PAY TRIBUTE TO MEMORY OF TWO VETERANS

**Legionaires Hear Speaker
Urge Continued Need
for Patriotism**

New London—Need for the same unquestioning, undaunted patriotism that stirred the ragged, bleeding men of Valley Forge, during the Revolution, and in France, during the World war, was urged by the Rev. Francis S. Dayton at the memorial service held on Tuesday evening at Legion hall. The service was planned to honor the memories of Norris and Spencer, the two New London boys who lost their lives, for whom the New London legion post was named.

The speaker drew a picture in words taking the listeners back to the days when Company D. was being whipped into formation. He recalled the spirit of the people of those days and the pride with which the city sent her young men. Following them through the months of grime and dust and monotony of Texas training camps, the speaker said that those were the days of test, and that families and friends at home were glad to remember that the men had stood the ordeal well. He made comparisons between the lads who left the cheering crowds in home streets with their quiet departure from an eastern coast upon

the Tuscania. Bronzed and hardened underneath a Texas sun the New London contingent was among the first of the troops to go overseas.

The sinking of the Tuscania off the shore of Ireland by a German submarine lives forever in the minds of these men, said the Rev. Dayton. The city heard the dread word, and scanned papers searching for names of those nearest and dearest. Then came the formal government slips received by the relatives of the two missing, and the word went round that though the body of Norris had been recovered and interred in Irish soil the body of Spencer was never found.

LAST NIGHT ON SHIP

The Rev. Dayton recalled the words of companions of the two boys. "A close call, Buddy. We've been through some mighty tough places together, but always came out." This was a sketch of a conversation heard on deck during the afternoon previous to the ship's sinking. The two boys who were close companions had recalled an episode of the north woods which had never proved fatal to one or both of them. But, the speaker continued, their immortal souls went on united even after death, though the one slept beneath the waves and the other on foreign land. The Rev. Dayton closed his address urging fathers and mothers to teach the beauty and duty of sacrifice during the country's need.

The address was heard by members of the post and their families. Lunch, provided by the Legion Auxiliary, was served by the men of the post. The Rev. H. P. Freeling led the pep singing. Miss Jean Dessel sang two vocal solos, Miss Eunice Rickaby played violin solos, both women being accompanied by Alton Engen. Short talks were given by Byron Christian, Frank Davis and Laurel Conant, Tuscania passengers who were last in conversation with the two victims.



Rev. Francis S. Dayton was the speaker at the Tuscania memorial program given by the Norris Spencer post of the American Legion. The speaker stressed the urgent need for devoted patriotism as shown in the time of our participation in the great war. He mentions especially the

lives of Clifford Norris and William Spencer who lost their lives when the Tuscania was sunk off the coast of Ireland, while carrying among other troops, Company D which included many New London boys. Byron Christian, Frank Davis and Laurel Conat of the local post and

Two Legion Posts Named After Tuscania Victims

Memories of the World war that recall the death of three men in this district who have been honored by having American legion posts named after them, will be brought back Monday, Feb. 5, when the National Tuscania Survivors' association meets at Kenosha.

The three men are Corporal Clifford Norris and William B. Spencer, after whom the New London legion post is named, and Sgt. James P. Hawley after whom the Neenah post is named. The three lost their lives in the sinking of the Tuscania.

Only two of the Appleton men on the ship, McKinley Robinson and Arthur J. Hantschel, still live in the city. Others who were residents of Appleton when they went into service and who survived the incident are Eric Galpin, Jacob Schneider, Irwin H. Meidam, Theodore Briggs, Worth Bushey and Paul Van Wyck. Several of the survivors have moved from the city and one or two are dead.

Among other men from this vicinity listed as on the Tuscania in dispatches received a few days after the sinking were Ralph Mayo, New London; Harry B. Collar, Hortonville; George E. Doman, New London; Hilding Fagerdahl, Hortonville; Elmer A. Hebbe, New London; Arthur Steffen and Alexander Stewart, Hortonville; Martin Winter, Clintonville; William A. Ruechel, Leeman; Byron E. Christian, Laurel J. Conat, Frank I. Davis, Charles Foley, Archibald Beaudoin, Martin D. Bongers, and Leonard T. Meshke, all of New London; Martin T. Evenson, Manawa, and John C. Barth, Clintonville.

Will Honor Jones

One of the features of this year's meeting of the veterans will be honoring John Newton Jones, now a resident of New York, formerly of the British navy who helped rescue a great number of the survivors.

