Willard Cotton Hall, whose picture is not half as charming as his dear little self, was born January 6, 1899, in Los Angeles, Cal. Just 20 days after he first saw the light he began to "mix up" in life's troubles. His mother died, that greatest of all losses to a child, but happily he was too young to realize his great loss. And happily for him thus far on his journey of life he remains blissfully unconscious of his half-orphanage. And that is why he is such a sunshiny boy, baby, rather.

About April 1, following the boy's birth, his father, Willard Hall, a newspaper man, now running a paper in Walla

Walla, Wash, bundled Willard junior up, boarded a train and started for Butte. When he reached here he turned the delicate baby, who at five months weighed only five pounds, over to his aunts, Mrs. Bryan Irvin and Mrs. Levi Wild.

And to these aunties all credit is due for the remarkable evolution of the tiny five pounder to the fine specimen of a baby boy here depicted. A good thing it is for Willard that these aunties will continue to care for him for all time to come. Willard is a beautiful boy, blonde hair and bonny eyes. He is the joy and life of the Wild home, 725 West Granite street.

Willard's mother died 20 days after his birth, both in Jan 1899. Around 1 Apr 1899, his father Willard Sr. took 5-pound Willard Jr. to Butte MT to be raised by his aunts. "Butte (MT) Daily Post" 26 Oct 1901 p 14

Engineer Train in Which R. C. Richardson and Willard C. Hall Were Members Shipped on the Craft Sunk by Huns.

Cablegram Is Received From Second Lieutenant D. Hudtloff, Thought to be on Boat, That He "Arrived Safely."

There is little doubt now that at least two and probably three Butte boys were aboard the transport *Tuscania*, sunk by a German submarine.

Late advices from the war department show that the 107th engineer train was on the *Tuscania* and in that train were Willard C. Hall, 725 West Granite street, nephew of Mrs. Levi S. Wild and Mrs. Bryan Irvin and R. C. Richardson, formerly employed as an insurance solicitor by Simons & Booth of this city.

Richardson has a brother-in-law in Livingston, J. W. Anderson. He enlisted at Hancock, Michigan, his old home, last August and Private Hall enlisted while he was attending a military school at Racine, Wis.

Both Well Known.

Both trained at Fort McArthur and they had kept friends in Butte apprised of their movements until about two weeks ago when letters from the two boys conveyed word that they soon would be sailing for France. Richardson had been a resident of Butte for two years and Willard Hall since he was a babe. Both are well known.

The latter enlisted within a few days after President Wilson had issued a call for volunteers and he had just turned into his eighteenth year. This boy was brimming with patriotism and he enjoys the distinction of being one of the first boys if not the first in Butte to don the uniform of Uncle Sam in response to the president's call.

David Hudtloff Heard From.

Second Lieutenant David Hudtloff of Butte, who is in the artillery branch, also is believed to have been aboard the *Tuscania*, according to relatives here. However, he is safe as a cablegram was received from him yesterday said: "Arrived safely."

O. A. Beall of Whitehall had a brother aboard the *Tuscania*, Alva L. Beall, who is well known to residents of Whitehall. Alva Beall is in the 100th aero squadron, which is reported to have been aboard the transport. He enlisted at Salt Lake and had been flying for some time, he being re-

garded as an experienced aviator and he was under hurry-up orders to proceed to France. He had been stationed at Long Island, where he had embarked.

Willard Cotton Hall, who had lived in Butte since a baby, was believed to be one of the first – if not the 1st- in Butte to enter the military – "Butte (MT) Miner" 8 Feb 1918 p 10

"WHERE DO I GO FROM HERE? TO HELL WITH THE KAISER!" CRIED HERO AS HE SANK BENEATH WAVES

Willard C. Hall, Well-Known Butte Boy, Tells of Dramatic Incident Attending the Destruction of the American Transport *Tuscania* and of Battle in Dark Between British Destroyers and One of the Kaiser's Sea Wasps.

"Where do I go from here? To hell with the kaiser!" cried one of the gallant soldiers as he sank forever beneath the waves which later swallowed the Tuscania.

