Young's acquaintance with Mrs. Edna Mehmman, 1143 Cypress avenue, Brooklyn, whom he called to arrange a bail bond before it was asked, and her too ready replies to questions, disclosed the robbery of the Vogel home and when she was confronted with the stolen articles, the police say she identified them as coming from the Vogel house. POLICEMAN WINS \$2,000 VERDICT

C. E. Ensenbach Was Injured
When Tree Fell on Him in
Freeport, Election Day.

Minneapolis, Feb. 26. A jury before County Judge Lewis J. Smith, yesterday rendered a verdict for \$2,000 in favor of Charles E. Ensenbach, a policeman attached to the Nassau County police force, who sued Harry Steinbach, of 217 North Main st., Freeport, to recover for injuries suffered when a tree in front of the Steinbach home fell on him on Election Day.

Ensenbach was passing in a car when the tree fell. He was taken to his home at 20 Milton ave. and was treated. Since the accident he developed a twitching sensation that affects him seriously. Although active as a policeman, Ensenbach says he still feels the effects of the accident.

A physician for an insurance company questioned the seriousness of Ensenbach's injury and the policeman stripped to the waist, disclosing a hole near his shoulder where the tree fell on him.

Nassau Policemen Organize Association at Two Rallies

President Moran of New York City Body Addresses Members—Vice-president Leonard Also Among Speakers.

The Patrolmen's Benevolent Association of Nassau County was organized Wednesday at two meetings in the Alpha Fire Company's hall in Freeport. The new organization was sponsored by the Board of Officers of the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association of New York City and sent representatives to the meetings.

The Nassau County police have been anxious for the formation of some kind of an organization for several years. They found the police of other localities organized.

The desires of the Nassau County police reached the ears of Joseph P. Moran, president of the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association of New York. The county line of New York City and Nassau are such that the men of one force come in contact with the men of the other in the regular course of their tours. President Moran found the men of Nassau ready for organization.

With President Moran at the opening meeting were the following New York City officers: George Mulrooney, first vice-president, of the Bronx; George R. Leonard, second vice-president, of Queens; John Cummings, treasurer, of Brooklyn; chairman of the board of trustees Philip Clare, of Queens; Joseph Miller, of Manhattan, and Thomas O'Brien, of Brooklyn, financial and recording secretaries; Valentine Standing, of Manhattan; Monaghan, of Brooklyn, and Nugent, of Brooklyn, trustees.

There was also present Mortimer Cullity, president of the Jersey City Patrolmen's Benevolent Association, and former President Charles Burgess. Joseph J. O'Reilly, social secretary of the New York Association and secretary of the State Police Conference, was also in the party.

President Moran, as temporary presiding officer, talked on organization and called for short addresses from Cullity, Vice-President Leonard, Secretary O'Reilly and Vice-president Mulrooney.

Moran then announced the presence of Edward T. O'Loughlin, editor of the "Long Island Post." Mr. O'Loughlin was formerly register of Kings County.

Mr. O'Loughlin said he had taken an interest in the policemen and firemen because he believed in them. He expressed his strong belief in organization.

President Moran then called for

President Moran then called for nominations for temporary officers and the name of Charles Ensenbach of the first precinct was presented by several men.

The following officers were then placed in nomination:

For first vice-president, Lawrence Ray, First Precinct, and Joseph Hanneman, First Precinct.

For second vice-president, Cornelius O'Neill, Second Precinct.

For treasurer, John A. Cain, Third Precinct.

For recording secretary, Harold Strohson, First Precinct.

For trustees, Harold Hoper, Third Precinct, William Reaper, Second Precinct, and Edward Strohmeier, First Precinct.

For sergeant-at-arms, William Spalding, Third Precinct.

Word regarding the morning meeting had got around Nassau County and when President Moran opened the evening meeting there was standing room only in the fire company's assembly hall. The men had been talking to others and a spirit of enthusiasm prevailed when Vice-President George Mulrooney, of the New York P. B. A., urged them to be loyal to the man they elected as their leader.

"Whoever he may be you must be guided by him while he holds his office if you expect to get results," he declared. "Every other officer is an assistant to the president who carries out your policy and who must receive the loyalty of every member and particularly of every officer. You may suffer as you make your progress but you may be sure of the aid of New York in every step you make so long as you are loyal to yourselves and to the police organizations of the other cities and localities of this State."

Second Vice-President George R. Leonard, of New York, pointed out the pitfalls which new organizations encounter and urged the men when they had perfected their organization to attend their meetings and to respond to the call of the chair on all occasions.

