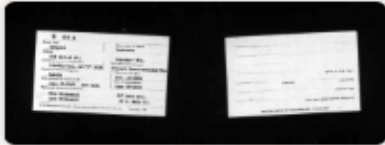

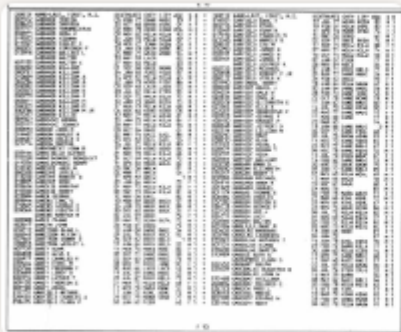

VALE'S MEN LAST OUT OF FRANCE

**107th Supply Train Official-
ly Announced to Arrive
on Virginian on Next
Monday Morning.**

ALL SAW HEROIC SERVICE

**Formal Orders of the War Department
Announces This as the Last Unit to
Sail for the State—Milwaukee
Planning Grand Review.**

The one hundredth and seventh supply train, which has seen wonderful service over in France under the command of Captain Asbury Vale of Kenosha and which contains some sixty Kenosha men did not return on the Louisiana on Tuesday and a new order of the War Department states that this unit of the 32nd Division has sailed from Brest aboard the battleship Virginia and it is due to arrive at Newport News on the morning of next Monday May 19th. As the transports with returning troops have been coming into ports in this country about a day ahead it is pretty probable that the word from these boys will begin to reach Kenosha about next Sunday at noon. The 107th will be on the last steamer

bearing members of the 32nd Division from France home. It is probable that the men will be sent to Camp Upton to await order to move West to Camp Grant. It is not known who will be in command of the train since Captain Vale has been ordered back to Coblenz. The last roster of the Kenosha men in the 107th Supply Train showed the following:

Fred Scholey was a member of the
First Sanitary Squadron which is sched-
uled to come home at the same time
as the Supply Train.

These names as given were the Kenosha men with the 107th when they sailed on the ill fated Tuscania. One other man was listed. He was Corporal Arthur Junker who lost his life on the Tuscania and who is now sleeping some where over on the Irish Coast. Some of these men may have been transferred to other units in the army and many of them may have won the chevrons of non-commissioned officers.

The One Hundred and Seventh Supply train is one of the Kenosha units which saw much action on several of the battle fronts. The boys were in action at many of the hardest fought engagements with the Germans and bore their part with honor. No group of men from Kenosha in the army saw as much service as these members of the 107th Supply train.

It is probable that following their arrival in New York they will be sent to Camp Grant for demobilization.

Milwaukee is making great preparation for a parade of the 32nd Division but the date for the big state review is not to be set until after the arrival of the 107th the last of the units of the Division to reach the country from France.

BELDEN EMPHASIZES DUTY OF OBEDIENCE

Judge Urges Newly Made Citizens to Observe
Laws of the Government to Which
They Pledge Undying Loyalty.

RANDALL FAVORS VOTES FOR WOMEN

In Speech to Sixty-Two Kenoshans Receiving Final Papers, Congressman Lauds Constitution
and 19th Amendment.

Welcomed into the fraternity, equality, and brotherhood, which is the deeper Americanism, by Judge E. B. Belden of Racine and Congressman C. E. Randall of Kenosha, sixty-two Kenoshans became citizens of the United States at the citizenship graduation exercises held in the High school assembly room Friday evening.

"We celebrate these rites," Judge Belden said to the newly made Americans, "because this is an important occasion. Tonight you men are renouncing your allegiance to your mother countries to promise loyalty to the United States of America. You are assuming here the duties of a new citizenship which carries not only rights but duties. We cannot emphasize too strongly the duties of that citizenship. Foremost among them is obedience to law. You may not approve of that law but you have sworn to abide by the statutes of the United States and whenever any measure becomes law that it is your duty to obey it. Law enforcement and law observance are evidences of political culture. Wherever it is found inequalities and injustice vanish. The accomplishment of this end will make America the thing that Lincoln said it was, a government of the people, by the people, and for the people, not any one class but the whole people and each individual in the whole."

