Survivors Of Tuscania Will Meet In Sheboygan

Fred A. Duxbury, one of Sheboygan's three survivors of the torpedoed transport ship Tuscania off the coast of Ireland on February 5, 1918, was elected president of the National Tuscania Survivors' association, and Sheboygan was chosen as the next convention city at the closing session of the organization's annual meeting at Baraboo.

Each year the association holds its reunion, and at that time the screaming blast of a torpedo, the terror-filled scramble for lifeboats and the thrilling rescue from the icy waters of the north Atlantic are recalled. Membership is limited to members of the American Expeditionary forces and members of the Tuscania crew who survived the torpedoing that resulted in the loss of 315 persons of the 2,700 aboard.

Name Other Officers

Approximately 200 members attended the Baraboo convention, and besides selecting their new president and next convention city, they elected the following officers: Dr. Ingwald Hansen, Manitowoc, vice president; Max Collins, Eau Claire, secretary; Fred Braem, Marshfield, treasurer; Charles B. Dunn, Chicago, judge advocate; Leo V. Zimmerman, Milwaukee, historian; Nathan F. Carhart, Galesville, sergeant at arms; John L. Barnes, Wautoma, chaplain.

Besides adopting a resolution asking President Franklin D. Roosevelt to enact the senate bill providing medals for Tuscania survivors, the association con-

ducted memorial services for victims of the disaster at a bridge in Baraboo, with members of the Baraboo unit of the national guard participating.

Speakers at the banquet included Col. P. K. Zinck, Beaver Dam, war-time commander of the 127th Infantry of the 32nd Division. Dr.

Wilhelm F. Meyer, commander of the German submarine which sank the *Tuscania*, was invited to attend, but sent his regrets from his home in Saarbruecken, Saar territory. The recent plebiscite there, he explained, had increased his duties and made his coming impossible.

Three Local Survivors

Sheboygan has the distinction of having three residents who are survivors of the tragedy, and in the selection of this city for the next convention and Mr. Duxbury as the new president of the organization, Sheboygan is signally honored. Other local survivors are Martin Bongers and Theodore L. Briggs, the latter being out of the city at the present time.

Mr. Duxbury was still out of the city this morning, but in a Press interview a year ago he recalled the *Tuscania* rescue as "the biggest thrill I got out of the war".

The story of the sinking of the *Tuscania* is most graphically told by Leo V. Zimmerman of Milwaukee, historian of the *Tuscania* Survivors' association.

"The *Tuscania* was one of a fleet of eleven vessels forming a convoy headed by the British cruiser *Cochrane* and the Commodore *Ship Baltic* and escorted by destroyers. Aboard the *Tuscania*, en route for Liverpool, were the following units: Headquarters Detachment and three companies of Twentieth Engineers; fifty-one casual officers; 107th Engineer Train, 107th military police, 107th Supply Train, 100th, 158th and 213th Aero Squadron, Medical de-

tachments 1 and 2 of the 32nd Division — comprising in all, a complement of 2,156 American soldiers, two British female nurses and a personnel of 237 officers and men in the crew.

Torpedoes Strike

"We saw nothing of the lurking German submarine on the dark night of February 5. Later it developed it was the German U-boat 77, with Lt. Commander Meyer in charge. It had left Borkum, Germany, and arrived off the North Channel, where it sighted our convoy escorted by destroyers. It maneuvered into position for attack and immediately after nightfall it sent two torpedoes from its forward tubes.

"The torpedo struck directly abreast of the engine room on the starboard side. The compartment was immediately filled by water and steam. The force of the explosion damaged some of the lifeboats.

"In orderly fashion, the soldiers adjusted their life preservers and took to the water, some of them scantily garbed. Like a wounded bird of the flock, the *Tuscania* whistle incessantly shrieked its call of distress, as if to give voice to its pain. Up into the sky, like two spurts of blood, climbed and quivered two red stars—submarine warning rocket signals. From the deck of the *Tuscania* two hissing, serpentine

streaks of fire shot up into the sky. The other convoy ships put on full speed ahead to leave us to our fate—a strict naval ruling. There was no panic among the soldiers — they knew their stations from previous drills.

Tells Of Rescue

"The English destroyer 'Mosquito' approached from the starboard side dropping depth bombs as it came. The 'Grasshopper' hove into view to port. The German U-boat, diving in a course straight away on the starboard of the Tuscania for a distance of a few nautical miles, quietly rose to the surface. At first perceiving her periscope abut and perceiving the vessel it had hit, the U-boat raised its conning tower slightly above the water, hurriedly set up the wireless and intercepted the signal of distress to learn the identity of its victim. It then resubmerged and endeavored to draw closer despite the movements of the destroyers. It fired a third torpedo, but the distance was too great.