Secretary Thomas O'Brien spoke on organization and what it must mean to all of the Nassau County policemen regardless of rank.

Mr. Reilly showed the assembled policemen how and why the organizations of New York had been successful in bringing the salaries of the two forces up to a minimum of \$2,500. The affiliation of each with the other had brought strength to both he said. They had tested public opinion on three occasions in great referendums and now look forward confidently to the time when the people of the city will vote \$500 increase for them of the lower ranks of the two departments, he said.

The evening meeting by unanimous vote approved the proceedings of the morning meeting including the temporary officers. The men at both meetings accepted the obligation of organization administered by President Cullity of Jersey City.

Nassau County Police Form Welfare Body

Charles Ensenbach Selected As First Temporary Head

The Nassau County Patrolmen's Benevolent Association was organized at two meetings, one in the afternoon and one in the evening, held in the village of Roosevelt Wednesday July 18.

The sponsor of the new organization was the board of officers of the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association

of New York City. President Joseph P. Moran of the above organization, attended by his full executive staff, and Mortimer Cullity, head of the New Jersey Association, and staff, conducted the ceremonies of organization and installation of officers.

After short talks by several of those present the following temporary officers were named:

For president, Charles Ensenbach of the First Precinct.

For first vice president, Lawrence Ray, First Precinct, and Joseph Han-neman, First Precinct.

For second vice president, Cornel-ius O'Neil, Second Precinct.

For treasurer, John A. Cain, Third Precinct.

For recording secretary, Harold Strohson, First Precinct.

For trustees, Harold Hooper, Third Precinct; William Reaper, Second Precinct, and Edward Strohmeier, First Precinct.

For sergeant-at-arms, William Spalding, Third Precinct.

It is claimed that the formation of the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association is the outcome of the general sentiment expressed by the Nassau County Police from time to time for an organization of this kind.

EISENBACH HEADS OFFICERS BENEFIT BODY IN NASSAU

Not in Conflict With Chief
Skidmore's Ruling, Says New
Benevolent Ass'n's Head.

Roosevelt, Aug. 7.—A meeting of the recently formed Patrolmen's Benevolent Association of Nassau County, at which presiding officers and a board of trustees were elected, was held last night in the Fire Hall of Alpha Hook and Ladder Company. Patrolman Charles K. Eisenbach, who was unanimously elected president, announced that the association is not opposing Chief Abram Skidmore's recent ruling, which prohibited his men forming an organization.

Will Wait on Skidmore.

Following the election of the other officers, a committee was appointed to wait on Chief Skidmore in order to seek his approval of the organization. The committee will suggest that the body was formed for the purpose of bringing the patrolmen together for their "mutual interests and welfare" and to occasionally fraternize socially.

The president stated that the association was not a branch of the Patrolmen's Association of the New York Police Department, nor was it affiliated in any respect with the latter, despite the fact that the New York group materially assisted with their formation and organizing.

The association voted to pay a death benefit of \$200 to \$250 to any member that dies from natural causes or is killed in the line of duty. A "sick and visiting" committee was appointed to visit the afflicted members or those whom adversity has overtaken. It was also voted to arrange to aid financially the widow of Patrolman Matthew Maher, who recently was killed when he dived into a creek in Baldwin.

Other Officers.

The other officers elected are: First vice president, Lanice Ray; second vice president, Edward Johannann; recording secretary, Foster Witten; financial secretary and treasurer, Cornelius O'Neill. The trustees are: William Strohmeyer, William Reaper and Harold Hoopes. It was intimated by the officers that the present membership is about 200.

Nassau Chief Censured For Police Suspensions

**President of P. B. A. Declares Reprisals
Upon Men Who Dared to Organize
Will Draw General Protest.**

Policemen of this city are aroused to-day over the efforts of Chief Abram W. Skidmore to disband the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association of Nassau County, which was organized only a few weeks ago.

Chief Skidmore's statement that his force consisting of 400 men had been induced to organize through pressure brought by the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association of New York City was denied to-day by President Joseph P. Moran, who declared that Chief Skidmore's action in suspending the officers of the newly formed body was without a precedent and would surely bring down upon the chief of police the censure of all organizations in and out of the civil service.

The officers who have been suspended are admitted by the authorities of Nassau County to be among the most efficient of the local force. The manner in which Chief Skidmore humiliated the association leaders at Police Headquarters in Mineola on Wednesday was severely criticised by the policemen of New York City and of Nassau.

Called Before Chief.

