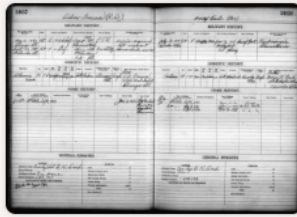

Death Takes Harvey Earl

Kenosha Survivor of Tuscania Disaster Dies at Milwaukee

Many Kenoshans learned today with deep regret of the death late Tuesday-afternoon of Harvey Earl, 50, well known Kenosha resident with a fine service record in the World War. He died at the Veterans hospital in Milwaukee, after a lingering illness. He was a survivor of the Tuscania disaster.

The body is at the chapel at the Veterans home in Milwaukee where catholic services will be held Thursday morning at 9:30, burial to follow in the National Home cemetery.

The deceased, coming to Kenosha in 1897 from Flint, Mich. lived here for thirty years. He was born in New Albany, Ind., a son of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Earl.

Was on Tuscania

At the start of the World War he enlisted in Company E, and was on the Tuscania when it was torpedoed. He later landed in France seeing service throughout the duration of the war. When the Armistice was signed he enlisted with the Army of Occupation in Germany.

He is survived by four sisters and three brothers: William and George Earl of Kenosha, and Walter Earl of Milwaukee, and by Mrs. Joseph H. Greenwald, Mrs. Milton Beckman, Mrs. Luther Holmes of Kenosha, and Mrs. Christian Nelson, Utica, N. Y. His parents preceded him in death.

VALE'S MEN LAST OUT OF FRANCE

**107th Supply Train Official-
ly Announced to Arrive
on Virginian on Next
Monday Morning.**

ALL SAW HEROIC SERVICE

**Formal Orders of the War Department
Announces This as the Last Unit to
Sail for the State—Milwaukee
Planning Grand Review.**

The one hundredth and seventh supply train, which has seen wonderful service over in France under the command of Captain Asbury Vale of Kenosha and which contains some sixty Kenosha men did not return on the Louisiana on Tuesday and a new order of the War Department states that this unit of the 32nd Division has sailed from Brest aboard the battleship Virginia and it is due to arrive at Newport News on the morning of next Monday May 19th. As the transports with returning troops have been coming into ports in this country about a day ahead it is pretty probable that the word from these boys will begin to reach Kenosha about next Sunday at noon. The 107th will be on the last steamer bearing members of the 32nd Division from France home. It is probable that the men will be sent to Camp Upton to await order to move West to Camp Grant. It is not known who will be in command of the train since Captain Vale has been ordered back to Coblenz. The last roster of the Ke-

Fred Scholey was a member of the
First Sanitary Squadron which is sched-
uled to come home at the same time
as the Supply Train.

These names as given were the Ke-
nosha men with the 107th when they
sailed on the ill fated Tuscania. One
other man was listed. He was Corpor-
al Arthur Junker who lost his life on
the Tuscania and who is now sleeping
some where over on the Irish Coast.
Some of these men may have been
transferred to other units in the army
and many of them may have won the
chevrons of non-commissioned officers.

The One Hundred and Seventh Sup-
ply train is one of the Kenosha units
which saw much action on several of
the battle fronts. The boys were in ac-
tion at many of the hardest fought
engagements with the Germans and
bore their part with honor. No group
of men from Kenosha in the army saw
as much service as these members of
the 107th Supply train.

It is probable that following their ar-
rival in New York they will be sent
to Camp Grant for demobilization.

Milwaukee is making great prepara-
tion for a parade of the 32nd Division
but the date for the big state review
is not to be set until after the arrival
of the 107th the last of the units of
the Division to reach the country from
France.

CASH AND WATCH LOST IN TAXICAB

Walter Murray of Flint, Mich., Alleges that He Was "Rolled".

MAKE TWO ARRESTS

Murray Says He Went in Taxicab to Seek a Room and Was Robbed of \$75 and Watch.

Walter Murray, who claims to come from Flint, Michigan, alleges that he traveled "the road to Jericho" in Kenosha on Thursday night and that as a result of his trip he fell among thieves who "rolled" him and robbed him of \$75 in cash and a gold watch of considerable value. William "Squeazy" O'Hare and Harvey Earl, who are alleged to have been fellow passengers in the taxicab with Murray, were afterward arrested by Police Officers Long and Hanaway and they are being held pending an investigation.

