Three Local Youths, Members of Aero Divisions, Had Berths on the Ill-Fated Vessel Sunk

Five Oakland men, two Alamedans, one Berkeleyan, one from San Leandro, several men from San Francisco, and relatives of Oaklanders were among those on the ill-fated transport Tuscania. 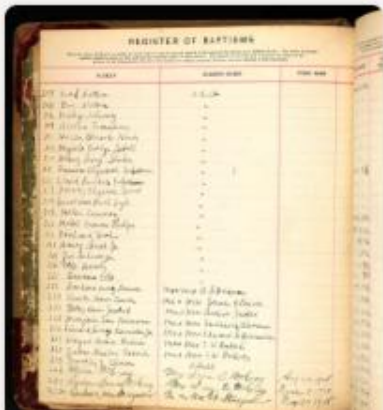

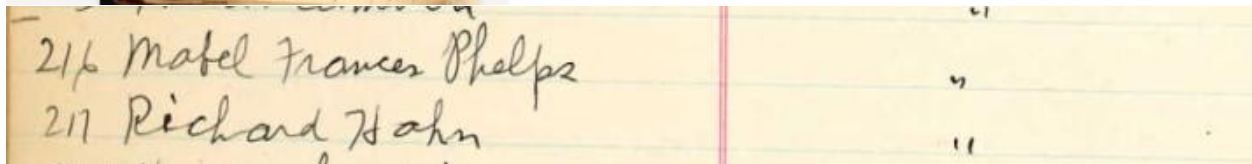

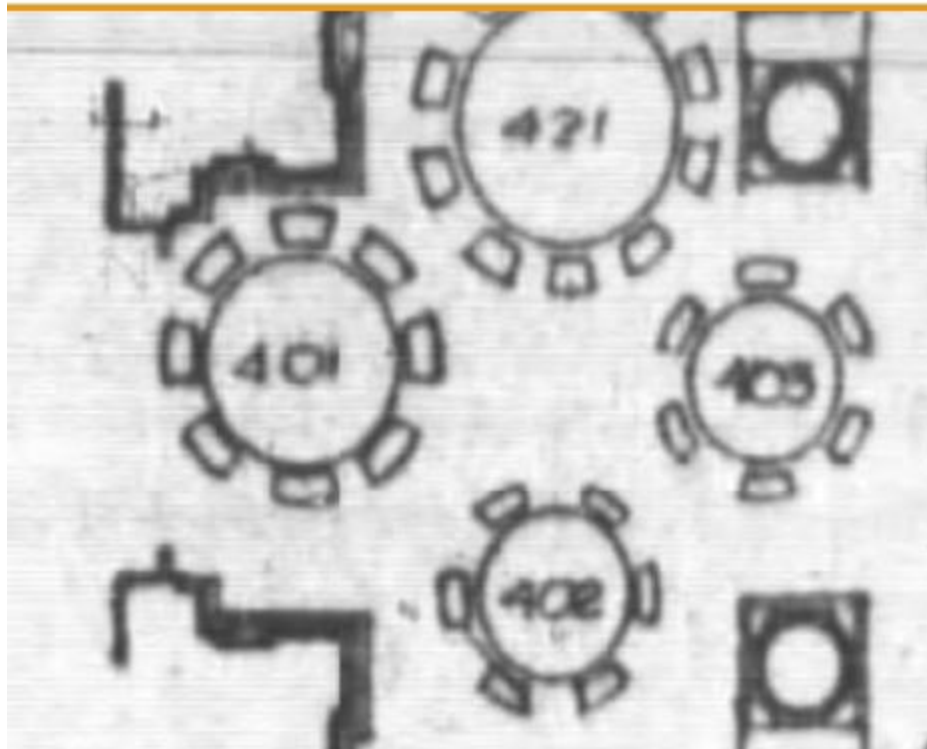

SWINGS IN AIR AS LIFEBOAT DRIFTS FROM SINKING STEAMER

**Sergeant Richard Hahn Writes
of Exciting Experience When
Steamer Tuscania Was Sunk
By a Submarine**

Sergeant Richard D. Hahn of the 100th Aerial Squadron has written to his aunt, Mrs. E. S. Wachhorst of this city, telling of the harrowing experience he passed through when the steamer Tuscania, on which he was crossing to France, was torpedoed by a German submarine.

