GEORGE A. BORGHEIMER

Born Oct. 24, 1896. Entered the service at Chippewa Falls, Wis., Oct. 12, 1917, as a private in Co. A. Trained at Camp Douglas and Camp McArthur. Transferred to the 107th Supply Train, 32nd Div. Sailed Jan. 22, 1918. Promoted to Sergeant. Fought in battle of Chateau Thierry, and practically every battle of the 32nd Division. Returned to the U. S. and was mustered out May 29, 1919. Re-enlisted in the service for one year, being assigned to Motor Transport Corps.

Stanley man new president of area 'Last Man's Club'

The Last Man's Club of the Chippewa area chalked up its 53rd anniversary Sunday evening at Van's Supper Club with eight members, their wives and other guests present. The club, thought to be the oldest World War I organization of its kind, has met every year since 1920 when it was organized with members of Company A, Headquarters Company, and the Fourth Wisconsin Band.

Nearly 150 returned veterans attended the first meeting held at the Poultry Building on the Northern Wisconsin Fairgrounds, and for many years the membership numbered over 100. Robert Wiley was the Club's first president and Ed Firth was its secretary.

At Sunday evening's dinner meeting Arthur Long of Stanley became the new president of Last Man's Club and Arthur Lunde is to continue as secretary-treasurer. It was announced that retiring president, Truman Felton of Bruce, is in Veterans Hospital at the Twin Cities.

Silent tribute was paid to three members who departed the ranks this past year: Oscar Solie, John Foster, and Guy Wieseman.

A name in the news today — Bunncrana, Ireland, where the IRA is concentrated — came into the conversation as members recalled the landing of their troops at that port.

Said one, "They were fighting there then, just as they are today."

THE BY-LAWS of the Last Man's Club specify that their annual reunion be held on the Sunday nearest August 11 for it was on August 11, 1917, that three companies, Co. A and Headquarters Co. of Chippewa Falls, and Co. B of Stanley, under the direction of Capt. E. H. Firth, First Lt. Edward H. Monat, and Second Lt. Harley C. Wilson left Chippewa Falls for Camp Douglas.

At Camp McArthur at Waco, Texas, they trained as part of the 32nd Red Arrow Division. The division left for Europe on Feb. 7, 1918, but overseas the 127th, 128th, and 129th were transferred to another division.

The Fourth Wisconsin Infantry Band was organized at the Chippewa Armory in May, 1917, by Band Leader Louis Altman. It was scheduled to leave New York the last day of January, 1918, but because a Chippewa Falls man developed a rash which the medics felt might be the beginning of an epidemic the band was

detained a week and departed with the 32nd Division.

The boat they were to have taken was the *Tuscania* which was torpedoed off the Irish coast with a heavy loss of lives. Three Chippewa Falls men were listed among the casualties: Clare Metzenbauer whose body was later returned to Chippewa; Arthur Harvey who was buried on the Isle of Islay off Scotland, and Earl Weissenberger whose body was never recovered.

The men who attended Sunday's dinner have gone their separate ways since WWI but their shared experiences draw them together during their brief reunions.

GEORGE STENGEL Co. A, 107th Supply Train, has a vivid recollection of his arrival in Ireland for he carries a small tan-colored card identifying him as a survivor of the *Tuscania*. He was one of the lucky ones. He is now living in northern Michigan but for 47 years following the war he served as a private chauffeur in Chicago. Asked if he was related to Casey Stengel he smiles and said, "Yes, a cousin, but his talent didn't rub off on me."

Melvin Gubrud of Eau Claire enlisted from New Auburn and left with the Chippewa contingent to serve with Co. E, 127th Inf. He was wounded at Chateau-Thierry and after his release from the hospital served in the Military Police Corps. After the Armistice he hiked to Germany to serve as an MP on the Rhine. He farmed and worked in the auto business for a while before his employment at U.S. Rubber.

George Borgenheimer was with Co. A, 107th Supply, and saw few of the local men during his tour of duty. Back in his home town he served for many years with the Chippewa Falls Fire Department, retiring in 1947. Since that time he has engaged in numerous occupations, always keeping busy.

Art Lunde was with Headquarters Company. He left the states with the 32nd Division on August 11, 1917, and served until the end of the war. Art is retired after serving many years as a State Accountant. He is secretary-treasurer of the Last Man's Club.

Bill Gereoux, 107th Supply Train, has missed only one of the 53 meetings of the Last Man's Club. Fellow members recall his usefulness in

France where his French background made him a reliable interpreter. His father was from France and his mother from Canada and Bill learned his English in a Chippewa County country school. Bill is a retired postal carrier and a moving force in the veterans' group.

AL BRUSEN OF Menomonie served with the Fourth Wis. Inf. Band which, upon arriving in France, was trained in first aid and stretcher bearing. Band Leader Altman appealed to General Pershing to leave the band intact and this was done. The band played for military and civilian functions; for the sick and wounded; sometimes under shell-fire; and on three occasions played for General Pershing. Al has recently retired after years with the Menomonie Farmers Store. He is a member of the Ludington Guard Band, an historic band organized after the Spanish-American War.

Arthur Long of Stanley, another member of the Fourth Wis. Inf. Band, served overseas with the unit for 14 months. The band returned to the states in April, 1919, received a hearty welcome, and played their final concert at the fairgrounds in Chippewa Falls. Long was in the grocery and meat business for many years and is now a Public Relations man with Sacred Heart Hospital, Eau Claire.

Al Smith of Minneapolis was, and is, an outstanding musician, and music became his life work. After service with the Wis. Band he spent four years in New York. His work with various musical organizations, including Sousa's Band and the Minneapolis Symphony has taken him over the entire United States. He still practices every day and brightens the days for patients at the Veterans Hospital, Minneapolis, by playing the piano for them.

As the Last Man's Club members indulged in reminiscences Sunday evening George Stengel reminded several of them of an embarrassing incident from those early war days.

Chippewa area men named Thornton, Hartman, Duxbury, Stengel and Gereoux were ordering a meal in the Bar-le-Duc Restaurant during a brief leave from fighting in the Argonne. Gereoux helped them order in French but when their food arrived one of the soldiers indulged in profane English criticism of everything. As he wondered

aloud what he was eating a woman at a nearby table arose and approached them. In flawless English she identified everything on his plate; then returned to her table.