The chief had notified Patrolman Charles Ensenbach, the president and his brother officers to appear at headquarters in Mineola on Wednesday morning. When the men had gathered in the chief's room Mr. Skidmore asked each one if he had severed his own connection with the new organization and had endeavored to disband the body. The policemen replied they were still officers of the association.

Anticipating their replies Chief Skidmore handed to each a blue paper containing formal charges. He told the officers they were suspended without pay and ordered them to report every day to their respective precinct stations until Wednesday next when they would be tried before him on the charges preferred.

Chief Skidmore then had the suspended policemen stripped of their shields and cap devices. The suspended men were compelled to go out of the building and to their homes miles away in the different villages of the county in uniforms without shields and cap devices.

Honor Man Ignored.

When Chief Skidmore had finished his ceremony he noticed among the suspended officers Frank Stevenson, a motorcycle man, who lost a leg in discharge of duty and who has been on the sick list. When Chief Skidmore refused to permit any of the officers to attend the State Police Conference at Rochester a week ago, Stevenson made the journey and received a warm welcome at the hands of the policemen of other sections of the State of New York.

Patrolman Stevenson moved forward on his crutches.

"What about me, chief?" he asked. "I am the treasurer of the association."

Chief Skidmore expressed his surprise when informed that Stevenson had volunteered to take the place when there was a vacancy, due to the resignation of the first treasurer.

Stevenson was not suspended and received no charges. As a cripple, under the law, he is entitled to full pay anyway.

The suspended policemen have engaged William O'Dwyer, of 26 Court street, to defend them. The charges against each are based solely upon their connection with the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association of Nassau County.

Backed by Conference.

The State Police Conference composed of organizations of all the cities of the State at its recent session adopted resolutions supporting the newly formed Nassau County Association and appealing to the people of the county to prevent persecution of the local policemen by Chief Skidmore for "following an example set by their own chief."

One of the points that will be brought out at the trial at Mineola on Wednesday next will be the membership of Skidmore in the P. B. A. of New York City. The Nassau chief as a New York patrolman joined the P. B. A. and at one time was a member of its board. When he became a sergeant he joined the Sergeants' Benevolent Association and later as a lieutenant he became identi-

fied with the Lieutenants' organization under Richard E. Enright. Chief Skidmore continued his membership in the P. B. A. and is still a member.

"Chief Skidmore's action is nothing less than an attempt to destroy organization in this State," said Joseph J. O'Reilly, secretary of the State Police Conference. "His action concerns all organized employees. He has an entirely wrong conception of organization if he contends that it is not a help to the head of a department. While he was struggling for advancement in the New York department it was the P. B. A. that defended his rights and privileges. In fact, he would not be where he is now if it had not been for the organized efforts of the association to which he was paying dues for so many years.

Joined for Protection.

"The Nassau County policemen have been trying to organize for several years, but they learned that Chief Skidmore did not like organization where he was the boss. Months passed and then a committee of the men sought knowledge of organization in New York from the P. B. A., to which their chief was paying his dues. It was then that Chief Skidmore started his own organization composed of a number of wealthy citizens of the county. The men joined not from choice but from fear of reprisal such as is now being visited upon them. The 'inside' organization, as the men called it, was not to their liking. They had no control over it and they combined their efforts to bring about an association of their own.

"The Nassau policemen have the right of court review, and it cannot be possible that a member of a P. B. A. in one county can dismiss men for joining a P. B. A. in another county and get away with it in the higher courts. The policemen of Nassau County will remain loyal to their officers regardless of the result. If Chief Skidmore, after having profited by membership in the P. B. A. of New York, can crush the life out of a newly formed body of his own men it will be because the people of Nassau County have a far different idea of organization than the people of the counties composing the greater city alongside of them."

NASSAU COPS FIRM IN DEFYING ORDER TO ABOLISH FUND

Meet in Roosevelt Fire House
and Back Up Eight Sus-
pended Officers.

Roosevelt, Aug. 28.—"To stick it out and see things through," was decided last night at a meeting of the Nassau County Patrolmen's Association, held in Alpha Hook and Ladder Company. At the meeting were the eight officers of the association who were recently suspended by Chief Skidmore for forming a separate body, contrary to his orders.

The suspended officers will be placed on trial for violating departmental rules before Chief Skidmore in his Mineola office on Sept. 5. They will be represented by counsel and will submit petitions from many civic bodies that have endorsed their stand.

