Charles "Pep" Fasce was a three sport star at Pittsfield High School in Massachusetts. Fasce played basketball at Catholic University and Syracuse University. He was captain of the Syracuse squad his senior year. In the 1920's Fasce coached multiple sports at St. Joseph's High School in Pittsfield and also was a professional baseball umpire in the Eastern and International Leagues. Fasce practiced medicine in Pittsfield for over forty years.

Dr. Charles Fasce dies at 84; practiced medicine for 50 years

Dr. Charles F. "Pep" Fasce, 84, who was cited earlier this year by the Massachusetts Medical Society for 50 years of practice in this state, died yesterday morning at Berkshire Medical Center.

At a testimonial for him 17 years ago, attended by an overflow crowd of 800, Judge Francis J. Quirico, a longtime neighbor of the Fasce family in the Lakewood section of the city, described the guest of honor as a man who gave himself totally to the community.

Dr. Fasce opened his practice here in 1932, after a two-year internship in Albany, and almost immediately was named city physician, a position he held for two years.

"And the record of his first year," Quirico said at the testimonial dinner, "showed that it was not just a title. He ministered to the poor. He made more than 15,000 calls, 5,300 of them in his office, 5,800 in the hospital, 3,500 house calls and more than 51 calls to what was then known as the poor farm."

The pay was \$1,500 a year, out of which Dr. Fasce paid office and automobile expenses.

He was a general practitioner who made house calls at all hours of the night. "And," his brother-in-law, Thomas J. Gilligan, said yesterday, "he was the world's worst bill collector."

Dr. Fasce was a former president of the Berkshire Medical Society and was chief of staff at St. Luke's Hospital, which later merged with Pittsfield General Hospital to become the Berkshire Medical Center. He quit his private practice in 1968 and became the physician for BMC's employees.

He was born in Bethlehem, Pa., but moved to Pittsfield at an early age with his parents, Fortunato and Jennie Garbarino Fasce, who earlier had come to this country from the Genoa area of Italy. He attended local schools and was an outstanding athlete at Pittsfield High

with a bachelor of science degree in bacteriology and chemistry.

As basketball coach at St. Joseph's High School for two years, he produced championship teams. At the urging of the then school principal, the Rev. Eugene F. Marshall, he entered Albany Medical College. Father Marshall, later Monsignor Marshall, helped finance his first year, but after that he paid for his own education through refereeing professional basketball and umpiring baseball in the Eastern League. He received his medical degree in 1930.

After two years of internship in Albany hospitals, Dr. Fasce opened his practice in Pittsfield. He was city physician for two years, took time out in the summer of 1934 to go back to umpiring — this time in the International League — but after three months he quit to return to his practice here and to marry Claire Nesbit of Pittsfield.

School in all sports, particularly basketball.

The 1915-1916 basketball team was considered by the late John M. Flynn, longtime sports editor of The Eagle, as the greatest of all time at PHS. Fasce was a fast, aggressive forward on a team that included Dan Martin, John Linnehan, Mickey Marvin and Sol Goldstein.

Ship was torpedoed

He served in the Army in World War I. En route to Europe, his troop ship, the SS Tuscania, was torpedoed 300 miles off the Irish coast. He was on a raft for five hours before being picked by a British destroyer. About 250 of the 2,700 soldiers on board lost their lives. Subsequently he saw much action in France, and he spent some time in Europe with the Army of Occupation following victory.

In 1920 he entered Catholic University, Washington, D.C. After a year he transferred to Syracuse University and graduated in 1924

The nickname "Pep," according to his 81-year-old brother, Joseph, derived from his extreme agility and "pepperiness" as a young man growing up in the Lakewood section.

Mrs. Fasce died in 1966. Survivors, in addition to his brother, who has lived most of his life in Detroit, Mich., are a daughter, Miss M. Patricia Fasce, a teacher in the nursing program at Berkshire Community College; two sons, Dr. Charles F. Fasce Jr. of Red Hook, N.Y., and William Fasce of St. Louis, Mo.; a sister, Mrs. Louise Murphy, of Pittsfield; seven grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

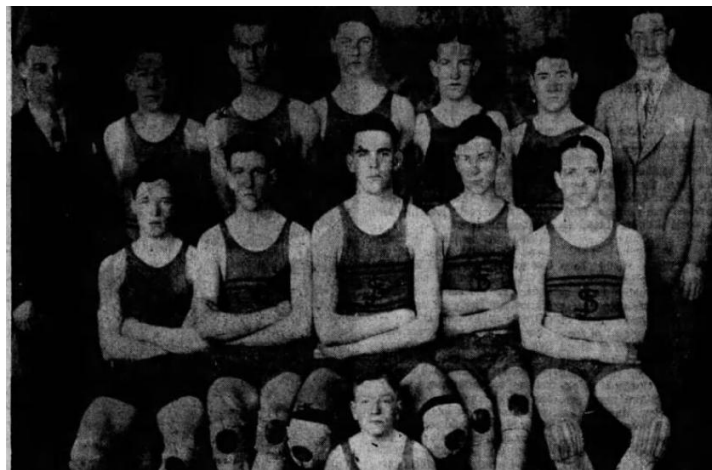

Pep Fasce was a starting forward for Syracuse basketball for two seasons. Fasce was known as someone who remained under control throughout a game, and was tenacious in his play. He was considered a fair athlete, with not much speed but very studious on the court.