O'Hare was booked on a charge of larceny and Earl was held as a witness. Murray was also held by the police as a witness in the case. He did not make much of a protest against being held. O'Hare is pretty well known to the police and he was recently in court charged with thefts from the American Express company, by which company he was employed as a driver.

Murray Tells Story.

Murray told the police the story of the alleged robbery just after ten o'clock on Friday night. He declared that his home was in Flint, Mich., and that he had recently been in St. Paul, Minn., but that he came to Kenosha to get work. He is an automobile mechanic. He said that he was acquainted with Earl and that the latter consented to assist him in finding a room to live in. As it was expected that they would visit several places, Murray hired a taxicab and O'Hare who was with Earl, was invited to take a ride. After a room had been found for Murray, it was declared that the other men decided to show him the sights of the town.

It was alleged that the "rolling" took place in the taxicab near the Northwestern station just after eight o'clock. The driver of the taxicab reported the case to the police. O'Hare and Earl were picked up at ten o'clock and neither of them had anything like \$75 in their pockets. They denied any connection with the robbery of Murray.

Harvey Earl and William O'Hare, arrested in connection with the reported holdup of Walter Murray, pleaded guilty to charges of disorderly conduct in the municipal court on Friday afternoon and fines of \$3 and the costs of the action were assessed in each case with an alternative of ten days in jail. There was no evidence on which a stronger charge could be put against the men. Murray who has been held by the police was discharged.

Walter T. Earl, 80, died at the residence of a niece, Mrs. Albert Bornhuetter, 420 11th St., Tuesday morning following a short illness.

He was born in New Albany, Ind., May 30, 1880, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. George W. Earl. He was educated in the schools of New Albany, Ind., and for a number of years resided in Milwaukee before coming to Kenosha. For the past six years, he made his home in Somers township.

Earl served with the U.S. Army in World War I, entering the armed forces on May 8, 1918, Fifth Division, Unit 302. He received his honorable discharge from the service on Aug. 2, 1919.

He was formerly employed by American Motors and for the past 20 years had been retired.

Surviving are a brother, William Earl, Waupaca, and three sisters, Mrs. Joseph Greenwald, Mrs. Milton Beckman and Mrs. Luther Holm, all of Kenosha. He was preceded in death by two brothers, George and Harvey, and a sister, Mrs. Emma Dahl.

Husband’s obituary: “Kenosha News” 21 Jun 1967, p 15 – Joseph Greenwald, age 74, of 6039 – 49th St., died 20 Jun 1967. Born in Kenosha 11 Nov 1892, son of Jacob Greenwald. Born 13 May 1893 New Albany IN to the late Mr. & Mrs. George Earl. Came to Kenosha as a child & was educated here at St. James School. Beckmann, Sr., of 2123 – 26th St., died at Woodstock Health Center on

12 Mar 1975. Born in Kenosha WI on 11 Jun 1896 to the late Mr. & Mrs. Charles P. Beckmann; Kenosha High School graduate. Married on 8 Oct 1919 to Ruth A. Earl at Thomas Aquinas Church. Pre-war:

“Bloomington (IN) Evening World” 23 Apr 1917 p 1 – Sheriff J.G. Browning & Deputy Sheriff Henry Dudley were called to the Ketchum neighborhood this morning “by the strange actions of Harvey Earl of Kenosha, Wisconsin. Earl was brought to town and placed in jail.” [By 1924, and likely influenced by his wartime experiences, he is diagnosed with psychoneurosis. He is frequently arrested for intoxication post-war.]

Wartime:

“Kenosha News” 24 Oct 1917 p 1 & p 5 – “Vale Command Truck Co.” Truck Co. #2 is at Waco TX; some of the men of Co. M, which has been disbanded, are now in this company under the command of Asbury Vale. Among them is Pvt. Harvey Earl.

“Kenosha Evening News” 8 Feb 1918 p 1 – The War Department revised list for the Kenoshans aboard the Tuscania in the Headquarters Co., 107th Supply Train includes Harvey Earl.

“Kenosha News” 11 Feb 1918 p 1 – In Headquarters Co., 107th Supply Train, Pvt. Harvey Earl reported among those saved.

“Kenosha Evening News” 14 May 1919 p 1 & p 2 – the 107th Supply Train which saw service in France did not return on the “Louisiana” Tuesday. New orders from the War Department indicate that this unit of the 32nd Division sailed from Brest, France, on the “Virginia” & is expected to arrive in Newport News VA on Monday, 19 May 1919. This is the last steamer bringing the 32nd Division home from France. On board should be Pvt. Harvey Earl.

