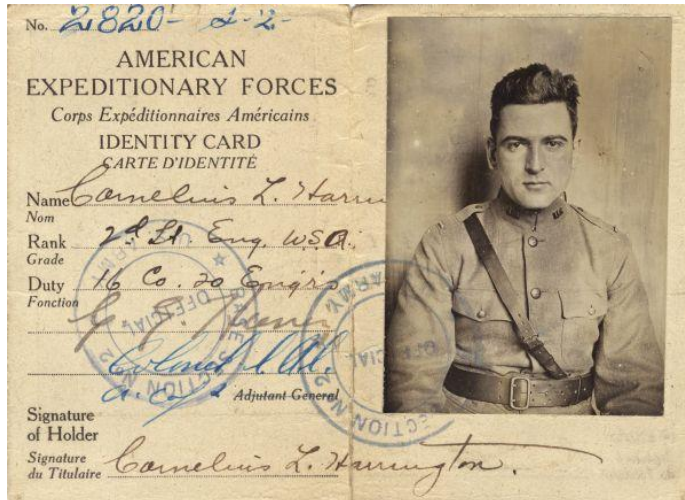

Cornelius L. ("Neal") Harrington, a second lieutenant in the 107th Engineers, becomes the superintendent of Wisconsin's state forests and parks, in a career that spans 1923 to 1958. Harrington Beach State Park (Belgium, Ozaukee Co. Wisconsin), with its mile-long beach on Lake Michigan, is named for him. He is named to the Wisconsin Forestry Hall of Fame in 1992.

Harrington Beach State Park has more than a mile of beach along Lake Michigan. This 715-acre park also features a white cedar and hardwood swamp, old field grasslands with restored wetland ponds and a scenic limestone quarry lake. Camp, sunbathe, picnic, hike, bird watch, fish or practice astronomy at one of the observatory's monthly public viewings.

On hot summer days, the prime attraction of Harrington Beach State Park is the mile of Lake Michigan shoreline. Visitors enjoy the refreshing lake breezes while picnicking on the groves of trees overlooking the lake.

Beautiful views of Lake Michigan are a feature of the point and south picnic areas. These areas and the Puckett's Pond picnic area by the upper parking lot have reservable shelters. There are also sand volleyball courts available in the park.

On display in the point picnic area overlooking Lake Michigan is the anchor of the freighter Niagara that was consumed by fire just off the shore in 1856, killing as many as 169 people (the purser did not have records of the number of passengers). Scuba divers will want to explore the remains of this wooden steamship, located a few hundred yards offshore in about 80 feet of water.

A SERGEANTS EXPERIENCE

Sergeant C. L. Harrington; Wisconsin, in the course of an interview, gives a thrilling account of what actually happened when the Tuscania was struck. He stated:

"I was sitting on the floor on top of my life preserver, in my stateroom on Deck C, about 5:45 p.m. on Tuesday evening. There was a bunch of boys present. We were all talking together, when suddenly there was a dull heavy bump, and the electric light went out. The ship seemed to tremble all over, and there was a sensation as if she were bumping over a rocky bottom. We immediately went out on deck and discovered our ship had been torpedoed on the starboard side. Of course everyone was rushing for lifeboat stations; there was a great amount of excitement, due to a large extent because of the darkness.

I got to my lifeboat with several of the men, and when we got in, the crew began to lower away, but something happened to the tackle, and we were all tipped out from a height of 50 feet. The casualties, I am afraid, are heavy, due chiefly to the fact that the force of the explosion had blown many of the lifeboats to atoms, and in other cases the tackle of the emergency boats got very much tangled, and they could not be properly launched. When I came to the surface after having been thrown from my lifeboat I struck out and caught a rope, which was dangling from the liner. While I was hanging on to this rope, a lifeboat fell from the top deck, into the water a few feet from where I was. I swam over to it and clambered in and began hauling several of my company onboard. The boat was almost full of water but the air chambers kept her floating. In all, we got on board thirteen men, after which we drifted away in the darkness. We began to bail the water out, and rowed for about 3 hours, singing and shouting. We had on board two of the ship's company. They were young lads only in shirts and the cold was intense. After three hours rowing we sighted a patrol boat, which came alongside and landed us at an Irish port."