Fasce served in the Army in World War I. He was aboard the ship [Tuscania](#) when it was torpedoed in St. George's Channel on February 5, 1918. He was in the water for five hours before being recovered. This was the first ship carrying U.S. troops to be sunk in the War.

Fasce would be a starting forward his first year at Syracuse, while he was in medical school. He would be one of the top scoring players on the team that season.

His final year at Syracuse he was the captain of the basketball team. Though he was in good academic standing, he lacked the extra study honor points required and was suspended from second half of the season (after February 10th).

Fasce would earn a Medical Degree from Syracuse. He would set up practice in Springfield, Massachusetts. He did some baseball umpiring as side work for a while, and eventually became a full time umpire in the Eastern League and in the International League. He would also play some professional basketball in the New York State League. In the late 1950s he was a team physician for the Boston Red Sox.

Dr. Charles Fasce died in August of 1982.

BASEBALL BUG IS CAUSE OF TWO RUNAWAYS

Marcott and Fasce Boys Went
to New York from Here—
May Be Sidetracked Now.

Alcidas Marcott, 15 years old, of East street and Charles Fasce, 13 years old, of Alessio street wanted to see the world's series of baseball games so they ran away from their homes here and went to New York where they were held Saturday by the New York Children's society. They were sent back to this city yesterday, but Chief White was inclined to believe this afternoon that they had failed to stay on the train until reaching this city.

The New York Children's society has found a number of cases of runaway children since the series started. Marcott and Fasce started out of New York Wednesday on a freight train, en route to Philadelphia but they were held up by a railroad detective at Pelham Park.

"It is a very easy matter to explain this epidemic of runaway boys from the New England states," said Albert H. Hockley of the Children's society in New York last night. "The attraction is the baseball series now being played. In nearly every case the boys have left comfortable homes. When remanded to the society they have been eager to be sent home again. It's the baseball bug. We've had a dozen cases this week."

"Pep" Fasce Thought To be on Vessel Sunk

Former Pittsfield High Athlete Reported
Among American Soldiers Who Were on
Transport Tuscania, Recently Torpe-
doed.

According to the following article in the Pittsfield Eagle, "Pep" Fasce, Pittsfield high's former all around athlete, is believed to have been among the American soldiers aboard the liner Tuscania, which was sunk by a German submarine Tuesday night.

"Charles Fasce of 102 Newell street, perhaps better known as 'Pep' Fasce, is believed to have been aboard the Tuscania. He is attached to the medical corps of the 32d division and in a letter received by his parents 10 days ago he stated that he was to sail overseas with the contingent of troops from Michigan.

" 'Pep' Fasce was prominent in athletics at the Pittsfield high school. He played football, basketball and baseball at the school and was a star in all branches of sport in which he participated. Fasce played in the backfield on the football team, played a guard position on the basketball team and was in the infield and outfield on the baseball team. He also played on independent teams and while playing with a local team in Stockbridge he fell and broke a bone in his shoulder, keeping him out of athletics for a time.

"The young man was an excellent student and was never kept from any athletic games because of scholarship difficulties. He always ranked well in

his studies and the teachers all spoke highly of him. Fasce was a member of the Pittsfield Boys' Club and was a member of the class of basketball referees. He assisted James E. Keegan in the conduct of the grammar school baseball leagues during the last few summers and was umpire of many games. 'Pep' Fasce is known to about every young man in the city and there are few who are interested in sports who do not know him by name and fame at least.

"He enlisted last summer after his return from a trip to Oklahoma where he planned to work on a farm for the summer. Simon D. Minsky, another Pittsfield high school athlete, enlisted in the army at the same time and both went to Fort Slocum together. Later they were assigned to different branches of the service and separated. Fasce has not been home since he entered the service.

"His mother has received no word from her son since his letter of 10 days ago. She is anxiously awaiting the list of those aboard the Tuscania to ascertain whether he was on that ship, and if so whether he was among the many saved. Mrs. Fasce stated this afternoon that she believed her son was on the torpedoed ship as he was with the Michigan troops."

torpedoed and sunk, is safe, contrary to a report that was widely circulated yesterday to the effect that he was lost with the ship. His safety was announced in a telegram from the war department received in Holyoke last evening, addressed to his mother, Mrs. Louise Dubuque, who is now a resident of Richmond, Va.

Mr. Dubuque enlisted in the aero service in New York soon before the draft and was sent to Mineola, L. I., for training. He has spent most of his life in this city, where now reside two sisters, Mrs. Joseph T.

Davolino and Mrs. Ida Nicholson, a brother, Clarence Dubuque, lives in Holyoke, and another sister, Mrs. William Lacey, lives in West Springfield. He has a wife and a three-years-old son in Brattleboro, Vt.

