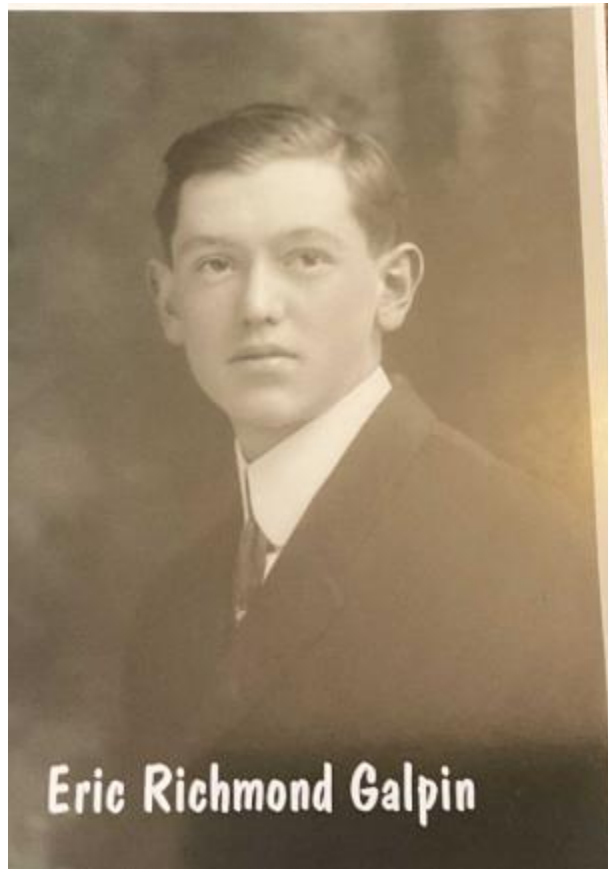

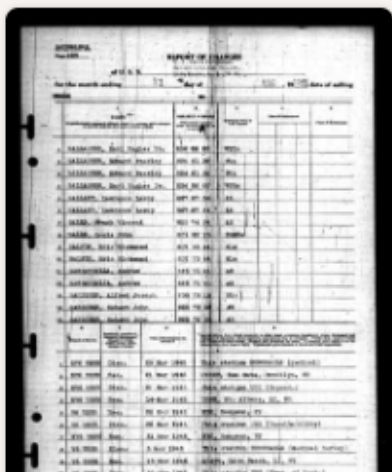

**ANNIVERSARY OF SINKING OF
TUSCANIA—LOCAL MEN ON
HER LUCKY IN BATTLE**

Today marks the first anniversary of the sinking of the British transport Tuscania off the coast of Ireland by a torpedo from a German submarine. Of the nine local young men who were on board the ill-fated ship, only two were wounded during the nine months of war that followed that first great disaster to American troops when they came so near death. Irvin Meidam, 107th Supply Train 32nd Division, was wounded in action in August, but has recovered from his wounds and is now with his unit in Germany. Theodore Briggs, Sanitary Squad No. 7, was struck by a piece of high explosive shrapnel in the left shoulder, July 30, at the battle near Chateau-Thierry when he was engaged in caring for the wounded. He spent six weeks in the hospital after that, but upon his release caught cold and a relapse followed, confining him to the convalescent hospital for two or three months. At present he is doing clerical work in the central department office.

The other four members of the Sanitary Squad, Sgt. Eric Galpin, Paul Van Wyk, Worth Bushey, and McKinley Robinson, came through the war without a scratch. Soon after their arrival in France they were transferred from Sanitary Squad No. 1 to Squad No. 7 of the 32nd Division. Their work consisted mainly of seeing the billets for the rest of the troops were in proper sanitary condition. During the battles they were engaged as ambulance drivers and stretcher bearers, doing general first aid work. September 1 they were transferred from the 32nd Division, doing detached duty at various hospitals. They were at the base hospital at Is-sur-Tille, France, until recently, when they were detailed to do outside work, and are now awaiting orders to return home.

The other members of the 107th Supply Train, Lieut. Henry J. Pettigrew, since promoted to Captain of Co. D, Sgt. Arthur J. Hantsche and Sgt. Jacob Schneider, also escaped injury of any kind. They are still members of the same unit in which they served when they left this country and are now in Germany with the 32nd Division.

World Veterans Have No Faith In Disarmament

**Former Service Men Believe
America Should Constant-
ly Be Prepared.**

Is the time ripe for international disarmament?