Such was the cry which came out of the darkness and the roar of the ocean, which a moment later hushed the last filing possible from this hero in khaki at the Hun butcher.

This remarkable scene is described by Willard C. Hall in perhaps one of the most vivid accounts of the torpedoing of the American transport had from one aboard that ill-fated liner. Private Hall is a member of the One Hundred and Seventh engineers. He is one of Butte's best known young men and is a nephew of Mrs. Byron Irvin and Mrs. L. S. Wild, 725 West Granite.

A letter from him was received yesterday by his aunts, which follows:

Willard Hall's Letter.

"Winchester, England, Feb. 13, 1918—
My Dear Aunts. I presume you received the card I mailed from 'somewhere' in the north of Ireland containing the information of my safe deliverance from the terrible disaster that befell the Tuscania. I will now try and describe some of the scenes that came under my observation on that horrible night. First let me say how thankful to God I am to be here safe and well.

"It was just dark when the crash came. I was down in the hole—that is, three lower decks below the upper decks. We were on our last leg of the trip and expected to reach the English port the next morning. Everyone was free from seasickness and happy. I was waiting with the engineers—my company—for dinner on the third lower deck, and as we were waiting there the conversation mostly centered on submarines and torpedoes.

"Just previous to dinner the captain of the Tuscania issued an order that all men go above on deck, but we had not yet received the order. The order

was to remain out on deck until 8:30 o'clock and wear or carry our lifebelts and to either wear or carry our belts wherever we went.

"I was sitting on mine and occupied a seat by the mess hall door talking with one of the boys about torpedoes when the torpedo struck.

Terrific Explosion.

"The explosion was terrific, the electric lights went out; darkness and indescribable consternation reigned. Some one near me yelled: 'She's got it! The dirty Germans have got here now!'

"After the lapse of what seemed an interminable time we were groping our way upstairs to the upper decks. As we came out on the deck we heard shooting going on in the dark. The torpedo boats guarding us were fighting the submarine. The ship was listing heavily to the port side, where she

was struck. We all went to our lifeboats. After waiting 15 minutes for the boats to be lowered the emergency lights on the top deck were turned on, but this light soon went out. Our company was lined up and we stood at attention for half an hour while 20 of our men tried to get the lifeboats out. There were three lifeboats for our company, but all of them were wrecked in the effort to lower them.

Desperate Situation.

"With all our boats wrecked the situation became desperate. How were we to escape from the sinking transport? She was slowly but surely going down. Everybody was desperately struggling to save himself. A large number of the boys were overboard in the sea crying for assistance. I heard one poor soldier just before he sank yell loudly: 'Where do I go from here? To hell with the kaiser!'

"A few minutes later a British torpedo boat destroyer came up on the starboard side of the sinking ship and rescued us. It was jump, slide, hurdle, swim—anything to get aboard. It was 50 feet to the little destroyer. A number of the boys perished trying to get aboard. For myself, I took a 60-mile per hour ride down a rope from the ill-fated craft and landed in the sea and was fished out by an iron hook and landed safely on board the little destroyer.

"Marvelous luck, you'll say. Believe me, it was luck. The little vessel soon got away from the terrible scene and soon landed us safely on the Irish coast. All the men of our company were saved.

"Write me soon and often. I long for news from home.

"Your loving boy, WILLARD."

FEAR EXPRESSED FOR BUTTE BOY

Willard C. Hall, Nephew of Levi S. Wild of This City, Is Believed to Have Been Aboard the Ill-Fated Tuscania.

Willard C. Hall, one of Butte's best-known young men, nephew of Levi S. Wild and Mrs. Bryan Irvine, 725 West Granite street, is believed to have been aboard the Tuscania, and concern is felt by relatives and his many friends here for his safety.

Private Hall had been transferred from the Wisconsin ambulance corps, in which he was sergeant, to the 107th engineers at Camp McArthur, and he had been in training there for some time.

Companies of this regiment of engineers were aboard the Tuscania, but to what company Private Hall belonged it was impossible to ascertain late last night, and it is possible that his company may not have been aboard the transport.