Edmund J. Radasch, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Edmund J. Radasch of Longmeadow, who was also aboard the ship, sent a cablegram to his parents informing them of his safety. The message was brief and to the point. "Safe" was all it said. Private Radasch was a member of Co. F of the 20th engineers, a forestry unit. He enlisted in Springfield about two months ago and was sent to Fort Slocum for training. The arrival of the cablegram yesterday put an end to the anxiety of his parents, who were informed Friday by the war department that their son was on the Tuscania.

No word has as yet been received regarding the fate of Private George V. R. Carey of 22 Reed street, this city, who is a member of the 6th battalion of the 20th engineers, medical detachment. Private Carey enlisted in Springfield and has hitherto been stationed at Camp Washington at Washington, D. C. Before entering the service he was in the employ of the Metropolitan life insurance company.

The other three Western Massachusetts men who were aboard the vessel are reported safe. They are Dexter L. Bullard of South Hadley Falls, S. W. Eager of Deerfield, a private in Co. E, 6th battalion of the 20th engineers, and Charles F. Fasce of Pittsfield. The last is the son of Mrs. Fred Fasce of 102 Newell street, Pittsfield. He was a member of the mobile laboratory of the 32d division of the national guard, a Michigan outfit. He is a former Pittsfield high school athlete and was on the state interscholastic championship basketball team in 1915 and 1916.

"PEP" FASCE HEARS HIS DIVISION MAY RETURN SOON

Former Local Athlete Quartered in Gymnasium at Neiwied, Germany, and Has All Comforts of Home—More Reports About 26th Division Coming Home.

Charles Faese of this city, who was on the torpedoed transport *Tuscania* and who is attached to the mobile laboratory corps of the 32nd division, which is composed mainly of Michigan troops, writes under date of December 29 that he expects to be home before long. Unofficial reports circulated among the men of the 32nd division assert that the division may start for the United States late in January or early in February. It is not official, however. Today announcement was made regarding the returning of several divisions from overseas but the 32nd was not included in the list. Neither is the 26th nor 82nd division, which includes many Pittsfield men.

On December 29 "Pep" Faese was located at Neuwed, Germany. He was quartered in a gymnasium with a bed to sleep in and the building is steam heated. The men of the 32nd division have taken over the Hohenzollern theater in Neuwed and have renamed it Uncle Sam's theater and shows are presented regularly by the soldiers. Concerts are also given by the different regimental bands.

Around Christmas time Faese was in Coblenz and was pleased with the city. There was plenty of life there but it was difficult to get along because of not understanding the language. In his letter he says that because of the revolution in Berlin the people are glad to see the American troops for they regard them as a protection to the populace. The people treat the Americans well but everything is very militaristic. Even street car conductors show this attitude. They do not act like a people who have gone down to defeat. "Pep" had not met any Pittsfield boys in a long time.

Work of Chatham Man

With thousands of troops being rushed through Long Island last summer and in fact since the first movement of troops from Camp Mills to France, few people watching the crowds of happy faced boys that waved their hats from the passing trains knew that all this wonderful movement of a half million troops was accomplished by one man who a short time before the breaking out of the war had no more idea of how to ship thousands of troops than he had of flying in an airplane.

To Captain Albert S. Callan, of Chatham, N. Y., was given the work of handling all incoming troops and those leaving for overseas. The work of getting the men into camp from the scores of trains was easy compared with the task of placing them aboard

Powell, was tendered a farewell reception last evening and left today for Indianapolis. A pleasant evening was spent. A musical program was carried out, including the U. S. army bugle calls played by Sergeant Powell, and refreshments were served.

May Be on Manchuria

Private Lawrence Maloney of South street and Private James Welch of West Pittsfield, members of 492nd aero squadron, are believed to be aboard the *Manchuria* which is due to arrive today.

Has Returned Home

Leslie C. Ford of Lebanon avenue, who has been in the United States navy, has returned to this city. He is now on the inactive list.

Condition Improved

The condition of Private Fred Silk, who is undergoing treatment at St. Elizabeth's hospital in Washington, D. C., as a result of having suffered from shell shock, continues to improve. His sister, Miss Mary Silk of Maple street, recently visited her brother. The attending physician says that it will be from three to four months before he will fully recover. He is the son of Mrs. Thomas McKee and went to France with western troops. He has two brothers, James and John, who are now with the American forces in France.

ABOUT SINKING OF TUSCANIA

British Sailors Looked Out
for Themselves First and
Neglected Soldier Passen-
gers After Torpedo Struck
Heavily Laden Transport.

Private Fasce Visited 303d
Ambulance Company at
Andermach, Germany—
Many in His Division Talk-
ed German—Lauds Scen-
ery of Ireland and Ger-

Private Charles "Pep" Fasce, survivor of the Tuscania disaster and who served for many months in France with the mobile laboratory of the 32nd division, has been honorably discharged from the service at Camp Devens and has returned to his home at 163 Newell street. No soldier returning here from overseas has been more cordially greeted by his innumerable friends than "Pep" who although he looks somewhat changed because he is wearing a moustache still possesses that smile which not even figuring in a shipwreck or being through the horrors of war could erase. For two reasons "Pep" raised a moustache; one being a wager and the other being the fact that practically everybody tried their hand at growing one in France and he just followed the procession. In a few days more, however, the time extension on his wager will expire and the moustache will vanish.