George A. Borgenheimer, 82, 109 Pear St., Chippewa Falls, died Thursday evening at St. Joseph's Hospital, Chippewa Falls.

He was born in Chippewa Falls Oct. 24, 1897, the son of George Borgenheimer and Anna Boettcher. He resided here all his life. He was a member of the Chippewa Falls Fire Department for 25 years and after retiring was employed by the city as a heating plant engineer for 10 years.

He was a Sgt. First Class in the U.S. Army during World War I, participating in the major campaigns in France and Luxembourg.

He married Dorothy Adams Oct. 22, 1924 at Notre Dame Catholic Church, Chippewa Falls.

He was a member of World War I Barracks 2095, American Legion Post 77, a charter member of VFW Post 1038, Last Man's Club, Knights of Columbus Goldsmith Council 974, past president of the men's Thursday night bowling league, with his high game as 298.

He was an avid gardener and a member of Holy Ghost Catholic Church.

Surviving are two daughters Mrs. Peg Becker, Dallas, Texas, and Mrs. Howard (Ellen) Perry, Radcliff, Ken.; a sister Mrs. Ane Clem, Chippewa Falls; eight grandchildren; and one great-granddaughter.

He was preceded in death by his wife Aug. 1, 1979; a son J.R. (Bob); his parents; six brothers; and five sisters.

A funeral service will be held at 11 a.m. Saturday at Holy Ghost Catholic Church. Interment will be in Our Lady of Hope Cemetery.

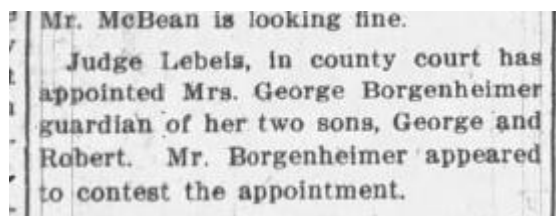

SIGNED UP FOR ANOTHER YEAR
IMMEDIATELY UPON
DISCHARGE

Sergt. George Borgenheimer, Corporals George Stengel and Mike Cosgrove who returned Friday morning in the 107th Supply Train, decided that the Army was O. K. and that they were adapted to the life. When they were discharged at Camp Grant about a week ago they were given an opportunity, like all men who are discharged from there get, to re-enlist in any branch of service they desired and to take up the kind of work they are adapted to, thereby obtaining much experience in that line. The re-enlisting term is one year. The men have a splendid chance for advancement as those who have seen service are given a decisive preference over new men. They leave June 30th for Camp Grant and from there they will go to Presidio, San Francisco.

CHIPPEWA FALLS, Dec. 1.—George Borgenheimer, appointed fireman last week, today successfully passed his examination and entered upon his duties. Borgenheimer is an ex-service man.

The quick discovery of fire by Miss Susie Nyhus, chief operator at the Wisconsin Telephone Co., and quick response and good work by the fire department, prevented what might have been a most disastrous fire to the Jacobson Shoe Store, Morris Hat Shop and Wisconsin Telephone Co.

Fire, which supposedly started when gas fumes in the furnace in the basement of the Jacobson Shoe store, blew the furnace doors open throwing live coals out onto the basement floor, ignited paper and waste some distance from the furnace.

Oscar Serlev, janitor, made his rounds at 2:30 this morning and when he left the Jacobson Store there were no signs of fire. At 2:45 Miss Nyhus, night chief operator, smelled smoke and immediately notified the fire department which responded at once and fought the fire through the windows of the basement in front of the building. The store itself was filled with smoke, and made it difficult for the firemen to get into the building. Geo. Borgenheimer, one of the firemen, was overcome by smoke.

COUPE COLLIDES WITH FIRE TRUCK

**Two Vehicles Both Damaged
in Crash Near High School
at Noon.**

The Stutz fire truck pumper of the fire department, being driven by Geo. Borgenheimer, sustained a damaged fender in a collision with a Ford coupe belonging to Henry Geissler while speeding to a call from the Chrystal residence on North Jefferson avenue, at 11:40 o'clock today. No persons were injured.

The truck was going north on Bay street to Oak, which is the route taken by the fire truck drivers responding to calls in North Chippewa in order to avoid a corner and heavy traffic on the more traveled streets. Mr. Geissler was driving west on Cedar street and the two vehicles met at the intersection of the two streets.

There was a crash and the two vehicles stopped. Both drivers immediately backed away from each other, and the truck proceeded on its way to the Chrystal residence. The coupe was also damaged but Driver Borgenheimer said upon his return to the fire station that Mr. Geissler had driven away when the fire squad passed that way in its return from the call.

Mr. Borgenheimer attempted to stop the truck in order to prevent a collision as indicated by tracks in the

snow where the wheels had skidded. Indications pointed also to efforts made by Mr. Geissler to stop his car before the crash.

George Borgenheimer Is Elected District Commander of V.F.W.

George Borgenheimer, Post No. 1038, Chippewa Falls, was elected district commander of the Fourth district of the Veterans of Foreign Wars at the district convention held in this city Sunday. Leonard Loken, Post 305, Eau Claire, was chosen district council member to succeed Edward Conley, formerly of this city, now residing at Kenosha.

Temporary district officers were elected as follows: Vice-commander, Carl M. Toft, Stanley, junior vice-commander, L. E. Gray, Chetek; quartermaster, Frank Glonskie, Eau Claire.

A large representation from posts at Stanley, Ladysmith, Eau Claire, Menomonie, Chetek and Chippewa Falls attended. The meeting was called to order by Department Chief of Staff A. G. Bleum. An interesting and enlightening talk was given by Robert L. Wiley, Chippewa Falls, on the National Economy League.

After the business meeting, supper was served by the Auxiliary of the local post to about 100 guests. The supper music was furnished by Ed. Gunn and Herman Klages, and the evening program consisted of a com-

edy act by David Zenoff and R. Smith, a trumpet and clarinet solo by the Ross brothers; music by the Hawaiian quartet composed of Mr. and Mrs. Harry King, and Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Nolop, and a clog dance by Chrissie Holter.