The conference of the nations which will meet at Washington probably in November will have to answer that question. But in order to learn the opinions of Appleton men who served in the World war, a reporter for the Post-Crescent interviewed a few of them. This is what they said:

"We haven't reached the millenium yet," said Charles A. Green, "so, in my opinion, there is little chance for the disarmament conference to succeed. Man hasn't changed any, as far as I can see, and nations haven't changed any. Man is just as prone to fight now as he was 1,000 years ago. When Angel Gabriel blows his horn, I'd say let America disarm, but not till then.

"I am and always will be in favor of a large navy and a fairly good-sized army. I believe that there will be another great war within 25 or 30 years. It may not be as great as the last war but nevertheless I have a premonition of a hard struggle. Somehow, I have always felt that we would have to fight Japan sooner or later. My contact with army men who know, during the last few years, has led me to believe that. Personally, I am not in favor of disarmament."

International disarmament is not a question of agreement but of enforcement, Eric Galpin believes. He thinks that most nations would make the agreement but he is afraid some of them would not carry it out.

"It's human nature to fight," Mr. Galpin said. "I would be in favor of disarmament if all the nations really disarmed, but there are too many sneaking people in the world. They would always be getting ready in the dark and preparing to put it over on the nations which were living in good faith. Suppose the agreement was

made. It probably would be only a short time until one nation or more would begin preparations for war. Then the other nations which were parties to the agreement would have to fight to enforce the agreement so what benefit would disarmament be?"

"I believe in looking out for trouble and preparing for it," said Dr. James A. Rolfe. "I am not in favor of disarmament. As long as there are Germans, or Frenchmen, or Englishmen or Japanese there are bound to be disagreements. I believe in looking for trouble and preparing for it. None of the foreign countries have ever lived up to an agreement yet and I'm afraid they never will. If they would, disarmament would probably work out all right.

"The minute one of those countries decides to fight, they are bound to do it. Furthermore, I can't see any way of enforcing an agreement on disarmament. Even if the various nations would agree, how would we know that the others were living up to the agreement? The nations say one thing and practice another. We objected to Germany raping Belgium. Now England does the same thing to Ireland every day. It will really require a reformation in the several nations to assure the success of any disarmament program. All nations must be consistent and act in good faith and they must have mutual confidence before disarmament can be attained."

"The great big motive behind universal disarmament is that it will put an end to war," said John Hertel. "There are other good reasons why nations should disarm but none of them compare with this. Sherman told us what war is and I believe dis-ought to be tried until it is armament is the only way to get rid of it. Anyway disarmament proven either bad or good. There is no reason that I can see why disputes should not be settled by arbitration. It surely would be less costly and would cut down taxation, for one thing. When it comes to disarmament, I'm for it.

They have to undergo severe service year in and year out. In the winter snow and ice block them; in the summer heavy showers flood them. **Appleton Claims Credit for
One of First Ex-
changes in America**

By Harold C. Franck

Home of the first electric street railway and commercial electric light plant, Appleton also claims credit for establishing one of the first telephone exchanges in the United States. The first exchange here was opened in April, 1879. For several years prior to that date the telephone had been in use here on private lines.

In fact, Appleton is generally credited with having the first telephones in service in Wisconsin. In 1877 a telephone line was strung from what was then the Benoit and Bleser drug store on E. College-ave to Dr. J. T. Reeve's office and to the residence of Louis Benoit and Dr. A. H. Levings.

Dr. A. H. Levings.

Wrote to Bell

Alfred Galpin, Jr., founder of the Galpin's Sons hardware store was instrumental in establishing the first telephone line in this city, and his nephew, Eric R. Galpin, has many interesting records of early day telephone history, and copies of letters to and from Alexander Graham Bell, inventor of the telephone, and others which were written shortly after the invention was made public. Through the courtesy of Mr. Galpin, many of these documents have been made a part of the Bell System Historical Library in New York City.

Miss Kate E. Hollihan, who later became Mrs. E. W. King, was the first operator in the first exchange, and became manager after the death of Mr. Benoit in 1881. Mr. Bleser later moved to South Dakota. In 1883 the telephone exchange was moved from the drug store to more commodious quarters on the second floor of the same building. In July, 1912, the telephone exchange was moved from rooms over the present Langenberg shoe store to a new building erected for that purpose at the intersection of W. Washington and N. Superior-sts, present home of the Wisconsin Telephone Co. exchange.