It was on August 20, 1917 that Charles Fasce and Simon Minsky enlisted at the local army recruiting station in the hope that they would be allowed to stay together by such was not the case. After they had been at Fort Slocum a short time "Pep" was sent to Washington, D. C., and his companion was ordered to Camp Gordon. They did not meet again until last evening, both of them having just returned home, a strange coincidence that they should be coming back at practically the same time.

On Tuscania Disaster

Of course "Pep" is called upon to relate his experience in the Tuscania disaster and he does it without the least spirit of bravado and in an extremely interesting manner. In an interview with an Eagle reporter "Pep" had the following to say about the sinking of the Tuscania:

"On January 23, 1918, we sailed from New York on the Tuscania. There were about 2000 troops aboard, most of them from Michigan and Wisconsin. There were, however, vast stores of meat, potatoes and other food stuffs on the ship. On the 14th day out, when off the coast of Ireland, it must have been about 8 p. m., as we had eaten supper about an hour before, our ship was struck by a torpedo from a submarine. It was a terrible crash and the lights immediately went out leaving the place in darkness as

it became dark early at that time of the year.

"I was about one deck up from the water line and we all scrambled for the deck where emergency lights were put on. The excitement was intense. There were no heroes that I could observe. No hand was playing in an orderly fashion as some gifted writers described the sinking of the Titanic in 1912. It was just a case of each man or group of men going for themselves. According to the rules of the ship the British sailors who manned it were supposed, in event of accident, to allow the soldier-passengers to get into the boats, then lower them and the sailors man the boats. It turned out, however, that the sailors took to safety as soon as possible and let the soldiers look out for themselves. Some boys jumped from the decks into the ocean. Some put down the boats in a cautious manner and others just threw them over from the deck. Other boats overturned when about half way down to the water. The rafts looked better to me than a boat and when I saw some of the ship stewards getting out on to a raft I figured they might know something about handling one and I boarded it with them. For three and one-half hours we floated around in the water and it certainly seemed a long, long time. We were encouraged from the time we took to the raft, however, for we could see two of the convoy destroyers approaching. According to the orders all ships of the convoy were supposed in event of attack upon the transport to speed ahead to safety, with the exception of two destroyers in the rear who were supposed to rescue the crew and passengers of the ill-fated transport.

Saved By Mosquito

From all accounts the destroyers who were supposed to speed ahead to safety, carried that rule right out to the letter, because they soon got out of sight. Two destroyers, the Mosquito and the Grasshopper, remained to do what they could for us. It was one time when I was glad to see a Mosquito and it was that ship which picked me up after we had played a flashlight on them. They warned us to stop using the flashlight. They were thoroughly frightened and made no secret about it. Fully 250 lives were lost in that disaster. I understood, but I only knew a few of the men intimately who were lost.

Although the water seemed some-

what cold while I was on the raft, it did not bother me, for the excitement was so great that my blood kept plenty warm.

"Owing to the great danger of transports being attacked, every man on the ship had to wear a life preserver wherever he went and that fact undoubtedly saved lives, although I was not obliged to count on my life preserver while being rescued."

Saw Ambulance Company

Private Fasce went to Ireland, England, France, Belgium and Germany and the places which impressed him most for their beauty, were along the Rhine in Germany and certain parts of Ireland. Just before starting for home he visited the 308th ambulance company at Andernach, Germany, which company includes a number of boys from this city and other parts of Berkshire county. They were all anxious to get home, in fact so much that one member of the company took it upon himself to write General Pershing as to the chances of getting home soon and received a reply signed by the general himself, or at least somebody authorized to sign for him, which was as follows:

"Impossible to tell when corps troops would go home. John J. Pershing."

This message is posted on the wall of the company's headquarters at Andernach.

All Could Talk German

Outside of the Pittsfield boys he saw in the ambulance company Private Fasce did not meet many other Berkshire boys in France that he knew. There were many soldiers from Milwaukee in his division. At one field hospital there were 126 soldiers from Milwaukee and every one of the 126 could speak German, the language having been so generally taught in that section and so many of the soldiers being of German parentage. The Berkshire boys are in charge of a hospital in Andernach, Germany, but there were no patients in the hospital when Fasce was there, everybody enjoying good health.

Saw Legore Play Football

While getting some wood from a building in France for kindlings, Fasce caused a beam to come down upon him, injuring a shoulder which he had previously hurt in athletic games in this country. For that reason he did not go into athletics much while abroad although he did a little boxing. He saw Harry Legore, the Yale football star, who was later killed in an accident, play football with the 2nd division team against his own division, the 32nd division, in Germany. He said Legore and Moore the former Princeton star, tore up the 32nd division team in great escape, winning for the 2nd division.

