HARDWOOD MEN IN MEETING.

Edward A. Hamar Heads Northern Hemlock Association.

Milwaukee, Wis., Jan. 29.—Edward A. Hamar was reelected president of the Northern Hemlock and Hardwood Manufacturers' association at its fourth annual meeting yesterday in the Hotel Pfister.

Shipments of hardwoods and hemlock in Wisconsin during the last year gained more than 200,000,000 feet. The total increase in shipments amounted to twenty-eight per cent, the increase in hemlock shipments was thirty per cent, and that of hardwoods twenty-three per cent. Reports also showed that the cut of timber is decreasing each year. The decrease in hemlock cut was eight per cent and that of hardwoods ten per cent.

"The market conditions are much better than last year," said Secretary R. S. Kellogg. "There is a demand for lumber."

Other officers, who were reelected, are: Vice president, R. B. Goodman; secretary, R. S. Kellogg; treasurer, George E. Foster; auditor, E. J. Gilluly.

Two changes were made in the board of directors. A. R. Weeks and J. J. Lingle were named to succeed George H. Atwood and George Chapman, respectively. Other members of the board are: W. C. Landon, A. C. Wells, and the president, vice president and treasurer, ex-officio.

Committees on grades and information who have been elected are: M. J. Quinlan, chairman; M. J. Fox, C. A. Goodman, G. A. Harder, J. T. Phillips, A. R. Owen, J. J. Ott, W. H. McDonald and R. G. Hall.

Members of the other committees will be appointed by President Hamar.

Lumber Shipments Increase.

Wisconsin shipments of hardwoods and hemlock gained more than 200,000,000 feet during the year just ended.

This fact and others fully as encouraging for the industry in this state were disclosed at the fourth annual meeting of the North Hemlock and Hardwood Manufacturers' association in Milwaukee.

The total increase in shipments amounted to 28 per cent. The increase in hemlock shipments was 30 per cent. and that of hardwoods, 23 per cent.

At the same time it is shown that the cut of timber is growing less each year. The decrease in the hemlock cut this year is eight per cent. and that of hardwoods, ten per cent.

The total hemlock, sold and unsold, held by sixty members of the association on January 1, was 195,490,000. The same figures for hardwood is 79,060,000. These figures show a decrease of stock on hand for hemlock of 35 per cent. and for hardwoods, 34 per cent.

In his address, President Edward A. Hamar sounded an optimistic note. He assured the members that the year had been one that should encourage them to greater efforts this year.

"It costs money to carry on a broad and comprehensive work of this kind," he remarked. "You, however, have no better investment at this time on your books."

The association is at this time interested in a new grading of hemlock. In reference to this Mr. Hamar said:

"The grading committee will, I believe, at this meeting recommend a new set of rules for the grading of hemlock. These rules have been drawn after a careful study of our needs, and by actual demonstration.

"The present rules are obsolete and need revising. This committee has also devoted some time to the consideration of hardwood grades."

President Hamar is certainly in favor of a forest products exposition.

"Some time ago by resolution we indorsed a plan and offered our support to a forest products exposition," he said. "A number of our members subscribed to a fund to get this started. It seems poor business policy for lumber manufacturers to let the cement, brick and patent roofing men hold their exhibits when forest products can be advertised by the same method with lasting results."

Reports of the railroad, legislative and advertising committees were read. The election of officers was scheduled to take place.

The present officers are:

President, Edward A. Hamar; vice-president, R. B. Goodman; secretary, R. S. Kellog; treasurer, George E. Foster; auditor, E. J. Gillouly.

ANNUAL MEETING.

The Northern Hemlock and Hardwood Manufacturers' association held its fifth annual meeting at the Hotel Pfister, Milwaukee, on Tuesday. All reported everything in a flourishing condition and that its members will be able to face the coming season with confidence, and that the returns of the last year as a whole have been satisfactory as compared with some of the other manufactories, was declared in the several reports submitted.