Hold Reunion

On April 15, 1926, a reunion of pioneer telephone subscribers of Appleton was held at the local exchange office to commemorate the forty-seventh anniversary of the opening of the office and the telephones' fiftieth anniversary year. Those present included Frank Wright, F. E. Saecker, O. P. Schlafer, John Hanson, Dr. J. S. Reeve, John Goodland, Jr., and Mrs. Rush Winslow. H. M. Fellows was host, F. N. Belanger, then district traffic supervisor, presided, and F. E. Chandler, General traffic superintendent, was present from Milwaukee.

In an address at the party, Mr.

Schlafer, veteran Appleton hardware dealer recalled an incident which helped to make the telephone a welcome guest in this community. That incident was the saving of the life of Judge Harriman. One day, while the judge was working in his yard, he chanced to step on the handle of a scythe, causing the blade to fly up and hit him in the side. A deep wound was inflicted and an artery severed. Having a telephone in the house, he was enabled immediately to reach Dr. Leving's office and the doctor arrived at the home just in time to save the judge's life, Mr. Schlafer told the group.

Dr. Reeve remembers the days the telephone was a real novelty, he and E. P. Humphrey, former editor of the Appleton Post, used to stand in the front windows of their respective homes, which faced each other, and talked over the telephones to each other.

Telephone Fright

He recalls the stage fright that used to seize the people when they tried to use the telephone for the first time. Persons would come in as "chesty" as peacocks and full of ambition and say, "I want to talk over your telephone." When another party would be called and communication established, the owner would hand the receiver to the guest and say, "Here you are. Now talk." and the guest would become so confused he would invariably say, "Oh, I just can't think of a thing to say," and hand back the receiver in confusion.

Mr. Galpin's letter to Mr. Hubbard is as follows: "Appleton, Wis., Feb. 23, 1877. Mr. Gardiner G. Hubbard, Washington, D. C. Dear Sir: On writing to Alexander Graham Bell in reference to his telephone, he referred me to you. Will you kindly inform me; first, whether it is a guaranteed success; second, price. What I want would only be for short circuits in which the resistance of line might be practically omitted. Yours truly, A. Galpin, Jr."

This letter, which proves by its text that Mr. Galpin had written to the inventor himself, previously to writing to his father-in-law, received the following answer: "Washington, D. C., Feb. 23, 1877. Mr. A. Galpin, Jr., Appleton, Wis. Dear Sir: Your note making inquiries in regard to the telephone has been received. Negotiations are now in progress for the introduction of the telephone to the public. As soon as these are completed I will give you the particulars you desire. Yours truly, Gardiner G. Hubbard."

That the desired information was given within the promised time was proved by the fact that before the year of this correspondence had ended, a telephone was rigged up at the home of Captain Spaulding, and people from all over this part of the country came to see the new "miracle."

That there was nothing slow about Appleton folks in those early days is revealed by a letter written by Mr. Galpin to Gardiner G. Hubbard, father-in-law of Mr. Bell, and it proves that Appleton men were

Appleton veterans of the world war who were on the troop ship "Tuscania," which was torpedoed off the coast of Ireland on Feb. 5, 1918, may have a chance to see the U-boat commander who sent their ship to the bottom of the sea if they attend the annual reunion of the National Tuscania Survivors' association in Chicago, Feb. 4, 5 and 6.

The commander of the sub, U-Boat 77, was Dr. Wilhelm Meyer, Saarbrücken, Germany, who has been invited to attend the convention as guest of the veterans. The German consul at Chicago and the German ambassador have approved the invitation and the North German Lloyd Steamship line has expressed a willingness to help finance the trip.

Kinley Robinson, Eric Galpin, Theodore Briggs, Worth Bushey and the late Paul Van Wyck.

"We invited our former enemy," said Arnold Joerns, president of the National Tuscania Survivors Association, "in the spirit of good sportsmanship and in the interest of international friendship. As long as we live we will respect and revere the memory of our 225 buddies who were killed that night. The purpose of the reunion is to honor their memory. Nor will time ever erase from own minds the harrowing experiences of that night. But that was war—and the war has been over more than 14 years. After all, we are part of the same world. Economically, culturally, scientifically, we have much in common with Germany. It is the duty of the

victor to take the lead in erasing war hatreds and healing war wounds after the war is over. It was conscious of the German captain to accept our invitation."

The 1900 war veterans who are survivors of the Tuscania hail from every state in the union. The sinking of the Tuscania was the only major disaster that marked the transportation of more than 2,000,000 American troops to Europe.