Post-war:

“Kenosha (WI) Evening News” 10 Sep 1920 p 1 – Walter Murray, who claims he is from Flint MI, said that on Thursday, 9 Sep 1920, he was “rolled” by thieves in Kenosha, who stole

\$75 in cash & a valuable gold watch from him when he was in a taxicab. His fellow cab passengers – William (Squeazy) O'Hare & Harvey Earl – were arrested by police officers Longo & Hanaway & held pending an investigation. O'Hare was charged with larceny & Earl with being a witness. Murray was also held as a witness. O'Hare is well-known to police & was recently in court concerning thefts from the American Express Co. where he was a driver. Murray said he had been in St. Paul MN & came to Kenosha to find work as an auto mechanic. Murray was acquainted with Earl, who said he'd find him lodging. A taxi was hired as the 2 expected to drive to several rooming places; O'Hare, who was with Earl, came along. After finding Murray a room, O'Hare & Earl decided to show him the sights of Kenosha. In the car near the Northwestern station just after 8 p.m., Murray said the 2 robbed him. The cab driver reported the case to the police. O'Hare & Earl were picked up at 10 p.m. & neither had anything like \$75. The two denied the robbery.

"Kenosha News" 11 Sep 1920 p 5 – Harvey Earl & William O'Hare, arrested in connection with the holdup of Walter Murray, pled guilty in Municipal Court on 10 Sep 1920 to charges of disorderly conduct & were each fined \$3 & costs, or the alternative of 10 days in jail. There being no evidence for the stronger charge, Murray was discharged.

"Kenosha News" 4 Apr 1925 p 7 – The soldiers' bonus insurance policies for 14 Kenosha war veterans are being held at the American Legion here as they were unclaimed. The addresses are not correct. If not claimed by 1 May, the money will be returned to Washington. One of the policies is for Harvey Earl.

"Kenosha Evening News" 13 Jul 1925 p 1 – Harvey Earl pled guilty to a charge of possessing a bottle of moonshine when he was arraigned today. He lives in the soldiers' home in Milwaukee & came to his hometown for a vacation. Harvey told Judge Slater that he was just carrying the bottle & didn't know what was in it. Finally he pled guilty & was sentenced to 30 days at hard labor. When the judge asked Harvey if he was able to do work at the hospital, Harvey said "yes," that he worked out of doors. The judge replied: "Then they can use you at the county poor farm."

"La Crosse (WI) Tribune" 15 Jul 1925 p 4 "Possessed Moonshine, Gets 30-Day Sentence" – Harvey Earl, a patient in the government hospital at Milwaukee, was sentenced to 30 days at hard labor at the county farm in Kenosha. He pled guilty to possession of moonshine.

"Kenosha News" 21 Feb 1930 p 6 – Seven men were sent to the Kenosha Co. jail this morning to serve 10 days, as they were unable to pay \$2 & costs. All were arrested by police on Thursday night, 20 Feb 1930, for intoxication. One of the 7 was Harvey Earl of Milwaukee.

"Kenosha News" 10 Sep 1931 p 7 – Harvey Earl, 2612 – 73rd St., who was arrested by police on 2 Sep 1931 for intoxication, had his charges dismissed this morning. Police explained to the court that he was a patient at the Milwaukee Veterans Hospital.

“Kenosha Evening News” 3 Apr 1934 p 7 – Four men were arrested Monday afternoon, 2 Apr 1934, when their car hit a light pole at St. George’s Cemetery. George Earl, 1807 – 52nd St., the car’s driver, will have a hearing on 10 Apr on drunken driving charges. The others were fined \$1 & costs each for intoxication. They were Harvey Earl, 1515 – 14th Ave. – William Earl, 2206 – 57th St. – and George Ahlstrom, 2915 – 63rd St. [George, Harvey & William are brothers]

“Kenosha News” 31 May 1934 p 7 – In Municipal Court, a charge of intoxication over the holiday [Memorial Day] resulted in fines of \$1 & costs each this morning for William Earl, 2206 – 57th St. and Harvey Earl, 5015 – 14th Ave. [William & Harvey are brothers]

“Kenosha News” 5 Feb 1949 p 5 – The annual reunion of Tuscania survivors. On the original list of 35 Kenosha survivors aboard is Harvey Earl.
