STAR SPANGLED BANNER SUNG AS TUSCANIA WENT DOWN, SAY BROOKLYN SURVIVORS

Thrilling Story Told by Sergeants
Dubuque and Muller—New Yorker
Named Houston, Another of the
Rescued, Tells How He Was Saved

LONDON, Feb. 7.—Sergt. E. C. Dubuque and Sergt. Muller, both of Brooklyn, were rescued from a raft by a coasting schooner after the *Tuscania* was sunk.

The sergeants say that the *Tuscania* took a tremendous list to starboard almost as soon as she was hit. Almost all the lifeboats on that side were either blown into the air or otherwise rendered useless.

The soldiers were immediately lined up, and while standing at attention as one man began to sing "My Country 'Tis of Thee" and the "Star Spangled Banner." The crew, which lined up on the opposite side, sang "God Save the King."

BELFAST, Ireland, Feb. 7.—One of the stewards on the *Tuscania*, named Houston, whose home is in New York, was near the engine room when the explosion occurred. He had much difficulty in reaching his boat station, owing to the list to starboard.

The steward found the boat crowded, but it was launched successfully. "We were among the lucky ones," he said. "We got away easily."

LONDON, Feb. 7.—Thomas Smith of Glasgow, a boatswain's mate on the *Tuscania*, said the steamer was proceeding to an English port under convoy.

"At 5.45 o'clock on Tuesday evening," he continued, "I was in No. 1 room, talking with a fellow boatswain, when I heard a terrific explosion and felt the vessel keeling over. I said to my mate: 'They've got her now.'

"We commenced lowering boats on the starboard side. The soldiers were lined upon deck, waiting for the boats. Unfortunately many jumped overboard.

"I found the boat at No. 9 station, to which I proceeded, had been blown to pieces. I then helped to get boats 9-A, 9-B and 9-C away, with full complements, and the second officer got boats 1 to 7 safely away.

"After seeing these launched I proceeded to the other deck, where I launched a raft. I picked up fourteen soldiers and two of the ship's company who were swimming about. We had no oars and had to paddle along with our hands. We were picked up at 9 o'clock in the evening and landed Wednesday morning.

The first survivors were landed at 4.30 o'clock Wednesday morning. From then until 7 A. M. many patrol boats arrived, each bringing a full complement of survivors. All the medical men at Larne, on the north-eastern coast of Ireland, where some of the survivors were landed, were requisitioned.

Proof of the order which prevailed is given by the landing of two typhoid and two pneumonia cases without bad effect.

Three men from the *Tuscania* died from exposure in one boat.

Forty of the survivors were taken to hospitals. In the majority of cases they are suffering from injuries as a result of accidents in the lowering of lifeboats or in consequence of sliding down ropes. The survivors are proud of the behavior of the only two women on the *Tuscania*. They went down a rope in fine style, laughing.

n "Flag Was Still There!" Sang ; Soldiers on Sinking Transport

LONDON, Feb. 7.—Sergeants E. C. Dubuque and Muller, both of Brooklyn, N. Y., who were among the rescued from the Tuscania, gave a vivid picture of the final moments of the great troop ship.

S As the vessel began to list the soldiers were lined up at attention on one side of the deck, while the crew stood together on the other side. It was evening, just toward the gathering of darkness. The sea was calm. The excitement of the first rush to the decks had subsided. Before the davits began to rattle there was a momentary pause and almost complete silence.

O Suddenly this was broken by the voice of a soldier singing "My Country, 'Tis of Thee." As he finished the first stanza another started "The Star-Spangled Banner," and this was echoed all along the line.

Then from across the deck came the voices of the British crew singing "God Save the King" as they started upon the work of rescue.

Sergt. Dubuque said the boat to which he had been assigned was shattered by the explosion. He clambered over to the port side the best way he could and was placed in a boat with ten or twelve other men.

When he had been lowered about halfway down the ropes became disarranged. They were all thrown into the water. There was a rather heavy sea, but the sergeant was able to swim to the stern of the liner and climbed on a raft. There he found Sergt. Muller.

Sergt. Dubuque said he saw many men in the sea. Collapsible rafts were thrown overboard to enable those who were struggling in the water to save themselves. Some of these rafts struck loaded boats. The sergeant said he believed quite a number of the men must have been killed in this way.

The sergeant and the others on the raft were at the point of collapse when picked up, but they soon recovered. They are under the care of Dr. Langers of New York, who has been in the United States service for some time.

Sergeant George Arthur Muller, son of Mrs. Anna Muller of 1759 West Eleventh street, according to news dispatches, had a thrilling escape from drowning when the Tuscania went down. He and a pal, Sergeant E. C. Dubuque, improvised a raft and kept adrift until they were picked up by a patrol boat. Young Muller was only 19 years old. He enlisted on July 12, 1917, and was at first assigned to the coast artillery at Fort Hamilton, remaining there to November, 1917, when he was transferred to the 213th Aero Squadron at Mineola.

Young Muller was in Brooklyn three weeks ago, and at that time had with him papers notifying him of his promotion to sergeant. He had not expected to leave for France until some time in the spring. Muller was educated at Public School No. 10, the Bronx.

SPRINGFIELD BOY WAS LOST ON TUSCANIA

Earl Dubuque Sailed with Aero Squadron on Torpedoed Troopship

Earl Dubuque, a native of this city, a member of one of the aero squadrons aboard the torpedoed Tuscania, was lost when the ship went down, according to a telegram received this morning by his brother, Clarence Dubuque of 123 Chestnut street, Holyoke. The news of the death of the young aviator came as a sudden shock, as word had been received unofficially last night that he was among those rescued. Dubuque, who was 24 years of age, enlisted just before the draft. He entered the service at New York, and was sent to Mineola, L. I., for training.

