Little Mother Fears for Boy

Colusa Lad Was on Tuscania

Lankenau's Family Still Clings to Hope That He Escaped

Special Dispatch to The Chronicle.

COLUSA, February 14.—Read C. Davis, 158th Aero Squadron, whose home address was given as Colusa, Cal., is still among those aboard the ill-fated Tuscania as yet unaccounted for.

In Colusa a frail little woman, his mother, is suffering an agony of fear. Her boy was listed missing among 345 American soldiers aboard ship. This list has dwindled somewhat, and yesterday a list of known dead and some unknown dead was cabled from a Scottish port. Davis' name was not mentioned.

Davis' mother, Mrs. Susie Davis, lives here. Clifford, Mac, Mildred and Inez Davis, brothers and sisters, are in Colusa. J. A. C. Davis, father, lives at Stockton. Young Davis was 18 years old in October. He worked in Colusa a year and a half in a garage, leaving last June to accept a position for an Oakland physician as chauffeur. Early in November he quit and enlisted at Stockton. He then came home to Colusa to bid farewell to his mother and brothers and sisters.

WANTED TO ENLIST

He asked to enlist during the Mexican trouble, but his mother would not give her consent. He said he was going to France and when he became 18 laid his plans accordingly and his enlistment followed.

He graduated from the Escalon School in 1914. He was then 14.

At that age he swam the Stanislaus river during a freshet and gained local fame as a swimmer. His mother and brother say he could easily swim four or five miles and hope this ability helped him when the Tuscania was sunk.

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FRAIL LITTLE MOTHER FEARS FOR HER BOY

**Read Clive Davis, Colusa Boy,
Reported on Tuscania; No
News of Him Has Come to
Relatives**

COLUSA (Colusa Co.), February 14. Clinging to a forlorn hope that her 18-year-old soldier son may be finally listed among the Tuscania survivors, a frail little woman, with her sorrow and suspense indelibly traced in her features, is anxiously waiting for any word concerning the fate of Private Read Clive Davis of the 158th Aero Squadron.

The boy was listed several days ago in a list of 345 troopers aboard the ill-fated transport. Later reports giving the name of additional survivors did not mention Davis.

Not on List of Dead.

Yesterday came the list of the American soldier dead buried in long trenches on the Scottish coast. Davis' name still was not carried. Several soldier dead were designated "unidentified member Aero Squadron." Was Davis one of these latter? Perhaps this never will be known.

"He isn't dead, is he? My boy is an expert swimmer. He could swim four or five miles with ease! When he was 14 years old he swam the Stanislaus River at flood time. Maybe he swam out." Thus the little mother attempts to strengthen her ebbing hope.

Family Proud of Boy.

Not a word of her son's fate has been received by Mrs. Susie Davis, or by Clifford Davis, an older brother,

employed in a bake-shop here. Another brother, Mac, and two sisters, Mildred, a student nurse at St. Joseph's Hospital in Stockton, and Inez Davis, are at home here. All of them speak with pride of the young soldier, even though tears fill their eyes and their voices quiver.

Read C. Davis was 18 years old in October last. He begged to be permitted to go to the Mexican border. Parental consent was withheld. He said when he was 18 years old he was going to Franco.

Boy Was Patriotic.

Young Davis was intensely patriotic and possessed by a spirit of adventure. Prior to his enlistment he worked in Westcamp & Sparks' garage here. He left Colusa last June and went to Oakland, where for a time he was chauffeur for Dr. Benteaux, a Bay physician.

Just before Thanksgiving he enlisted at Stockton, where his father, J. A. C. Davis, now resides. He chose the aero service. He passed the tests to enter a flying school, and went first to San Francisco. From there he went to Texas to an aviation camp. He was transferred to Lake Charles, La., and from there went to Garden City, N. Y.

Expected to Fly.

He qualified first as a truck driver, then as an aero machinist, and in his last letter told the members of his family he expected to fly when he reached the French war front.

Young Davis graduated from the Escalon schools in 1914. He was then 14.