Hahn was in the ship hospital at the time of the submarine attack, and at the alarm was rushed into his clothing and ordered into a lifeboat. As he swung on the life line to drop into the boat, the lifeboat drifted away from the sinking ship, leaving Hahn dangling in the air eighty-five feet above the surging ocean.

In his weakened condition it seemed a long time. He tried to swing back to the steamer without success. Just

as he felt his last strength leaving him, he says he offered up a prayer to God and made a final effort. Companions on the steamer grasped the life line and pulled him on deck. He then was placed in another lifeboat.

Hahn was landed, with other survivors, at Hamford, England, where he remained and is attending a three months' school for flyers.

Hahn is well known in this city, where he frequently visited.

Tuscania Survivor Back in Oakland

Man Previously Reported Lost Returns Home

OAKLAND, May 24.—Aboard the torpedoed *Tuscania* when she was a Hun victim and among the 275 American soldiers at first reported lost, Richard D. Hahn, Oakland aviator, has arrived home after many months on the line. Hahn, who lives at 763 Walker street, is the son of the late James D. Hahn, of this city. He was in the 100th Aero Squadron, volunteering for service in July, 1917. He saw active service on the Toul and St. Mihiel sectors.

"Following the sinking of the *Tuscania*, the seas grew high and drifted the life boats against the ragged coast of Scotland, where most of the Yankees lost their lives," said Hahn. "Their bodies were recovered and buried on the Island of Islay. Two of these only were from California. I was landed at Buncrana, Ireland, where I was well cared for."

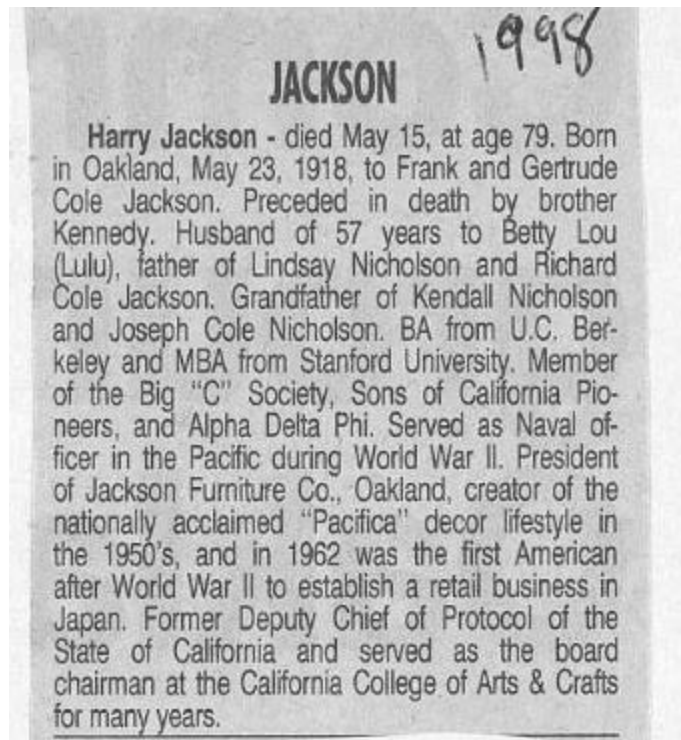

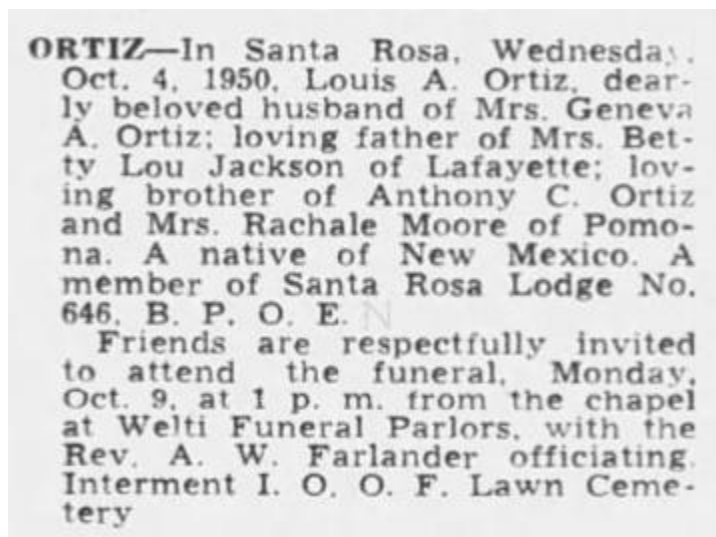