A few days before the Tuscania sailed from this side on what was to be her last trip Dubuque sent word to his mother, Mrs Louise Dubuque, asking her to go to New York to bid him good-by. His mother left at once, but when she reached the point of embarkation her son had sailed.

Young Dubuque lived here about all but two years of his life. His father is dead. His mother is now in Richmond, Va. He leaves a widow, who was Miss Louise Phillips, and a three-years-old son. They are now with her father in Brattleboro, Vt. He leaves also, besides his brother, Clarence, four sisters, Mrs William Lacey of 217 Rogers avenue, Tatham, West Springfield, Mrs Joseph T. Davicino of 968 Worthington street, Springfield, and Mrs John J. Tindal of Washington, D. C., formerly of West Springfield and Mrs Ida Nicholson of this city, and another brother, John H. Dubuque of Richmond, Va., with whom the mother now makes her home.

DUBUQUE ONLY HOLYOKER ABOARD

**Other Local Men Who Might Have
Been on Tuscania Accounted For.**

Priv. Earl C. Dubuque of the 213th Aero Squadron, who is on the passenger list of the ill-fated Tuscania, is a former resident of this city. Priv. Dubuque has been away from Holyoke for about five years. A brother, Clarence W. Dubuque still lives here. He is at present living at 123 Chestnut street, and is employed as foreman for F. H. Revett, the plumber. Priv. Dubuque's mother, Mrs. Zoe Dubuque, formerly lived in the Belmont, apartments at 123 Chestnut street, but left last October for Richmond, Va., for a visit with a son, J. H. Dubuque, who is a sergeant of police there.

Priv. Dubuque is about 23, and a previous service man, having served an enlistment of three years in the Coast Artillery at Ft. Hamilton, N. Y. He was discharged from service about two years ago and located in Brooklyn, N. Y., where he was married and where his wife and baby now reside. Being of military age

he registered in June and was caught in the first draft. Being a former soldier, Dubuque did not like the idea of being drafted so he obtained his release and joined the aviation corps.

His brother in this city last heard from him about three weeks ago just prior to his departure. His mother was also at that time headed north from Richmond to see him off, but it was later learned that he had gone before she got there. Mrs. Dubuque is now in New York and it is very likely that she may soon return to Holyoke. Priv. Dubuque was a machinist by trade but has formerly worked as an electrician.

Besides his mother and brother in this city, there are four sisters, Mrs. W. H. Lacey of West Springfield, Mrs. John Tindal of Washington, D. C., and Mrs. Maud Davidson, and Mrs. Ida Nicholson of Springfield, and a brother in Richmond, J. H. Dubuque, who is a sergeant on the Richmond police force.

Harold F. Alken of 91 Newton street, a member of Co. A, 5th Battalion, 20th Forestry Engineers, was not on the Tuscania, according to the official list of officers and troops on board. Neither were Leonard P. Taylor, 605 Beech street; Arthur E. Wells, 304 Chestnut street, or Lieut. Frederick R. Young, 97 Beacon avenue.

A card received today allayed the fear of relatives for the safety of Priv. John O'Brien, who is a member of a unit which had members aboard the Tuscania. The card was mailed Feb. 5 and had evidently been mailed on this side but not released until word had been received that the sender had arrived safe on the other side.

The message was brief and to the point. "Safe" was all it said. Private Radasch was a member of Co F of the 20th engineers, a forestry unit. He enlisted in Springfield about two months ago and was sent to Fort Slocum for training. The arrival of the cablegram yesterday put an end to the anxiety of his parents, who were informed Friday by the war department that their son

was on the Tuscania.

No word has as yet been received regarding the fate of Private George V. R. Carey of 22 Reed street, this city, who is a member of the 6th battalion of the 20th engineers, medical detachment. Private Carey enlisted in Springfield and has hitherto been stationed at Camp Washington at Washington, D. C. Before entering the service he was in the employ of the Metropolitan life insurance company.

The other three Western Massachusetts men who were aboard the vessel are reported safe. They are Dexter L. Bullard of South Hadley Falls, S. W. Eager of Deerfield, a private in Co E, 6th battalion of the 20th engineers, and Charles F. Fasce of Pittsfield. The last is the son of Mrs. Fred Fasce of 102 Newell street, Pittsfield. He was a member of the mobile laboratory of the 32d division of the national guard, a Michigan outfit. He is a former Pittsfield high school athlete and was on the state interscholastic championship basketball team in 1915 and 1916.

Earl C. Dubuque of Springfield, Mass., was ordered committed to the house of correction for six months by Justice E. L. Waterman in the municipal court yesterday morning and to pay the cost of prosecution, amounting to \$4.80, for disturbing the peace. Upon payment of the costs the imprisonment was remitted, and he was placed in charge of C. Menzies Miller, probation officer. Debuque was arrested Monday evening on Cedar street by Police Chief George Wilson, who had been summoned by telephone after Merrill Stark had knocked Debuque down and taken a loaded revolver away from him. The young man, who married a daughter of Elliot G. Phillips, had called at the Stark home, where she was staying, and there had been words between them. Two of the cartridges showed that the trigger had been snapped on them, but they failed to explode. Yesterday morning Debuque claimed in court that he had intended to commit suicide and that there should not be a law in Vermont to prevent a man ending his own life if he wanted to. He retained former Judge William R. Daley to defend him.

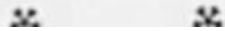

'Sixth Selectman'

Robert L. Dubuque, 59, Editor, Columnist Dead

Robert L. Dubuque, retired news editor of The Reformer and often called Brattleboro's "sixth selectman" because of his encyclopedic knowledge of town affairs, died Sunday night at his home. He was 59.

Mr. Dubuque had been inactive with The Reformer since last May because of heart trouble and surgery. Units of Rescue Inc. were summoned to his home after he was stricken last night, but he was pronounced dead at the scene.