Note: C. L. Harrington from Wisconsin was a 1st Lieutenant, not a Sergeant; the newspaper article was in error.

Retired Forester Harrington Dies

C. L. Harrington, 74, of 136 Lathrop st., a retired superintendent of the State Conservation Department forest and park division, died after an apparent heart attack Saturday (May 14, 1966) near Wyalusing.



Mr. Harrington had just finished a dedication speech for the John T. Curtis wildlife area when he was stricken at about 2 p.m. He was conveyed to a Prairie du Chien hospital by ambulance.

Well known for his conservation work, Mr. Harrington was a graduate of the University of Michigan and a World War I veteran. He had been a Madison resident since 1914 and retired in 1958.

Survivors include his wife, the former Emily Chisolm, and two sons, John and Richard, Milwaukee.

Harrington Beach State Park is a 715-acre (289 ha) [Wisconsin state park](#)^[3] on the shore of [Lake Michigan](#) in the [Town of Belgium](#). In addition to a mile-long beach, the park contains a white cedar swamp surrounding a 26-acre (11 ha) lake that used to be a stone quarry. The park provides campgrounds, hiking trails, picnic, and bird watch areas.

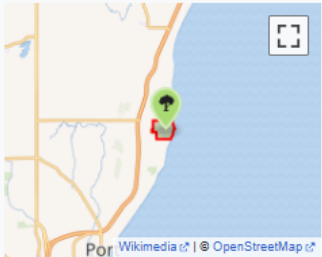

From the 1890s until 1925, a dolomite quarry operated at the on the site of the park. From 1901 until 1925, the Lake Shore Stone Company developed a [company town](#) called [Stonehaven](#) at the site. Most of the workers were immigrants from [Luxembourg](#), the [Austro-Hungarian Empire](#), and [Italy](#). When the quarry closed, some of the residential buildings were moved to the [Village of Belgium](#). The foundations of some of the buildings remain in the state park.^{[4][5]}

In 1968, the [Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources](#) began buying the properties that would become Harrington Beach State Park.^[4] A campground of 73 sites opened in 2009; it was the first new campground at a Wisconsin State Park in over 20 years.^[3] Construction began in 2008 and it was completed in the beginning of September 2009.^[3] It opened with 32 electric sites, 33 non-electric sites, 5 walk-in sites, one kayak site (only accessible by water), one group campsite, and one site for the campground host.^[3] Before the campground was added, the park had up to 120,000 visitors per year.^[3]

Forest Regiment.

A regiment of woodsmen, "lumber-jacks" and skilled mill workers is being organized by the U. S. Forest Service for early operations in France. It will be a part of the American Engineers Reserve Corps which will aid in transportation and other engineering work. The duty of this regiment will be to get out the timber and lumber materials needed by the American armies for railroad, trench, mine, bridge and general construction work, and the unit will be equipped with ten or more portable sawmills. The work will be performed in the fine French forests behind the battle lines but may fall within the danger zone.

The recruiting for this regiment in Wisconsin is under the direction of F. B. Moody, member of the State Conservation Commission. This week a drive is being made in the northern part of the state to bring the Wisconsin quota up to full strength. This regiment offers splendid opportunities for skilled woodsmen and sawmill workers between the ages of 18 and 40. Sawyers, teamsters, swam-pers, skidders, millwrights, axmen, black-smiths and all others needed for the various activities connected with woods operations and the maintenance of portable sawmills and large camps, are wanted.

IRON COUNTY BOYS ON BOARD TUSCANIA SAFE.

**Names of All Three Have Appeared In
the List of Survivors. Neil Har-
rington Sends Cablegram.**

The war was brought close to home last week when it became known that three Iron county young men, Neil Harrington, of Hurley, Oscar Peterson, of Upson, and Arthur Evenson, of Mercer, were on board the ill-fated Tuscania when it was torpedoed and sunk off the coast of Ireland last week Tuesday afternoon. Relatives and friends of the boys were held in suspense for a few days following the disaster until it became definitely known that all three were safe. The names of the boys appeared in the list of survivors announced from Washington and published in the

daily papers. Neil Harrington sent a cablegram to his parents announcing his safe arrival, the message reaching here Wednesday evening, but at first Mr. Harrington was not aware that Neil was on board the Tuscania and understood that the message was to make known his safe arrival in France. Later it was quite evident that the message was sent from some port in Ireland or Scotland. Sunday morning Mr. Harrington received a message from Washington informing him that his son was among the survivors.