His mother says he was six feet tall and a powerful lad. His swimming prowess she believes was due to the fact that, despite his height, he had a remarkably small foot, wearing a No. 5 shoe. She thinks he may have swum ashore or have clung to floating wreckage. When told that the water in the seas in which the Tuscania was sunk is ice-cold, an apprehensive shudder shook her, and she said: "I hope my boy is safe."

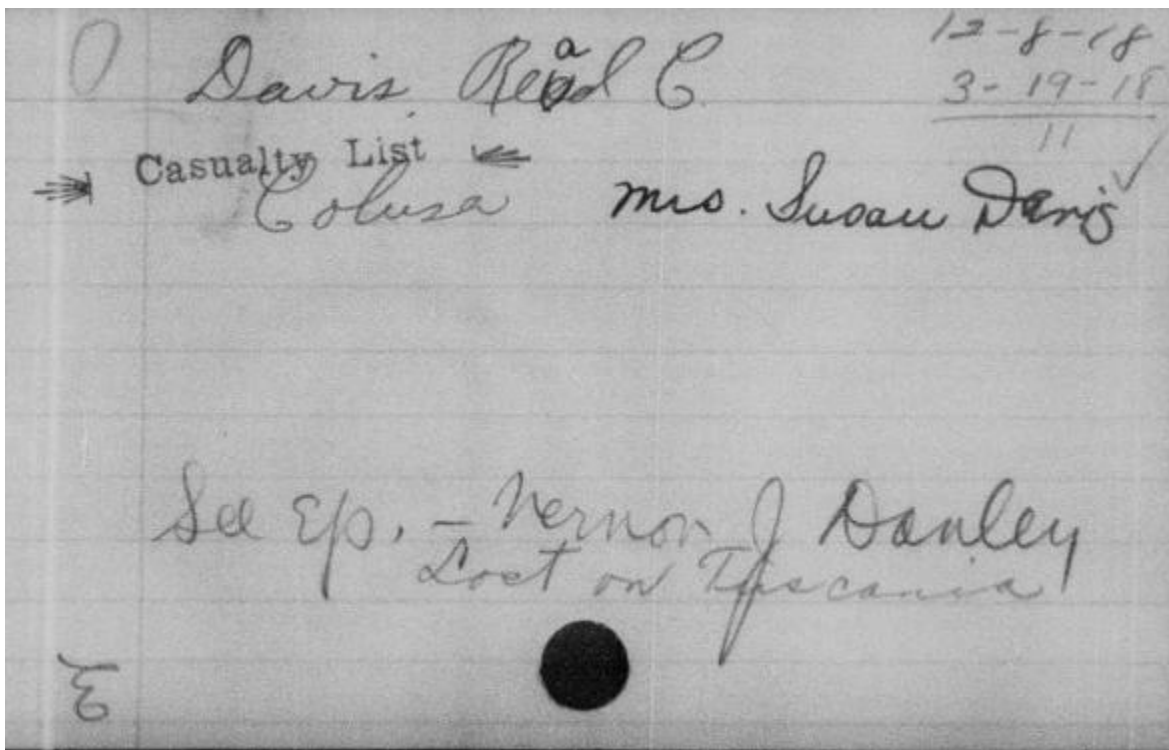

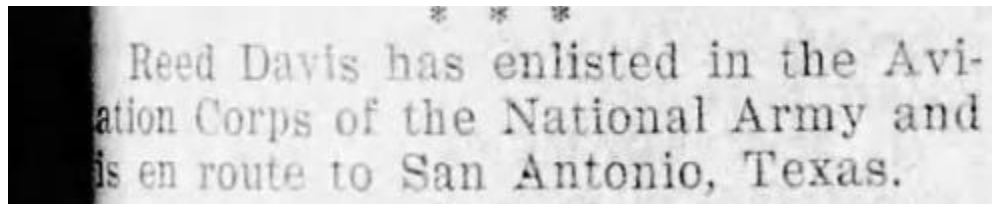

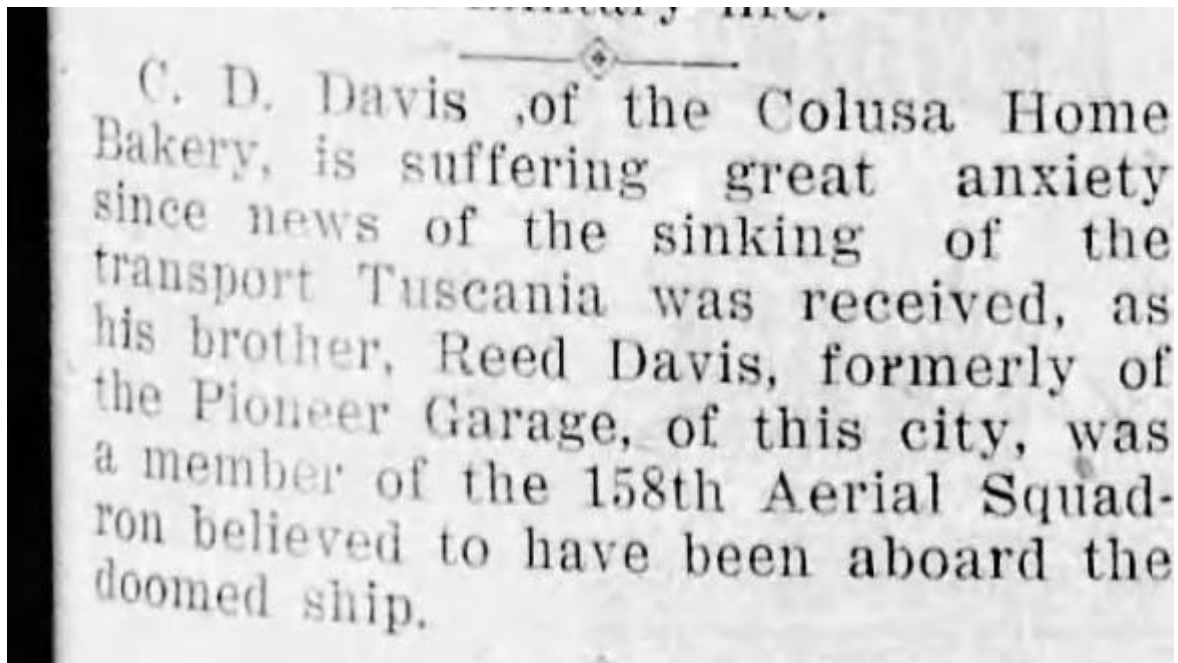

TWO COLUSA BOYS AMONG MISSING

Reed C. Davis and William Berger Not Included In List of Survivors Received; Hope Entertained That Young Berger, Member 20th Engineers, Possibly Not Aboard Ill-Fated Transport Tuscania

Two Colusa county Liberty Boys are still among the missing from the torpedoed transport Tuscania. Relatives here have looked in vain to read the names of Reed C. Davis and William Berger among the list of survivors. All hope will not be abandoned until the official list of the dead shall be published in Washington.