Glad to be home and glad to know that Pittsfield has a team in the Eastern league, Private Fasce intends to remain in this city for the summer and he will go to college this fall. He now weighs about 157 pounds, which is considerably more than he weighed when he enlisted and he has also grown some taller since he went into the service. He is, however, the same pleasing boy who has made him so extremely popular in this city and various other parts of the county.

"PEP" FASCE EXPECTS TO RETURN HOME SOON

According to the following article from the Pittsfield Eagle, "Pep" Fasce, the former Pittsfield high athlete, is now in Germany with the American army of occupation but he is expected to return home with a short time:

"Charles Fasce of this city, who was on the torpedoed transport Tuscania and who is attached to the mobile laboratory corps of the 32d Division, which is composed mainly of Michigan troops, writes under date of December 29 that he expects to be home before long. Unofficial reports circulated among the men of the 32d Division assert that the division may start for the United States late in January or early in February. It is not official, however. Today announcement was made regarding the returning of several divisions from overseas but the 32d was not included in the list. Neither is the 26th nor 82d Division, which includes many Pittsfield men.

On December 29 "Pep" Fasce was located at Neiwied, Germany. He was quartered in a gymnasium with a bed to sleep in and the building is steam heated. The men of the 32d Division have taken over the Hohenzollern theater in Neiwied and have renamed it Uncle Sam's theater and shows are presented regularly by the soldiers. Concerts are also given by the different regimental bands.

Around Christmas time Fasce was in Coblenz and was pleased with the city. There was plenty of life there but it was difficult to get along because not understanding the language. In his letter he says that because of the revolution in Berlin the people are glad to see the American troops for they regard them as a protection to the populace. The people treat the Americans well but everything is very militaristic. Even street car conductors show this attitude. They do not act like a people, who have gone down to defeat. "Pep" had not met any Pittsfield boys in a long time."

"PEP" FASCE HOME

Private Charles Fasce of Pittsfield who went into battle in France with the Michigan troops and arrived in Boston on the Toloa, after which he was transferred to Camp Devens, expects to be home today on a furlough. His mother, Mrs. Charles Fasce, went to Boston to meet him when the troops landed. Private Fasce, who is known in athletic circles and undoubtedly in military circles as "Pep" expects to get his discharge from the service soon. Private Fasce had the thrilling experience of being on the Tuscania, the troop ship which was sunk. He was formerly prominent as an athlete at Pittsfield high school.

This New England Colonial is the new home of Dr. and Mrs. Charles F. Fasce. It is located on Andover Street and was built by Contractor James J. Quirico.

An attractive New England Colonial just completed on Andover Street for Dr. and Mrs. Charles F. Fasce becomes today's Home of the Week. The six room home faces a park established when the tract was first opened several years ago. In back of the house there are two large white birches, which with the addition of landscaping, complete the picture.

Center Hall

The home, built by Contractor James J. Quirico is arranged under the center hall plan with the dining room on the south side and the large living room utilizing the entire north side. The latter room has a tapestry brick fireplace with Colonial mantel finished in white. The wall paper is light and in keeping with the white woodwork. Electric fixtures are used to advantage on either side of the mantel. Opening from the living room is a door leading to an open sitting porch.

The dining room, papered in cream and gray is equipped with an attractive electric fixture which, with the other fixtures, was furnished by Lord's. There are five indirect lights each adorned with prisms. French doors open from the hall into the living and dining rooms. The hall paper is of Colonial scenic design. At the end of the hall there is a clothes press and also a door leading to the kitchen.

Cabineted Kitchen

The entire south wall of the kitchen is taken up by cabinets, floor and wall. Over the porcelain sink there is a recessed semi-indirect light. The black composition working surface with chromium border completes the arrangement. The linoleum furnished and laid by Wiltsie is in tan, black and cream. At the west end there is a break-

fast alcove and in addition to the many cabinets a sizable pantry has been provided. The walls and ceiling are in ivory with a two inch China red strip at wainscot height. The home is heated by a General Electric oil burner installed by the Wagner Engineering Company.

The recessed bathtub is equipped with spray shower. Black linoleum with white grain is on the floor. Dr. Charles F. Fasce

Those who knew him said that Dr. Charles F. 'Pep' Fasce delivered just about every Italian newborn in the city -- especially in the Lakewood section -- during his 50 years as a medical practitioner here. He also served as city physician from 1932 to 1934 after a brief internship in Albany, N.Y.

A medical advocate of the poor, Fasce was said to be a "lousy bill collector," although it's become obvious that some of that was by design.

Born to Italian immigrants in Bethlehem, Pa., he moved to Pittsfield with his parents at an early age. For several years, his mother, Jennie Garbarino Fasce, served as a translator for other Italian immigrants in Pittsfield, helping them to gain solid footing in their new surroundings.

Fasce, who died in 1982 at the age of 84, had a testimonial dinner on his behalf in 1965, and longtime Lakewood neighbor Judge Francis Quirico was the main speaker on that occasion.