Two local firemen were seriously burned and a third injured when an explosion occurred while they were fighting a fire in the Gonyea apartments, Main street, Monday morning. George Borgenheimer and William Huber were trapped in the flaming room when the force of the explosion jammed the only door and they had to batter it down. They both were burned about the face and hands. Edmund Paul, who was in the doorway at the time the blast occurred, was sent hurtling down a flight of stairs by the force of the explosion. The building was a total loss. Both Paul and Huber are expected to be in the hospital for more than a month and Borgenheimer is expected to be released soon.

The nearly 300 men of Co. A and Hdqtrs. Co. of Chippewa Falls, and Co. B of Stanley were under the command of Capt. E.H. Firth and Capt. John Hanley.

At Camp McArthur at Waco, Tex., they trained as part of the 32nd Red Arrow Division and left for Europe

on Feb. 7, 1918. The Fourth Wisconsin Infantry Band, organized at the Chippewa Armory in May, 1917, by Band Leader Louis Altman, also embarked from New York with the 32nd Division.

Chippewa County men were to participate in some of the most devastating action at Chateau-Thierry, Soissons and the Argonne Forest. Of the 2,100 boys from Chippewa County who served in W.W.I. nearly 500 served overseas with the 32nd Division.

The Ladies Auxiliary Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States Post 1038 received a national certificate congratulating it on its 65th anniversary.

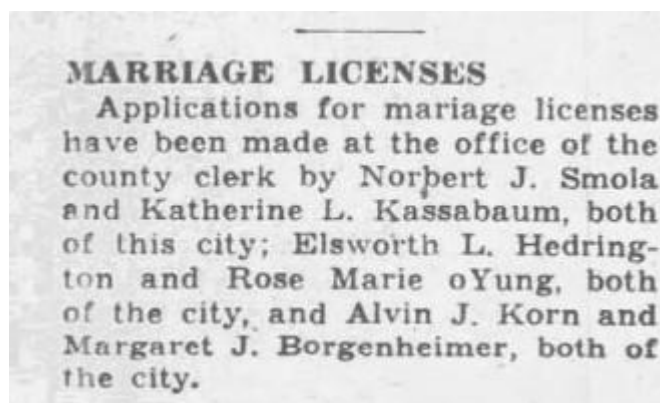

Sentence Delayed

Threatening Letter Lands Man in Court

Leo Delaney, 34, Chippewa Falls, one-time crane operator for the H. F. Radant Construction Co., in Eau Claire, pleaded nolo contendere in county court today to a charge of writing a threatening letter to Henry J. Radant over a disagreement on unemployment compensation checks.

District Attorney Edmund A. Nix told the court Radant received a letter containing the following statements:

"I also wonder if you know how many thousands dollars damage five pounds of sugar could do to a bunch of equipment. I know that you know that lots can go wrong with machinery. Anything could tomorrow or even five years from now. Who knows. Two plus two make four."

THE LETTER was signed: "Thank you—you're one time crane operator."

Nix said Radant felt the letter contained enough threat to take it to the police. He told them who he thought wrote

the letter. The FBI examined the letter and compared the handwriting with other copies of Delaney's writing, reporting them the same.

Nix said Radant had a difference of opinion with Delaney on whether he was eligible or not for unemployment compensation. He said Radant reported the man was fired and therefore ineligible.

Represented by Richard Stafford of Chippewa Falls, Delaney said he wrote the letter from Arizona where he was working for a Los Angeles construction firm.

Judge Connor T. Hansen felt the charge was serious enough to warrant Delaney taking the witness stand and giving more detailed testimony under oath.

DELANEY SAID he had worked for the local construction company for six months last year, leaving the company in November. He said he couldn't get along with one of the sons. He testified he never intended putting sugar in Radant's equipment, pass-

ing off the statement in the letter as "just one of those things."

Judge Hansen found Delaney guilty of the charge and ordered a presentence investigation be made by the State Department of Public Welfare. He placed the man under a \$500 bond and adjourned the case to Aug. 3.

Delaney was a former crane operator for the company and had a disagreement with Radandt over unemployment compensation. Radandt maintained Delaney wasn't eligible for compensation because he was fired from the job.

After court was completed, Police Officer Norman E. Hahn walked up to Delaney and his attorney with a warrant for Delaney's arrest. He is wanted in Juneau County for not supporting six children by a previous marriage.

FARM BUILDINGS BURN

Nearly Everything George Borgenheimer Had Went Up In Smoke Sunday.

George Borgenheimer's house, barn, sheds, a team of horses, a stack of rye and several chickens on his farm, a mile southeast of the city were consumed by fire early Sunday morning. All that remains standing on the farm is a small woodshed.

It was one of the quietest fires that ever occurred. The neighbors living directly across the road did not know there was a fire until they arose in the morning. The blaze was plainly visible in the city and the Independent made a strenuous effort to locate it, but was unable to do so.

ENDS HIS LIFE BY HANGING

**William Stoddard Commits
Rash Deed In The County Jail
Yesterday Morning.**

The community was shocked yesterday morning when the news spread around that William Stoddard had committed suicide by hanging himself in a cell at the county jail, where he was placed Saturday night in a sick condition.

Yesterday morning at 6:30 the turnkey, Euclid Forest, went to Mr. Stoddard's apartment and as he opened the door the frightful spectacle of a body hanging by the neck confronted him. The young man had raised the upper bunk so that the chain from which it is suspended slackened and formed a noose, then he stood upon the lower bunk, placed his head through the noose and stepped off. Mr. Borgenheimer, who is confined in the jail talked with the unfortunate man about 12 o'clock Sunday night and heard him moving about for some time after that, so it is believed that the deed was committed about 2 o'clock. He had his head in the noose when Borgenheimer saw him last, but Mr. Borgenheimer says he "thought he was only joking," so he did not alarm the jail attaches.

Mr. Stoddard was very popular in society during his boyhood days and those who knew him then regret very much that he met such a tragic death. He was born in Eau Claire, the son of Nathan D. Stoddard who moved to this city a few years afterward. His father was a cook in the woods and afterward conducted a restaurant and buffet. The young man was employed as clerk in C. F. Smith's grocery store for a number of years and about ten years ago went to Montana. Little was heard of him until he returned early last summer. His acquaintances here will remember him as "Willie," or "Nibs" Stoddard.