Reed C. Davis was a son of Mrs. Susie Davis, of Goad's Extension, and a brother of C. D. Davis, a baker in the employ of the Colusa Home Bakery. Prior to his voluntarily enlisting in the 158th Aerial Squadron on November 3, 1917, he was employed at the Pioneer Garage. He was only seventeen years of age, but from letters received by his relatives he had made rapid progress in the air service as a mechanic.

William Berger, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Berger, residing on the Moulton ranch, volunteered in the Forestry Division, 20th Engineers, enlisting at Ukiah. His parents have heard nothing from him since before his supposed departure for foreign shores. They have been hoping against hope that he was not among those crossing on the Tuscania.

Their friends in the county are rejoicing over the good news that Dennis L. Jones and Leslie Sills, both of Arbuckle, and Frank T. Anderson, son of Mrs. Fowler of Colusa have been saved from a watery grave.

J. A. C. DAVIS BELIEVES HIS SON IS SAFE

J. A. C. Davis, a carpenter employed at the car barn of the Traction line, whose son, Reed C. Davis of the One Hundred and Fifty-eighth Aero Squadron is reported among the lost of those aboard the *Tuscania*, has not given up hope for the safety of his boy. The father says his son could swim five miles, if necessary, and he believes that there is still a chance that he will be heard from.