Equally impressive were Congressman Randall's remarks on the federal constitution and its significance for citizens.

Randall Praises Nation Builders.

"We celebrated Monday," he said, "the 144th anniversary of our national birthday. One hundred and forty-four years from the Fourth of July, 1920, the Declaration of Independence was signed by men who had been taxed without representation, forced to quarter an abusive soldiery, and compelled to ship their products in English ships to English ports. That declaration renounced kings, queens, and aristocracy in the United States but it did not establish a government. The colonies were still colonies. There was no nation."

"In May, 1777, the constitutional convention was convened. It consisted of fifty-four men. Of those fifty-four men, twenty-nine were college or university graduates. They put away all their fine theories and produced a practical instrument of representative government, the federal constitution.

"That is the document to which you are swearing allegiance tonight. Under it a republican government has been maintained in the United States for 131 years. In that time only eighteen changes have been made in that constitution. Another is in prospect. It should be completed as soon as possible. I refer to the nineteenth amendment, the Susan B. Anthony measure, which will enfranchise women in the United States. It will help to fulfill the dream of the nation builders, a real democracy."

Citizens Receive Diplomas.

Congressman Randall's speech followed the presentation of diplomas to graduates from the night school course in American citizenship conducted by Prof. E. F. Randall, Prof. Lewis W. Powell, and their assistants. Thereafter the students and others receiving citizenship papers took the oath of allegiance impressively administered by B. M. DeDiemar, clerk of the circuit court. Judge Belden's address followed the presentation of certificates of naturalization by Mr. DeDiemar.

Music Is Inspiring.

Preceding the program of oratory for the evening, rousing marches were rousing played by the Nash Band. The selections were well chosen and played with a verve appropriate to a patriotic occasion.

Thereafter Edward A. Moe, representing the graduating class, explained "what being an American citizen meant to him." Mr. Moe emphasized the participation in political affairs made possible by naturalization papers and described the thrill which comes to a foreigner as he realizes that he has ceased to be an outsider and has become a part of the great machinery which is the United States government. His remarks were pertinent, pointed, and convincing.

His speech was followed by one of the most pleasing numbers on the program, a solo rendition of "The Star-Spangled Banner," by Mrs. Edna Starr. The national anthem, so rarely well interpreted, became under the magic of Mrs. Starr's voice a thing of beauty

and compelling power. Miss Minnie Larson's chime-like chromatics on the piano furnished a rich contralto accompaniment for Mrs. Starr's superb soprano.

Also pleasing were the more classical numbers played by the Nash Band as interludes for the oratory.

Belden Urges Newspaper Reading.

In summing up ways and means of cultivating Americanism, Judge Belden urged the new citizens to keep in constant touch with current events and American atmosphere by reading English newspapers daily.

"Learn to speak and read English," he advised, "not brokenly, but well. Hereafter, as before, I will adhere

strictly to my policy of granting no certificates of citizenship to men who apply for them through the aid of an interpreter. To think Americanism one must speak Americanism. This can be mastered only by daily reading and daily practice."

Both Judge Belden and Congressman Randall pointed out the need for a loyal support of the government in these more modern times when the constitution is everywhere the subject of attack by libertines and anarchists.

D. A. R. Presents Mementos.

Perhaps the most picturesque feature of the celebration was the presentation of mementos to the new citizens by the Kenosha chapter of the D. A. R. This was done by Judge Belden, assisted by the little Misses Louise and Frances Holm, Mary and Dorothea Hannahs. The latter were dressed a la Martha Washington in dresses of flowered satin set off by powdered wigs coiffed with black velvet, rhinestones and roses. Smilingly they presented the new Americans with silk-corded cards bearing their names and the American's Creed.

The rites concluded with a salute to the Stars and Stripes and an ensemble rendition of "America" led by Mrs. Starr and Miss Larson.