Recently he was ordered to Camp Merritt, N. J., preparatory to embarking for France. Letters from him ceased coming two weeks ago, it being the practice of the military authorities to prohibit all letter writing for about a week or ten days prior to a transport's sailing in order that no information as to the date of the ship's departure reach the enemy.

Private Hall is a relative of Major Jesse B. Roote, who is with the Montana regiment somewhere in France.

Some fear was expressed last night that Capt. Hugh McLeod of Butte was aboard the Tuscania, but letters received by friends a day or two ago were of such a date as to preclude the possibility, it is believed, of the captain being aboard the vessel. BUTTE BOY SAVED FROM TUSCANIA

Glad Tidings of the Rescue of
Willard Hall Come to
the City.

Willard C. Hall, mentioned in the special dispatch from Washington as having been saved from the sunken transport Tuscania, is a Butte boy of life standing. He was reared from practical infancy in this city, lived with his foster parents, at 725 West Granite street, and enlisted last April.

The young man had just reached his nineteenth birthday on Jan. 6. For the past two years he had been a student of the Racine college, a military institution of the Wisconsin city. He enlisted in that city with an ambulance corps, but at the request of relatives in this city was transferred to an engineering unit. Willard Hall went from Racine to Camp Douglas, Wis., after enlistment for training. Reporting at that cantonment a little too late for service with the ambulance corps, with which he had first enlisted, he was moved by the department to the training camp at Waco, Texas. In the latter town the young man took a course of training and finally embarked for France with a Waco camp unit.

About the time he boarded the Tuscania he was transferred to the engineering unit, the 107th engineers, largely through the instrumentality of Mr. and Mrs. Levi Wild, with whom he had lived as an adopted boy since the time he was 4 years old. Mrs. Wild's sister, Mrs. Belle B. Irvine, was also a resident of the same home and the boy had been as a nephew to her.

Since the time of the sinking of the transport the boy's foster parents had been greatly worried and anxious, not having word as to whether he was alive or dead, and yet knowing that he had set sail upon that boat. The glad news came to them yesterday, in the form of a telegram from the war department, stating that the boy had been rescued and was uninjured.

Willard Hall was well known among the young people of Butte, having been a pioneer in the sense that he had been reared from infancy here. He was popular, and the only child of the family with whom he had so long made his home.

Official confirmation of the report that Lieut. David G. Hudtloff had also been saved from drowning with the transport Tuscania was also received from Washington last evening, in the form of a special dispatch to the Standard. The communication was brief, stating only that the popular Butte officer had been saved.

Lieutenant Hudtloff was formerly an employe of the Butte Water company. He was married, his wife at present living with her parents at 1028 West Porphyry street.

Lieutenant Hudtloff left Butte in August of last year, having been in training in this country at several points since that time until the time of sailing aboard the transport.

Butte Inventor Uses Electricity To Separate Ores

Special to The Billings Gazette.

BUTTE, Nov. 29.—An invention which backers declare will do much to further the interests and progress of the mining industry has been recently perfected by Willard C. Hall, 24-year-old Butte inventor. Basic patents have been obtained on the invention, which is an apparatus for the separation of di-magnetic minerals from ores by a process of induction.

An electrical process, it is said to be much cheaper than the oil flotation process, and has the added advantage of classification as Hall's induction separator, according to the statement of H. J. Meisel, mining engineer and president of the Hall Mineral Separation company, and not only separates the mineral from the ore but classifies the different metals contained in the rock.

According to Mr. Meisel, the machine will do much toward making the mining of low grade ore more profitable. Electrically operated, the machine is neither static or magnetic, but works, as its name implies, through induction. Either wet or dry ores may be separated by the apparatus. The cost of operating, asserts the president, is low in proportion to some of the methods now in use. In the treatment of low grade ores this item will be a big factor, contends Mr. Meisel.

Electrically operated, the machine is neither static or magnetic, but works through induction, and either wet or dry ores may be separated. The cost of operating is said to be low in proportion to some of the methods now in use.