Young Davis is a graduate of the Escalon school, being a member of the class of 1914, at that time 14 years of age. During a freshet there the young man swam the Stanislaus river and gained quite a reputation as a swimmer at that time. The lad comes from a patriotic family and wanted to enlist during the Mexican border troubles, but his mother would not consent, owing to his tender age.

The boy's father was formerly a Texas ranger. He is now enrolled on the labor reserve ship building list.

REED DAVIS LOST SAYS WAR DEPARTMENT

Clifford Davis, of the Colusa Home Bakery, received a telegram from the War Department advising him that his brother, Reed C. Davis was among those unaccounted for and was undoubtedly lost when the transport Tuscania went down. Yesterday Mr. Davis received a special form from pension attorneys at Washington asking to be designated as his mother's representatives in the collection of War Risk Insurance due from the Government on the death of Reed Davis. Mrs. Susie Davis, mother of the youthful hero who made the supreme sacrifice for his country, lives in Goad's Extension and has been in failing health for many months from asthma. Besides Clifford, the eldest son, and head of the family, there are Miss Mildred Davis, who is a nurse at St. Joseph's Home in Stockton, Mark and Inez Davis, the latter two being of tender years. Reed Davis was 18 years of age when he enlisted in the Aviation Section and having had some mechanical experience in the Pioneer Garage in Colusa, he had promise of becoming a mechanic. His grief stricken mother, brothers and sisters have the sympathy of the entire community. On some far off shore in an unmarked grave Reed Davis will repose until the Judgment finds him, but in the future glory of his country will be read the achievements of possibly thousands who shall pay the debt before the cruel war is over and be held in sacred memory by a race of freemen.

thing in this respect, he insisted, One outstanding feature, however, should be 100 per cent and no less, aid he grilled without mercy the Bolsheviks, the I. W. W., the Reds and the anarchistic. The trinity of future rule, he said, should be and will be, the great American public, capital and labor, and it is these three which, rightly adjusted will and should rule the destinies of the country. He knew nothing of a League of Nations, but strong he was for a League of Americanism. Better schools, better homes, and better social and economic conditions found

favor with the speaker and with the audience.

Mr. Dunton drew a beautiful word picture when he read the roster of the Colusa boys who had gone "Over There" and who now slept beneath the lilies of France that we at home might have better conditions and better civilization. There were bowed heads when he read this list and closed his address with a glowing tribute to the mothers of Colusa who had given of their dear ones that the world might live.

The next number on the program was a beautiful and attractive one, being two songs by Miss Willie May Spaulding, who was in excellent voice and who rendered her songs in a way most attractive to the crowd. THE PARADE.

The parade was formed on West Market street and moved forward on time under the guidance of the Marshal of the Day, Frank L. Crayton. His aides were George Woods, Meridian; Herman Dunlap, Jr., Maxwell, and Byron D. Beckwith, Colusa.

In the lead in decorated autos were the city and county officials, prominent officials and business men and the orator of the day, riding beside Judge Weyand, who was booked to make a welcome address to the boys.

Then came a decorated automobile containing veterans of the Civil war, among whom were Messrs. Richter, Firch, Moore and Potter.

Following these was the Colusa band of thirty pieces, which did well in its efforts at the head of the procession.

Behind the band were the Boys in Blue, thirty in all, and following these 250 men who wore the olive and drab in the late great mix-up. It was a most creditable showing in every respect and the heroes were heartily cheered all along the line of march.

At the head of the thirty Red Cross women on foot were J. F. Campbell and six little girls. The cavalcade of Red Cross workers were followed by a number of Red Cross ladies in autos. Mrs. Tennant Harrington lead the auto division.

