who were members of the American expeditionary forces had given their lives for the cause of liberty up to September 1, this year, according to war department casualty lists made public up to that time. Of this number 48 had been killed in action, 18 had died of wounds, 25 were lost on the high seas, the victims of German submarines, and 13 had died of disease or accidental injury. A list of 48 missing in action—prisoners—or probably prisoners, of Germans—increased the state's total casualty list, to September 1, to 279. HONOR ROLL FOR OUR SOLDIER HEROES

If the necessary information can be obtained, the Star will honor the memory of the Nowata county boys who have given up their lives in the service of their country, by hanging in the window of this office an Honor Roll giving the names of those boys who have died in the service. To make the list complete, it will be necessary that we have the full name of the soldier, his rank, age at death, home address, date entered service, branch of service, company, etc., how he lost his life, date of death and where, occupation in civil life, name of next of kin, relationship and address.

Up to the present time we have the names of twenty-one Nowata county boys who have died in the service. Six of these were killed on the field of battle, and the remainder died of disease in the camps in this country. Those killed in battle were Wesley Jackson Stubbs, Delaware; Leslie Reynolds, Wann; Eugene Newton Dicks, Alluwe; Newton McKellar, Nowata; Stanton H. Marshall, Delaware; Clarence E. Holbrook, Delaware.

NEED DATA ON DECEASED SOLDIERS

The Oklahoma State Council of Defense is endeavoring to secure the names and addresses and other data relative to Nowata county soldiers and sailors who were killed or died while in the service. The council will issue a certificate to the next of kin, but before this can be done the information must be sent to the council headquarters. It is also probable that a marble shaft will be erected at the state capitol on which the name of each man who lost his life in this war will be chiseled.

The Council has requested Mrs. E. B. Lawson to secure the necessary information and any one who can furnish information regarding the following soldiers are requested to send it to Mrs. Lawson or call at Mr. Lawson's office in the First National Bank Building and leave same:

JACKSON STUBBS KILLED IN ACTION

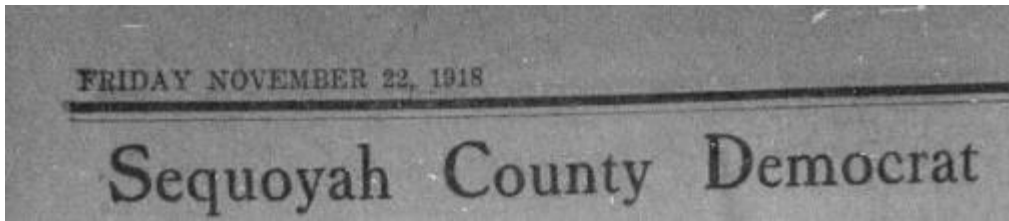
Wesley Jackson Stubbs, of Marble City, a soldier in the National Army was killed in action in France last week. His father, Sam Stubbs, of Marble City, was notified by the War Department last Saturday that his son had fallen while fighting for his country.

Jackson Stubb, as he was known by his associates here, was in the first draft from this county. He was on the transport Tuscania which was torpedoed off the coast of Ireland and was rescued by the accompanying convoy. His division was transferred to the fighting lines in France as soon as they were re-equipped and he was killed while fighting the Huns. This is the second Sequoyah county boy killed in the present conflict of the nation; Willis Boothe, of Hanson, a member of the regular army, who volunteered at the beginning of war was killed in action several months ago.

Surviving are five daughters and three sons. They were all at the bedside at the time of death.

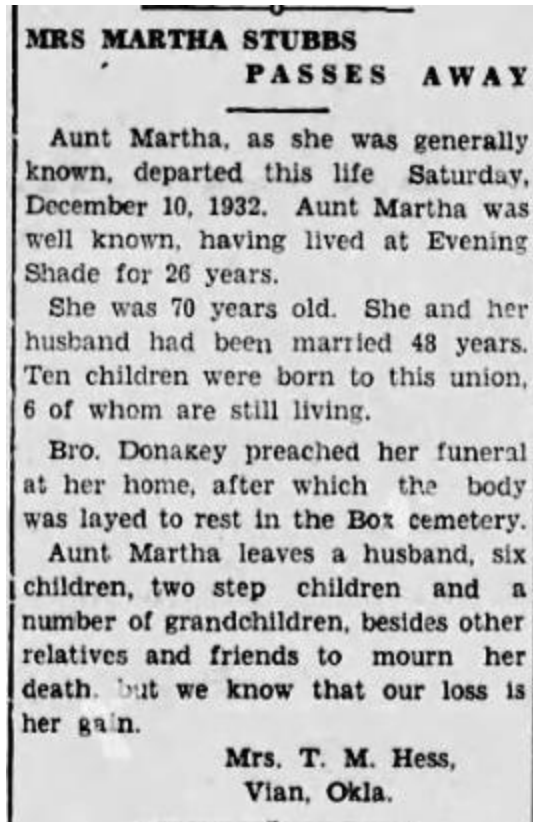