The machine will be handled by a company composed entirely of Butte men. E. W. Williams is secretary, and the directors are Paul Passmore, Edgar Wild, Henry Howell, and Levi Wild. The corporation is a closed one, and no stock is to be sold.

Will Lacking Specific Date Is Held Valid

HELENA, June 28. — (U.P.) — The Montana supreme court today held valid a holographic will written by the late Belle B. Irvine and reversed a decision of the Silver Bow county district court which rejected the will and denied probate on the grounds that it contained no specific date of writing.

In a 3-2 decision, the supreme court held that the will, leaving all of Miss Irvine's property to her nephew, Edgar Wild, contained the phrase, "this day of May, 1938," and therefore complied with state law requiring that such documents be dated. That the specific date was not entered was merely an oversight and the will should be "entitled to the respect of the courts," the majority opinion held.

Willard C. Hall Jr. contested the validity of the will. The majority opinion was written by Associate Justice Hugh R. Adair and concurred in by Justices Leif Erickson and Claude Morris. Chief Justice Howard A. Johnson and Justice Albert Anderson dissented.

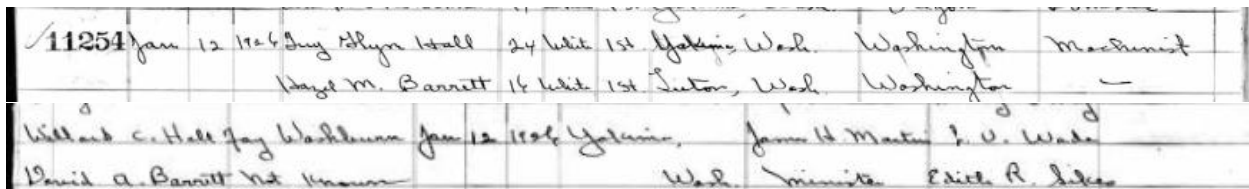

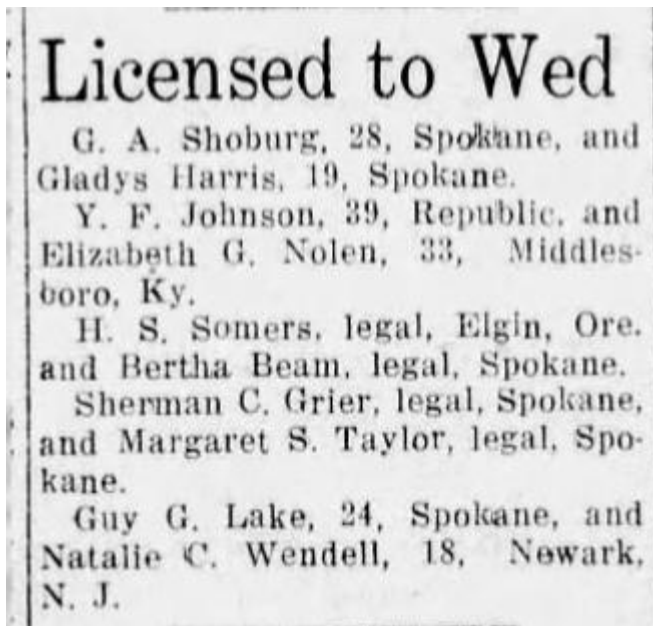

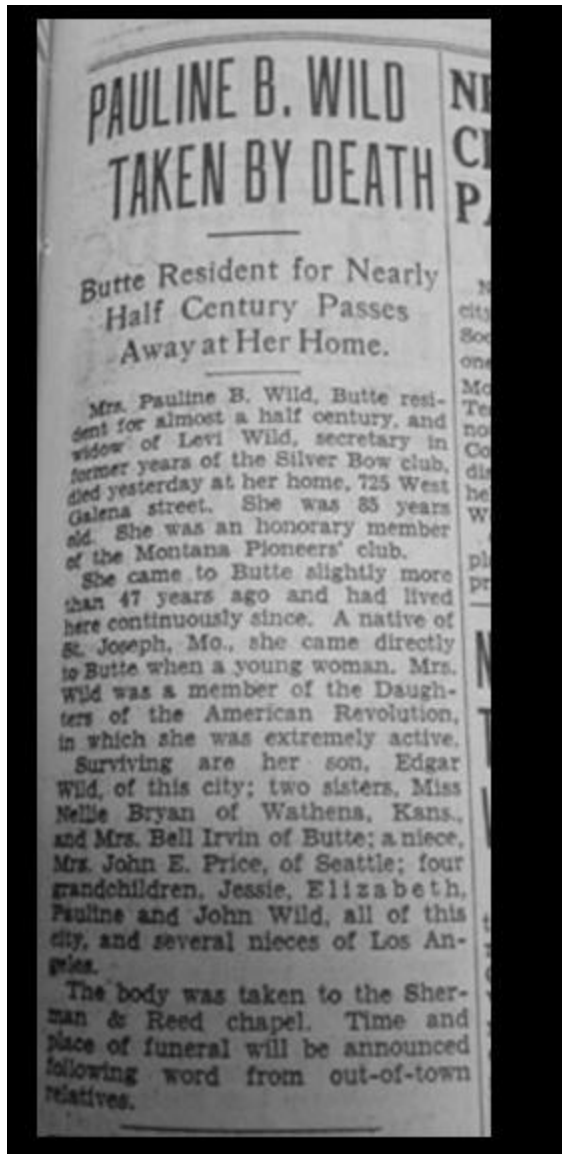

Helen's brother was Eugene Palenga, 9 Sep 1901 Warsaw, Miastro Warszawa, Mazowiercke, Poland – 11 Aug 1942 Chester, Delaware Co. PA. Served in the US Army as a private in Co. A, 12th Infantry, then in the US Navy as a musician, Seaman First Class, discharged 16 Jan 1942. Died from a brain tumor on 11 Aug 1942. – Buried in Beverly National Cemetery, Beverly, Burlington NJ. F: 2524668