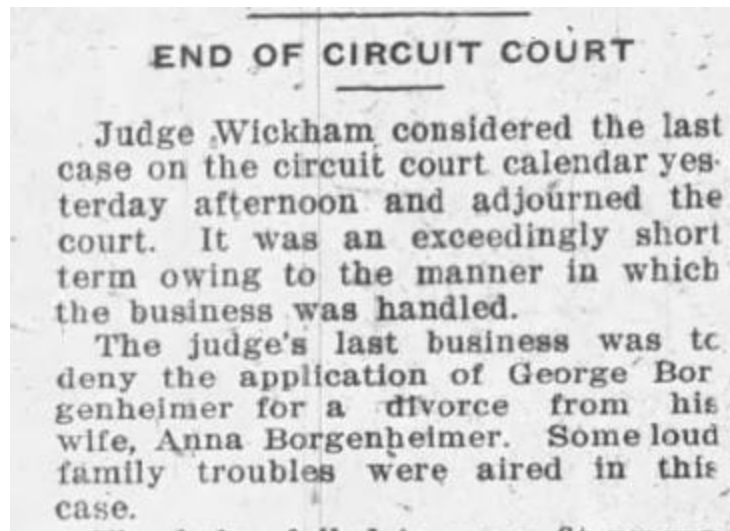

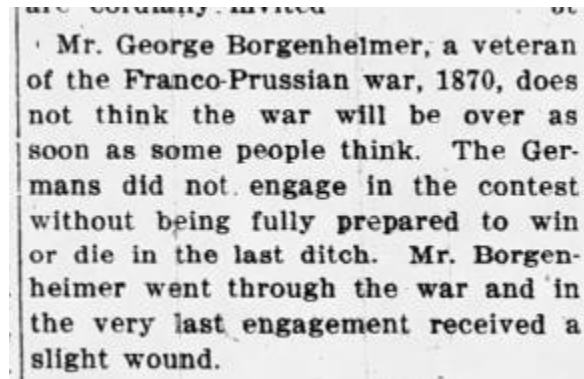

Harry F. Boetcher, 63, Dies As Result of Heart Attack

Harry F. Boetcher, 63, Great Falls business man, civic worker and former fire department captain, died early Thursday morning at a local hospital. He had been a patient there since he suffered a heart attack at his office two weeks ago. His home was at 805 Fifth avenue north.

Boetcher retired Oct. 15, 1943, from the fire department, in which he had served 27 years. He was a captain four years and prior to that a lieutenant. He was active in fire prevention work for years and annually spoke to thousands of local school children on that subject.

Since his retirement from the fire department, Boetcher, although he had engaged in business, entered wholeheartedly into public work. At the time of his recent illness he maintained a real estate and insurance office in the Montana Bank & Trust Co. building.

Probably his most notable civic contribution was in the cause of polio prevention. Friends state that he was especially devoted to the interests of children. He became city chairman of the annual March of Dimes campaign here in January, 1948, and in October, 1948, was made

chairman of its Cascade county drive.

In October, 1949, Boetcher was

again chairman of the drive and on March, 1950, he was elected chairman of the Cascade county chapter

of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Inc., being re-elected to the office in July this year.

Under his direction, the county March of Dimes drive in 1950, with \$18,628.58 realized, was the most successful ever conducted here, according to Julius E. Hilgard, state chairman.

Boetcher was a fourth degree member of the Knights of Columbus and an active member also of the Chamber of Commerce, Rotary club, Serra club, First Montana Toastmasters club and the Firemen's Protective Assn. He held an interest in the Petite Shoppe, Inc., with his wife, Mrs. Emma Boetcher, and daughter, Mrs. Margaret Taylor. In 1932 he served as president of the Lower Sun River Valley Community club.

He had been a member of the USO board here since its activation. He was also on its Junior Hostesses and Airmen's council boards.

Boetcher was born Oct. 24, 1888, at Chippewa Falls, Wis. He came to Miles City, Mont., in 1906 and to Great Falls in 1907, where he had since resided. Mr. and Mrs. Boetcher were married here Oct. 24, 1914.

Surviving close relatives besides the widow and the daughter, Mrs. Taylor, are two sons, John of Wilamette, Ill., and Harry F. Jr. of Asheville, N. C., and five grandchildren. The body is at the T. F. O'Connor Co. undertaking rooms. Funeral arrangements are pending communications from the sons.

Boetcher leaves also two brothers Robert of Duluth and George of Chippewa Falls, and three sisters, Mrs. Ane Clem and Mrs. Genevieve Blaisdell of Chippewa Falls, and Mrs. Ellen Maleitzka of Minneapolis.

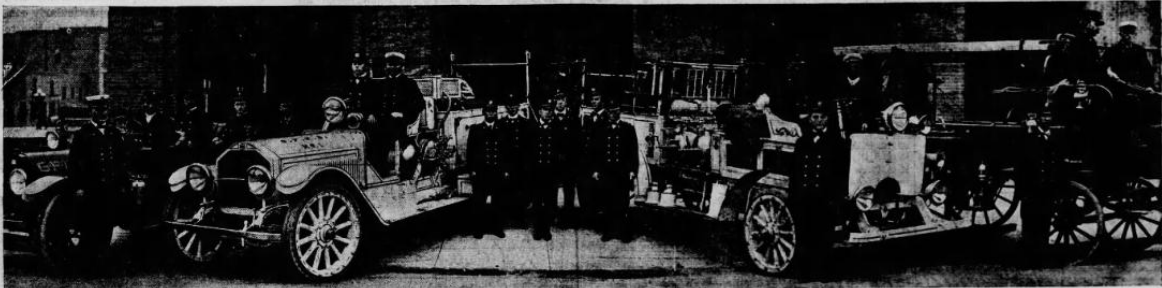

BUILDING BURNS; ORIGIN MYSTERY

HOUSE OCCUPIED BY MRS. PAUL
BRUEHLING DESTROYED
EARLY THIS MORNING

The house on Fifth-av, lower South side, occupied by Mrs. Paul Bruehling and her three children was burned to the ground at 1 o'clock this morning. Not a piece of wood large enough to make a toothpick remains about the smouldering ruins.