Mr. Dubuque announced his retirement from the paper, for which he had worked — with time out for naval duty during World War II — on Feb. 10, when he resumed writing his popular weekly column, "It Dawns On Us. . ." His final column — with its usual abundance of fact, analysis and dry wit — appeared last Saturday.

Town Manager Corwin S. Elwell, a close friend of Mr. Dubuque's, said in a statement today that "I was shocked, particularly because I had a

conversation with him late last week about upcoming town meeting events. I don't know of anybody not in the so-called official family who was more knowledgeable about town affairs than Bob Dubuque. We have lost a great friend and a great source of information for the past history of this town."

The death of Robert L. Dubuque brought to a close the career of a newspaper man who not only held the highest offices of his profession in the New England area but who devoted 37 years to the day-to-day production of news in this newspaper. He aspired only to being a working newspaperman, not a journalist. And for the 21 years his Editor's pencil turned the rough copy of reporters into grammatically correct copy for the discerning newspaper reader, he left his anonymous imprint on thousands of editions of the Brattleboro Reformer.

His own by-line did appear early in his career on the sports page, later in the news column

and most recently in his Saturday column, "It Dawns On Us." But it was with the editing pencil of the copy-desk that he carved his uniqueness, from which he

received the most personal satisfaction and by which he rose through his own self-education from a Brattleboro High School graduate to a distinguished arbiter in the proper use of the English language.

Joining the staff of The Reformer in 1935, he spent his early years in reporting the kind of activities that he enjoyed, as a competitor and a sports fan. But through the years of his employment at The Reformer he developed an interest in local governmental reporting where his fairness and objectivity, not to mention an infrequent tongue-in-cheek approach to the gyrations of local officialdom, he earned the respect of many boards of selectmen as well as the readers of this newspaper.

Besides his devotion to his family and to his daily long-houred task at the newspaper, Bob Dubuque somehow found time to move through the offices of Post 5, American Legion and the 40&8, to serve as President of the Associated Press News Executives Association and to participate in the affairs of the Family and Child Guidance Services, Inc., the latter citing him for his services when he left its board.

Following a serious illness and surgery five years ago, he returned to his desk and to his weekly coverage of the meetings of the Brattleboro selectmen in spite of the physical problems with which his illness had left him — exerting the same dedication to the relentless challenge of news editing and producing a lightness of humor in his weekly column which belied the difficulties of his illness.

John S. Hooper, former editor and publisher of The Reformer, said, "The testament of his life exists in the bound volumes of The Reformer to which his copy-editing pencil, poised in the direction of perfection, bore witness to his deep sense of responsibility to the readers of each day's edition."

Mr. Dubuque was born in Brattleboro Dec. 1, 1913, son of

Earl and Louise (Phillips) Dubuque. He graduated from Brattleboro High School in 1932 and joined The Reformer news staff in 1935.

A Navy veteran of World War II, he was a member of American Legion Post 5, the 40 and 8, and Veterans of Foreign Wars. He was frequently invited by these organizations as well as other local groups to be master of ceremonies at dinners.

He was a communicant at St. Michael's Episcopal Church and served for many years as clerk of the Vestry.

Surviving are his widow, the former Ruth Geddis, whom he married Sept. 30, 1937; and a son, Dorian of Brattleboro.

He also leaves four half brothers, Joseph, James and Donald Wood of Brattleboro and Eugene Dubuque of New York City; and three half sisters, Mrs. Dorothy Warwick of Brattleboro, Mrs. Shirley Hayes of Conyers, Ga., and Mrs. Barbara Perkins of Redondo Beach, Calif.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday at 2 p.m. at St. Michael's Episcopal Church, the Rev. Steele W. Martin officiating. Burial will be in Locust Ridge Cemetery.

Eagle, who lives on the Caughnawaga Indian Reservation in Quebec province, Canada, is 6-2, 221 pounds.

Moto, a native of Tokyo, Japan, is 5-11 and 235.

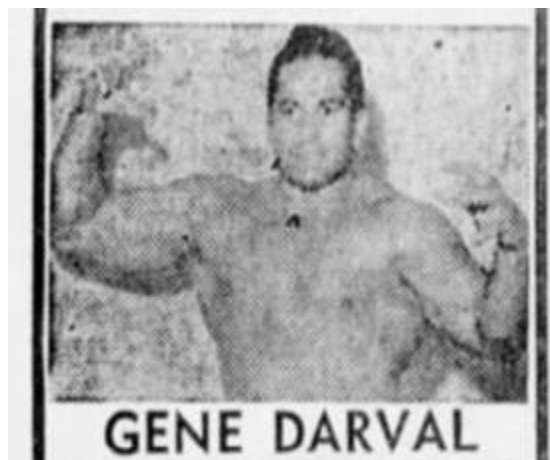

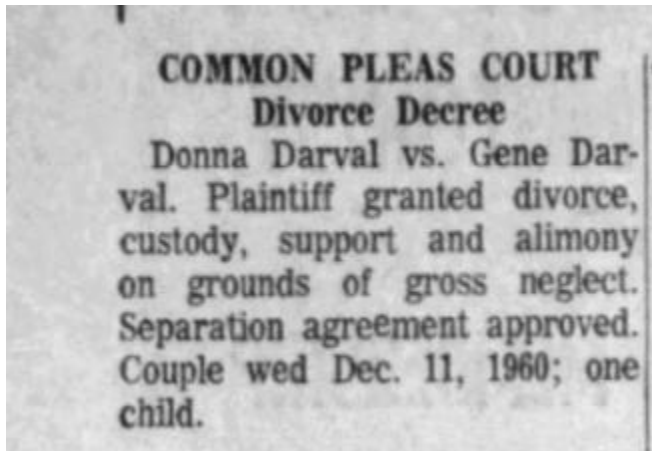

Dubuque was born in 1927 to American and Russian parents. He was an amateur bodybuilder, winning the 1947 Mr. New York City contest and turned into pro wrestling in 1949 in wrestling in New York City. He later went to Texas, San Francisco, Hawaii, and [Stampede Wrestling](#) in Calgary, Canada. On June 24, 1957 he lost to [Ilio DiPaolo](#) in a Best out of three falls in Los Angeles. In 1958 he teamed up with [Mike Valentino](#) and won the [NWA World Tag Team Championship \(San Francisco version\)](#) where he won the titles once with Valentino and twice with Fritz von Goering.^[1]

He later became Magnificent Maurice in 1959. He started teaming up with [Johnny Barend](#) in 1960 and they won four different tag teams titles from 1962-1968. In 1961 he won the [NWA San](#)

[Francisco](#) Pacific Coast Heavyweight Championship defeating [Ramon Torres](#). He wrestled for [American Wrestling Association](#) from 1960-1963.