Helen also had a brother named Regis Anthony Palenga, born in Warsaw, Poland, who served in the US Navy 7 Apr 1941 to 2 Mar 1946.

In the 1950 census for Los Angeles, Los Angeles CA, conducted 3 Apr 1950, Regis A. Palenga, 43 Poland, no occupation was the head of the household at 1619 Shatto St. In the household were his (and Helen's) mother Josephine Palenga, 78 Poland, widow – brother-in-law Clarence Senkus (43 CT, shipping clerk, wholesale hardware store) & Regis's sister (Clarence's wife) Hermenegilda Senkus (42 Poland).

Following Willard Jr's death in 1953, Helen Julia Hall, nee Palenga, applied for US citizenship in US District Court in Los Angeles CA on 13 Apr 1955. As part of this petition, she was filing to change her middle name from Julia to Joy. She had arrived in the US at NYC on 3 Jan 1913. Julia Hall lived at 1515 E. 80th St., Los Angeles CA & was unemployed.

According to his document, Helen had married on 11 Jul 1942 in Las Vegas NV to Willard C. Hall, born 6 Jan 1899 in Los Angeles CA, but now deceased. She had lived in the US since 1941 & not left

Around 1 Apr 1899, when Willard Jr. weighed 5 pounds, his father Willard Sr. brought him by train to Butte MT, to be raised by Willard Sr.'s aunt (Jr.'s great-aunt) Isabell (Belle) Bryan Irvin & her husband Bryan Irvin and Belle's sister Mrs. Levi (Pauline Bryan) Wild, in Butte MT.

"Butte (MT) Miner" Sunday, 24 Dec 1916 p 11 – Willard C. Hall arrived in Butte Friday morning from Racine WI where he is attending school to spend his holiday vacation with his aunts, Mrs. Bryan Irvine & Mrs. Levi Wild, of W. Granite St.

Willard was attending military school in Racine WI when he joined the Army just after the US declared war on Germany in Apr 1917.

Wartime:

"Butte (MT) Miner" 13 Sep 1918 p 6 – a letter to Mrs. Byron Irvine & Mrs. Levi Wild, Willard Hall's foster mothers, who live at 725 W.