Attached to the Pigeon, British destroyer, Jones was a chief petty officer on Feb. 5, 1918. The Pigeon was part of the escort of the Tuscania as it neared the Irish coast just as day was ending. The torpedo that seemed to come from out of nowhere rising from the depths of the sea dealt its deadly blow to the troop ship and the panic was on.

The Pigeon was one of the first of the escorting squadron to arrive on the scene. Capt. John Eddis,

commander of the destroyer, ordered Petty Officer Jones to take charge of the lifeboats lowered from the Pigeon davits. Men were clamoring for help from the tilting deck of the Tuscania and hundreds more were afloat in the water, clutching anything they could hold. The lifeboat in which Jones was lowered rapidly filled with men picked up from the water, and with the shrieking cries of men asking to be saved, the officer looked around for his ship.

Left Alone at Dusk

It was gone, due to menace of another torpedo from the enemy submarine.

Seeing several other lifeboats nearby Jones ordered the boat to the vicinity of the others and organized rescue work. Every boat that could pick up another man was soon filled, and Jones found 11 life-boats filled. He shouted encouragement to the men at the oars and with the boats joined in a single chain they pulled away from the scene to avoid being sucked in as the Tuscania finally lifted its stern into the air and with a groan sank under the surface, taking with it scores of men who could not swim away fast enough.

The exploits of Jones were not at once recognized. Of a retiring nature himself, the officer merely submitted a report later that he had led 210 survivors in 11 lifeboats to safety.

But the men in those lifeboats, many of them Wisconsin war veterans who were saved to go further into the war, did not forget.

The medal to be given Jones at the reunion of the Tuscania survivors in Kenosha Monday night is the fourth such award to come out of that exploit, and the first to be given by the association of survivors.

The Tuscania?

Remember the Tuscania?

McKinley Robinson of Appleton does. So does Archie Beaudoin of New London.

Robinson and Beaudoin and numerous other Fox Valley soldiers bound for European duty were aboard the Tuscania when the big British transport steamer was torpedoed by a German submarine off the Irish coast about suppertime on Feb. 5, 1918.

The Tuscania stayed afloat for about two hours, enough time for most of the more than 2,000 British and American troops to abandon ship safely. But more than 200 of them died, including James P. Hawley of Neenah and Clifford Norris and W.B. Spencer of New London.

"All Appleton Boys Saved," screamed the banner headline across the top of the front page of the Appleton Evening Crescent on Feb. 11. One who was saved was Arthur Hantschel. He's dead now, but his brother, Erwin, of Appleton, came to the office recently with a fragile, yellowed newspaper front page dated Feb. 10, 1918 that listed the names of all Wisconsin soldiers who survived the disaster.

Many of them are no longer living. I found two who are, and asked them what they remembered about the day the Tuscania was torpedoed.

Beaudoin was 20 years old — "I still had my mother's apron string in my hands." The soldiers were supposed to land in Liverpool the night of Feb. 5.

There was an uneasiness on the Tuscania, because everyone knew there were German U-boats in the area. Against regulations, Beaudoin and a buddy went up to the third deck, thinking it would be safer there. "I looked straight ahead and could see a light flashing," probably from shore, seconds before the torpedo hit, Beaudoin said.

There was no warning it was coming. No sighting. No sound. "But, so help me God, I felt it coming," Beaudoin said.

"The whole boat sort of shivered " when it was struck, he recalled. A second torpedo missed its mark. The first one hit the coal bin. That, Beaudoin said, was fortunate, because the pumps could be used for a while as the men escaped.

Beaudoin saw men disappear when they leaped into the water or when they couldn't make the leap from the listing Tuscania to the destroyer that pulled alongside for the rescue. Beaudoin made the leap, when the Tuscania was "about 45 degrees down."

The Tuscania survivors used to hold reunions. Now there is seldom even any talk about that cold night off the Northern Ireland coast 60 years ago, Beaudoin said.

Robinson also was 20 years old on Feb. 5, 1918. He had left his homeland in Waco, Texas, a member of the 127th Medical Company.

He doesn't recall just where he was on the Tuscania when she was torpedoed, "but I probably was under cover somewhere, because it was cold out.

"There was a lot of screaming and hollering" where he was, Robinson recalled. He said he "nearly drowned" before being rescued from a lifeboat. Robinson escaped the Tuscania with soaked clothes, nine cents and a pouch of Durham chewing tobacco.

According to The Crescent, there were many tense days in Appleton as families and friends waited for the War Department to release the names of Tuscania casualties and survivors. The Crescent of Feb. 8, 1918, stated, "Mothers who could scarcely restrain sobs, fathers whose voices trembled and sisters and sweethearts vainly besieged newspaper offices by telephone and in person to learn the fate of a boy thought aboard the Tuscania."