Written from Saarbrücken, Germany, the latter gives an insight into German political affairs. It says in part:

"Here in Germany our circumstances are becoming worse from day to day. Politically, we are threatened on the one side by French imperialism, from another by Russian bolshevism.

Will Fight for Liberty

"The inner political situation regarding the frenzied payment of tribute to former enemy powers is such that in consequence we are stripped to a degree that threatens to knock down our economic stability. We have now over 5,000,000 unemployed and still more factories are being closed and workers laid off.

"That under these circumstances still further reparations be paid is impossible. The Versailles treaty must be annulled, otherwise there will be no peace in Europe. We Germans, and especially we former front line soldiers, do not further desire to live in servitude, and we will hazard everything to bring about again the freedom of our people."

Tuscania Vets Pick Kenosha for 1940 Meet

National Tuscania Survivors Assn. to Stage Reunion Here Feb. 3-5

Kenosha will be host to the 1940 convention of the National Tuscania Survivors association Feb. 3-5, it was announced here today by Frank Tanking, newly-elected president of the association.

The Kenosha bid for the 22nd annual convention was presented at the executive board meeting in Milwaukee and was accepted. Ray Stephenson, also of Kenosha, is the association secretary.

Dr. Fred Vater, Milwaukee, is chairman of the executive board.

The association stages its annual reunion on the anniversary of the sinking of the Allied transport Tuscania with a loss of 226 American soldiers. The ship carried a large consignment of Wisconsin troops, and there were 350 Wisconsin survivors of the war-time naval tragedy. There were 31 Kenosha soldiers on board the ship who survived.

Convention Here in 1934

Kenosha was last host to the national convention in 1934, and the 1939 meeting was held at Minneapolis. In Kenosha the reunion brought together survivors of the sinking who joined in the hand of friendship extended to sailors of the German navy who were their enemies during the war.

It was at the time of the convention in Chicago in 1933 when efforts were made to bring the commander of the German U-boat which sank the Tuscania to America for the convention. He is Capt. Wilhelm Meyer. His failing health, however, prevented the trip.

Leo V. Zimmermann, Milwaukee, who is national historian of the association and who is also credited with being its founder, will assist the Kenosha officers in extending the invitations for the convention and reunion, and the Kenosha Chamber of Commerce will also cooperate.

Kenosha Survivors

The National Tuscania Survivors association was organized in 1926 in Milwaukee, and the 1,954 survivors of the sinking were listed as charter members. Today this number has been reduced considerably, but there are still several hundred members of the association who turn out for the reunion annually.

NEWBOLD MAN SAYS ELECTION CHARGE FALSE

**Lorenz Garglas Denies Soli-
citing Votes in Polling
Place April 2.**

Lorenz Garglas, town of Newbold farmer, pleaded not guilty today in county court to a charge of "solicit-
ing votes and engaging in election-
eering within 100 feet of a polling
place" Tuesday—spring election day.
It was the first case of its kind in

The complaint against Garglas

NEWBOLD MAN NOT GUILTY IN ELECTION CASE

**Lorenz Garglas Acquitted of
Vote Soliciting Charge by
Judge Steele.**

Lorenz Garglas, a town of Newbold farmer, was acquitted today in county court on a charge of soliciting votes and electioneering within 100 feet of a polling place on election day.

The verdict was handed down by Judge H. F. Steele, who explained he was not satisfied "beyond all reasonable doubt" that Garglas had engaged in electioneering at the Newbold polls April 2, when the annual spring election was held. "I don't think I could say, without qualification, that the defendant violated the law," the court stated, "and so I must dismiss the charge against him."

Four state witnesses—Mrs. Mary Luck, who signed the complaint against Garglas; Mrs. Lena Hanson, Mrs. Emil Welk and John Armfield—testified Garglas asked them to vote for "little Marty" (Martin Warekois) when they entered the polls to cast their ballots. Garglas, they explained, was a member of the election board and acted as gate tender in the town hall election day.

Courtroom Filled.