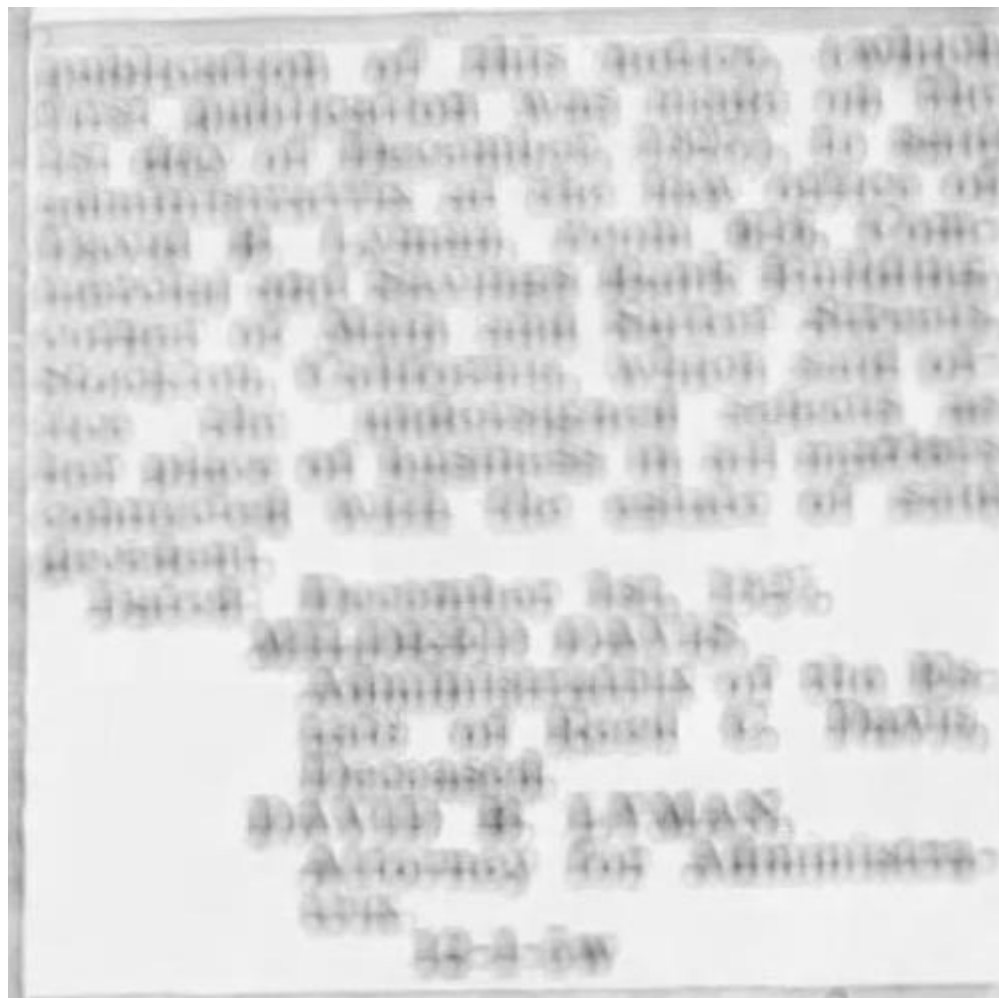

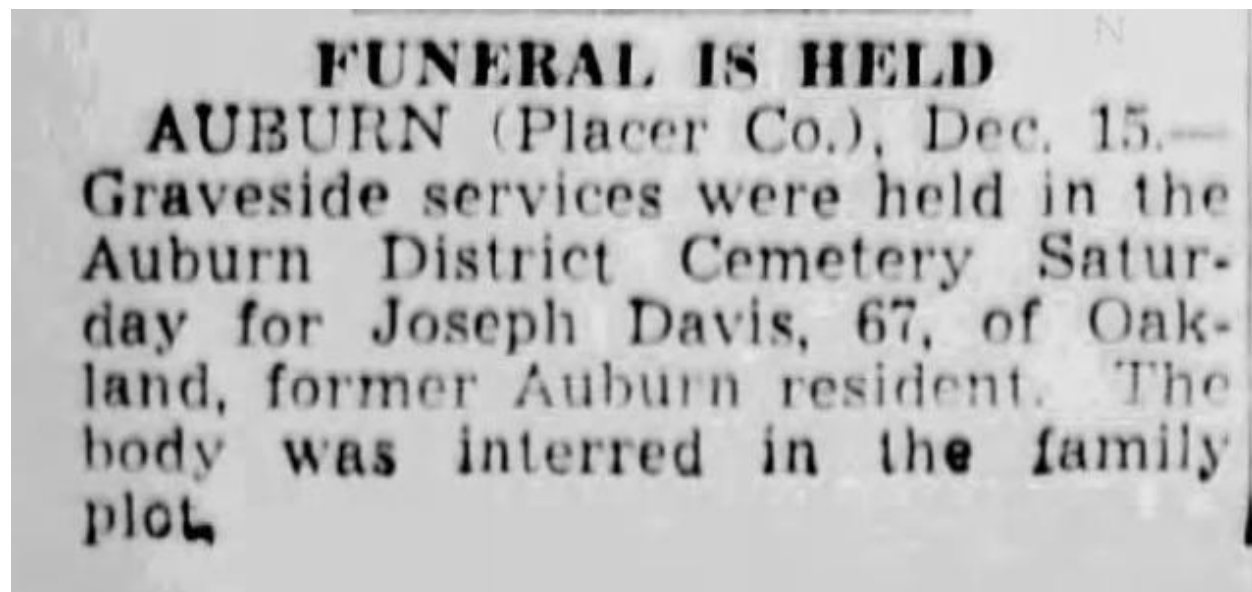

The courage and skill of fifteen-year-old Fred Ferrianola, son of Frank Ferrianola, saved Miss Mildred Davis from a watery grave in the Sacramento river Thursday evening. Miss Davis, who is a trained nurse and a young woman about 21 years of age, while in swimming with a number of other town people off Third street, became exhausted and had gone down for the third time when the game little Italian boy risked his life to save her. Despite the fact that there were a number of grown-ups on the river bank, both men and women, none dared to plunge into the treacherous current until it became evident that the young woman had disappeared for the last time, when young Ferrianola, small even for his age but with a courageous heart, plunged in and swam to the spot where Miss Davis had gone down to rise no more, diving, he brought the girl to the surface, quickly pulling her bathing cap over her face, he hastened for the bank where the waiting crowd resuscitated Miss Davis.

Young Ferrianola is in the employ of J. J. O'Rourke's Grocery Department and is a promising lad.

Miss Davis is a daughter of Mrs. Susie Davis and a sister of C. D. Davis, who is employed at the Colusa Home Bakery. Miss Davis lost a brother, Reed C. Davis on the ill-fated Tuscania which was sunk off the coast of Scotland several months ago.