Patrolman Charles K. Ensenbach, president of the association, one of the suspended group, announced that two petitions endorsing the patrolmen had been received from residents of Bellmore and Merrick. These, he said, contain 500 signatures, in addition to which is the resolution of the Baldwin Exchange Club protesting the recent ultimatum of Chief Skidmore for the patrolmen to disband. More endorsements are expected.

The association voted to send a floral piece and a telegram of condolence to Chief Skidmore over the death of his mother, Mrs. Amelia C. Skidmore, who died Saturday night at her home at 523 Solomon ave., Inwood.

All patrolmen off duty tonight will attend the funeral services at the home in full uniform with white gloves. Services will be held at 7:45 P. M.

Two meetings will be held on Labor Day which will be open to the press and general public; members of village police forces and the patrolmen from the departments of Long Beach and Glen Cove. The secretary read a letter from the Bellerose Chemical Hose and Engine Company endorsing the P. B. A. and stating that the vamps could see no reason for Chief Skidmore's opposition.

It was disclosed that each member of the Nassau County force is taxed 25 cents monthly for dues in the Nassau Relief Association, the body favored by Skidmore. This money is deducted from their pay and is practically compulsory.

In the Hempstead Bank, the relief body has \$14,000 on deposit, which is disbursed for relief on the sole authority of Skidmore.

SKIDMORE WINS; REINSTATES MEN WHO OBEY ORDERS

**Police Benevolent Body's Of-
ficers Avoid Trial by Yield-
ing to Chief**

Mineola, Sept. 4.—The eight Nassau County policemen who were suspended by County Police Chief Abram W. Skidmore for disobedience in joining the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association over his protest, were reinstated yesterday.

This act followed a visit made by the men to Chief Skidmore in Lawrence. While Chief Skidmore would not talk about it last night, he did admit that the men saw him; that they had agreed to abandon the association and in consequence they were put back to work. This precludes the need for a trial tomorrow.

"I am not talking about it," he said. He also doubted that any of the men concerned would talk about it either, but the chief did admit that the men had all agreed to abandon the association and consequently they have been reinstated. They went back to work yesterday.

Had the eight policemen insisted on carrying out the association and elected to fight the chief, they would have had to stand trial tomorrow, with the possibility that they would be "broke" for disobedience or insubordination.

Done Deliberately

The eight men did not get into trouble blindly. When agents from the association called on Chief Skidmore nearly two months ago and asked for permission to organize the association in Nassau, Chief Skidmore declined to allow it. Despite this, they met with the men under Skidmore and formed the association.

Several meetings were held and then the chief suspended the officers.

Since then attacks have been made on the chief by persons who are behind the project, but he remained firm, deciding to be boss of the situation. Chief Skidmore recently made the statement that the men of the county force may form their own benevolent association, but he will not stand for the New York police organizing an association among the men of the county force.

The eight men concerned are Charles K. Ensenbach, Lanice Ray, Edward Johannemann, Foster Witten, Cornelius O'Neill, William Strohmeyer, William P. Ryan and William Matthews.

There will be no need for a trial on Wednesday, and from what Chief Skidmore reluctantly admitted last night, the matter has ended.

Roosevelt, Sept. 4.—Two meetings were held by the patrolmen yesterday in the Fire Hall of Alpha Hook & Ladder Co., here. Before the evening session, President Charles K. Ensenbach said there had been an arrangement entered into between the patrolmen and their chief, "not to have any more publicity in the newspapers."

Ensenbach asserted that on account of a "gentlemen's agreement" made with Chief Skidmore yesterday afternoon at two o'clock, further airing of the police controversy in the newspapers would be discontinued.

At the morning meeting, a resolution reading that there never had been at any time any intention on the part of the patrolmen to disband, was unanimously passed.

The resolution bore the signatures of the following officers of the Association: president, Charles K. Ensenbach; 1st vice-president, Lanice Ray; 2nd vice-president, Edward J. Johannemann; secretary, Foster H. Witten; chairman of the board of trustees, William G. Strohmeyer; and trustees, William F. Matthews and William B. Ryan.

John W. Grimm, 31, A. B. M. T. surface car motorman of 6 Bella pl., Maspeth, was held without bail for the Grand Jury when arraigned today before Magistrate Downs in Ridgewood Court, on a charge of bigamy.