(Warekois defeated Ernest Junggen for the post of assessor in the town of Newbold by a substantial plurality.)

Defense witnesses, who said they

did not hear Garglas make any statements which might be construed as electioneering, included: Malcolm Wendt, Ray Reader, Mr. and Mrs. William H. Deranleau, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Pavlik, Fred Vonloh, William Rapley, Sr., and William Rapley, Jr. The defendant also testified he had not engaged in any electioneering activities at the polls, denying he had talked to any of the state witnesses on election day.

The county courtroom was filled to capacity with interested spectators from the town of Newbold. Atty. Orville A. DuBois represented the defendant, while Dist. Atty. George A. Richards appeared for the state.

Mark 30th Year For Company M

Thirty years ago this morning, Company M, Fourth Wisconsin Infantry, marched through Kenosha to the railway station and embarked on a trip from which many never returned.

Company M was the first infantry unit to be furnished by Kenosha during the war, although a cavalry troop, later converted to an artillery battery under Capt. John S. Coney, had left previously. The company was recruited personally by its company commander, Captain Ed Dayton, after other recruiters had given up the attempt as impossible.

The company trained at Camp Douglas, Wisconsin, Camp MacArthur, Texas, and Camp Merritt, New Jersey, before beginning its eighteen months of combat service at the front in France. In addition to Capt. Dayton, it was staffed by Lieutenants Asbury H. Vale and Francis A. Singer.

Part of the company sailed to Europe on the liner Tuscania which was torpedoed and sunk en route. Cpl. Arthur Junker was lost in this action, one of Kenosha's first casualties.

Tuscania Survivors Mark Anniversary of Tragedy



S. S. Tuscania

It was Feb. 5, 1918, and the spreading cloak of dusk fell over the North Channel, just off the coast of Ireland. Suddenly, the telltale, unswerving trail of a torpedo slashed through the quiet swells, headed for the Allied troop transport, S.S. Tuscania, carrying 2,300 soldiers, part of the 32nd Red Arrow division. A tremendous explosion rocked the transport as the deadly missile struck its target.

Two hundred and twenty-six Americans lost their lives in the sinking, among them a Kenoshan, Arthur Junker, for whom the VFW Junker-Ball Post 1865 is named in perpetual memoriam. In 1926, the 1,954 survivors of the torpedoing organized the National Tuscania Survivors association in Milwaukee and became charter members, including 31 Kenosha men.

Annual reunions were staged and tributes paid their missing comrades by the men who survived the tragic sinking of the converted White Star liner during the first world war.

Charles Knaup, 3708 19th Ave., one of the men who escaped death, was three decks below when the German underseas raider, the U-77, fired the deadly torpedo into the Tuscania's side. He recalled how he ran to the top deck after the explosion, only to discover all the lifeboats in his section had been smashed. The Tuscania remained afloat for two hours, giving those who survived the blast time to get free of the ship. Knaup was picked up by one of the British destroyers which had been guarding the convoy. At the time he was rescued, the Kenoshan had only the clothing he was wearing and a lifebelt.

Another Kenosha survivor, Fred Scholey, 7120 20th Ave. also re-

calls the tragedy. He too, was three decks below when the Hun raider torpedoed the transport.

A number of the victims were interred on Scotch and Irish soil. The rescued soldiers were taken to Eire by the British ships which searched in vain for the enemy submersible.

Year after year, the former members of the 32nd division held their annual reunions, meetings filled with drama of never-to-be forgotten scenes. In 1939, the group decided to invite the German u-boat commander to their reunion, and through the efforts of Leo V. Zimmerman, historian and founder of the association, the u-boat commander's identity was revealed. The German admiralty for many years refused to divulge the name of the submarine or the skipper, fearing reprisals.