In 1963 Maurice and Barend went to the New York Territory for the [World Wide Wrestling Federation](#)^[2] where they sometimes teamed with [Buddy Rogers](#) feuding with [Bobo Brazil](#), [Dory Dixon](#), and [Pedro Morales](#).^[1] Maurice had a few singles matches feuding against [Bruno Sammartino](#) for the WWWF Heavyweight title.^[3] From 1964-1965 he feuded with [Bill Watts](#) and [Wahoo McDaniel](#).^[4] By 1969 he left the company.^[5]

Maurice reunited with Barend in 1965 at Detroit's [Big Time Wrestling \(Detroit\)](#). In 1971 he returned to World Wide Wrestling Federation as Gene Dubuque.^[1]

Gene Dubuque Wrestling History

Just in the last few days, new detailed information about wrestler "Magnificent Maurice" Gene DuBuque has been located that is not commonly known or available on the Internet (as of December 23, 2010). Recently, two friends of mine, John Pantozzi and Fred Hornby, inquired openly about the fate of DuBuque, as no one had a clear picture of what happened to him. Somewhere along the line, it was rumored that he died in a plane crash, but again, there was no solid information explaining what had occurred.

I began to dig around, following the genealogical side of DuBuque's life. His family was found in the 1930 U.S. Census as living on 53rd street in Brooklyn. His father, Earl, worked in the Navy Yard, and his mother Eugenia was from Russia. Eugene Earl DuBuque was born on December 11, 1927, however, the census taker apparently got their information mixed up, and listed young Eugene as being only two months old. By the mid-to-late 1940s, DuBuque became an amateur bodybuilder, winning the 1947 Mr. New York City contest, and turned to professional wrestling sometime in the in the 1949-'50 time-frame. He was originally booked on the New York City circuit, then ventured out to Chicago, Texas, and California.

Adopting the "Magnificent Maurice" persona, he flaunted a heel personality that drew heat and gained success as a regional champion in several territories.

He shows up in Denver as late as 1970, and, according some sources, he began to focus on a career in Hollywood. But he then disappears, and the websites that are mentioned above list his date of death, across the board, as occurring in January 1974.

That date of death is incorrect. Gene DuBuque did go to Hollywood and was hired by Wolper Productions, run by David Wolper, to perform the part of a prehistoric man in the ABC-TV documentary "Primal Man." A crew went out to the Mammoth Lakes area in the Inyo National Forest (Inyo County, California) to film, and on March 13, 1974, they were set to return to Burbank. Their Sierra Pacific plane, Convair 440, was chartered by the company, and took off from Bishop Airport carrying 31 members of the production crew and 5 airplane staff. Five minutes later, the plane crashed into a White Mountains ridge, killing all aboard. "Magnificent Maurice" Gene DuBuque was one of the deceased.

Among the others killed were Janos Prohaska, his son Robert Prohaska, Jackie Tang, Albert Kihn, Jim Dixon, Dennis Azzarella, Irene Bunde, Rick Ackerman, and Loren Raymond. In reports of the plane crash, DuBuque's name is not listed. However, the name "Gene Darval" is, and that is the name DuBuque was using for his Hollywood acting career. In fact, his name was printed as Eugene Earl Darval aka Eugene Earl Dubuque.

Another wrestling history mystery has been solved. A big thanks to the Inyo County Library for its assistance.

P.S. The one and only J Michael Kenyon informs me that he had this information as early as 2006. Goes to show you that it's hard to scoop the best researcher in the business. I need to rummage through his files for awhile to make sure this doesn't happen again.

Clues Sought In Plane Crash That Killed 36 [people]

BISHOP (AP) -- Investigators flew by helicopter yesterday to a rocky ridge where a chartered plane crashed and exploded, killing 31 members of a television movie crew and five airline employees. Witnesses said the Sierra Pacific plane blew up like a fireball after slamming into the ridge about five minutes after take-off, from Bishop Airport, Wednesday night. The twin-engine propeller plane disintegrated on impact. Only the tail section remained intact. A helicopter pilot, at the site, said, "They were all dead. All that we saw was a lot of burning."

Documentary Being Filmed

Wolper Productions, which chartered the Convair 440, for the crew, filming the documentary series, "The Primal Man," said one of the dead was actor Janos Prohaska, 54, who played the talking bear, on the Andy Williams Television show. His son, Robert, 34, also was identified as a victim.

A Wolper Productions spokesman, Michael Manheim, said another victim was Dennis [R.] Azzarella, a film director and writer, whose credits include the National Geographic special, "The Violent Earth," and a television biography on football star Joe Namath.

Manheim said the film crew had been shooting a Siberian tiger hunt sequence, at the Mammoth Mountain Resort Area. It was to have aired 02 May [1974].

Gary McCoy, Sierra Pacific, Vice President, saw the take-off and said he had no idea what caused the crash, the airline's first.

No Difficulties Reported

In Los Angeles, Sierra Pacific spokesman Dean Sparkman said the pilot had been in contact with the control tower, at Bishop Airport, until just before the crash and reported no difficulties. The crew, which had been working, in the area since Monday, was headed to Burbank, a Los Angeles suburb 250 miles South of here.