"The destroyer 'Pigeon', throwing out a heavy smoke screen, approached and lowered life-boats to pick the men out of the water. A short time later, just as the Tuscania sank, Officer Jones led a straight column of life-boats filled with survivors to safety.

"We were placed aboard the 'Grasshopper' and taken up the river Foyle to Londonderry, Ireland, where we were billeted with the Inneskillen regiment and given warm food and shelter."

Sheboygan Has But One Survivor Of "Tuscania"

The sixteenth annual reunion in Kenosha Monday of the National Tuscania Survivors' association recalls that there is in Sheboygan only one man who survived that famous war-time catastrophe in which many lost their lives when the British steamer Tuscania, conveying American troops and airplane supplies to Liverpool, was torpedoed and sank by a German submarine off the north coast of Ireland on February 5, 1918. The lone Sheboygan survivor is Fred A. Duxbury, of 1928 Cooper avenue. Another survivor, Theodore L. Briggs, made his home here since the war but recently moved to California.

Each year, on the anniversary date of the sinking of the Tuscania, the Survivors' association holds a meeting and members join hands in a demonstration of fellowship and a deep tribute to the war dead of all nations. This year's reunion at Kenosha was typical. August Heise, Milwaukee, who was a machinist mate on a German submarine that sank 200,000 tons of allied shipping during the war, sat at the side of John Newton Jones of New York, former British naval officer aboard H. M. S. destroyer Pigeon. Mr. Jones was awarded a medal for distinguished service in his heroic work as leader of a rescue crew which picked up American soldiers and led them to safety in a fleet of small row-boats while the submarine still lurked in the dark near the scene of the tragedy.

Recalls Experience

Mr. Duxbury was unable to attend the reunion at Kenosha, but he recalled the sinking of the Tuscania clearly. "That was about the biggest thrill I got out of the war," he said.

The story of the sinking of the Tuscania is most graphically told by Leo V. Zimmerman of Milwaukee, historian of the Tuscania Survivors' association.

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They Are In Charge At Kohler

Mr. Duxbury is in ground charge of the deputies who now have the east side of High street and the picket lines under their control.

Last night, the first night after the departure of the troops, the village was exceptionally quiet and peaceful. Pickets left their posts between 7 and 7:30 o'clock but returned again early this morning in accordance with the agreement made with the sheriff and his men.

The deputies are housed in an empty store in the Recreation building where cots have been set and sleeping quarters arranged. A highway crew cook shanty on wheels has been brought to the rear of the building where meals for the deputies are prepared.

Fred A. Duxbury Named To Veterans' Commission

Fred A. Duxbury, a prominent figure in local veterans activities, has been appointed a member of the Sheboygan County Veterans' Service Commission.

His appointment to fill the unexpired term of the late Edgar W. Freimund was announced today by County Judge J. W. Wilkus. It becomes effective immediately.

Mr. Freimund, a member of the commission since 1935 and its chairman since 1942, died last Sunday at the age of 65. His present three-year term expires next Dec. 12.

The three-member Veterans' Service Commission is a statutory body which administers soldiers, sailors and marine relief aid to veterans and their dependants from funds appropriated annually by the County Board.

Other members of the commission are Werner Wolf and Karl R. Thiel.

Duxbury, 62, of 1903 Cleveland Ave., has been a leader in American Legion activities at both the county and state levels for more than 40 years.

He is a past commander of Prescott-Bayens Post 83, a former commander of the Sheboygan County Legion Council, a past Second District commander, former Department of Wisconsin vice-commander, and a former member of the Legion's national security training committee.

A World War I veteran, Duxbury served 18 months overseas

with the 10th Supply Train of the 32nd (Red Arrow) division.

He was one of Sheboygan's three survivors of the sinking of the SS Tuscania which was torpedoed off the coast of Ireland in 1918 and resulted in the loss of 315 persons of the 2,700 aboard. He is a past president of the National Tuscania Survivors' Association.

Duxbury, a resident of Sheboygan since 1925, has been a salesman for the Topp Oil and Chemical Co., Milwaukee for the past 28 years.

Fred Duxbury, Local Veterans Leader, Dies

Fred A. Duxbury, 72, of 1903 Cleveland Ave., chairman of the Sheboygan County Veterans Service Commission, and a leader in local veterans affairs, died this morning in St. Nicholas Hospital after a brief illness.

Mr. Duxbury was born Jan. 10, 1899 in Alma Center, son of the late John and Ida Duxbury. He attended the local grade and high school at Alma Center.

