Two of the W. S. C. Men on the Ill-Fated Tuscania Are Named in the Partial List of Survivors

Joseph C. Knott and Charles Hanson, two former W. S. C. men, are named in the partial list of survivors which has been received at the administration office. While here both men were registered in the school of agriculture and would have graduated this spring.

Early last fall they enlisted in the forestry division of the 29th engineers in Spokane.

Other W. S. C. men believed to have been on the boat are not named among the list of survivors. Some time will be necessary before their exact whereabouts can be ascertained.

F.C. Honors C.V. Hanson

Charles V. Hanson, 71, a native of Fall City and an inveterate worker in community affairs, this week received a token of appreciation from his townsmen.

Members of the Fall City Kiwanis Club presented him a plaque "in recognition and appreciation for outstanding service to the community of Fall City."

And since Mr. Hanson was not able to attend a ceremony in Fall City to receive it, the pre-

sentation ceremony was taken to him in his room at the Issaquah Villa Nursing Home.

Hanson has led or worked on scores of community projects that span the history of the town for many decades. His last effort was a successful campaign for street lights.

He has been president of the Community Club since 1950.

After working for many years for Weyerhaeuser Co., in 1949 he

was appointed to the newly-created rural carrier route of the Fall City Post Office.

He retired early this year.

Hanson was born in Fall City, and schooled there. He is a graduate of what was then Washington State College and is a World War I veteran who served for 20 years as service officer for the Renton-Pickering Post, American Legion.

Charles V. Hanson Taken By Death

A Personal Tribute

They say no one is indispensable. But in my estimation, no one person will ever again be able to undertake and accomplish as many tasks as were shouldered by Charlie V. Hanson.

My first encounter with Charlie was in 1944 when I first came to visit the Valley. At that time he was active in the "Keep Washington Green" movement, in addition to river improvement work.

He had lived along the Snoqualmie River, knew the hazards of high water and floods, and devoted much of his time to the drive to build dikes and dredge the river.

He was ever mindful of soil conservation, the preservation of fish and wildlife and the protection of forests. He said trees were meant to be grown and the timber harvested, but that additional trees should be planted to assure forests of the future.

After the Second World War, Charlie saw the need for fire fighting equipment in his home town. Early in 1946 he organized King County Fire Protection Dist. 427 in Fall City.

Through War Surplus Property he was able to procure an air-field crash fire truck, the first fire truck owned by the people of Fall City. Since then they have purchased a new fire hall, and have added two more fire trucks to the equipment. Charlie was chairman of the Fire Commissioners of this district from the time it was organized.

Charlie was rural route carrier in Fall City from 1949 until December 1965 when he retired. During all that time there was not a man, woman or child who did not become acquainted with his many services beyond the call of duty.

Many is the widow who couldn't cash her monthly check and had C. V. do it. There were those without lights or phone, and C. V. took care of that and told us to notify the necessary companies when he came off the route.

He was ever mindful of the balmy weather that caused the river to rise. He would either personally alert the farmers to bring in their livestock, or he made sure that one of us warned those in danger.

When there was death in a household, Charlie was always there to advise the widow of her many benefits if her husband had been in the service. When a veteran became ill or needed help with a compensation or medical claim, C. V. was there, advising on procedures, serving as liaison between the American Legion and the V.A., making as many trips to Seattle as were necessary to assist.

In 1946, C. V. saw that we had to have street lights, not only for motorists, but so that the aged and children could feel more assured when they went out in the evening.

Through lots of hard work, the street lights became a reality, but that was not enough as far as Charlie was concerned. Approximately two years ago he saw the need for bigger vapor lights. The \$5 a year donation from local residents to pay for the present lights was insufficient for new ones, so C. V. was determined to form a Local Improvement District.

In spite of many set-backs and disappointments he stuck by his guns. Last November, while Charlie was confined to a hospital bed, the hearing for the L.I.D. came up. County Commissioners saw fit to pass the resolution thereby putting the Fall City street lights on the County tax rolls as an L.I.D.

Fall City does not have all the vapor lights installed as yet, but the irony is that last Friday

night, January 26, the first two vapor lights went on for the first time along the Preston Highway. Charlie never knew it, but two days before his death, his big undertaking had been realized.

I like to refer to Charlie as the Abe Lincoln of Fall City. Never has there been a more community-minded person nor a greater humanitarian — he would have made a great statesman.