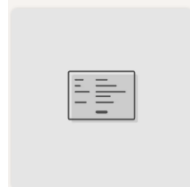

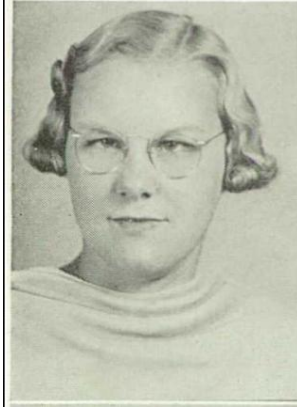

HAYES, MARGARET E. Peggy was born in Norwich, Connecticut on June 20, 1924. She grew up in Freeport, New York, on the south shore of Long Island. Among her fond memories of her early teens were frequent visits to the neighboring house of band leader Guy Lombardo where she met several other leaders of the Big Bands, including Glen Miller, Tommy Dorsey, Woody Herman, Charlie Barnett, Paul Whiteman, Harry James, Les Brown and Gene Krupa. She spent many weekend afternoons as a backstage guest. Peggy had a full life. She adored her Nana Kelly, modeling herself in the standards of her idol. She was devoted to her family, bestowing and inspiring respect and affection with each new member whether by birth or by marriage. In addition, Peggy unselfishly contributed her talents to the field of nursing and to both civic and social enhancement. In her mid-teens Peggy volunteered as a "candy striper" at the local hospital rendering various services for the comfort and convenience of patients. When the U.S. went to war in December 1941 she became a volunteer nurse's aid after school, evenings and weekends, attending to many battle casualties in the wards and assisting in the operating rooms. Upon graduation from high school in June 1942 she became a full time volunteer. Peggy earned her nursing credentials primarily through on-the-job training and extensive experience. She also worked evenings at the public library, having combined her 3 major interests, music, nursing and reading. Peggy met her future husband, Donald, in the fall of 1941 on a

her future husband, Donald, in the fall of 1941 on a blind date. He became a Naval Aviator during WWII. They married in early 1945. After the war he was released to inactive duty. Her nursing skill was again donated for the public good in 1947. In the next town two trains, one crowded with commuters returning home, collided on temporary tracks. Hundreds of people were killed or injured. Peggy promptly donned her Red Cross uniform and reported to the nearest hospital. She returned home 48 hours later to shower, launder her uniform, and go back for another 48 hours. In May 1952 her husband was called to active duty. They moved several times and created a family of 5 children. During the years 1959 through 1961 she was a steady volunteer at the hospital on the Guantanamo Bay Naval Base devoting hundreds of hours to caring for others. In 1962, upon arrival in San Diego she signed on at the Balboa Naval Hospital assisting in clinics, in the wards, and at the blood bank. Some years later she transferred her efforts to the 32nd Street Naval Station OB/GYN clinic preparing patients for exams and helping with minor surgeries. From 1952 through 1974, the years in which she had a child in school, Peggy was a member of various PTA groups, usually serving as Treasurer. Concurrently, from 1962 to 1971 she was very active in the Navy Officer Wives Club. She led a group of wives in the creation of a low cost child care facility at NAS Ream Field. Her contributions were recognized early in her West Coast activities by her being selected as Service Wife of the Year for San Diego County 1964-1965. She also supervised the activities of

County 1964-1965. She also organized the wives of commissioned officers and chief petty officers when her husband ' s command deployed to the Western Pacific. The purpose was to provide aid and advice to the inexperienced wives, especially the young ones away from home for the first time. Somehow she found time to take art lessons working with a blow torch, oil paints and water colors. Peggy astonished the instructor with her use of colored chalk and lipstick to achieve the desired effect. Her creations are proudly displayed in her home. She was a member of the Sweetwater Women ' s Club. again serving as Treasurer for several years. Upon taking that office she discovered that there were overlapping insurance policies. She corrected that error and saved the club approximately \$5,000 each year. Peggy is survived by her husband Cdr. Donald J. Hayes, USN (Ret); four of five children: sons Cdr. Thomas Hayes, USN (Ret) of South Woodstock, Vermont; Peter Hayes of Bonita; Mark Hayes of Ramona; and daughter Lisa Clements of Chula Vista. Her son David Hayes predeceased her. She leaves nine grandchildren: LCdr. Christopher Hayes, USN of Chula Vista, Allison Hayes of Chula Vista, LtJG Ryan Hayes, USNR, of Jacksonville, Florida, Kristina Sousek and Steven Sousek of Chula Vista; Shawn Hayes and Erin Hayes of Bonita; and Parker Hayes and Andrea Hayes of Ramona; 3 great grandchildren; Catherine, Jack and Kyle Hayes of Chula Vista; plus two sisters, Teresa Linacre of Wappinger Falls, New York and Frances Wells of Buffalo, New York. The contract for the improvement of School st., Glen Cove, was awarded to Hinkle & Finlayson, with a bid of \$14,825, which was less than that of E. M. Underhill & Son, with \$15,040.
Chief of Police Abram W. Skidmore reported a controversy with the State Civil Service Commission on the matter of promotions from the ranks of the force to sergeant and captaincy. The commission differs with the police act as passed by the Legislature as to the powers conferred on the chief regarding the right to promote. The matter was referred to the county attorney who will handle the case from its legal aspect for the purpose of guarding against any mistake. The chief reported he had appointed Alfred Ensenbach of Freeport and Henry T. Simms of Lynbrook to the provisional force at \$6 a day. He also reported that four police booths and one police car had been damaged.
James B. Louchran complained that the curbing in front of his home at Archer and Grove st., Freeport, had been damaged by the contractors improving a roadway there, and he asked the county to make redress. The matter was referred to the county attorney and county engineer.