During World War I, he served with the U.S. Army in France.

While overseas, Mr. Duxbury was aboard the British transport ship *Tuscania* which was torpedoed near Ireland in 1918. Survivors of that incident formed a "Survivors of *Tuscania*" club, of which Mr. Duxbury once served as president.

On Nov. 27, 1919, Mr. Duxbury married Miss Agnes Freitag of Oshkosh at the St. Vincent Catholic Church in Oshkosh. They moved to Sheboygan in 1924 and celebrated their 50th anniversary in 1969.

Mr. Duxbury worked for Topp Oil and Chemical Co., Milwaukee, as a salesman for 31 years and retired in 1963.

He was appointed chairman of the Veterans Service Commission in 1950 and had held the post for 11 years.

He also was a member of St. Dominic Catholic Church, its Holy Name Society, a member of and past-commander of the American Legion Prescott Bayens Post 83, and a former vice-commander of the State Department of the American Legion.

In 1968 and again in 1969, he was elected president of the State Association of County Veterans Service Commission. In 1969 he served as grand marshal of the Sheboygan Memorial Day parade.

Survivors include his wife;

three daughters, Mrs. Millard (Florence) Bell, Sheboygan Falls, Mrs. Henry (Loyola) Houmes and Mrs. Leo (Barbara) Froechte, both of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., nine grandchildren; two great-grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Howard McLaughlin, St. Petersburg, Fla., and Mrs. Vera Howard, Corpus Christi, Texas, and a brother, Hugh, of Madera Beach, Fla.

He was preceded in death by two brothers, one sister, and two grandsons.

Funeral services will be held at 9 a.m. Friday in St. Dominic Church with the Rev. Roger Zens assistant pastor, as celebrant of the funeral Mass. Family rites will be held at 8:30 a.m. in Ballhorn Funeral Chapels. Burial will be in Calvary Cemetery.

Friends may call at the church only at the time of services.

A memorial fund has been established in Mr. Duxbury's name for St. Dominic Church.

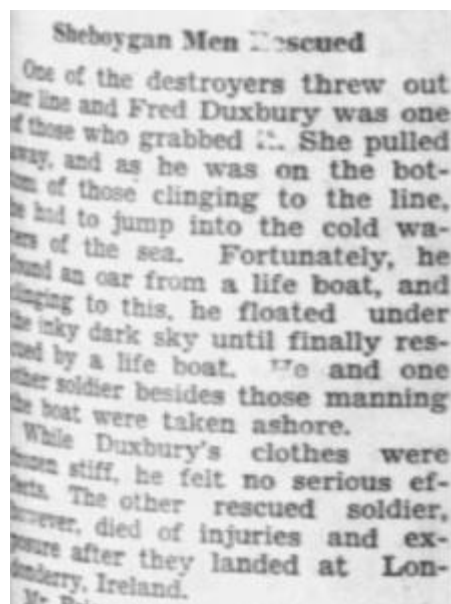
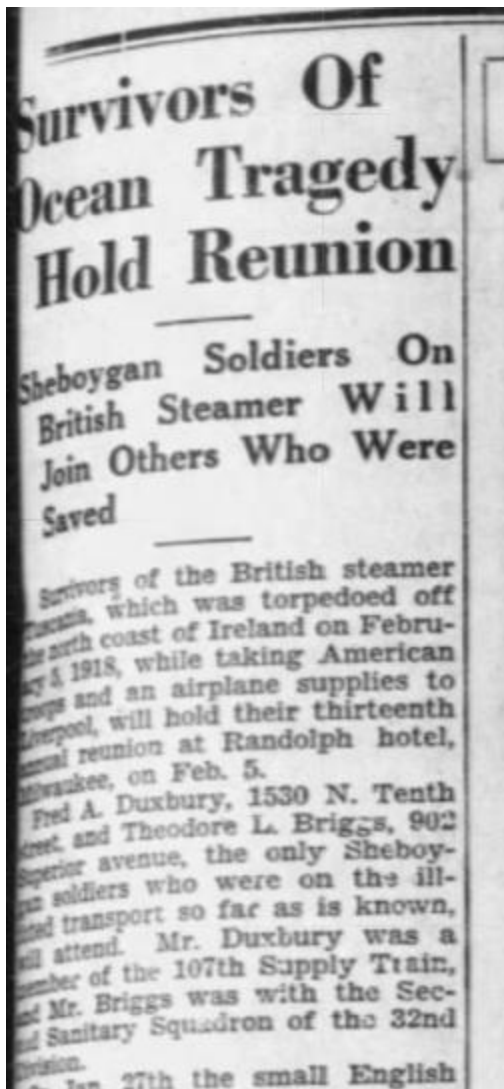

Through an article printed in The Press Tuesday about the annual reunion of the survivors of the transport Tuscania, which was sunk off the coast of Ireland, Feb. 5, 1918, the name of a third Sheboygan survivor has been learned. He is Martin Bongers, 1118 S. Fifteenth street. If there are any other survivors of that ill-fated wartime vessel in Sheboygan county, The Press would like to hear from them or about them.