He loved the Snoqualmie Valley, and after talking to Charlie you felt that it was a privilege to be alive and live in this area that afforded so much. His own belief no doubt inspired him to work for the community, never thinking of personal gain, or wanting any credit for his many accomplishments. The area tried to show its appreciation when he retired from the Post Office in 1965 by giving him a party "send off" into retirement.

Charlie may have retired from the government service, but he never retired from his active community advancement.

Fall City is suffering a great loss. A new chairman of the Fire Commissioners will have to be elected; a new president of the Fall City Community Club; a new chairman for the Fall City Planning Committee, and a new person to bear the burden of the growth pains that our town is experiencing.

Unselfish to the end, it was Charlie's wish that no flowers be sent to his funeral Wednesday. "Have them give their donations to the Fall City Library or the Fall City Methodist Church," was his parting wish.

We loved C. V.; we will miss him.

Wednesday Services

Charles V. Hanson, a Fall City native and one of its best-loved citizens, died last Sunday in Seattle's Swedish Hospital after an extended illness. He was 71 years old.

Mr. Hanson grew up in the Valley, attended schools here, and was a graduate of Washington State College. He was a veteran of World War I, and for 20 years was service officer for the Renton-Pickering Post of the American Legion.

Mr. Hanson had led a number of community activities, including the Commercial Club and the Kiwanis. Last November, while in the Issaquah Villa Nursing Home, he was presented a plaque in appreciation of his years of leadership by the Fall City Kiwanis Club.

His last major community drive was for new and better street lights, and that, like most of his campaigns, was successful, with the first lights going in shortly before his death.

Survivors include his wife, Hulda, at the family home; two sons, Garin Donnelly, Issaquah, and Harold W. Donnelly, Concrete; and two brothers, Albert G. and Robert H., of Fall City.

Funeral services were to be held Wednesday at 2 p.m. at the Issaquah Funeral Home with the Rev. George Pratt officiating.

The family asked that instead of flowers remembrances be in the form of donations to the Fall City Library or the Fall City Methodist Church.

The main job of the State KWG Committee is to coordinate the work of the local groups and to supply general educational material on forest fire prevention. The cooperate of the Junior Red Cross has been enlisted, according to Brier, for promotion of the fire prevention work of the Junior Forest Wardens.

New Forest Products Group To Hold First Meeting In Olympia

The State Institute of Forest Products, created by the last Legislature to conduct research into methods of obtaining more complete utilization of timber, will conduct its initial meeting in Olympia this Thursday.

The nine-man non-salaried commission, headed by Governor Wallgren as chairman, plans to discuss its work program for the coming year with emphasis on a survey of research needed for more economical and efficient methods of utilizing waste products of the state's timber industry.

Results of the commission's survey will be reported to the 1949 Legislature along with its recommendations for a continuing state research program of timber utilization and marketing.

Out of the Woods

"Keep Green" and the Legion

There is need for a history straightener on how the "Keep Green" citizens' forest-fire prevention movement, now in force in 26 states, came to get its start. Until a more able straightener of this variety comes along, I expect to work at it some.

Whoever the expert historian may be, he will find the sources of Keep Oregon Green and Keep Washington Green—Keep Maine Green, too, Keep Florida Green, and all the others—in such men as American Legionnaires Babe Munson of Shelton and Charlie Hanson of Fall City, in Washington state. It was Keep Washington Green first, beginning in April, 1940, and its strength was built up by Washington American Legion Post Forest Marshals, with the then—and now—Department Adjutant Col. Fred M. Fuecker promoting the program and appointing a State Forest Marshal on it—me.

A broad-beamed ex-top sergeant of artillery, Hols Holbrook, was the first state director of the Keep Washington Green program. He was at it for four years and he and Fred Fuecker kept it up front as a Legion project during the first two.

Don't let anyone tell you that Keep Oregon Green was started in 1941. It was in full operation after July 1, 1940, and in this drive the Legion also had a place of leadership.

What happened? I don't rightly know. The encouraging thing, the great thing in sight now, is that the American Legion in Washington, under the 1950 state commander, Herbert L. Davis, is fighting the accursed forest fire again.

The 1939 Beginning

The American Legion in both Oregon and Washington was well-nigh the whole show in the actual birth and infant growth of "Keep Green," which was in 1939. The name the movement went under in that year was "The Junior Forest Council." Niel R. Allen of Grants

Pass was Oregon state commander of the Legion that year, and he made the J. F. C. a chief concern. Washington Commander Arthur J. Hutton was also active on the Board. The state foresters of the two states were co-chairmen.