Federal Aviation Authority officials, Inyo County Coroner's workers and an F.B.I. team were at the scene. The F.B.I. men were assisting in identification of the bodies, many of which were badly burned. The cause of the crash was not immediately known. A team of National Transportation Safety Board Investigators was on its way to the barren hillside, at about the 6,500 - foot level, of the White Mountain Range.

Sierra Pacific is a subsidiary of Mammoth Mountain Corporation, which operates ski lifts near Mammoth Lakes, 50 miles north of here.

The air craft crew was identified as Captain [LTC Albert John] Al Evans, 50, [Pilot] of Torrance; First Officer, Paul [Thomson] Dennis, 27, [Co-Pilot], of Pasadena; Captain [Harold Robert "Robert"] Robert West, 52, [Observer Pilot, On Flight], of Torrance;

Hostess Mary [Joanne] Parker, 19, [Flight Attendant], of Paramount and passenger services director James [Erik] Steinlauf, 27, [Passenger Service Representative for Sierra Pacific], of Marina del Rey.

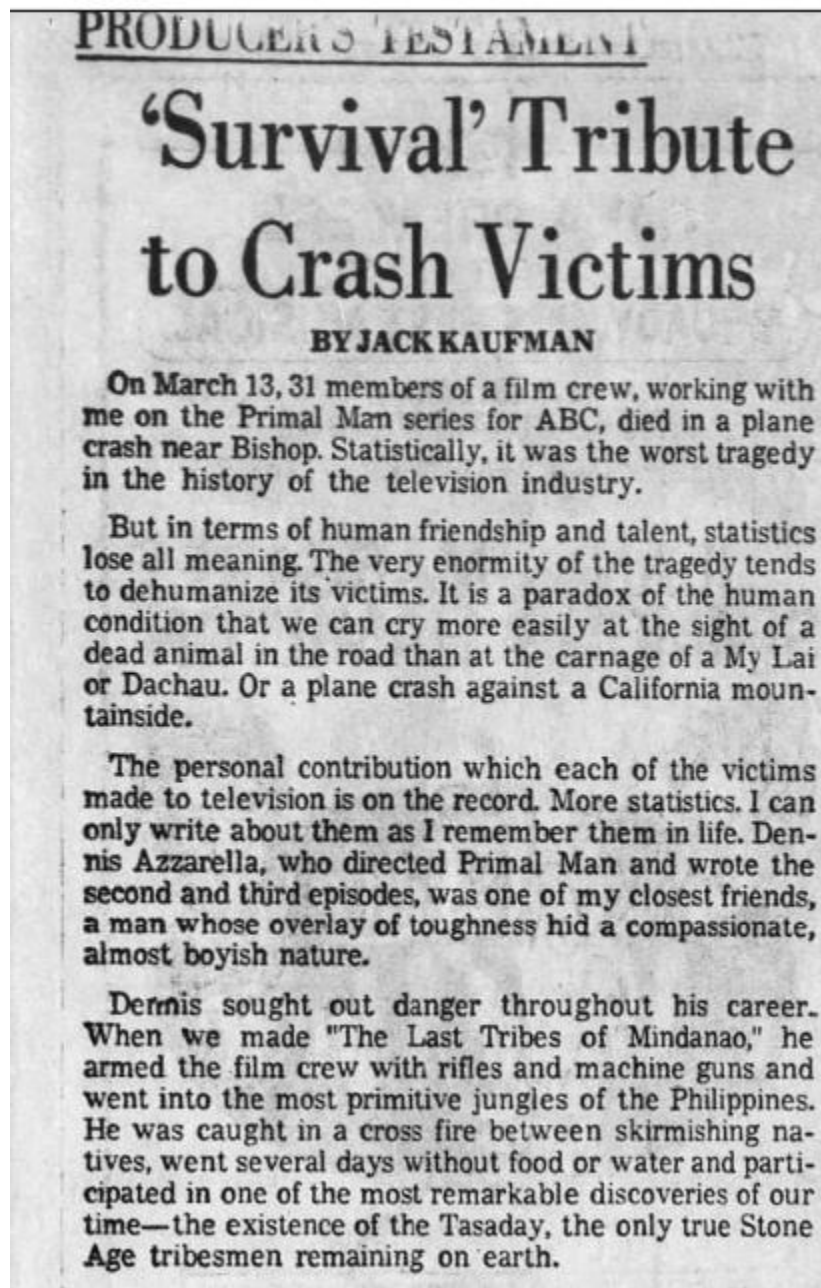

TV Crew Dies In Plane Crash

BISHOP, Calif. (UPI) — A chartered airliner carrying a film crew from the ABC-TV series "Primal Man" crashed into a mountain ridge in a remote area of a national forest Wednesday night and exploded in a ball of fire, killing all 35 aboard.

The U.S. Forest Service said a helicopter that landed at the site minutes after the crash reported no survivors.

Among the dead were six actors, including Janos Prohaska, who once played a comic bear character on the old Andy William television series, and Dennis Azzarella, the "Primal

series "Primal Man: Struggle for Survival." The series dramatizes the evolution of human beings from animal ancestors into primitive men.

Mike Antonio, pilot for the Western Helicopter Co., flew to the scene with Dr. Dave Sheldon of Bishop.

"The plane smacked hard into the ridge and spread wreckage for 300 feet," Antonio said. "There wasn't much left of the plane. I could see a tail section, an engine, not much else. All of it was burning.

"The bodies were pretty badly burned too."

Man'' series director, Wolper Productions said.

The twin engine Convair, chartered from Sierra Pacific Airlines, slammed into the snow-spotted Poleta Ridge of the White Mountains in Inyo National Forest not more than five minutes after taking off from Bishop, the Forest Service said.

The plane blossomed in flames that were clearly visible from Bishop, more than eight miles away.