Said Quirico: " The record of his first year showed that being city physician was not merely a title. He ministered to the poor and made more than 15,000 calls to homes, hospitals and his office, including about 50 to what people called then 'the poor farm.' "

A 39-year-old secret was revealed last night as friends from varied interest groups paid eloquent and enthusiastic tribute to Dr. Charles F. (Pep) Fasce, a man of many careers. Eight hundred-thirty attended the testimonial dinner in the Boys' Club gymnasium.

Dr. Fasce, 66, in acknowledging his gratitude to persons who had exerted an influence for good on his life, disclosed that Msgr. Eugene F. Marshall, D.D. helped to finance his medical education.

"He swore me to secrecy in 1925, but I think it can be told now," Dr. Fasce said. "I want to thank him from the bottom of my heart."

'Fired' Into Medicine

Msgr. Marshall, pastor of St. Mary's Church now but principal of St. Joseph's High when Dr. Fasce was a young coach there, earlier had said that he "fired" the doctor and ordered him to go to medical school.

Dr. Fasce said the priest provided enough money for his educational bills "without asking for interest or security." He said he didn't have to borrow as heavily as he had expected, because he earned money as a sports official while attending Albany Medical College. Msgr. Marshall said, "Pep paid back every cent."

Standing almost knee-deep in scrolls, citations and plaques, Dr. Fasce announced at the end of his speech of thanks that he would split his purse between the Boys' Club and St. Luke's Hospital. He earmarked the money for a dispensary at the Boys' Club and a respirator for the operating room at St. Luke's.

He returned a check that had been presented to him by the Monday Morning Quarterback's Club to the club, requesting that the money be used for the Pop Warner Football League.

'Most Momentous Moment'

"For me to say that this is the most momentous moment of my life is putting it very mildly," Dr. Fasce said. "I find it hard to find words to express adequately how I feel."

Noting that doctors, as they grow older, sometimes become cynical, Dr. Fasce declared, "If there ever has been any cynicism in me, you people here tonight have obliterated or annihilated it."

John T. Carmody, retired Pittsfield High Coach, who has had both of his legs amputated in the last year and a half, attended in a wheel chair. He coached against Dr. Fasce in the middle 1920s.

Msgr. Marshall, noting that he had attended high school and Holy Cross College with Carmody, observed, "Jack's presence here tonight is about the greatest tribute that could be paid to Pep."

Superior Court Judge Francis J. Quirico, who was toastmaster, said that Dr. Fasce's friends decided to show him, "while he is here to see it," how much he is appreciated for what he has done for the community.

He later stressed that the dinner didn't mean that Dr. Fasce is about to retire.

Mayor Speaks

Mayor Robert B. Dillon said that the greatest tribute paid to the doctor "is this outpouring of citizens." He said that "if you haven't been a patient of Pep Fasce, I seriously doubt whether you live in Pittsfield."

The mayor continued by submitting that the city should give a gold Cadillac to Dr. Fasce, but said he was afraid "the council wouldn't approve it."

Bill Summers of Upton, retired American League umpire and a colleague of Dr. Fasce on

the officiating staff of the old Eastern League in the late 1920s, said, "When he left, the Eastern League missed him."

Dr. Harold J. Hookway of Belmont, who was a companion of the doctor at Boston Red Sox spring training in Sarasota, Fla., for many years, said, "The place is pretty dead without him."

Msgr. Marshall called Dr. Fasce, "one in a million, a man of character, a man of ability, but above all a true and loyal friend."

Lauded by Farrell

Clement M. Farrell, general chairman of the dinner committee, said Dr. Fasce "epitomizes" the phrase of the late President John F. Kennedy regarding service to country. Farrell said that when he was ill Dr. Fasce provided the greatest medicine: his zeal and interest in athletics.

Farrell made the final presentation, a purse from all present and also a portrait of Dr. Fasce.

Dr. Fasce thanked his wife "for driving my automobile late at night when I was too tired to do it" as he made his rounds as city physician during the depression years of the early 1930s. He also thanked the several groups of nuns who attended and his fellow doctors for helping him.

Dr. Thomas M. Norton, representing the board of directors of St. Luke's Hospital, the staff of the hospital, and the Berkshire Medical Society, addressed the group as "members of the Pep Club." He made presentations to the honored guest in behalf of all three groups.

Luke's Nurses' Alumnae Association, Miss Marguerite M. Tristany; the St. Luke's Student Nurses' Association, Miss Roseann Vielkind; the personnel of St. Luke's, Thomas Duane; the American Legion, Joseph Kasuba; two Sons of Italy lodges, Guy A. Pellegrinelli Jr., and Charles H. Perenick; the Monday Morning Quarterbacks' Club, Francis M. Callanan; and the Berkshire Pharmaceutical Association, Giro R. Samale.

Quirico added that the pay for the job was \$1,500 annually, and from that stipend, expenses for office and automobile were taken out.

Fasce already was well known in the city before his medical career. He played on the 1915-16 Pittsfield High basketball team that still is considered among the school's best. As late as the 1950s, former Eagle sports editor John Flynn called the team "the best ever" at PHS.