The Junior Forest council was formed and fostered by the West Coast Lumbermen's association, which has been the No. 1 supporter of "Keep Green" all along. The purpose of the 1939 effort was to encourage forestry program projects everywhere with young people through their existing organizations. American Legion leadership in the Junior Forest council exerted strong influence in the Boy Scout troops sponsored by many posts and in the Sons of the American Legion squarons.

At the 1939 meeting of the Western Forestry and Conservation association State Foresters Goodyear and Ferguson called a dinner meeting on the expansion of the Junior Forest council. The result was a February meeting of industry and state forestry leaders, in the governor's office at Olympia. There the program was expanded into one of education on forest fire prevention with all of the public, under a "Keep Washington Green Committee"—a name proposed by Roderic Olzendam. Sarge Holbrook was given a job to do.

Then in Oregon Edmund Hayes and John B. Woods, Sr., set up "Keep Oregon Green."

Again the Legion Marches

At the start of this piece I mentioned two by name—Babe Munson and Charlie Hanson. Babe and I are equally at home in a boom-pond shack. Charlie and I are old hard-handed greenchain lumberhookers. We are all of the Legion. Babe Munson did a powerful job in his spare time starting what is now the famous Mason county Keep Washington Green committee and its annual Forest festival. Charlie inspired and led a KWG committee in the Snoqualmie valley and has been a member of the KWG state board of trustees all these years.

They went into this work first, and with heart and soul, because it was an American Legion program. Literally hundreds of others like them in Washington and Oregon have done the same. So it has gone in 24 other states.

Yet the American Legion claims no credit for the nation-wide "Keep Green" forest-fire prevention program. No one else is yielding the Legion proper credit. Here is a rough try. The Legion is marching on this cause again. Encourage it!

Hanson Memorial Dedicated in F.C.

A newly-erected flagpole on the banks of the Snoqualmie River at Fall City was dedicated last week to Charles V. Hanson, a Fall City native and civic leader who "gave his life to serving the community."

Herman Zimmerman, head of the Fall City Community Club, briefly recounted Hanson's history, noting that his life was a "tireless quest" after service to the area of his birth.

Then Zimmerman formally turned the memorial over to Paul Stilwell, president of the Fall City Recreation Council, commenting that it was appropriate that a "service" organization be the recipient.

LeRoy Bronemann was master of ceremonies for the occasion. The Rev. George Pratt offered a prayer. The American Legion post presented colors.

A wreath was placed at the base of the memorial by librarian Mrs. Marguerite Nelson. The library was one of the many local institutions Hanson had aided.

The ceremony was one of the highlights of Fall City's annual Derby Day celebration.

Charles V. Hanson was 71 when he died last January.

Two days before his death, and unknown to him, the last project he had directed was realized, when new street lights were turned on in Fall City.

During a career that seldom took him far from home, Hanson headed the Community Club, the American Legion Post, where he served as service officer for many years, the Kiwanis, and almost every other organization that had its roots in Fall City and whose major theme was service.

The flag memorial will bear a simple plaque, containing Hanson's name, and dates of birth and death. No plaque could have been built big enough to contain all the causes he worked for, all of his accomplishments for the town of Fall City, or all the thanks of its citizens.

Bronemann said the memorial was the work of many men, and gave the following as particularly instrumental in getting the monument: Henry Dubuis, architect; Barney Phillips, contractor; Vernon Landon, mason; Zimmerman, Stilwell, W. L. Brickey Jr. and Dave Schiesser, Larry Reidhed and Gary N. Giles.

He also thanked the American Legion for its participation.

Dear Charles & Hulda:

You will please pardon me for this long delay in acknowledging receipt of your very kind letter and card of sympathy for the sorrow caused by the death of our mutual friend, Grandma Donnelly who passed away so suddenly it seems.

I had been under the weather with a severe case of Bronchitis and on account of not being well anyhow, it takes me time to get on my feet after a sick spell. Now that I am feeling pretty good again, I am writing to send you our thanks and appreciation of your remembrance.