The fire was discovered by William Fowler and by that time the interior of the building was in flames. An alarm was sent in and the fire department responded, but the building was too far gone to have attempted to save anything. Anyhow, it was located outside the fire limit and the reach of water. The department was of service in saving nearby buildings. The bright illumination brought out a large crowd of people.

The building was owned by Mr. Staske of Whitehall, Wis., and it is said no insurance was carried. Mrs. Bruehling, it is understood, carried \$1,200 insurance on her furniture, not a sufficient sum to cover the loss.

Mrs. Bruehling and the children had been staying at the home of her mother, Mrs. Borgenheimer, on Vine-st., for several days and as no one had been in the house during that time, the origin of the fire is a mystery.

PITCHED BATTLE WHILE IT LASTS

Charge of Assault Against Women Dismissed After Judge Hears Stories.

It was a pitched battle while it lasted, for both admitted they pitched in and pulled hair. However, that and the fact that the fight was over a 50 cent lamp were all they did agree upon; each charged the other with being the aggressor and after listening to both of their stories, Judge Cook yesterday afternoon dismissed a charge of assault against Mrs. Genevieve Bruehling preferred by Mrs. Edith Putnam.

Neither the plaintiff nor the defendant had witnesses to bear out the evidence she gave, although Mrs. Putnam displayed some scratches on her neck, so the judge said it appeared to be so much of a "cat and dog" affair that he could not fix the blame, so dismissed the case.

"Battle of the Lamp"

The "battle of the lamp" occurred Wednesday evening, and the story of the principals as given on the witness stand is the best description of the fracas. They both reside on Canal street.

Mrs. Putnam was the first to take the stand. "Well, in the first place, Mr. Cook," she said, "my sister borrowed a lamp from me and let Mrs. Bruehling use it. We had only two and the one I let her take was worth only 50 cents, but was a keepsake of my husband and yesterday he wanted the lamp back. So I went to my sister's and told her to get the lamp. She went

and told her to get the lamp. She went to Mrs. Bruehling's house but came back without the lamp, saying that Mrs. Bruehling would not give it to her unless she gave her another one. Then, I said I would go and get it.

Hair Grabbing Starts

"I went to her house and rapped on the door and when she opened it, I walked in and said; 'I want my lamp.' She grabbed me by the hair, so I grabbed her by the hair. Then she grabbed me by the throat and pushed me onto the floor but I hung on to her hair. She said 'let go of my hair,' but I said I won't until you let go of my throat. Then a boarder came into the room and wanted to know what the rumpus was about, but she still hung on to my throat and I hung on to her hair. I said 'let go of my neck and I'll let go of your hair.' Then she let loose and I let go. The boarder got the lamp and gave it to Mrs. Bruehling and she gave it to me and then pushed me out of the house onto the porch and told me to get out. I had no intention of fighting when I went there, but she started it and when she pulled my hair I pulled hers."

The second act opened with Mrs. Bruehling on the stand. After relating a story of loaning a lamp to Mrs. Putnam's sister a year ago with the understanding she would get it back when she needed it, Mrs. Bruehling said she asked for the lamp the day before and got one, but not her own. Wednesday evening, she said, Mrs. Putnam's sister came after the lamp, and she refused to give it to her unless she would bring another one in its place. Then the sister left, but let Mrs. Bruehling go on with the story.

Denies Any Choking

"Then Mrs. Putnam came back like a wild cat and said she wanted her lamp. I told her she could have hers if she would get me mine. Then she forced her way into my house and when I told her to get out she grabbed me by the hair and tried to get by me

to get the lamp, but I wouldn't let her. We had company and I didn't want them to know of the row, but she knocked the panels out of a door and then sat down on the floor while hanging on to my hair. I did not choke her and I hope to die if I attacked her and I tried to talk nice to her."

Mrs. Putnam denied that she had forced her way into the Bruehling home and Mrs. Bruehling could not explain the scratches on Mrs. Putnam's neck.

Each continued to blame the other for the fracas and with no witnesses to bear out either's claim and unable to decide where the blame might lie, the judge dismissed the case.

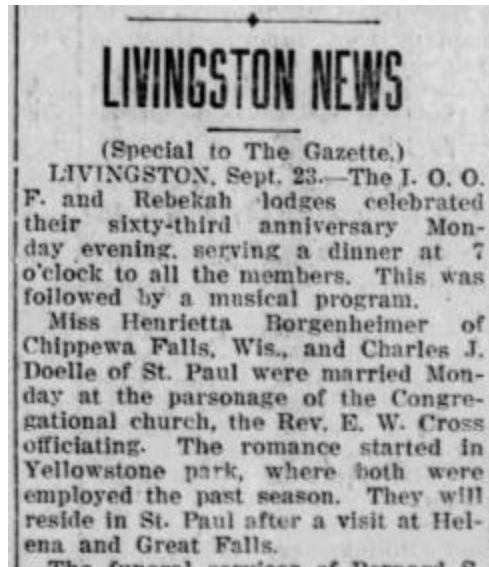

Ten Perish as Airliner Falls and Is Burned

Attempt to Recover Bodies From Montana Mountain Halted by Blizzard.

Walter E. Borgenheimer of Basin, Mont., one of ten persons killed in an airplane crash near Bozeman, Mont., late yesterday, was on his way to the bedside of his mother, Mrs. Anna Borgenheimer, who is critically ill at her home in this city.

Bozeman, Mont. (AP) — A biting blizzard threw a snowy shroud over the bodies of 10 persons killed when a Northwest Airlines plane crashed and burned in the Bridger Mountains 14 miles north of here yesterday.

Piloted by Nick Mamer, who had flown more than 1,000,000 miles without injuring a passenger, the plane went into a tailspin and plunged nose-first into a small clearing. The nose was snapped off by impact with the frozen ground.

Searchers found all aboard dead, but the storm forced them to give up until late today the task of bringing the bodies here. A guard was left at the crash scene.

Plows to Open Roads.

Gallatin county officials said snow-plows would open the roads when the bodies are brought down by bobsled.

Two woodcutters, C. A. Larson and Glenn White, were working about 200 feet from where the plane crashed but were unable to approach because of the flames. They went immediately for help and met Sheriff Lovitt I. Westlake and a party of forest rangers.

