ROME — Funeral services for Winifred E. Doty, 63, of 1500 Black River Blvd. will be at the Thomas A. Cox Funeral Home Monday at 11 a.m. Burial will be in Forest Lawn cemetery, Camden.

Mr. Doty died yesterday in St. Luke's hospital, Utica after a long illness. Son of George and Jennie Jeliff Doty he was born in Camden Aug. 22, 1893.

He attended Camden and Rome schools and later served with the army in France during World War I. He and Myrtle E. Weeks of Utica were married in Utica July 2, 1913.

A former president of Rome YMCA he served with the New York Central Railroad for over 40 years.

He was a member of Calvary Methodist church, Ro-Mens Club, Rome Lodge of Elks, YMCA board of directors and was former president of the New York Central Veterans' Association, Adirondack chapter.

Surviving, besides his wife are a son, Ernest of Camden; a brother, Charles, of Rome, two sisters, Mrs. Fred Schnieder of Elbridge, and Georgetta B. Doty of Rome; two grandchildren.

Death Claims Winfred Doty At Age of 63

Winfred E. Doty, 63, of 1500 Black River Blvd., died this morning in St. Luke's Hospital, Utica, after a long illness.

The former president of the Rome YMCA and veteran of over 40 years of service with the New York Central Railroad was born Aug. 22, 1893, in Camden. He was a son of George B. and Jennie Jelliff Doty.

Educated in Camden and Rome, Mr. Doty served with the Army in France during World War I. On July 2, 1919, he and Myrtle E. Weeks, Utica, were married there by the Rev. Phillip Jessup. They had lived in Rome since their marriage.

Mr. Doty, a timber treating engineer with the railroad, had served as president of the New York Central Veterans' Assn., Adirondack Chapter. He was a member of the Calvary Methodist Church, Ro-Men's Club, Rome Lodge of Elks, YMCA Board of Directors, and the United States Wood Preservers Assn.

Besides his wife, he leaves a son, Ernest, Camden; a brother, Charles, Rome; two sisters, Mrs. A. Fred Schneider, Elbridge, and Georgetta B. Doty, Rome; two grandchildren, Camden, and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be at 11 a.m., Monday, in the Thomas A. Cox Funeral Home, conducted by the Rev. David N. Boswell, D.D., of the Calvary Methodist Church.

Burial will be in Forestlawn Cemetery, Camden.

When the Tuscania Went Down Off
the Coast of Ireland—Messages
Received by Relatives.

On Sunday messages were received in this city from Adjutant General McCain at Washington saying that Corporal Thomas P. Riley and Privates Howard C. Money and Winfred E. Doty had been saved. Corporal Riley has a brother at 270 Day avenue. Corporal Riley was a member of the National Guard and saw service on the Mexican border before going into the Aero Squadron.

It has been learned that there was another Roman on the Tuscania, John Parkin, 154 W. Dominick street. Mr. Parkin was a former employe at the Rome State Custodial Asylum and he left there and enlisted last October. Mr. Parkin's name appears on the partial unofficial list of the men saved.

Today's reports are to the effect that H. Snow of Camden, who was on the Tuscania, is among those saved.

LETTER FROM ROME BOY ON TUSCANIA

THE UNITED STATES TRANSPORT
THAT WAS TORPEDOED BY A
GERMAN SUBMARINE ON
FEB. 5.

Mrs. George Doty, 709 Wood street, this morning received the following letter from her son, Winifred E. Doty, Co. D, 20th Engineering Corps. Mr. Doty was on board the United States Transport Tuscania, which was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine on Tuesday, Feb. 5, off the Irish coast. There were two other Rome boys on the same boat, Corporal Thomas P. Rielly of the 158th Aero Squadron and Private Howard C. Money, 20th Engineering Corps, son of Mrs. Louise Money, 527 Turin street. As far as is known this is the first letter received here from any of these young men. The letter, which is written upon paper bearing the Y. M. C. A. triangle, reads as follows:

Over Seas, Feb. 8, 1918. Dearest Mother and All: I suppose that you are all worried because you have not heard from me but am writing as soon as we landed. I am safe and well although we have had some experience. Of course you read about the Tuscania being torpedoed and going down. I was on board that boat

so you can imagine what we were up against. It was not God's will that we all go down, so most of us were rescued.