Grandma was not in good health for a long time, but she was up and around and active and seemed to like it here very much and to have a home. On Friday evening of the week before she died, we were over at my son Donald's home looking after their baby while they went to a show. We spent the time playing cards and while we were playing, she complained of being sleepy. We got her to lie down on the studio couch and she slept for maybe 20 minutes. We then went home which is only next door, and when we got into the house, she said she had a bad headache. She said she would sit up for a little while and then go to bed. She sent me to bed. I sleep upstairs and her room was on the first floor. Along about 12:30 AM. she called me down stairs. Lucky that she was able to rouse me and that I heard her. When I came down stairs, she was sitting in an easy chair and told me she thought she had pneumonia like I had early last spring and when I was sent to the hospital. I got Dr. Clark right away and when he examined her, he told me on the side she was suffering from heart failure and possibly a stroke. We got her to bed right away and she had to lie sort of upright on a hospital type bed so she could breathe. She went into a coma shortly after that and remained in a coma until she passed away about 11 o'clock Sunday morning. Molly Robinson, the nurse said she suffered no pain at all. Grandma always feared she might become an invalid and be a care. Grandma was 82 yrs old last June, which is more years than I will ever see, I believe.

Grandma left an estate of I think about 800 to \$800.00 in bonds, a checking account of possibly \$200.

This was told to be by my mother, Christy Darlene Donnelly Davidson. She was told this by Hulda's sister Freida.

Buford, Hulda and their two boys, Garin and Harold lived on a farm in Arkansas.

Buford was coming home and saw Hulda talking to a neighbor man. Buford meant to scare the man away by shooting down at the man's and Hulda's feet, with a shotgun. Some of the shot from the gun hit Hulda in the foot and crippled it (she had a hard time walking from then on). She was hurt that he shot at her and she didn't forgive him. She wanted to go home to Iowa to live with her sister Freida.

Freida said that Buford loved Hulda very much, but it was out of jealousy that he did what he did. Buford took Hulda and the boys to the train station. He carried Hulda onto the train and put her in her seat. That was the last time that he saw her and his boys.

Hulda went to Iowa to her sister's house (Freida) in Ryan, Iowa. After Hulda's foot healed, she decided to help her father, mother, and younger brother on the farm in Fall City, Washington. That is why Hulda and her sons moved out to Washington. Her older brother, Alfred, and a sister ran the original homestead, in Iowa, where Hulda and her siblings were born.

Hulda kept in close contact with Buford's mother, Emma, all through the years.

So that is why the family disowned Buford. They were ashamed of what he did to Hulda.

Freida, when she came out to visit her sister, Hulda, she would sometimes go to visit Felix Donnelly, who lived in Tacoma, Washington. I don't know how Felix was related. Hulda and her family were not allowed to visit him. The reason may have been because he believed that there was a reason that Buford did what he did.

When Hulda was getting ready to remarry and preparing to get a divorce from Buford, Emma wrote to Hulda telling her that Buford had died.

The information here came from Hulda's sister, Freida. My great-grandmother, Hulda would not talk about Buford and my grandfather doesn't know what happened, he was too young.

My mother believes that it takes two to break up a marriage. Hulda's sister said that Buford shot at the man and Hulda to scare them, and that what happened was an accident.

My mom told me that she feels very deprived not to have known her real grandfather.

Highway police Tuesday said that they will make a search of Buford W. Donnelly's belongings in an effort to discover some motive for his suicide in a cave on the side of Mt. Franklin.

Donnelly's body was found Sunday by hikers. Coroner R. B. Rawlins ruled suicide when a revolver was found near the body.

Highway police estimated that Donnelly had been dead for four months. W. H. O. Johnson, El Paso Machine Co., said Donnelly had worked for him until he disappeared in April.

Peak-Hagedorn attendants said they had received no answer to a telegram they sent to Donnelly's father, Dr. John F. Donnelly, North Lake, Wis.

Think Hunger Led E. P. Man To Kill Self

Body of Machinist Sought in Slaying Found at Bottom of Cave

Belief that Buford W. Donnelly, a machinist, suffered for days from hunger and thirst and finally killed himself to keep from starving to death, was expressed by highway police Monday after his body was found in a cave near the summit of Mt. Franklin.

R. M. Luse, R. M. Fairchild and Marion Clifton, 3310 Pershing, found the body at the bottom of a 15-foot cave.

Highway officers and Peak-Hagedon attendants dragged the body out of the cave after hours of work. It took five hours to bring it down the side of the mountain.

Revolver by Side

A .45 calibre automatic revolver was found by the dead man's side.

W. H. O. Johnson, El Paso Machine Co., identified the body.

Johnson said Donnelly worked for him for several months. He was an excellent machinist and was a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Johnson said. His father, Dr. John F. Donnelly, lives in Wisconsin, Johnson said.