A busy three day program will be provided in Chicago during this unique reunion. Headquarters will be at the Great Northern Hotel. The boys will be given a pre-view of Chicago's world fair, the century of progress; have a boxing and wrestling stag in which the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars will cooperate; and will hold memorial services for the Tuscania dead in the fashionable Fourth Presbyterian Church on Michigan Boulevard at which a Catholic priest, Jewish rabbi, and Protestant minister will jointly officiate.

The survivors have also invited as a guest of honor their beloved friend, Captain Peter McLean of Glasgow, Scotland, who was the skipper of the Tuscania and the last man to leave the sinking ship. Another important guest of honor will be Commander John M. Smith of the British Destroyer "Grasshopper" who saved the lives of 500 of the Tuscania survivors. He now lives in Pavilion, Canada.

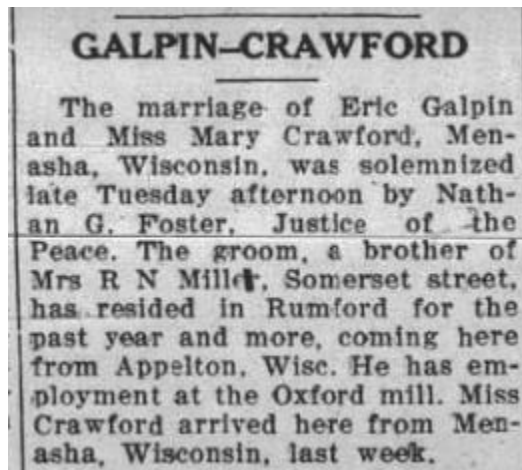

St. Paul Housewife Builds in Miniature

It took Mrs. Wilmot Macklin 100 hours to build Bethany Baptist church at Roseville—but she worked alone.

The Northstar center was a bigger job.

Mrs. Macklin finished it last week after 506 hours of work. "It was so big it just perched in the middle of the living room for two months," she said, "and life went on around it."

MRS. MACKLIN, 3103 N. Asbury Av., St. Paul, became a model-building housewife by chance. Now she is busily free-lancing on building jobs for Twin Cities architectural firms.

"I wanted a job with the children in school," she said, "but my husband thought I should do the job at home."

"He hauled me around to assorted architectural firms, and finally one of them took a chance."

Walter MacGregor handed Mrs. Macklin her first job—the blueprints for Bethany church. Her only experience until then was doing models of the Macklin home.

"**WE TORE** it completely apart and put it together again," she said, "using my models as guides."

Mrs. Macklin, mother of two boys and two girls, aged 8 to 18, is currently planning to build a new workroom onto the family home.

"I had to move the boys out of their bedroom to the basement for the Northstar job," she said.

Mrs. Macklin, the former Frances Galpin of Appleton, Wis., constructs the model buildings from stiff high-grade illustration board. She also uses a sharp knife, poster paints, some sandpaper and for foliage, green lichen moss.

THE SCALE on most models is one-eighth of an inch to one foot. Northstar center, now on view in the lobby of Northwestern National bank in Minneapolis, stands 3 feet high above a base measuring 5½ square feet.

Mrs. Macklin, who reads and understands blueprints, believes more home builders should provide scale models for their customers.

"People can't visualize a home from blueprints," she said. "The model helps them understand. And it's easier to move a window in a scale model than after the house is built."