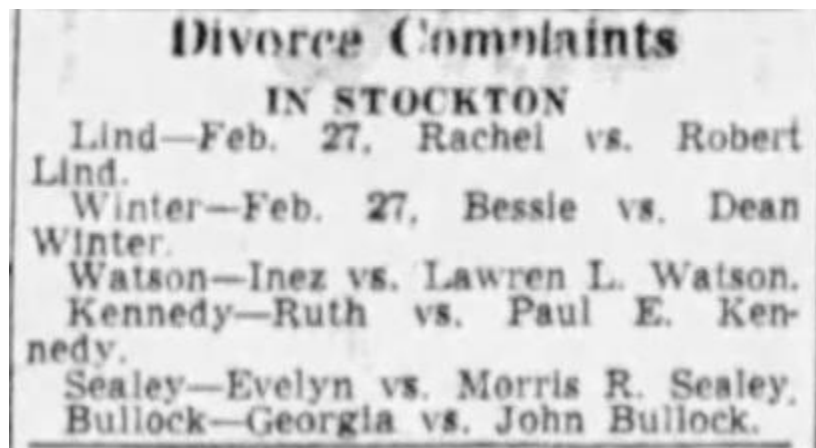

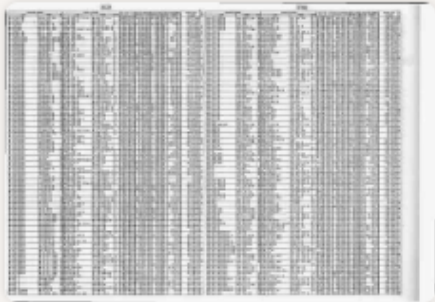

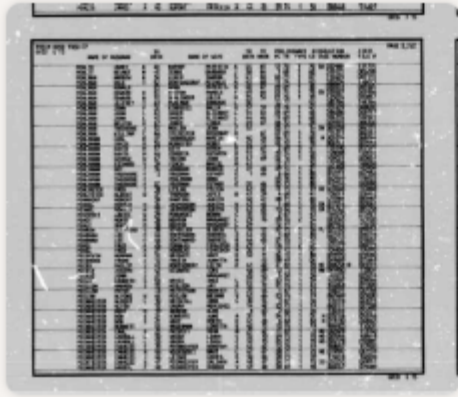

Youth Held on Assault, 2nd Charge

A South Stockton youth, Reno Jefferson, 17, of 3780 S. Mourfield, a student and car wash employe, was lodged in Peterson Juvenile Hall yesterday on charges of battery and receiving stolen property.

Police said two wheels and tires stripped from a stolen car were found in the trunk of Jefferson's car Friday night when he was stopped for questioning about a fight at Weber Avenue and California Street. He was released at that time, pending further investigation.

Officers said the tires and wheels were removed from a car owned by Fred R. Jones, of 674 Flint, after it was stolen from in front of Jones' residence late Thursday night. The car, stripped of its wheels and other parts, later was found abandoned at Clayton and Mary avenues.

The assault charge against Jefferson resulted from the altercation in downtown Stockton Friday night in which Jefferson allegedly struck Mac Henry Davis, 63, of 215 N. California, as Davis and a companion crossed the street and forced Jefferson to halt his car.

In 1880, Joseph Davis, age 4, b. TX, lived with his parents, 7 single siblings, a married brother & his wife, and a cousin (the niece of his parents) in Erath Co. TX.

Because his wife Susan claimed to be a widow in the 1920 census, many online genealogies list his death as pre-1920.

One of the 1918 newspaper accounts of Reed's death reports his father was a former Texas Ranger.

The couple was apparently estranged by the time Reed went to war & listed his mother as his next-of-kin. Susan & his siblings resided in Auburn, Placer CA in 1920 (census conducted 25 Jan 1920; she died 17 Jul 1920.) After her death, the two youngest children – Inez & Mac – moved to Stockton, San Joaquin CA where Joseph lived.

Joseph registered for the WWI draft but a year later than his son Reed did, on 12 Sep 1918.

Resident of the US Hotel in Marysville, Yuba CA. Born 30 Dec 1874. Bridge carpenter,

Missouri Valley Bridge Co./Western Pacific Railroad Bridge in Marysville. His NOK listed as

[daughter] Mildred Davis of St. Josephs Home, Stockton CA. He says he has 4 children [Reed is dead]. Was 6 feet tall & slender. –
His Social Security record (573-16-9827) lists him as Joe A. Davis, b. 30 Dec 1974 Stephenville TX.

In the 1940 census for Oakland, Alameda CA, conducted 4 Apr 1940, Joseph A.C. Davis (65 TX, widowed) lived with his son Clifford B. Davis (44 TX, baker), Clifford's wife "Mytle" [Myrtle] J. Davis (36) & their 3 children. They had lived in the same place in 1935.

Obituary: "Sacramento Bee" 16 Dec 1941 p 10 – graveside services were held at Auburn District Cemetery on Saturday, 13 Dec 1941, for Joseph Davis, 67, of Oakland, a former Auburn resident. He was buried in the family plot.