The crash occurred at about the 7,000 foot level in a roadless region of sagebrush-covered ridges and deep valleys about 75 miles southeast of Yosemite National Park, said Forest Service spokesman Ed Waldapfel.

David L. Wolper, president of Wolper Productions, confirmed in Los Angeles that the plane was carrying 31 members of a film crew from his studio on a flight to Burbank, in the Los Angeles region. The Federal Aviation Administration said the airliner carried a crew of four.

The crew had been in the Mammoth Lakes area, filming the third of a

BISHOP, Calif. (AP) — A twin-engined chartered airplane exploded like a fireball after smashing into a remote mountainside, killing 31 members of a television movie crew and five other persons aboard.

A helicopter pilot who arrived at the smoldering wreckage six miles east of here Wednesday night said the Sierra Pacific Airlines Convair 440 had disintegrated and "they were all dead. All that we saw was a lot of burning."

The propeller-driven plane was chartered by Los Angeles-based Wolper Productions, who were filming the documentary television series, "Primal Man" in

snow-covered mountains near this resort town.

One of the dead actors was identified as Janos Prohaska, 51, who has played animals in a variety of movie and television roles. He was the cookie-mooching bear on the Andy Williams TV show. His son Robert, also an actor in the series, was also identified by Wolper Productions as one of the dead.

Wolper spokesman Mike Gray said victims included writer-director Dennis Azarella and the entire shooting crew of the program.

The airplane crew consisted of two pilots, an ob-

server pilot, two stewaresses and a passenger service representative, said Dean Starkman, director of station operations for Sierra Pacific.

Cause of the crash was not immediately known, but it occurred about five minutes after the 8:30 p.m. PDT takeoff from Bishop Airport. A team of National Transportation Safety Board investigators were on their way to the bleak, lightly tree-covered area.

"It was a very black night. The plane was disintegrated. The biggest part I saw was the tail section. The bodies were burned very badly," said helicopter

pilot Mike Antonio, who had flown a doctor to the site shortly after the crash.

Residents in Bishop said the plane exploded like a fireball when it struck at the 7,000-foot level of the White Mountain range in Inyo National Forest.

About 10 Inyo County deputies and reserve officers hiked about two miles over rugged terrain to reach the crash site early today, a spokesman said. No efforts to remove the bodies were planned until after an FBI team made positive identification of the victims sometime today, a spokesman said. An Inyo County Sheriff's spokesman said the remains would be taken to a temporary morgue at Bishop Airport.

About 10 Inyo County deputies and reserve officers hiked two miles over rugged terrain to reach the crash site early today, the spokesman said.

Stan Margulies, vice president of Wolper Productions said the firm had chartered the plane to transport 31 persons from the cast and crew back home.

Gray said the crew had traveled to the Mammoth Mountain resort area because a snow setting was needed to film a Siberian tiger hunt by actors made up to portray Neanderthal men.

The sequence was to be included in the third segment of the four-part series on early man's struggle for survival, Gray said. The sequence was to have been shown on the ABC television network May 2.

The crew had been working in the area since Monday, Gray said.

Margulies said he believed film from the final day's shooting was aboard the plane. He added he was unsure whether the accident would affect the program's telecast.

A tiger had been rented for the filming, but Margulies said the animal was to be returned to Los Angeles by truck.

The flight was headed for Burbank, a Los Angeles suburb about 250 miles south of the crash scene, a spokesman said.

Inyo County Sheriff Floyd Barton said recovery efforts were hampered initially by darkness and the remoteness of the site.

The weather was clear, Starkman said. He said the pilot, who was in radio contact with the Bishop tower until the crash, had reported no difficulties. Starkman speculated that wind or clear air turbulence may have contributed to the accident.

The plane carried a flight recorder, which records flight crew conversations and instrument data.

Sierra Pacific is a subsidiary of the Mammoth Mountain corporation, which operates ski lifts near Mammoth Lakes, about 50 miles north of Bishop. The line purchased four 44-passenger Convairs shortly after it was acquired by the ski operator last year. The Convair was a major short-haul aircraft used widely by major commercial airlines in the early 1950s.

Sierra Pacific operates regularly scheduled flights from major California cities

to eastern Sierra ski resorts.

This was the second major air crash in five years within sparsely populated Inyo County, population 17,000. In 1969, a prop-driven chartered plane, carrying

vacationers on a gambling weekend to Nevada crashed into Mt. Whitney, about 50 miles south of Wednesday's crash site. Thirty-five persons were killed in the earlier crash.

Some Known, But Most Were Anonymous

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Dennis Azzarella described himself as "an action-type director in the field of documentaries who will try anything once."

During his career he tried many things, from exploring the Philippine jungles in search of primitive tribes to filming inside a smoldering volcano. This week he went to Mammoth Mountain in California to film a Siberian tiger hunt for a television movie, part of "The Primal Man" series.

Azzarella, 34, and the rest of his movie crew died on their return trip to Hollywood when their chartered plane crashed into a mountain near Bishop, Calif., Wednesday night. Thirty-one film people were killed, and the disaster was one of the worst in the history of the industry.

Among the dead were few names the public would recognize. They were the everyday workers on movie sets, the men and women who did their jobs quietly and efficiently. The names of some of them slide by at the end of television shows. Most remain anonymous.

The actors of the "Primal Man" film were more anonymous than most. Their own faces were obscured by Neanderthal makeups that required two or three hours to apply. Their names were Irene Bunde, Rick Ackerman, Loren Raymond, Jackie Tang, Gene Darval and Jim Dickson.

Two of the performers had minor celebrity status — Janos Prohaska, 54, and his son Robert, 34. Janos had made a profession of appearing in a variety of animal suits; he was best known as the cookie-hungry bear on Andy Williams' television show.