On Feb. 11, The Crescent published the pictures of the Appleton survivors and the names of other area soldiers who were safe in Scotland and Ireland.

Survivors from Appleton were Robinson, Hantschel, Eric Galpin, Theodore Briggs, Henry J. Pettigrew, Jacob F. Schneider, Irwin H. Meidam, Worth L. Bushey and Paul VanWyk. New London soldiers who were saved were Beaudoin, Byron E. Christian, Frank I. Davis, George E. Doman, Martin D. Bongers, Charles Foley, Leonard Meshke, Elmer A. Hebbe and R.A. Mayo.

Others from the area who survived were Laurel Conant, Harry B. Coliar and Arthur L. Steffen of Hortonville; Alexander Steward Jr., Martin C.W. Winter, John C. Barth and Hilding Fagerdahl of Clintonville; W.A. Reichel of Leeman; George D. Danley of Iola; Martin T. Evenson of Manawa and A.E. Steffenhagen of Neenah.

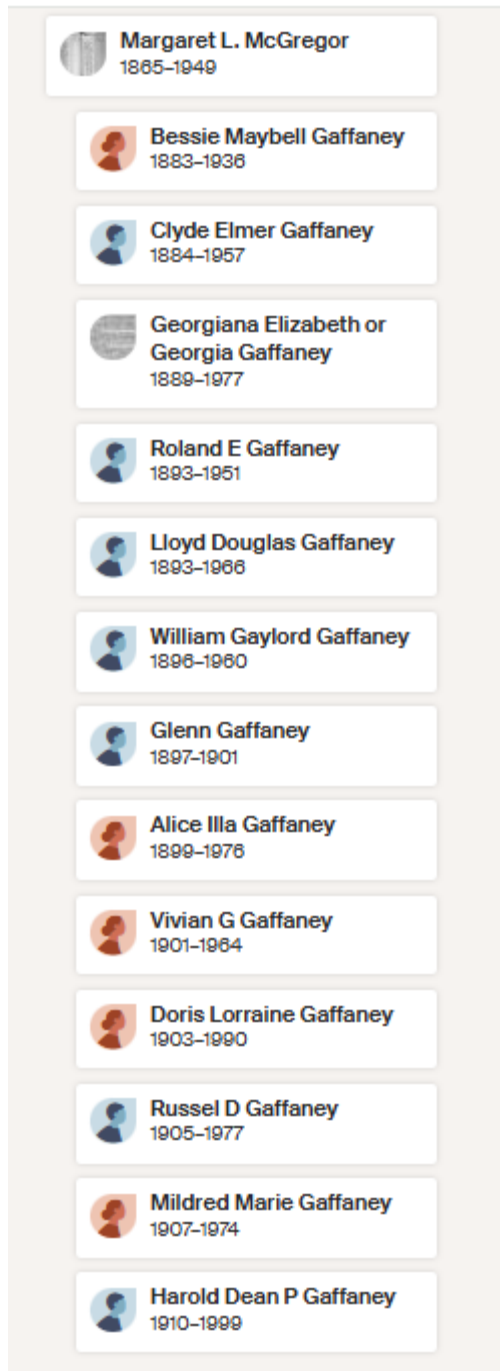

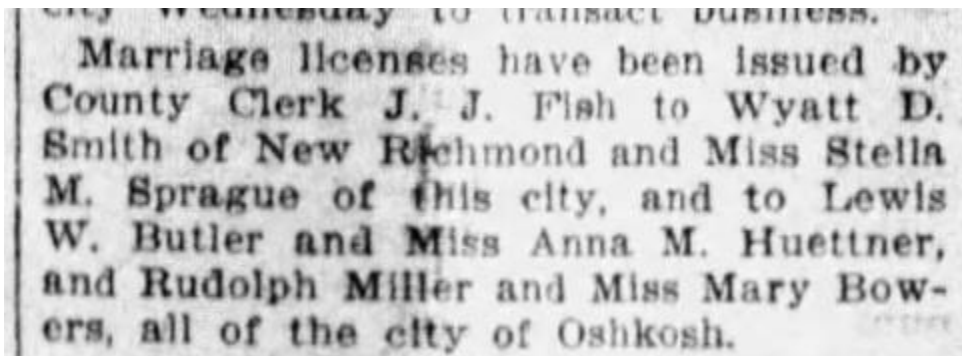

The condition of Raymond Gaffney, warehouse worker with the Barkhausen Oil company, who was seriously burned in the fire which followed the explosion at the warehouse Thursday afternoon, and who is in St. Mary's hospital, is reported as remaining about the same today, although it is possible there is some slight improvement.