"Just now the railroads are struggling to get an advance in freight rates," said President E. A. Hamar of Chassell, Mich. "I believe this advance is to be 5 per cent, although we hear rumors that in certain instances they have discriminated against some commodities to the extent of 5 and even 10 per cent. I believe we should take a broad view of this subject and stand for an increase.

Secretary R. S. Kellogg of Wausau, Wis., pointed out that the period of depression is rapidly passing, and that the lumber industry has no cause to fear.

MISSIONAIRES IN NORTH WOODS

Religion In Logging Camps
Now Deemed a
Necessity

HOLD ANNUAL ELECTION

R. B. Goodman Again Chosen
President and J. T. Phillips
Is Made Second Officer

Milwaukee, Jan. 28.—Missionaries may regularly visit camps in northern Wisconsin and northern Michigan following the discussion of the subject by Matt Daly of Duluth, Minn., who addressed the Northern Hemlock and Hardwood Manufacturers' association at the Wednesday session of the convention at the Hotel Pfister.

The speaker, who has been doing missionary work in the camps, pronounced the plan a success as far as he has tried it.

Should Study Needs.

A committee, headed by W. A. Holt of Oconto, was appointed to provide some definite plan for missionary work.

"Manufacturing Lumber to Fit the Needs of Consuming Factories," was the topic of an address by W. W. Brown of Two Rivers, Wis. He said the manufacturers should study the needs of the consumer more closely, and that the consumer should apprise the manufacturer more closely of his needs.

Enos Colburn, Green Bay, spoke on "Manufacturing Birch for Inner Finish." "Timber Utilization" was the topic of the address by O. T. Swan, Washington, D. C., who advocated the passage of "pure wood" laws which would compel the producer to brand the woods according to grade. R. S. Kellogg read a paper by C. H. Worcester, Chicago, on lumber transportation. Edward Hiner, Chicago, spoke on the purchasing of the products by the larger mills of the small firms, thus stabilizing the price of woods and preventing price cutting.

Time passes mighty fast in moments like these and may have been a half an hour before I found Captain Edward Gillouly, but in that time I saw many horrible things, scenes I shall never forget; I saw the ruined lifeboats, blown to pieces by the explosion and watched the nurses, two women onboard, go down a rope into a boat to safety. I saw an officer rush into the deck and take his turn going over clad only in the light clothing which is customary to bathroom use. A Lieutenant and myself threw a rope to one of our boys and had him half way up the side of the ship when he was overcome with exhaustion and called to us in a weary voice, later I saw his cramped formed face downward in the water.

In the meantime our opportunity had not come. Captain Edward Gillouly and I met at short intervals; I cut several long ropes and ordered men to coil them in readiness for instant use as one or two destroyers had loaded up and it would soon be our turn. The Captain was calm and cool, his attitude nerved me, for the quiet manner in which he rolled his cigarette and talked of our chances, made me confident, and our talk onboard must have been a source of comfort to us both for we actually laughed when I tied his belt on over a heavy coat he had scored from someone on deck. His actions nerved our waiting company, and here, let me add, the fact, that we knew our boats could not be launched and that it was either a rescue or a straight doom as our lot.

Captain Edward Gillouly saw that all were over and then he followed, via the rope route as I could see in the light furnished by the destroyer. I had sent my men over and was about to follow them when I saw Chief Howith coming from the bridge, he hailed me and took me forward where from the deck of the Tuscania, we had only to wait for the waves to even the deck with that of the destroyer and step aboard. The Chief followed me, and the last man I saw leave the ship was Captain McLean of the ship. Two sailors coming over found a man on deck badly injured from a fall or possibly leaping to the lower deck, and we took him into the mess room under the bridge of the destroyer.

These men, who were all members of the 107th Supply Train, held a reunion August 22 at Lake Eau Claire, state park, six miles north of Augusta.

The *Tuscania* was heading for Liverpool, England, when she was torpedoed by the German submarine, U. B. 77. There were 2,156 American soldiers aboard and 281 of these lost their lives. Those from Superior saved in addition to Forsyth were E. J. Gillouly, since deceased, and F. W. O'Bervan.