Neal Harrington sent a cablegram to his folks on Wednesday of last week stating that he had arrived safely, but Mr. and Mrs. Harrington did not know that he was a passenger on the boat until they had seen his name mentioned in the list sent out from Washington containing the names of all those who were on the boat; they supposed the message came direct from France. They have also received messages from the war department and the adjutant general of the U. S. army stating that Neal was among the survivors. All three boys are members of the forestry division of the 20th engineer corps and they volunteered for this service while at Camp Grant.

Cornelius Harrington, former forest ranger at Trout Lake, rescued from torpedoed Tuscania

The first real taste of the horrors of war to the people of the United States came last Thursday morning when news was flashed throughout the length of the land that the United States troop ship Tuscania with many Wisconsin troops aboard had been torpedoed and sunk off the north coast of Ireland.

The first reports gave the number of men lost as over 250, and it was supposed that some of them were Vilas county boys on their way to the front. However, it is now officially known that only 101 are missing and it is said that the majority of this number comprised the Tuscania's crew.

The only soldier that Vilas county has any claim to is Cornelius Harrington of Hurley. Harrington is well known in this county having up to last year worked for the Conservation Commission at the headquarters camp at Trout lake. According to Peter Christiansen of the forestry force at Trout lake, who was in Eagle River yesterday, Harrington had made the statement that it would be just his luck to be shot up by some boeche the minute he landed at the front, or else he would be torpedoed going across. How true his remarks were is seen by the fact that Harrington was one of the soldiers saved from the sinking Tuscania after the torpedo struck her.

Most of the 2,296 soldiers aboard the ship were from the southern and western part of Wisconsin and northern Michigan.

Another Bad Fire.

Hurley was visited by another destructive fire on last Sunday morning when the livery barn of T. S. Harrington was partially destroyed, causing a property loss of about \$10,000. The fire started from a defective chimney in the office part of the building and had gained considerable headway before it was discovered. Members of the Neil Brennan household were awakened by the fire shortly before 4 o'clock and immediately phoned the alarm to the fire department and also phoned neighbors in the vicinity. Ed Leveck, an employe, was the only person in the barn at the time of the fire; Roy Pearson, another employe, was out with a single rig and when he returned at 4 o'clock he found the entire front of the barn all ablaze. He immediately woke up Leveck and they hustled to the rear of the barn and got out all the horses. The fire department by hard work was able to confine the fire to the front part of the building and thus saved all the hay in the second story of the rear of the building. It was very fortunate that there was practically no wind at the time of the fire as a north or northwest wind would have periled the Burton hotel property and many of the residences in that vicinity. All the property and material in the front part of the building was a total loss, including all of the harnesses, worth several thousand dollars,

cutters, sleighs, hacks and two hearses. Mr. Harrington carried insurance to the amount of \$5,000 on the building and contents, \$3,500 on the building and \$1,500 on the contents. He states that it is unlikely that he will continue in the livery business and will probably dispose of the property as it stands.

EARLY MORNING FIRE AT LIVERY STABLE.

One of Hurley's Old Landmarks Partially Destroyed by Fire Last Sunday Morning.

T. S. Harrington's livery stable, an old and well-established institution, was almost totally destroyed by fire early Sunday morning. The fact that there was no wind and due to good work of the firemen saved the rear portion of the building, on the lower floor of which was the stable and the upper floor used for the storage of hay and feed.

The fire is thought to have started from the chimney in the office in the front part of the building and before it was discovered had gained considerable headway. The only person in the building at the time was Ed. Laveck, an employee, and he was not aware of the fire until awakened by another employee, Roy Pearson, who was returning from a trip about 4 o'clock. They immediately went to the stable and released all the horses so that all the animals were saved. The front part of the building, together with the harnesses, cutters, hacks, etc., was totally destroyed, and had there been a wind blowing at the time surrounding buildings and residences would have been in danger.