Because of the nature of the "Primal Man" film, there were more than the usual number of makeup artists on location. All died in the plane — Rolf Miller, Jim Phillips, Irving Pringle, Bill Miller, Charles Sorkin.

The cameraman was Al Kihn, a veteran of David Wolper documentaries. He had filmed many of the National Geographic television shows, and he recently completed his first theatrical feature, "Up from the Apes."

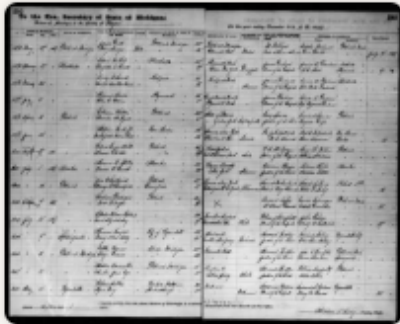

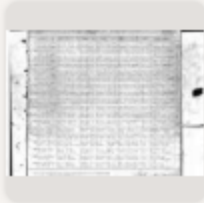

HOLYOKE, Aug 8—One boy was killed and five others injured, one probably fatally, this evening when a jitney en route from Elmwood to the City Hall overturned, pinning seven passengers under the car.

Maurice Moynihan, aged 11, of Forest Hill, L I, was killed and the following injured: Clarence Dubuque, Maple and Appleton sts, shoulder and back sprained, possible internal injuries; Grace Thorpe, 65 Westfield road, cuts and bruises, suffering from shock; Eileen Moynihan, aged 9, Forest Hill, L I, cuts and bruises; Bernard Moynihan, aged 6, Forest Hill, L I, cuts and bruises; Frank Morency, 17 Grover st, cuts and bruises; John Magus, driver, 144 Cabot st, cuts and suffering from shock.

The jitney was going down South-st hill when a jitney coming up forced it into the gutter. As it turned out of the gutter at high speed the wheels caught and the car overturned.

Maurice Moynihan had a triple fracture of the skull and died in a few moments. Henry Toepfert took three to the City Hospital and the ambulance brought the others. Clarence Dubuque be most seriously hurt. The others will recover. One man in the jitney was uninjured.

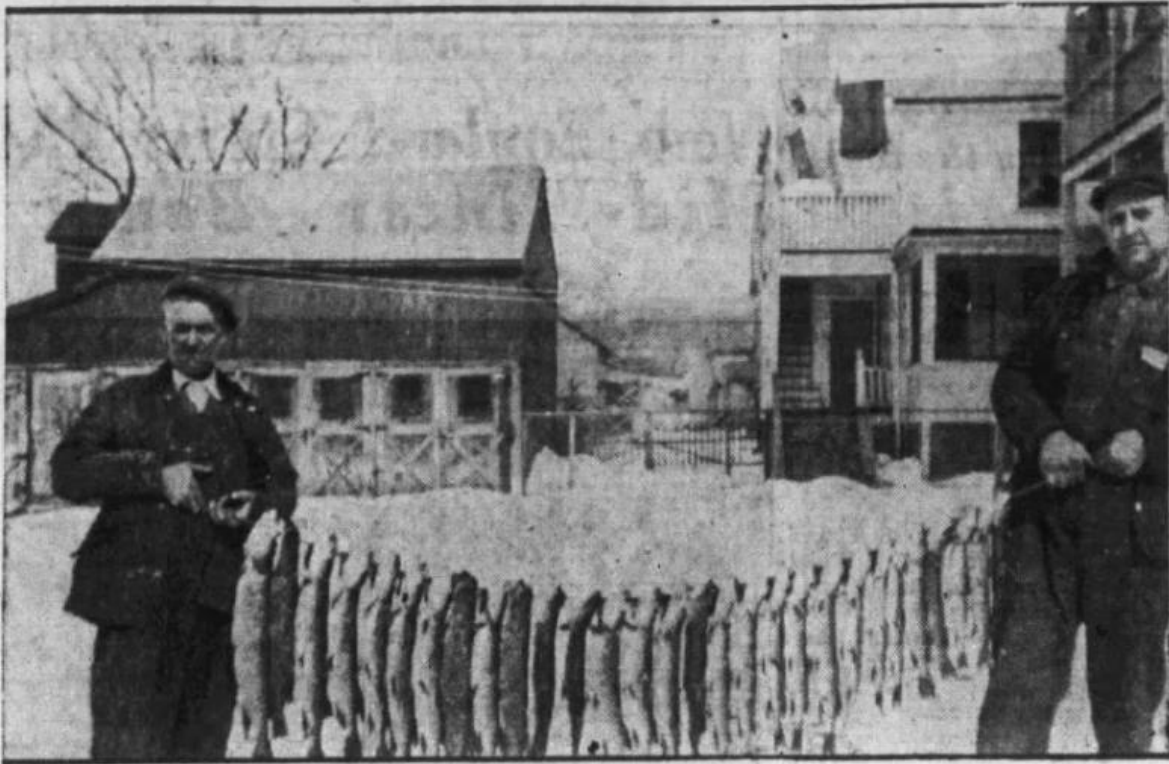
Frank Heyne and Clarence Dubuque Display Pike Weighing 23 Pounds

South Hadley Falls, March 21—Tax Collector Frank Heyne of 22 Spring street, former chief of police at South Hadley, and Clarence Dubuque of the Amherst road, employed by the J. L. Leahy Plumbing company, have returned home from a fishing trip to Lake Dunmore at Brandon, Vt., where they have made an annual pilgrimage for a number of years for an ice-fishing party. In former years they brought home tales of the wonderful catches that were made at the lake and their listeners with a sly wink at their neighbor would remark in a soft undertone "just another fish story."