Elmer Aebischer, truck driver for the Barkhausen company, who was burned while rescuing Gaffney from the flames, and who is in Bellin Memorial hospital, showed considerable improvement today, it was said, and it is thought he is well on the way to recovery.

The two firemen injured while fighting the conflagration, Elmer Schoen and Henry Bitters, left the hospitals where they were taken following the injuries, this morning. Schoen was at Bellin Memorial hospital with burns on the arm and forehead, and Bitters at St. Vincent's overcome with the heat and smoke at the fire. Both are reported recovering nicely.

Several other firemen were still a bit shaky this morning as the effect of the carbon monoxide gas which was mixed with the air at the fire had not entirely worn off. None were in a serious way, however, and all were able to be on duty.

CITY MAY TIGHTEN GASOLINE AND OIL PLANT REGULATIONS

Enactment of Strict Code Gov- ernment Warehouses, Etc., To Be Passed?

One result of the Barkhausen Oil company fire here Thursday may be the enactment of a very strict city code governing similar establishments, it was indicated today at a conference between Mayor John V. Diener, City Attorney Thomas C. Dwyer, and J. H. Mande, city electrician. Belief was expressed that the disaster might be duplicated, possibly with even greater loss of life, in any of several plants here.

While the last state electrical code, adopted in 1925, states that all live electrical parts in such a plant must be enclosed, it does not specify that they must be air tight, although such a requirement is made by some insurance companies.

These companies, for example, require that all switches on motors in oil plants must be of the oil-break type, in which the arc as the contacts part is smothered in flash-proof oil. Had such a switch been in use at the Barkhausen plant, it was thought, the disaster might not have occurred, as Raymond Gaffaney, plant foreman, is very certain that the explosion occurred as he pulled the switch to shut down the tank pump.

Dry cleaning plants, for example, where naphtha is used, cannot have switches of any kind inside the building, and all lights must be enclosed in vapor-tight fixtures. The ruling against open contacts applies to all places where inflammable vapor is present.

Mayor Diener ordered the electrical inspector to check up on garages, dry cleaning plants and oil stations to be sure that they complied with existing laws, and the adoption of a more stringent ordinance will be considered later.

They obtained their license on 21 May 1907, the day before the ceremony. - Her Find A Grave record indicates 21 Jan 1976 is her interment date, but it is actually her death date. - Obituary: "Appleton (WI) Post-Crescent" 23 Jan 1976 p 19 – Hazel Gaffaney Parfitt died 21 Jan 1976 at St. Joseph Residence, New London, after a lingering illness. 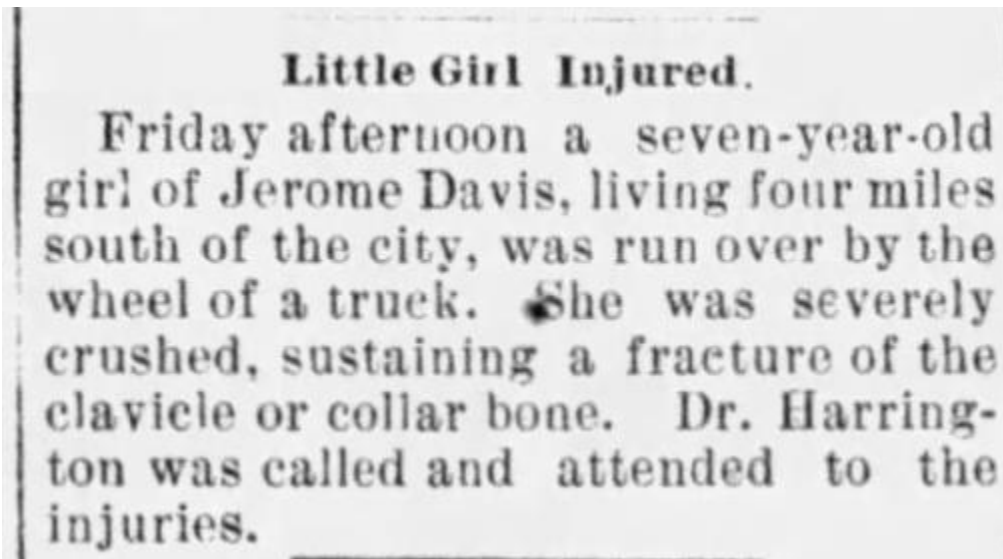