Northwest Airlines officials in St. Paul listed the dead as Mamer, Co-Pilot F. W. West, both of Spokane, and these eight passengers:

Croil Hunter, president of Northwest Airlines, issued this statement at St. Paul:

"It has been determined that all on board lost their lives.

"Until a thorough investigation has been completed by both the Airline officials and the Department of Commerce we will be unable to make any statement as to the definite causes surrounding the same."

F. W. Whittemore, vice president in charge of operations, said company representatives were enroute to the crash scene to investigate.

The sheriff reported the bodies were badly burned, three had been thrown, or fallen, from the fuselage, and the others were tossed into the front of the shattered airliner.

Line's First Passenger Deaths.

The passengers were the first ever killed in a transport plane crash in Montana, and the first to meet death on a Northwest Airlines flight. The National Safety Council awarded the line a certificate last year for its 11-year record of flying 47,000,000 passenger miles with no passenger fatalities.

The plane, bound for Chicago from Seattle via Minneapolis, had been grounded for a time at Butte because of bad weather.

First word of the disaster came to the forest service from Elmer Johnson, a rancher who said he saw a plane fall near the Flaming Arrow Dude Ranch. Sheriff Westlake and forest rangers started for the area on the basis of this report.

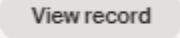

PLANE VICTIM CHIPPEWA BOY

**Walter E. Borgenheimer Killed
While Speeding to Bedside
of Mother.**

Walter B. Borgenheimer, 36, and a former resident of Chippewa Falls, met his death yesterday as a passenger of the ill-fated air liner that crashed near Bozeman, Mont., while flying to the bedside of his mother who is in a critical condition here. His mother, Mrs. Anna Borgenheimer, 102 West Vine St., did not know of her son's death today.

Walter Borgenheimer was born in the town of Hallie September 25, 1901 and was a resident of Chippewa county until 1929 when he moved to Basin, Mont., where he since has made his home. He was a member of the Chippewa Falls fire department for several years, and was highly esteemed by his many friends here.

His wife, formerly Eve Detour of Chippewa Falls, and a ten months old daughter, Ann, survive his death. He was notified of his mother's illness the day before yesterday and took a plane from Butte, Mont., to fly to her bedside. A last minute cancellation left an empty seat on the plane yesterday. Had it not been for the cancellation he would have taken a later plane and escaped the crash.

He had been a contractor at Basin since 1929 and at the time of his death had built up a successful enterprise. His brother, William Borgenheimer, city, worked with him since 1930 and

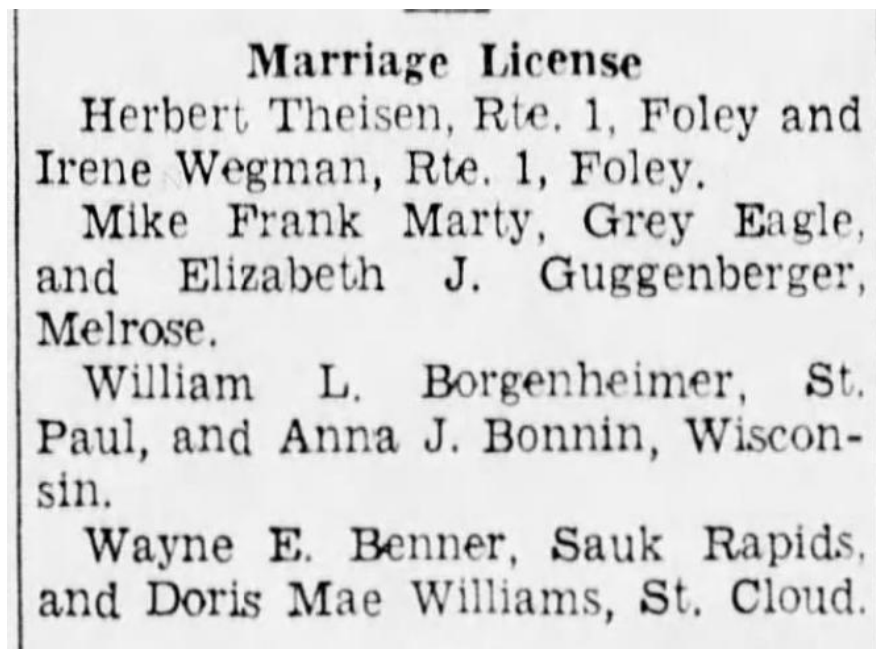

(Ellen) Perry of Fort Knox KY. Buried in Hope Cemetery, Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI, the same as his parents. F: 93078309

"Brother" – apparently first cousin:

- Harry Boetcher, born Boettcher, known in Wisconsin as Harry / Harry Frederick Borgenheimer but in Montana as Boetcher, 24 Oct 1888 Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI – 28 Nov 1951 Great Falls, Cascade MT. – Raised by George & Anna (Boettcher) Borgenheimer in Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI. Mentioned in their obituaries & those of his "siblings" as a brother named Harry Borgenheimer. Even his obituary in WI refers to him as "Harry Borgenheimer." - Obituary: "Chippewa Herald-Telegram" 30 Nov 1951 p 3 – Harry died suddenly 28 Nov 1951 at Columbus Hospital in MT. He had just been home to attend the funeral of his sister Mrs. Charles (Henrietta) Doelle in Chippewa Falls on 1 Nov 1951. His brother George left by plane to MT to attend Harry's funeral 1 Dec at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Great Falls. He will be buried in Great Falls MT. B. Chippewa Falls 24 Oct 1888 & educated here. Went to MT as a young man & has lived there since. Married Emma Eisemhart of Great Falls. Survived by 3 sisters: Mrs. Walter Malietzka (Minneapolis), Mrs. Genevieve Blaisdell (Chippewa Falls) & Mrs. A.E. Clem (Chippewa Falls).