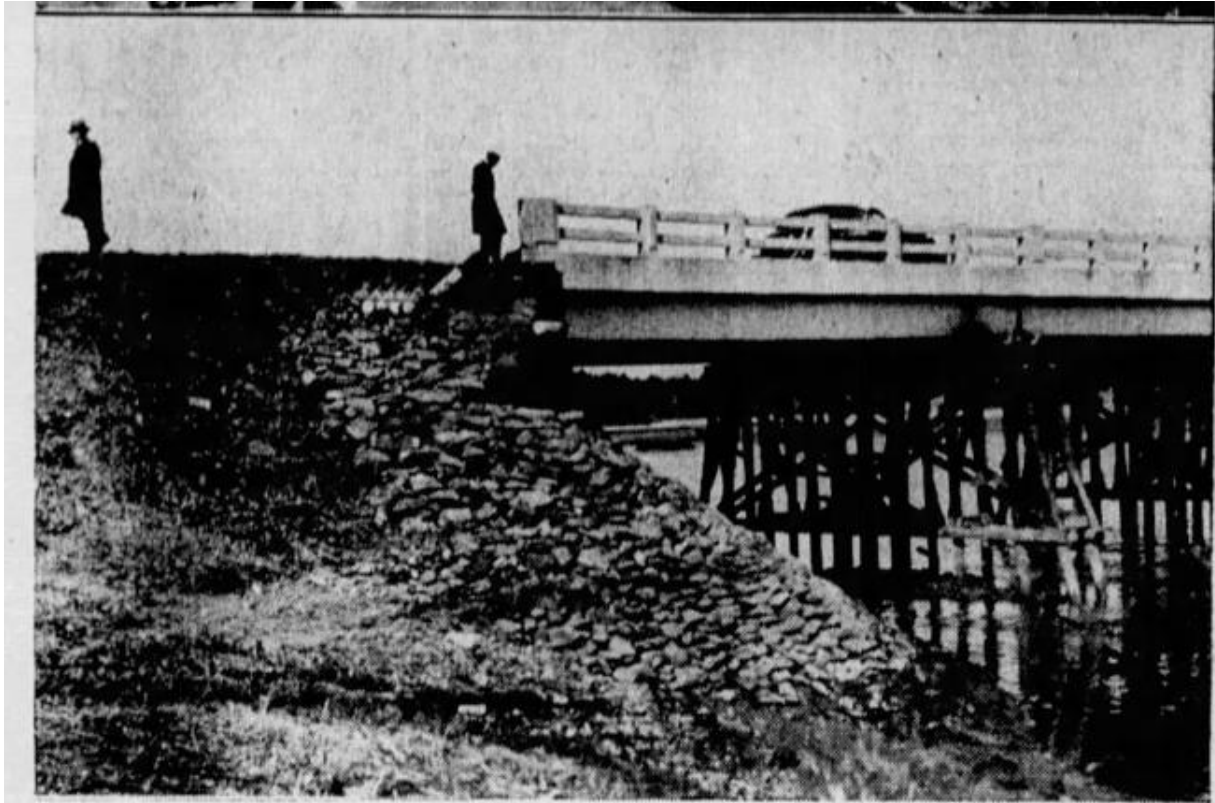

***R N Miller Dies, Was
Mill Executive, Budget
Committee Chairman***

Roland N Miller, 63 of 104 Somerset street, advisor in research at the Oxford Paper company plant here, and former chairman of the Rumford finance committee, died at the Peter Bent Brigham hospital in Boston Wednesday night, April 15, after a short illness.

Mr Miller had been in the Community hospital here for treatment recently, and was taken to the Boston hospital on Friday. Mrs Miller was with him in Boston.

Mr Miller's death marked the end of an active life in the fields of chemical research, engineering and forest products research on two continents. Possessed of a keen, analytical mind, he had also proven an effective member and chairman of the budget committee of Rumford.

Typical comment on his death was that his passing brought "a great loss to the community."

Roland N "Bill" Miller was born in Wisconsin, graduated from Lawrence College in Appleton in 1911, and received his master's degree from the University of Illinois in 1913.

During the next 16 years his was a varied career. He worked as chemist for the U S Gypsum company, then as a chemist with the U S Department of Agriculture in the division insecticides and fungicides.

For some time he was superintendent of the Necoosa Edwards Paper company. During World War I he served with the chemical warfare division of the US Army, and after the war became pulp mill superintendent of the Consolidated Water Power and Paper company in Wisconsin.

Following that he was superin-

tendent of the Ha! Ha! Bay Sulphite company in Canada, and then went with the U S Forest Service in the Forest Products laboratory in Madison, Wisc.

He was for some time a consultant with the Paulista Railroad of San Paulo, Brazil, and was manager of the San Juan Pulp company.

He spent some time as research chemist for the Champion Fibre and Paper company and then came to Rumford in 1929 as technical advisor to the mill manager. About 1930 he became superintendent of pulp mills at the plant here, a post he held until four or five years ago when he became research consultant.

Mr Miller devoted several years to town affairs as a member of the finance committee, the budget making group of the municipal government. He was first appointed in 1947, and served until the present year, the last three years as chairman. He did not wish reappointment this year. He was for several years a trustee of the public library here, was chairman for some time.

A fine golfer, Mr Miller was long an active member of the Oakdale Country club. He was an ardent amateur photographer, both in black and white and color, and in stills and motion pictures. Another of his interests was fishing

the waters of the Rangeley Lakes. The Millers had a cottage at Rangeley Lake for many years.