We like it very much here, the people are so good to us and the "cats" are fine. We get four meals a day, so you can see that we are not starving. I think of you people so often and it does not seem as though I am so far away, but as soon as we do our bit over here we will all be back and I will help fill the family circle which I hope will never be broken.

I must say good-bye to you all for this time but will write more later. With lots of love to all, from

NATIONAL ANTHEM STARTED THE TEARS

WINFRED DOTY, TUSCANIA SUR-
VIVOR, SAYS THAT AIR SOUNDS
GOOD OVER SEAS.

Another letter has been received by Mr. and Mrs. George Doty, 709 Wood street, from their son, Winfred, a member of the 20th Engineers Corps who was on the Tuscania when it was torpedoed and sunk off the Irish coast. He escaped injury and after thrilling experiences reached some place in Ireland. Because of the censorship restrictions very little may be written by the members of the United States forces over seas so Mr. Doty's letter is brief. He dates the letter "Over Seas," and says in part:

"I am enjoying myself very much. Have traveled through two or three countries and it is fine. Just like summer here. Everything green. It is certainly a beautiful land. I enjoyed the trip on the ocean until we were torpedoed and that sure took the joy out of life. It was dark and all the lights went out so you can see what we were up against. The boat stayed up quite a while and that is all that saved us. There was only a small percentage of our company lost. A couple of days after, as we entered a city, we were met by a large band and when it struck up the Star Spangled Banner the tears sure did start. If that grand old air ever sounded good it did then.

LETTER FROM WINFRED DOTY

Rome Soldier Who is Connected With
the Twentieth Engineers
in France.

Mr. and Mrs. George B. Doty, 709
Wood street, have received the fol-
lowing letter from their son, Winfred,
who is with Gen. Pershing's army in
France:

Castets, France, June 9, 1918.—
Dear Father, Mother and All: This is
Sunday morning and a fine one too.
I am out in a woods by a small stream
writing letters. There is so much
noise around the camp you can't write
very well. Everything is fine here,
working hard every day.

The mill runs night and day, so you
see we are doing business. We have
two 10-hour shifts. We are getting
out lots of railroad ties and all kinds
of lumber.

Being in the southwestern part, it
gets pretty hot here but we get along
very nicely although the work is pret-
ty hard and I get rather tired some-
times, not being used to it.

I see the old war is getting pretty
close to home, but we all hope it
doesn't amount to much. Will be glad
when it is all over and I can get back
home again.

I get mail pretty regularly now. It
takes only a little over two weeks to
get your letters and that is making
pretty good time. Well, I guess I
have told you all, for there is not
much doing here, so will close for this
time. Hoping you are all well and
expecting a lot more letters soon.

PRIVATE W.E. DOTY HAD A FINE TRIP

CLIMBER A NUMBER OF PYRENEES MOUNTAINS.

HISTORIC CITY OF LOURDES

Reproduction of Mount Calvary—The Crucifixion of Christ Shown in Fourteen Different Stages — Many More Interesting Sights.

Following is an interesting letter from Private Winfred E. Doty, "over there," to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George B. Doty, 709 Wood street:

Captieux, France, Jan. 31, 1919.—Dear Father, Mother and All: Well, I've returned from my furlough and, believe me, I had some trip.

Undoubtedly you have by this time received the letters and cards I sent you from the Pyrenees. I have some more pictures, cards and little articles I have picked up around here, and I am going to put them in a box and send them home. I also have a German mortar shell which I am going to send. While in the Pyrenees I climbed a number of the mountains, although the snow was pretty deep in some places. It is the first snow I have seen since I left the United States. Although it gets pretty cold where our camp is located we do not have any snow.