The other two are Fred A. Duxbury, 1530 N. Tenth street, and Theodore L. Briggs, 902 Superior avenue.

The hearing then adjourned for 10 minutes, after which Mr. Chase called Fred Duxbury to the stand. He said he had charge of the sheriff's forces at Kohler last September and that he had worked for the Kohler company at one time. He explained, under questioning, that he thought it best for, and suggested that, the workers stay in the plant at noon and not try to go through the picket lines. It was not until in October that the men went back and forth from the plant freely at noon.

Under cross-examination by Mr. Padway, Mr. Duxbury said he had not suggested that cigars, cigarettes and candy be given to the workers. He also testified that workers were not interfered with in going back and forth from the plant during the month of September. Under re-direct examination by Mr. Chase, the witness said the absence of trouble in September made him feel it was all right for the men to go back and forth in the month of October. He also said that he felt it necessary to keep 20 men on duty.

John Case Kohler police chief, corroborated Mr. Duxbury's testimony. He said the Kohler company complied with Mr. Duxbury's and his suggestion that the workers stay in at noon. He said, under questioning by Mr. Padway, that he and his men had no trouble after the riot and said he didn't advise the company to give the men free lunches, cigars, or cigarettes.

The hearing then was adjourned at 2:30 p. m.

HEARING OF PROTESTS ON ELECTION COMPLETE

SHEBOYGAN, Wis. — Robert B. Watts, special counsel of the National Labor Relations Board, today had under advisement the protest of the Federal Labor Union No. 18545 against the collective bargaining election at the Kohler company plant.

A hearing on the protest was completed late yesterday after the company and the Kohler Workers' Association, so-called company union which won the election, submitted testimony designed to refute the union charges.

Witnesses for the Workers' Association testified that the company did not attempt to influence employees in the balloting. Deputy Sheriff Fred A. Duxbury and Chief of Police John Cass of Kohler testified that workers did not leave the Kohler plant at noon in order to prevent friction at the picket lines.

SURVIVORS TO MEET IN '36 AT SHEBOYGAN

Members of the National Tuscania Survivors association, in annual session in Baraboo Tuesday, voted to hold their 18th annual convention, that for 1936, in Sheboygan. President James F. Bray of Baraboo presided at yesterday's session, held at the American Legion clubhouse.

New officers were elected for the coming year as follows:

President—Fred A. Duxbury, Sheboygan

Vice president—Ingwald Hansen, Manitowoc

Secretary—Max Collins, Eau Claire

Treasurer—Fred Braem, Marshfield

Three telegrams were dispatched late yesterday afternoon, following the passage of a resolution during the business session. The resolution urged the support of Senate bill 499, a bill which provides for medals for Tuscania survivors. No official recognition has ever been given the Tuscania survivors. It was stated, and as some distinction, such as campaign bars, has been given for every military engagement the group is urging the issuance of medals. The telegrams were addressed to President Franklin D. Roosevelt, State Senator Robert M. LaFollette and the Hon. P. Ryan Duffy, each urging their support of the bill.

Evening Banquet

Covers were laid for 200 at the 7 o'clock banquet served in the private diningroom of the Warren hotel.

Attorney J. A. Malone of Baraboo presided as toastmaster at the after-dinner program. Speakers included:

Observation Post Supervisor Named By Mayor Sonnenburg

Mayor Willard M. Sonnenburg today announced that he has appointed Fred A. Duxbury as observation post supervisor for the aircraft observation and warning service in the Sheboygan district.

The recruiting drive for 15,000 volunteer aircraft spotters for Wisconsin began Tuesday. The governor's office announced the drive had been started in response to an official request from secretary of defense Louis Johnson. The service is part of the nation's defense program.

Volunteers are needed in Wisconsin to man 707 aircraft observation posts throughout the state and a "filter center" at Green Bay, which will receive telephone messages from the observations posts.

The service will become part of a nation-wide warning service to supplement air force radar installations by observing low flying aircraft which might not be detected by radar. A similar organization in the eastern states already has been set up and tested, and the northern and west coast states now are being organized. All workers are directly under the supervision of

of his active interest and his deep knowledge of affairs of this kind he received his most recent appointment as observation post supervisor of the newly organized state-wide aircraft warning and observation service. At the present time he is recruiting personnel for his post.