Johnson told Capt. Allan G. Falby, highway officer, that Donnelly disappeared April 27. Johnson said he bought the automatic pistol for Donnelly a few days before he disappeared.

Sought in Murder

Capt. Falby said Juarez police had been seeking Donnelly for questioning since Manuel Flores, 38, was shot to death in Juarez April 21. Donnelly was said to have been a close friend of the woman.

Capt. Falby said Donnelly might have been inspecting the cave when he fell in a hole at the back of it and broke his leg. To keep from starving to death when he could attract no help by cries. He may have shot himself to escape further torture, Falby explained.

Mt. Franklin Prospectors Find Dead Man

Body Of Buford W. Donnelly Found In Cave With Bullet Through Heart.

Prospectors early yesterday morning found the body of an American, identified last night as Buford W. Donnelly, a machinist, in a 15-foot deep cave near the summit of Mount Franklin, about seven miles north of El Paso.

Donnelly's body was pierced near the heart from a large caliber bullet. Near the body was a new automatic pistol, identified by W. H. Orme Johnson, for whom Donnelly worked at the El Paso Machine company's plant, as purchased for Donnelly late last April.

Donnelly has been sought by Juarez police for questioning following the death of Manuela Flores, 38, in Juarez, April 26.

Identifies Body.

Johnson, who last night positively identified the dead man's body, said Donnelly disappeared late on April 27. He was an excellent workman, and was a graduate from the University of Wisconsin, Johnson said. His father, Dr. John F. Donnelly, lives in Wisconsin.

Bert Morris, who investigated the gruesome discovery for the sheriff's office and county highway police, said the condition of the man's body indicates he has been dead at least three months.

Recovery Difficult.

R. M. Luse, and R. M. Fairchild, 3217 Pershing Drive, and Marion Clifton, 3310 Pershing Drive, found the body while prospecting near the mountain top. They returned to El Paso and notified highway patrolmen.

Officers said the cave, leached from soft rock, is in the form of an inverted "L." It extends into the mountain side about nine feet, and then drops to a verticle depth of 15 feet. It has a diameter of seven or eight feet.

It took five hours to take the body from the cave and get it down the mountain side, attendants for Peak-Hagedon, who secured the body, said last night.

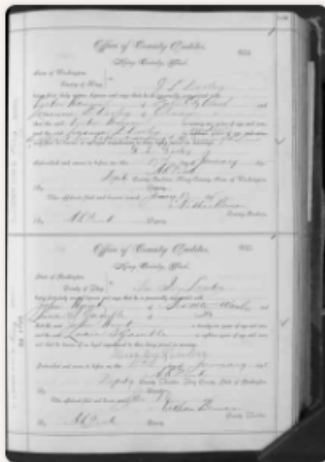

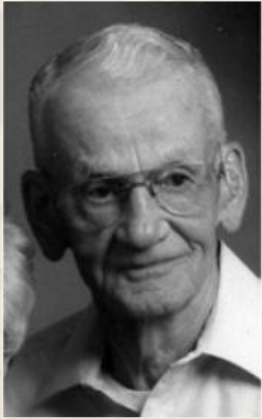

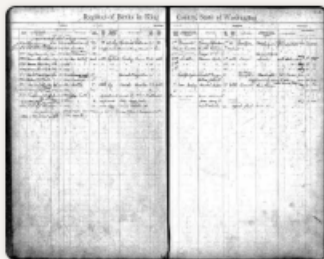

Germain Bulcke — Leader of Longshore Union

Germain Bulcke, a founding member and leader of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union, died Wednesday in Santa Rosa at age 91.

Mr. Bulcke was born in Belgium, and came to work on the San Francisco waterfront in the 1920s.

In 1933, a movement began among longshoremen against the "shape-up" system, under which dockers were required to apply for work each day.

Payoffs and discrimination were rife, and the only organization that claimed to represent the men, the so-called Blue Book union, was considered corrupt.

A tumultuous West Coast maritime strike began in May 1934, and culminated in the "Bloody Thursday" street fighting of July 5, 1934, in which police and strikers battled along the Embarcadero, from Telegraph Hill to Rincon Hill.

At the corner of Steuart and Mission streets, near the longshore strike headquarters, longshoreman Howard Sperry and cook Nick Counderakis-Bordoise were shot to death by police.