Mr Heyne and Mr Dubuque, fearing that the veracity of their stories was being doubted, returned from the present trip with positive evidence that all they had said was true. - **Clarence Michael ("C.M.") Dubuque**, 27 Apr 1886 Detroit, Wayne MI – 23 Sep 1958 Westfield, Hampden MA. - Shares tombstone with sister Maude Dubuque Davicino in Oak Grove Cemetery, Springfield, Hampden MA. F: 139391412
- **[niece, listed as sister] Mabel Bertha Dubuque Tindal**, 15 May 1893 Springfield, Hampden MA – 12 Jan 1989 Springfield Hampden MA. – MA birth records list birth of Mabel Dubuque on 15 May 1893 as illegitimate. On this record, the name of her father & his occupation appear smudged (erased?).- Listed as the daughter of Michael & Louise Zoe on census records, but actually their granddaughter, born to their daughter Laura Dubuque. Mabel cannot be the biological daughter of Michael & Louise – since she was born in May 1893 - & their son Earl Chester was born in Dec 1893 - Birth date of Aug 1893 given on 1900 census & on Find A Grave record. - Wife of John Roe ("Jack") Tindal (1890-1973) whom she married 7 Oct 1916 in Springfield, Hampden MA. – His name is listed as John Rae Tindal on their children's birth records. - Listed as Earl's sister in Dec 1939. - Buried in Paucatuck Cemetery, West Springfield, Hampden MA. F: 71685762
- **When Earl's father Michael Dubuque died in Feb 1909**, his surviving daughters were Mrs. W.H. Lacey (Laura), Mrs. Joseph Davicino (Maude), Mrs. Paul Winkelmann (Lena), Miss Mabel Dubuque & "Mrs. George Love" of Detroit MI. Since Anna Dubuque Spamer died in 1903, **this must be Ida Dubuque by default.**
- **When Earl's mother Zoe Dubuque died in May 1919**, her surviving daughters are listed as Mrs. Paul C. Winkelmann (Lena), Mrs. Ida Moody, Mrs. William H. Lacey (Laura), Mrs. Maude Davicino & **"Mrs. John R. Kendall" of West Springfield MA.** Anne Dubuque Spamer had died in 1903, so this must be Zoe's biological granddaughter/daughter Mabel TINDAL instead of Kendall.

Notes:

MA birth record: Earl Dubuque, born at 51 Monroe St., Springfield, Hampden MA to Michael R. & Zoe (La Breck) Dubuque, both parents b. Canada, Michael a carpenter.

According to a record found on Ancestry.com, Earl's sister Lena – and therefore by extension Earl himself – was descended from one of the first settlers of Dubuque, Dubuque County IA, for whom the city & county were named. Dubuque IA is named for Julien Dubuque of Quebec, Canada, who arrived at that site in 1785.

Wartime:

"Pittsburgh Post-Gazette" 8 Feb 1918 p 1 - Sgt. E.C. Dubuque & Sgt. Muller, both of Brooklyn NY, were rescued from a raft by a "coasting schooner" - Dubuque's starboard lifeboat was shattered, so he climbed over port side to get in a boat with 10-12 others, which tipped halfway down. Dubuque swam to a raft on which was Muller. Collapsible rafts thrown overboard hit boats & swimmers. [story of the 2 sergeants repeated in several newspapers]

"Brooklyn (NY) Times Union" 8 Feb 1918 p 1 – among the 1st men reported safe were 5 from Brooklyn. One was Sergeant E.G. [sic] Dubuque.

"Brooklyn Times Union" 8 Feb 1918 p 1 - Sgt. E.G. [sic] Dubuque, of Brooklyn, ship listed to starboard, lifeboats damaged, soldiers & crew lined up singing, he & Sgt. George O. Muller went over port side & slid down rope to boat with 10-12 men but halfway down ropes tangled & thrown in water, swam to stern & found raft, Muller got on 1st, picked up others, then picked up by coasting [sic] schooner

Post-war:

On 2 Feb 1920, Earl C. Dubuque enlisted in the US Marine Corps at Mare Island CA.

"Brooklyn Times Union" 30 May 1935 p 7 – Marching in the veterans' parade on Memorial Day, in the 5th Division, from the Veterans of Foreign Wars, are several posts & their commanders. E.C. Dubuque is commander of the Admiral Yates Sterling Sr. Post No. 110 of the VFW. [there are numerous newspaper reports about his activities with this VFW post]

Obituary:

NY deaths: Earl Chester Dubuque d. 13 Dec 1893 at age 46. Resident of 5314 – 18th Ave., NY, NY. Died at the Brooklyn Hospital, 121 DeKalb Ave., NYC of acute coronary occlusion. Machinist at Brooklyn Navy Yard. Wife Eugenia. Father Michael Dubuque, b. US & mother Zoe Dubuque, b. Canada.

"Brattleboro (VT) Reformer" 18 Dec 1939 p 5 – Robert L. Dubuque received word last night of the death in Brooklyn NY of his father, Earl C. Dubuque, age 47. The funeral will be held 20 Dec 1939 in Brooklyn. Earl was a master mechanic by trade & worked several years in the Brooklyn Navy Yard. He served overseas in WWI, receiving shrapnel wounds. He was past commander of the Admiral Sterling American Legion [i.e. VFW] Post of Brooklyn. Robert will leave for Brooklyn tomorrow.

“Richmond (VA) Times Dispatch” 18 Dec 1939 p 11 – E.C. DuBuque, 44, died at his home in Brooklyn NY. Earl C. DuBuque is the brother of Sgt. J.H. DuBuque of the Richmond police force. He died 17 Dec 1939. He was past commander of Post 110, VFW & has visited Richmond several times, and lived in Richmond for a short time a number of years ago. He is survived by his wife Mrs. Jennie DuBuque, son Jean, 2 brothers: C.M. DuBuque [i.e. Charles Michael] & J.H. DuBuque [i.e. John Howard] & 5 sisters: Mrs. Ida Moody, Mrs. Lena P. Winkelman [sic], Mrs. Laura Lacy, Mrs. Jack Tindle [sic] & Mrs. Maud Davicince.