Death Fells Two 10 Minutes Apart

Freeport—Sudden death struck twice within 10 minutes last night, the victims being two elderly women who lived within a few blocks of each other. Both suffered heart attacks.

The first was Mrs. Ellen Ensenbach, 80, who was stricken in her home at 22 N. Grove St. shortly after 6 P. M. Dr. Hugo Neuhaus, who had been treating her for a heart condition, pronounced her dead on his arrival at 6:58 P. M. She is the mother of Charles Ensenbach, one of the first members of the Nassau County Police Department. She is also survived by her husband, Alfred.

Reaching her home at 1 Pine St. after her day's work in a Baldwin laundry, Mrs. Sarah Swezey, 60, the second victim, complained to her husband, Henry, that she did not feel well. Shortly afterward she collapsed and Dr. Anton Notey pronounced her dead on his arrival at 7:08 P. M., despite the efforts of Sgt. John Raynor and Ptl. Kenneth Waterman to revive her with an inhalator.

Dr. Alan A. Jaques, deputy county medical examiner, gave permission for funeral arrangements.

Its present president, Charles Ensenbach, was elected 2 weeks ago. The group will make a final effort to wine Chief Abram Skidmore over, but if unsuccessful, Ensenbach is quoted as saying the policemen will comply with his order.

"NY Daily News" 23 Aug 1928 p 67 - 8 officers of the Nassau Co. branch of the Patrolmen's Benevolent Assn. were suspended 22 Aug by Chief Abram Skidmore at Mineola, and are facing trial for disobeying orders in forming the local branch of the association. “Brooklyn Times Union” Saturday, 24 Nov 1928 p 28 – the newly organized Police Officers & Patrolmen’s Benevolent Association of Nassau County will hold its 1st annual mask & civic ball on Wednesday night in Baldwin, Long Island NY. Eight officers were suspended but have been

subsequently reinstated & "the most cordial relations" exist between the police department & the association. Its president is Charles Ensenbach.

"Brooklyn Times Union" 3 Dec 1928 p 3 – Four members of one family were hurt 2 Dec 1928 at Barnum Ave. & Front St. when two cars collided. They were treated by Dr. Porter at Nassau Hospital. Assisting in first aid was patrolman Charles Ensenbach.

"Brooklyn Times Union" 20 Jul 1929 p 54 – Patrolman Charles Ensenbach of the county police & 1st president of the county's Police Benevolent Association, on the force for 5 years, will resign effective 1 Aug 1929 to form a private detective agency in Manhattan with E.S. Williams & A.J. Vitelli. They have leased space in the old Freeport Bank Building on Main St. Williams has operated a detective agency for many years & is at present operating in Manhattan. "Ensenbach was attached to the Merrick precinct for a time and is well known all over the county."

"Brooklyn Daily Eagle" 21 Jul 1929 p 16 - Freeport NY, patrolman with the county police for 5 years & 1st president of the Police Benevolent Association, Charles Ensenbach resigns effective 1 Aug to start a private detective agency in old Freeport Bank Bldg. (Main St.) with E.S. Williams & A.J. Vitelli of Manhattan.

"NY Daily News" 29 Mar 1933 p 374, famous speed aviator Laura Ingalls (photo) is ticketed 28 Mar for going 46 mph in Lake Success, Long Island, by motorcycle policeman, Charles Ensenbach. She is in trouble again, having been fined \$5 on 30 Dec 1932 for parking overtime in Manhattan. Ingalls said she will go to jail instead of paying; her trial is 7 Apr 1933. She is the holder of the women's flight record for two-way coast-to-coast flight.