Another trip I took outside the Pyrenees was to the historic city of Lourdes. I think it is, in fact I know it is, one of the most religious Catholic cities in the world. It is wonderful. I wouldn't have missed it for a great deal. On a mountain side at the edge of the city there is a reproduction of Mount Calvary. It gives the crucifixion of Christ in 14 different stages, from the time the disciples betrayed Him until the crucifixion, the burial and the resurrection. They are life-size bronze statues, and really you have to look twice to make sure the people are not alive. Another thing I saw was—of course you remember of reading of the little girl that had the vision of the Virgin Mary? Well, this happened right back of the big cathedral in Lourdes. There is a cave and there in the cave is a statue of the Virgin Mary exactly as it appeared to the little girl. Out of the mountain flowing into the cave is the tiny stream of water that is supposed to be so healing. People come from all over the world to be healed. Hanging all over the roof of the cave and on the outside are old crutches and canes that people used when they came there and left them after being healed. The cathedral is simply beautiful. The entire walls on the inside of the cathedral are covered with all kinds of fancy glass hearts and many other kinds of tokens that people have sent there in appreciation of the gratefulness for being healed. Another sight was a large castle supposed to have been built the year 17 A. D., so you can imagine it is an old one. It is built on a mountain outside the city and there is a tunnel dug under the ground from this castle to another city, Pau, that is located 40 kilometers, or about 20 miles, away. We didn't go through the tunnel, but it sure is there. We saw lots more in-

interesting cities. I am back on the job now and, as I told you in my other letter, I am at the headquarters now in the battalion supply, and I sure like it very much.

I thought for a time I would be home in a month or six weeks but I guess there is nothing doing now. It looks now as though we would be here six or eight months longer. I guess we have to clean up this timber job here and in that case it will take at least that long before we get everything finished. It's rather tough at that but I guess it has got to be done, so we must make the best of it. Of course, there is nothing certain about it but that is just as it looks now.

I received a nice long letter from Ras and believe me I was surprised for I had not heard from him for about six months, but it was a happy surprise for he writes such a good letter. I have to laugh from the time I start to read it.

I also received mother's letter yesterday. You said that Thompson had landed in the states. By Joe, I can't help envying a fellow that has arrived home or is on the way, for I have been away from home so long that I simply can hardly wait to get back.

There are two more places I would

like to visit before I come home and they are Paris and Italy. At the present time it is almost impossible for a soldier to get into Paris, but I think a little later they will issue passes to Paris and also into Italy, and if we are still here I think I shall try to go. It sure would be great to visit Rome, Italy, Monte Carlo, Naples, and some of the other big places there.

Well I think I have had quite a talk with you, so I guess I will close for this time. Hoping this letter finds you all as well as I am and waiting for another long letter from home. I remain, your loving soldier boy, Win.

Winfred E. Doty, 820 Croton St., has resigned as president of the Rome Taxpayers' Association to seek the Republican nomination for alderman of the Fifth Ward. His entrance into the active field of politics will result in a primary contest, as Alderman Arthur D. Williams seeks nomination to succeed himself.

Mr. Doty was born at Camden and has resided in Rome for 22 years. He has been in the employ of the New York Central Railroad Company at the Federal Creosoting plant for 23 years.

The candidate is a member of Calvary Methodist Church and the Romen's Club. He served 18 months overseas in the World War with the engineers.

Whether the already committed and threatened opposition for the various ward offices is a direct, concerted challenge to the city's Republican leadership is a question that has not been brought into the open as yet. Four Hurt In Crash of Two Autos

Winfred E. Doty, 58, of 1500 Black River Blvd., timber treating engineer at the New York Central Tie Plant here, was discharged after treatment for superficial injuries.

Meaning of Christmas

"When our children began questioning about Santa Claus, they were told Christmas was Christ's birthday and their gifts were given them to help celebrate His birthday. The result of this explanation was their suggestion to have a birthday cake for the Baby Jesus — a practice we have kept through the years, with the intention of always keeping "Christ in Christmas".