The other four starters were Dan Martin, John Linnehan, Mickey Marvin and Sol Goldstein.

Fasce attended Catholic University and Syracuse, and paid for much of his college education by refereeing professional basketball games and umpiring Eastern League baseball games.

Fasce later coached the St. Joseph's basketball team to two Berkshire County titles.

He served in the Army during World War I. En route to Europe, his troop ship -- the SS Tuscania -- was torpedoed off the Irish coast. He was on a raft for five hours before being plucked from the dangerous seas by a British destroyer. About 250 of the 1,700 soldiers on board died in that attack.

The nickname "Pep" was the result of his frenetic pace during his teenage years. The Fasce biography indicates that little changed in the subsequent decades.

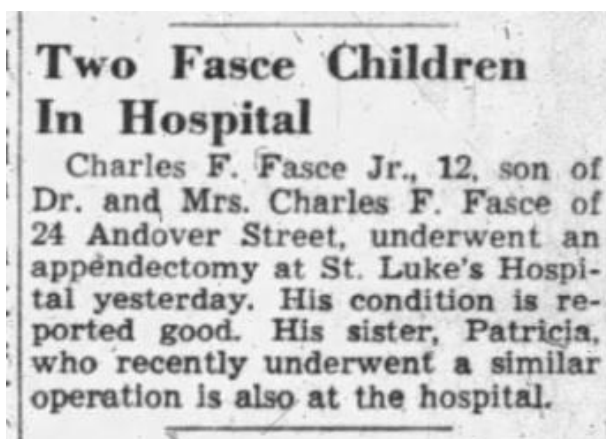

BCC promotes 3 women to full professorships

Berkshire Community College has promoted three associate professors, all women, to full professorships, effective Sept. 1. It is the first time in the college's 24 years that three women have been promoted to full professorships at the same time.

The college's president, Jonathan M. Daube, said last night the promotions have "absolutely nothing to do" with a sex-discrimination grievance filed by them and five other women associate professors last June and now awaiting hearing by an arbitrator. The hearing is scheduled for August.

The promotions should not be viewed as surprises, Daube said. The three women affected were "next in line," he said, after last

spring's promotion of two other associate professors, John P. Lambert Jr. and Arnold J. Pisani, to full professorships.

The three, whose promotions were announced Tuesday at a faculty meeting on campus, are Karen Canfield Border, who will be professor of history and anthropology; Mary Patricia Fasce, who will be professor of nursing; and Anne Everest Wojtkowski, who will be professor of engineering and mathematics.

They and their five colleagues who filed the sex-discrimination grievance contend that the college has historically favored males in promotions from associate to full professor rank and also contend that the few women who have risen to full professorship have been discriminated against in terms of pay.

At the moment, 21 of the 23 full professors at the college are male, and the two females who are already full professors, Joan M. Delory and Amy G. West, are on the low rungs of the professorial pay ladder, the grievance asserts.

The promotions, approved by the college board of trustees last week, were among eight in all and included elevation of three assistant professors to the rank of associate professor. The latter are Theodore W. Johnson, who teaches engineering technology; Sara J. Kataoka, speech; and Janet R. Kroboth, business.

Others promoted were counselor Susan Acciani from a Level 1 to a

Level 2 position, and Benigna Chilla, an instructor in fine arts to the position of assistant professor.

Mrs. Border, who joined the BCC faculty in the fall of 1971, has a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Massachusetts and a master of arts from Harvard University. She and her husband, Associate Professor James D. Border,

received a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities in 1981 to complete a documentary film on archaeological evidence for pre-Christian settlements in North America by European voyagers.

Miss Fasce, daughter of the late Dr. Charles F. "Pep" Fasce, has a bachelor of science degree in nursing from Boston College, a master's in nursing from Russell Sage College and a certificate as a family

State anti-discrimination agency planning to examine BCC case

The charge of sex discrimination in professorial promotions at Berkshire Community College will be reviewed by the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination before it is subject to a separate arbitrator's hearing, complainants say.

The arbitrator's hearing was originally scheduled for tomorrow in Boston but has been postponed at the request of the Massachusetts Teachers Association, the union representing complainants in the case.

The postponement, said one of the complainants, Anne Everest Wojtkowski, will not be a barrier to rescheduling the hearing later.

At the MCAD office in Boston, a staff attorney, Eugenia Guastaferrri, said neither she nor anyone else could guess when the MCAD review will be complete. It depends, she said, on receipt of information that bears on the issue.

The information, she said, is being sought from the Board of Regents of Higher Education.

The case is one dating back to June 9, 1983, when eight women associate professors at BCC filed a grievance with President Jonathan M. Daube charging that sex discrimination was evident over a number of years at BCC in promotions of women to full professor, the top academic rank.

At the time, there were 23 full professors in the BCC teaching staff and 21 of them were men.

Further, the complainants asserted, the two women professors were on the lower rungs of the professorial pay scale, a further sign of discrimination.