When the fatal shots were fired, Mr. Bulcke, a union picket captain, was fixing a flat tire in a garage that then stood at the spot. He recounted the incident many times in later years, in film and television documentary interviews as well as in an oral history he produced under the auspices of the Bancroft Library at the University of California.

In a 1986 interview with Chronicle reporter Rick DelVecchio, Mr. Bulcke recalled that he carried another man wounded in the shooting to safety, then returned to cover the bloodstains on the street with roses.

After the 1934 conflict, which developed into a short general strike in San Francisco, Mr. Bulcke took a prominent role in waterfront labor politics. With the reorganization of the longshoremen's union and foundation of ILWU in 1937, he held a number of posts, rising to a vice presidency of the international.

Mr. Bulcke was long a combative partisan of the left and was often involved in controversy during the West Coast waterfront factional wars of the 1940s and '50s.

He was active in the Harry Bridges Defense Committee and in events protesting the Reichstag Fire Trial held in Germany under Adolf Hitler. He supported the International Workers' Order in the 1939-41 "The Yanks Are Not Com-

ing" campaign against U.S. involvement in World War II.

He was president of the local council of the then-Congress of Industrial Organizations during a battle against the Taft-Hartley Act under President Harry Truman.

He also traveled to the former East Germany as a guest of the authorities there.

In the 1960s, Mr. Bulcke served as a longshore labor arbitrator until his retirement, after which he was active in the ILWU Pensioners' Association.

Mr. Bulcke is survived by his wife, Helen; his son, Ken, of Windsor; daughter, Muriel, of San Jose; and his stepson, Bruce Benner, of Grass Valley.

A memorial service is pending.

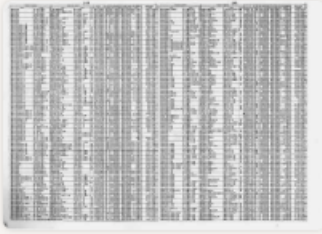

According to the family story on Ancestry.com copied above, one day Buford came home to find his wife Hulda chatting with a male neighbor. Jealous, Buford took a shotgun and shot into the dirt at the feet of the two, to scare the man away. Some of the shot hit Hulda in the foot, crippling her foot. She found it difficult to walk after this. Hulda wanted to go to her sister Frieda's in Ryan IA, so Buford took her & their 2 sons to the train station, carried her onto the train & put her in her seat. He never had contact with her or her 2 sons after that.

After Hulda's foot healed, she decided to move to Fall City, King WA where her parents & younger brother lived. Hulda remained friends with her mother-in-law, Emma Klonus Buford. Buford's family disowned him for what he did to Hulda.

In 1931, as Hulda hoped to remarry & needed to divorce Buford, she heard from his mother Emma that Buford was dead. However, she married Charles Hanson in June 1931 and Buford's body was not found until Aug 1931 – although, since Buford died in Apr 1931, Hulda was a widow at the time of her marriage to Charles. Hulda's relative wrote on Ancestry.com that Hulda would not talk about Buford.

By the 1930 census, dated 17 Apr 1930, Hulda Donnelly, divorced, 35 IA, parents b. Switzerland, lived with her brother William Barfuse (32 IA, parents b. Switzerland, single, farmer on own farm) & her children: Garin Donnelly (12 IA) & Harold Donnelly (11 IA), their father & mother both born IA. They resided in Fall City, King WA.

Buford's body was found 3 or 4 months after his death at the bottom of a 15-foot drop in a cave near the summit of Mount Franklin, 7 miles north of El Paso TX. He had committed suicide with a pistol. Newspaper articles above indicated he had broken his leg & may have shot himself because of his hopeless condition. He was wanted for questioning about the shooting death of Manuela Flores, age 38, in Juarez, Mexico, in Apr 1931, the month Buford disappeared from his job. Buford's Find A Grave record gives a death date of 7 Apr 1931. His employer said he disappeared 27 Apr 1931.

Buford (1891-1931) buried in Concordia Cemetery, El Paso, El Paso TX. TX death record lists him as single, suicide by pistol, in a canyon of the Franklin Mountains 10 miles from El Paso. Buford's F: 150961268

According to Hulda's delayed birth certificate (dated 5 Feb 1941), her birthplace is listed as Hazelgreen township, Ryan, Delaware Co. IA, born 16 Oct 1894, the 6th child of Ulysses Barfuse (34, Switzerland, farmer) & Elizabeth Gruenig (35, Switzerland, housewife). Her birth was attested to by her brother, Alfred Barfuse. "I was living at home at the time of birth of this sister."