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the U. S. Air Forces.

"The creation of an adequate warning service is a part of a high priority program designed to build an effective system of air defense in the United States," Johnson said in his instructions to the governor's office. "I urgently request that you give your support to this important program which will increase the capability of the continental air defense forces to give maximum warning to our citizens in the event of an emergency."

Post supervisors such as Fred A. Duxbury, heading the 707 posts in the state, are asked to recruit their own personnel for each post. All observers will be volunteers working without pay, as will those who man the filter center at Green Bay. They should be women, elderly persons or infirm persons who would not be eligible for service in the case of a war.

During a test of the warning system, to be made in April, or in the event of a national emergency, the aircraft observers will be asked to spend four hours daily at their posts. The state is responsible only for the recruiting of personnel. The air force will train the observers, operate the system, handle and maintain communications and pay operating costs of the network.

Mr. Duxbury is a former commander of the Prescott-Bayens Post No. 1230, American Legion, and at the present time holds the post of department vice commander. He served in the first world war and during the last war took an active part in all phases of home defense. Because

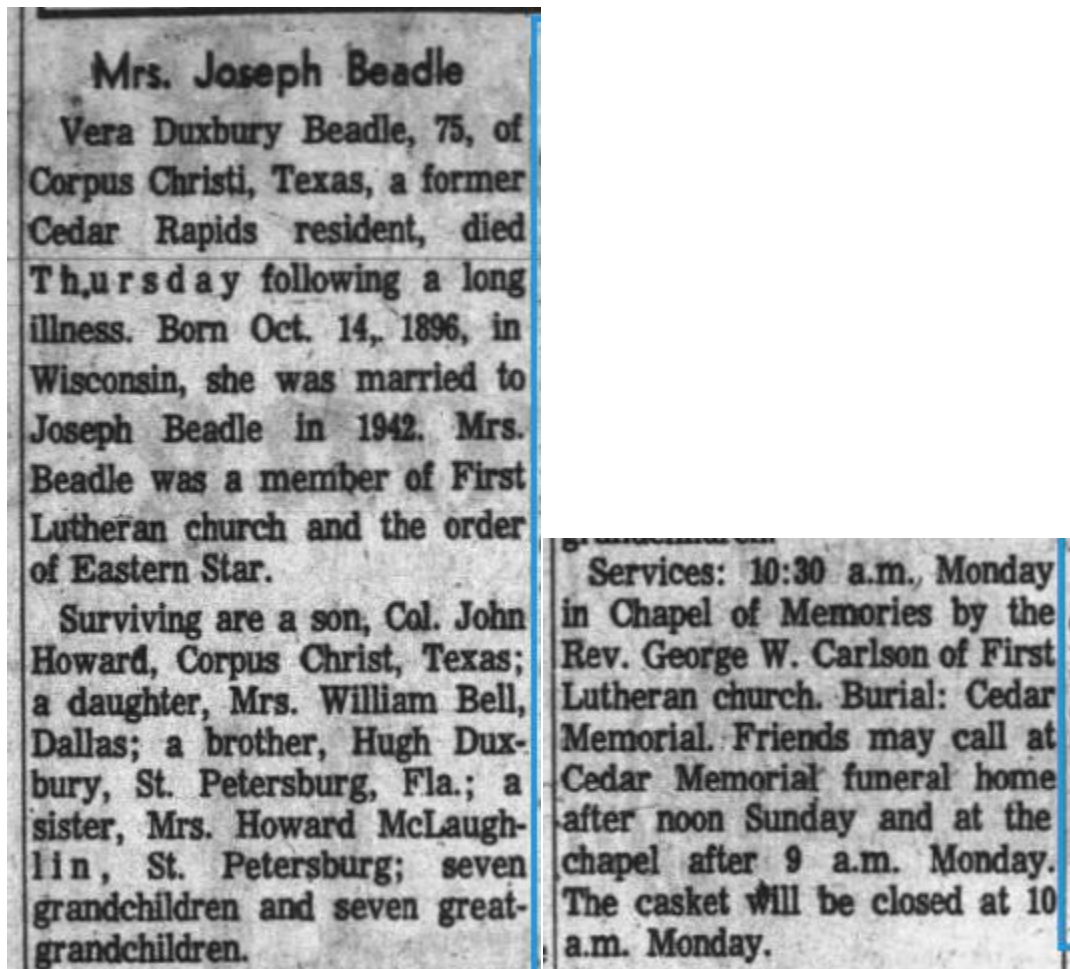