Grievance rejected

The grievance was subsequently rejected by Daube and then by state Chancellor of Higher Education John B. Duff, paving the way to arbitration, the final step in the grievance process.

While the MTA was preparing its request for arbitration last October, the grievants filed a complaint with the MCAD, whose review is sepa-

rate from the arbitration proceeding.

Although eight women filed the grievance, only seven are signatory to the MCAD filing. That is because one of the eight, Nancy B. Delaiti, associate professor of fine arts, retired last year.

The other seven, besides Mrs. Wojtkowski, are Karen C. Border, Mary Patricia Fasce, Bernice T. Morehead, Barbara A. Nichols, Helen C. Plunkett and Beatrice Selig.

Last April, Daube promoted three of them, Mrs. Border, Miss Fasce and Mrs. Wojtkowski to full professor, but said at the time the promotions had "absolutely nothing to do" with the discrimination complaint. Nevertheless, it was the first time in the college's 24-year history that three women had been promoted to full professorships at the same time.

The previous year, when two full professorships were open, Daube promoted two men, associate professors John P. Lambert and Arnold J. Pisani, to fill them. Daube said

those two promotions were made on the basis of performance, which he says is clearly stressed in the faculty contract, and that this year's promotions were made on the same basis.

While the women complainants say they agree promotions should be performance-based, they argue that in some cases "demonstrably inferior" males have been promoted over women, thus supporting the discrimination charge. They also argue that the faculty contract is designed to guard against discrimination through reference to affirmative action and equal-opportunity principles.

The case is believed to be the first of its kind in the commonwealth's community-college system.

Williamstown's first woman Marine, Mrs. Anita MacIvergan Fasce, daughter of Mrs. Irene M. Hickox of 9 Belden street, will leave soon to start duty in the U. S. Marine corps July 25.

Sworn into the Women's Reserve of the Marines May 6, she has received call to active duty to report to Camp Lejeune, New River, N. C. She was formerly employed as the only woman truck driver at the Navy building of the General Electric company in Pittsfield. She is the first local Marine recruit.

She would have been exactly the twentieth Williamstown girl to enter military service, except for the resignation from the WAVES of former Ensign Jane Newhall, now in London, England, with her husband, Arthur P. Lyon, who is in British military service, and the former Navy nurse, Ensign June Jones, who has joined her husband, Ensign D. J. Carruth at his naval station.

First Local Woman To Join Marines Dies at Age of 40

Miss Anita MacIvergan, 40, the first woman from Williamstown to enlist in the U. S. Marine corps in World War 2, died Friday evening at the Rutland Veterans' hospital, Rutland Heights. She has been in failing health for the past eight years and a patient at the Rutland hospital for the past three years.

Miss MacIvergan was born in Keene, N. H., the daughter of Mrs. Irene Hickox, now of Cheshire, and the late Patrick MacIvergan. She came to Williamstown to make her home as a small child and was a graduate of the Williamstown high school.

She enlisted in the marines on July 12, 1944 and was the 19th woman from Williamstown to enter the armed forces. She received her boot training at Camp Lejeune, N. C., and was then transferred to Quantico, Va. After further training she was assigned to the marine base at San Francisco, Calif., where she remained until separated from the service in 1946.

She then returned to Williamstown. In spite of failing health Miss MacIvergan for some time served as secretary of the Williamstown post, American Legion, and also assisted in writing the history of Williamstown which was published in connection with the 200th anniversary of the town.

She is survived by her mother, a brother, James MacIvergan of Bristol, Conn., and a half sister, Mrs. Joseph W. Fitzpatrick of Tom's River, N. J.

Funeral arrangements have not as yet been decided, but the funeral services are to be held at Rutland, following which the body will be taken to Beverly, N. J., for burial in the National cemetery.

Hibbard in district court today sentenced Nicholas Barbera of 16 Spencer street and Anthony Fasce of East street to two years in the house of correction after they had been found guilty of larceny of a \$150 slot machine from C. Archie Burbank's Meadow View inn at Coltsville. Sentences were suspended and the pair were placed on probation for two years.

Fasce was ordered to remain home nights and stay away from Barbera. They were arrested yesterday by Officers Thomas Hall and William P. McCormick of the detective bureau. The police say the machine was removed from the inn by daylight the 9th while a Negro employe at the inn looked on.

Two persons, Anthony Fasce, 29, of East Street and Hazel Provost, 22, of 87 First Street were injured shortly after midnight last night when struck by an automobile as they were crossing North Street near the Boston & Albany railroad bridge.

Fasce sustained a compound fracture of the left leg and an injury to the back of the head and Miss Provost suffered lacerations on the legs and back. Both were removed to St. Luke's Hospital.

The operator of the car was Joseph D. Gahm, state police officer assigned to the Pittsfield Barracks, who was driving his own machine.

Mr. Gahm was traveling southerly and when he was 47 feet north of the crosswalk the pedestrians, walking from east to west were knocked down by the right side of the right fender. The injured were taken to the hospital in the police ambulance. The accident was investigated by Sgt. Richard B. Rock.