However, the British naval authorities handed over the name of the sub and the French secret service assisted in uncovering the commander's name, a Dr. Wilhelm Meyer, of Saarbrücken, Germany. Officers of the Tuscania Survivors association wrote in their invitation to their former foe. "We have invited our former enemy in the spirit of good sportsmanship and international friendship. It is the duty of the victor to take the lead in erasing war hatreds and healing war wounds." Although the German ambassador, Dr. Frederick von Prittwitz und Gaffron, of Washington, and Dr. H. F. Simon, German consul in Chicago, forwarded the invitation and cooperated, Meyer was unable to attend the reunion, although he had tearfully accepted the invitation. Transportation had already been arranged by the North German Lloyd steamship line, but Meyer

failed to show up, unable to, according to reports, because of ill health. According to several Kenosha members, Meyers, the commander of the U-77, was back in the German naval service during WORLD WAR II, serving as head of a Nazi u-boat outfit.

Kenosha was host to the association reunion in 1940. Fred Tanking of Kenosha was president of the group at that time and Roy Stephenson, also of Kenosha, was secretary of the association. The Kenosha Chamber of Commerce assisted at an earlier session held in 1934. Reunions now, Scholey pointed out, are more or less localized, with members coming from nearby areas and states.

Today, the remaining members of the Red Arrow division will meet at their headquarters in Milwaukee, 31 years to the day, marking the tragic anniversary of the sinking of the Tuscania. Three former Kenosha men, also survivors of the torpedoing, now living in surrounding communities, will join the 23 Kenoshans to attend the vent.

"Kenosha News" 24 Oct 1917 p 5 (story begins on p 1) – Pvt. Lawrence Garglas is one of the men at Waco TX under the command of Asbury Vale. Many belonged to the old Co. M.

"Kenosha (WI) News" 8 Feb 1918 p 1 – Pvt. Lawrence Garglas of Truck Co. No. 2, 107th Supply Train was 1 of those aboard Tuscania.

"Kenosha News" 9 Feb 1918 p 1 – reported save as of 3 p.m. today: Pvt. Lawrence Garglas.

"Kenosha News" Wednesday, 14 May 1919 p 2 – "Vale's Men Last Out of France" – the 107th Supply Train is scheduled to arrive aboard the "Virginian" next Monday [19 May 1919]. They were under the command of Captain Asbury Vale. The men will be on the last steamer bringing the 32nd Division home. One of those men is Pvt. Lawrence Garglas.

Post-war:

Naturalized as citizen on 28 Jun 1920 in Kenosha Co. WI Circuit Court – Lawrence Garglas, b. 10 Nov 1884 Stulgis (spelling?), Russia. Arrived in the US on 10 Jun 1905 in NYC from Rotterdam, the Netherlands aboard the ship "Rotterdam" on 1 Jun 1905. Current address: 614 Market St., Kenosha WI, Occupation: laborer. Certificate 1249731.

His application for citizenship cited the law that made those who had been in military service to become citizens:

"Filed under Subdv 7 Sec 4 Art of June 29, 1906 as amended May 9, 1918. Enl [enlisted] August 3, 17 dis [discharged] May 29, 19. Serial No. 251045. Pvt 1st Class Co. B 107 Supply Train. A resident since 10 Jun 1905 in the US and since 1 May 1907 in Wisconsin.

“Kenosha News” 6 Apr 1921 p 9 – Kenosha ex-servicemen who have been waiting for the return of their discharge papers from Washington DC can now pick them up at the Kenosha County Red Cross office. Among the papers: those for Lawrence Garglas.

“Kenosha News” 19 Apr 1921 p 3 – The Kenosha County Red Cross announced this morning that Victory Medals have been received for county soldiers, among them Lawrence Garglas.

“Kenosha News” 14 Jan 1932 p 3 – Many of the 31 members of the National Tuscania Survivors Association plan to attend the annual meeting on 5 Feb 1932 in Milwaukee. One of the members is Lawrence Garglas.

“Rhinelander (WI) Daily News” 7 Jul 1937 p 6 – want ad: For Sale: Young pigs, 12 weeks old. Lawrence Garglas, McNaughton.

“Kenosha News” 5 Jul 1939 p 1 – Lawrence Garglas was an NTSA member when the last reunion was held in Kenosha (1934).