- HOWEVER, Harry is born Oct 1888 & “father” George Borgenheimer marries “mother” Anna Boettcher on 7 Sep 1889. On 9 (or 11) Jul 1888 in Brown Co. WI, August Boettcher, a resident of Tilden WI, married “Lima Timis.” In Jun 1892, August & “Emelia” Boettcher divorce. In the divorce petition, they report they have not lived together for 5 years. A wedding date in Jul 1888 makes it likely they are the parents of Harry Boettcher, born Oct 1888. August is the brother of Anna Boettcher Borgenheimer.
- In the 1910 census, Harry Boetcher – who drops the double-T in Boettcher – resides in Great Falls, Cascade MT, a hired man/butcher. He is age 30, born US, parents b. Germany.
- On 24 Oct 1914 in Cascade Co. MT, Harry Frederick Boetcher married Emma Veronica Eisenbart (1893 MT – 1982 MT, F; 118064454), the daughter of John Eisenbart & Emma Rose Schenck.
- Both MT & WI newspapers agree on his birthdate and death date & his surviving siblings, although his MT obituary lists only his brothers’ first names & not their surname Borgenheimer.
- His Find A Grave record links him to his biological father, August Henry Boettcher (1863-1940, F: 37554485). His MT death certificate lists his father as August Boettcher; his mother’s name is left blank. August Henry Boettcher is the son of August Johann Boettcher & Henrietta Catherine Hafferman. This makes him the biological brother of Anna Maria Caroline (Boettcher) Borgenheimer. To complicate genealogy, August appears to marry a woman named Anna Marie (1869-1936) in 1894 in Cook Co. IL so she appears on Ancestry.com family trees as Harry’s father – or his mother appears to be confused with August’s sister Anna.
- Supposition: George Borgenheimer and his wife Anna Boettcher Borgenheimer, who married almost 11 months after Harry Boettcher/Boetcher’s birth, adopted or fostered or at least raised Harry, their nephew, the son of Anna’s brother. Harry presumably used the surname Boetcher because he was legally born “Boettcher” and not “Borgenheimer.”

- Genevieve R. Borgenheimer Bruehling Blaisdell, 26 Jul 1890 Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI – 21 Sep 1967 Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI. - Wife of Paul J. Bruehling (3 Aug 1888 – d. in service in WWI of pneumonia at Camp Forest GA on 11 Oct 1918 (F: 93078438). They married 7 Sep 1907 in St. Charles Catholic Church, Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI. – Married Amos Guy Blaisdell (1894 Spencer, Juneau WI -4 May 1960 Ironwood, Gogebic MI, F: 224675508) in May 1939 in Duluth, St. Louis Co. MN. He is known as Guy Blaisdell. Guy is the son of Wilber Fayette Blaisdell (115555881) & Mary E. Duffy (F: 210117922). - Genevieve accused Guy of domestic violence in Nov 1913, for which he was arrested. His identity is confirmed

by newspaper mentions of his siblings & children. His sister was Donna Blaisdell (1881-1941, F: 131936419), the wife of Harry Bodle (1874-1950, F: 115556127). - In the 1940 census, she is listed as Blaisdell, but without a husband named in the household. Obituary: "Eau Claire Leader-Telegram" 21 Sep 1967 p 18 -Mrs. Genevieve Blasidell, 77, of 105 ½ Bridge St., Chippewa Falls, d. 21 Sep 1967 at her home. She married Paul Bruehling Sep 1907 in Chippewa Falls; he died 1918. Later married Guy Blaisdell. Worked at Chippewa Falls Woolen Mills 26 years; retired 1958. Survived by 2 sisters: Ms. A.E. Clem (Chippewa Falls) & Ms. Walter Maleitzke (Minneapolis) & 1 brother; George A. Borgenheimer (Chippewa Falls). - Buried in Hope Cemetery, Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI. As of 1 Jul 2024, she has 2 Find A Grave records, one as Bruehling (F: 93078434) & one as Blaisdell (F: 93078259).

- Henrietta (Etta) Sarah Borgenheimer Doelle, 20 Nov 1891 Chippewa Co. WI – 28 Oct 1951 Ramsey Co. MN (a resident of 395 Jenks Ave., St. Paul, Ramsey MN). - Wife of Charles Jacob Doelle (1887-1963, F: 170853752). They married 22 Sep 1914 in Livingston, Park MT. He was from St. Paul MN; they met the summer of 1914 while both were working in Yellowstone National Park. Both are buried in Forest Hill Cemetery, Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI. F: 170853766
- Ella/Ellen Maria Borgenheimer Maleitzka, 21 Feb 1893 Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI – 24 Dec 1976 Minneapolis, Hennepin MN. - Wife of Walter C. Maleitzka (1888-1969, F: 135466374). They obtained a marriage license in Eau Claire, Eau Claire WI on 4 Nov 1921. – Buried in Lakewood Cemetery, Minneapolis, Hennepin MN. F: 135466371
- Robert George Borgenheimer, 6 Dec 1895 Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI – 4 Dec 1964 St. Louis Co. MN. In "Honor Roll, Chippewa County" on same page as brothers George & Walter. Entered Army at Chippewa Falls WI Apr 1917. Private, Co. A, 4th WI Infantry. Trained at Camp Douglas WI. Discharged 14 Aug 1918. Married in St. Louis Co. MN on 29 Jul 1918 to Alice Lillian Kniss (1897-1989, F: 149636202) Buried in Oneota Cemetery, Duluth, St. Louis MN. F: 149636058
- Anna [later Ane] Theresa Borgenheimer Clem, 9 Oct 1899 Lafayette, Chippewa WI – 14 Jun 1982 Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI. - Private in WWII, Women's Air Corp. Served in the US Army from 9 Jul 1943 to 24 Jan 1944. – Wife of Alvertise Eugene Clem (1885-1968, F: 172794440) whom she married on 5 Jun 1946 in Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI. Obituary: "Eau Claire Leader-Telegram" 15 Jun 1982 p 4- Ana B. Clem, age 82, 110 Pear St., Chippewa Falls, d. 14 Jun at St. Joseph's Hospital, Chippewa Falls. Born in Chippewa Falls. Married Alvertise Clem in Chippewa Falls in 1946. Was in the Women's Air Corps in WWII. Employed at Chippewa Shoe Co., from where she retired in 1962. Ane Clem is buried in Forest Hill Cemetery, Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI. F: 115985145