TX. – Clifford's brother Reed died on Tuscania on Clifford's 22nd birthday. - According to his WWI draft registration on 5 Jun 1917, he was a baker, with a mother & brother dependent on him. Single, a baker for Montgomery & Walker, Colusa CA. Husband of Myrtle Jeanette Johnson (1904/1905-1990, F: 6353697) whom he married 18 Nov 1922 in Oakland, Alameda Co. CA. Myrtle was the daughter of George P. Johnson & Fredricka Pearson. - Buried in Oakmount Memorial Park, Lafayette, Contra Costa CA. F: 6353697
- **Mildred D. Davis Bonetti**, 3 Sep 1898 TX – 21 May 1990 San Joaquin Co. CA. - Wife of Clemente A. Birth attested to by Mrs. Mildred Bonetti. - Imprisoned in Folsom Prison CA & San Quentin Prison CA. - His crimes included forgery, burglary & armed robbery. - CA Prison & Correctional Records on 12 Sep 1941 for prisoner 23935 Mac Henry Davis, b. TX, age 37, in Folsom Prison (Sacramento CA). Height 5'7", 124 lbs., baker. Sentence of 10 years for forgery, from the Alameda Co. court. Catholic, 11 years of public education in CA. Attended college for 3 years. Born 1904 TX, with 15 years of schooling. Baker. Convicted 8 Oct 1946 of burglary of private residence (20 & robbery with firearms (1) – sentence of 30 years. Resident of Jefferson, Beaumont TX. Returned on 1 Jul 1965 – discharged 19 Apr 1967 – paroled 14 May 1957 – returned due to parole violation 2 Apr 1960. - “Austin (TX) American-Statesman” 3 Feb 1964 p 5 – Mac Henry, a prisoner at the Ramsey State Farm, on Monday 3 Feb 1964 revived his claim he made in 1952 that he was being held illegally in prison because he had not been represented by a lawyer at his trial. This claim does not agree with records in the Court of Criminal Appeals. Davis was sentenced in 1946 to 25 years in prison. In Feb 1952 his habeas corpus application reached the Criminal Appeals Court, with his claim that he had had no counsel.

Records indicate he appeared in person & by counsel in his trial so his application for release was denied. Then Davis appealed to the US Supreme Court for a writ of certiorari, but the court in Jan 1952 refused the writ. In 1954 Davis sent another habeas corpus appeal to the TX Court of Criminal Appeals, saying he had not had a lawyer. The court is wondering why he did not invoke the minimum sentence law, since he was sentenced from 5 to 25 years. [It sounds as if he could have gotten released that way.] – Buried in San Joaquin Catholic Cemetery, Stockton, San Joaquin CA. F: 224177001

Discovered while doing this research:

Reed Clive Davis was the son of Joseph A.C. Davis, who was the son of Lemuel McQuary Davis & Katherine Watson.

Joseph was the brother of Gabriel Marion Davis, who shared the same parents.

Gabriel's son, Charles Lemuel Davis – Reed's 1st cousin – was also aboard the Tuscania, but survived.

Wartime:

The sinking of the Tuscania & Reed's death occurred on the 22nd birthday of his older brother, Clifford Bruce Davis.

"Los Angeles (CA) Times" 11 Feb 1918 p 1 – Pvt. Read C. Davis of Colusa CA, 158th Aero Squadron, has not yet been reported as a survivor.

"Sacramento (CA) Bee" 13 Feb 1918 p 1 – still unaccounted for: Read C. Davis of Colusa, Colusa Co. CA

"San Francisco Chronicle" 15 Feb 1918 p 2 - mother Mrs. Susie Davis & siblings Clifford, Mac, Mildred, Ines lived in Colusa CA, while his father J.A.C. Davis lived in Stockton CA.

Oakdale [CA] Leader" 21 Feb 1918 p 5 - Mrs. Fred Drew got a letter from Miss Mildred Davis, Stockton CA, who is training to be a nurse. Mildred is now in Colusa CA with her mother, Mrs. J.A.C. Davis, formerly of Escalon, who is prostrated over news that her son Reed is dead. He was a schoolmate with Drew boys when they lived in Escalon.

"San Francisco Chronicle" 27 Feb 1918 p 4 – The War Department has reported Read C. Davis of Colusa as missing. His mother is Mrs. Susan Davis.

"Petaluma (CA) Argus-Courier" 28 Feb 1918 p 5 – Read C. Davis of Marysville, lost on the Tuscania, is the nephew of T.J. Davis, formerly of Petaluma, now of Santa Rosa.