Fred I Howard, Rumford town manager, said this morning:

"The death of R N Miller will be a great loss to the town of Rumford. Mr Miller has always been generous with his time in devoting it to municipal activities and his judgement has always been held in high regard."

T F Spear, vice president of Oxford Paper company, public relations, said:

"The town of Rumford has lost a valuable citizen and the Oxford Paper company a valued employee. Mr Miller will be greatly missed by his many friends and associates."

Funeral services for R N Miller Oxford Paper company technical consultant, were held at Meader and Son Funeral Home, at 2 o'clock, Sunday afternoon. Rev Harold Yates officiated, and there were services by the Blazing Star Lodge, F and A M.

The body was taken to Grace-lawn Memorial Park, in Auburn, for cremation. The ashes will be buried in the family lot in Riverside, Appleton, Wis.

Wartime:

“Appleton (WI) Post-Crescent” 8 Feb 1918 p 1 – The 1st Sanitary Squad, 32nd Division, was on the Tuscania. Among the men from Appleton: Sgt. Eric Galpin.

"Appleton [WI] Post-Crescent" 11 Feb 1918 p 1 – photo – there were 8 Appleton men on board & all were saved. One was Eric Galpin.

"Appleton (WI) Post-Crescent" 26 Apr 1919 p 2 – The 7th Sanitary Squad has been assigned to the 32nd Division & will return home with them. The unit includes the Appleton hospital corps boys, among them Eric Galpin.

"Appleton (WI) Post-Crescent" 5 Feb 1919 p 5 – The 1st anniversary of the sinking of the Tuscania. Nine local men were on board, with 2 of them wounded in nine months. One of those unscathed was Sgt. Eric Galpin.

Post-war:

"Appleton (WI) Post-Crescent" 26 Feb 1920 p 9 – In Madison WI, the state treasury's receipt of \$68,800 from Marinette County last Saturday has enabled the WI State Treasurer Henry Jonson to send out the first 500 soldier bonus drafts. The 1st draft went to Clayton K. Slack of Madison in the amount of \$229.33. [FYI – Pvt. Slack won the Congressional Medal of Honor in WWI] Eric Richmond Galpin was 1 of 2 Appleton boys to receive a bonus; the other man was Frederick William Korte. Galpin received \$244.

"Neenah (WI) News-Record" 14 Jul 1924 p 3 – Mr. & Mrs. Eric Galpin & baby of Appleton visited with Mrs. Galpin's mother, Mrs. August Raprager, over Sunday.

"Oshkosh (WI) Northwestern" 6 Feb 1928 p 4 – Eric R. Galpin of Appleton is 1 of them attending the National Tuscania Survivors Association meeting in Milwaukee WI.

"Appleton (WI) Post-Crescent" Friday, 18 Aug 1939 p 10 – Mrs. R.N. Miller, Rumford ME, will arrive Saturday for a 2-week visit at the home of Mr. & Mrs. Gerald Galpin, 1203 N. Superior St. Mrs. Miller is the former Dorothy Galpin of Appleton; she is Gerald Galpin's sister.

Eric also serves in the Navy in WWII. In the 1930 census he responds that he had also served in the Mexican Conflict. The article from the "Portsmouth (NH) Herald" of 26 Aug 1942 p 1 (copied above) shows him pictured with other enlistees.

"Portsmouth (NH) Herald" 9 Oct 1943 p 2 – Eric R. Galpin. m.s. 1/c, USNR, stationed at Sampson NY, is at home on a 7-day leave.

"Portsmouth (NH) Herald" 13 Jan 1945 p 3 – The Kittery temporary honor roll of those in the US military in WWII will be dedicated at the Rice Library on 21 Jan 1945. One of the names is that of Eric R. Galpin.

Obituary:

"Portsmouth [NH] Herald" 15 Jul 1959 p 3 - age 64, resident of 70 Government St., Kittery ME. WWI Army & WWII Navy veteran. Member of American Legion. Retired from Portsmouth Naval Shipyard Dec 1955 after 15 years as a coppersmith in Shop 56. Lived in Kittery ME for the past 20 years, moving from Rumford ME. Born 18 Dec 1894 Appleton WI,

son of Algernon & Edith (Richmond) Galpin. Wife Mrs. Mary (Crawford) & daughter Mrs. Edward Benson of Portsmouth ME, sister Mrs. Dorothy Miller of Rumford ME, brother George S. Galpin of Appleton WI survive.