- Walter Ezra ("Willie") Borgenheimer, 25 Sep 1901 Lafayette, Chippewa WI – 10 Jan 1938 outside Bozeman, Gallatin MT in an airplane crash. - In "Honor Roll, Chippewa County" on same page as brothers Robert & George. Entered Army 4 Apr 1917. Trained at Fort Sill OK. Made saddler in HQ Co., 1st Field Artillery. - WWI veteran,

tombstone indicates from Wisconsin. - Listed as "Emil" in the 1905 WI state census. - Husband of Eve (sometimes Eva) DeTour (identified as Deton in one obituary). She is mentioned in MT newspapers as Eve DeTour through Feb 1936, then as Mrs. Eve Borgenheimer with the DeTour family in Apr 1936. - Walter & Eve's daughter Ann Mary Borgenheimer was born 23 Mar 1937 in Butte, Silver Bow MT. Ann had the surname Cummins when her mother died in May 1985. - Widowed, Eve Borgenheimer married William Anthony Twohy (1900-1977, F: 70843006) in Butte, Silver Bow MT on 6 Jan 1945. Eva (10 Dec 1902 MT - 28 May 1985 MT, F: 70843053) was the daughter of Louis Henry DeTour (1870-1933, F: 71824579) & Mary Agnes Durnen (1878-1965, F: 70843219). - Walter dies at age 35 years, 3 months, 15 days, on 10 Jan 1938 outside Bozeman, Gallatin MT in an airplane crash. Was a carpenter; resident of Basin MT. Obituary: "Chippewa Herald-Telegram" 11 Jan 1938 p 1 & p 4 - Walter R. Borgenheimer, 36, formerly of Chippewa Falls, died as a passenger on an airliner which crashed near Bozeman MT. Walter was flying to the bedside of his critically ill mother in Chippewa Falls. Anna, who lives at 102 W. Vine St., does not know of her son's death. A resident of Chippewa Falls until 1929 when he moved to Basin MT where he has resided since. While in Chippewa Falls, worked at the fire department for several years. Survived by wife Eve Detour Borgenheimer (formerly of Chippewa Falls) & their 10-month-old daughter. Walter was notified of his mother's illness on 9 Jan & was taking a plane from Butte MT. A last-minute cancellation freed up a seat on an earlier plane, which crashed. A successful contractor in Basin MT since 1929. "Chippewa Herald-Telegram" 11 Jan 1938 p 1 - lead story: "Borgenheimer Dies in Plane Crash" with photo of Walter - A Northwest Airlines plane crashed & burned in the Bridger Mountains 14 miles north of Bozeman. The plane went into a tailspin, plunging nose-first into a clearing. The nose snapped off on the frozen ground. Searchers found all 10 aboard dead on 10 Jan but a storm/blizzard prevented removal of the bodies, so a guard was left on the plane. Two woodcutters 200 feet away saw the crash but were unable to approach due to flames. Killed were the pilot, co-pilot and 8 passengers, among them two Northwest employees (the state traffic manager & a mechanic) & W.E. Borgenheimer, 36, Basin MT, who cancelled a reservation on a later plane to speed to the bedside of his critically ill mother at Chippewa Falls. Northwest Airlines issued a statement that all on board had died. The bodies were badly burned, with three thrown from the fuselage & the rest found in the front of the plane. These were the first ever passengers to be killed in a transport plane crash in MT & the first to die on a Northwest Airlines flight. Last year the National Safety Council gave Northwest an award for 11 years, flying 47 million passenger miles, with no passenger fatalities. The plane was bound for Chicago from Seattle via Minneapolis. The flight had been grounded at Butte MT due to ill weather. Buried in Mountain View Cemetery, Butte, Silver Bow MT. F: 144439859

- Earl Eugene Borgenheimer, 31 Jan 1903 Lafayette, Chippewa WI - 12 Apr 1944 Stevens Point, Portage WI. - Married on 19 Jun 1943 in Eau Claire, Eau Claire WI to Ethel Marion Miller (30 Mar 1907 Spencer, Marathon WI - 2 Nov 2000 Eau Claire, Eau Claire WI, F: 17772753). She was the daughter of Louis Miller (1879-1953, F:

69983965) & Fannie Mae Truax (1881-1952; F: 69983993). – Earl & Ethel's son Walter was born 22 Jun 1944; he was mentally handicapped. Earl died in River Pines Sanitarium, Stevens Point, Portage WI. Ethel, who had been married for 18 months, did not remarry; she worked as a nurse. Their son Walter died 7 Jul 2006 (F: 117725754). Buried in Forest Hill Cemetery, Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI. F: 117725752

- Ruth Marilyn Borgenheimer, 1907 WI – 12 Sep 1908 Chippewa Co. WI. Buried in Forest Hill Cemetery, Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI. F: 167579158
- Wilhelm Leslie (William) Borgenheimer, 26 Feb 1910 Lafayette, Chippewa WI – 30 Sep 1949 Keflavik, Southern Peninsula, Iceland. – Husband of Anna Josephine Bonnin (1914 WI – 2008 WI, F: 115985213), the daughter of Joseph Nelson Bonnin & Mary Magdalene Korbitz. - whom William married 7 Mar 1944 in Stearns Co. MN, having obtained a marriage license in Feb 1944. Their MN marriage record (moms.mn.gov) misspells his surname as Borgenheiman. – Anna was previously married to Raymond C. Jasper, son of William Jasper, on 28 Jan 1937 in Notre Dame Catholic Church, Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI. Anna & Raymond separated in Sep 1940 & were divorced 18 Oct 1941 in Chippewa Falls, After William's death, Anna Borgenheimer married Irvn E. Hagen (1907-1975, F: 115985214) in 1961. Chippewa WI. Obituary: "Chippewa Herald-Telegram" 30 Sep 1949, p 3 – age 39, resident of Chippewa Falls, employed in Keflavik, Iceland, died suddenly today. He was construction foreman for Metcalf-Hamilton Kansas City Bridge Co & had been in Iceland for two years in August. He returned to Chippewa Falls several times on vacation. Born 28 Feb 1910 Chippewa Falls; married Anna Bonnin of Chippewa Falls in 1941. Survived by wife Anna; 3 brothers: Robert (Duluth MN), Harry (Great Falls MT) & George (Chippewa Falls) and 4 sisters: Mrs. Charles Doelle (St. Paul MN), Mrs. Walter Maleitzka (Minneapolis MN), Mrs. Genevieve Blasidel [sic] of Chippewa Falls & Mrs. A.E. Clem (Chippewa Falls). Buried in Forest Hill Cemetery, Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI. F: 167579219