The loss is estimated at \$10,000, with insurance on the building and contents of \$5,000. The building was erected many years ago, it being one of the oldest in the city. Mr. Harrington is undecided whether or not he will rebuild at this time.

NEIL HARRINGTON WRITES

Now Is "Somewhere in England." Tells of His Experiences.

The Miner editor is in receipt of the following letter from Neil Harrington, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. S. Harrington, who was on the torpedoed U. S. transport Tuscania. The letter tells in detail his experiences after the transport was torpedoed and of his narrow escape from a watery grave. The letter follows:

Somewhere in England
March 4, 1918

Dear Martin:—

With the advent of the March winds which have been blowing pretty steadily for the past few days, we have a little more leisure time to spend as we are in the barracks more, due to the cold and dampness which these winds seem to bring. At present a dozen or more of us are gathered around a comfortable fire in one of the huts kept by the Church of England. We just returned from a trip to look over a light British flying machine which was forced to land in a nearby field this morning. They are quite numerous around here.

No doubt you have heard all about the sinking of the Tuscania by this time and it is a decided pleasure for me to write that all three of us from Iron County went through the affair safely and without a scratch. It does not follow that we did not have our full share of everything that happened. We were all assigned to the same boat in case of emergency and on the way over we certainly had enough boat drills but on no occasion was a life-boat actually lowered into the water. The boat deck was about 50 feet or so above the water and there were four of us to get into the first boat, it was then to be lowered to the next deck where 20 were to be taken on and then lowered into the water and the balance of a complement of 70 were to come down over the life lines. After the explosion, and we all felt that it was a fatal stroke, we made our way to our respective stations as best we could only to find that the boat on the left of us had been thrown over the winch that was to lower ours. However we jumped into our own as per instructions and cut the lashing and then we swung out from the ship, which had listed heavily to starboard and the lowering began but it was only on one side, the right. The fellows on the left were having trouble to get at the ropes which were under the damaged boat mentioned above. Evenson

from Mercer and Peterson from Upson were in the up end of the boat and I and a few others were in the lower end. When the lower end reached the deck below the fellows there all started to jump for the boat and as that was going on the ropes on the other end began to slip through the blocks, the fellows there lost control of them and instead of the boat being lowered in a horizontal manner it was let down verticle and we were all thrown into the sea. Well, I managed to get a hold of one of the life lines along with a member of the ship's crew and we were pulled through the water for the big boat hadn't stopped as yet. One moment we'd be high in the air, the next plunged into the next wave. We went that way for about 50 feet or so and then as luck would have it, a collapsible life boat slid off the boat deck and landed just a few feet in front of us with a smash and immediately submerged. However the air chambers kept it afloat and the next instant as we were swung above it why the two of us let go and dropped down into the collapsible and at once we knew it would float in good shape even though it was full of water. We cut loose the oars, pulled in as many fellows as we could, yelled and cursed and walked around and finally found ourselves about 100 feet from the ship. A search of the boat located 13 human beings, an old tin pail

and a sauce pan, a lantern, a cask of water and a few other things, and we immediately organized a bailing and rowing detail and started in. At first the water came in our ends in considerable quantities, but we gained on it and by the time we were picked up we did not have over 8 inches of water in the boat. Evenson and Peterson by remarkable luck were in the same boat, as was our bugler, three of the ships crew (two boys) a few others of our company and some others. We sang and yelled and almost froze for about four hours before we sighted the trawler which landed us. It was over 40 miles away from the scene when it received the S. O. S. of the Tuscania and it certainly came along at a lucky hour for us. We were becoming worn out especially the fellows who were inadequately clothed; of course everyone jumped when the boat was hit. Two of the fellows in our boat were in the hospital in bed at the time and one of them didn't even have his shoes or socks on. As we were drifting on the ocean we finally got the lantern I mentioned lit, after an hours work or so and that is how the trawler located us. On boarding the trawler we were almost all killed. The tide and waves were strong at the time and as the two boats came together they began to smash and we could not hold them apart; of course the small boat got the worst of the encounter each time. In the melee

while trying to stand up with the light so the trawler's crew could see the outline of boat I was thrown overboard, but I managed with the assistance of the others to get in again and the next instant as a wave swept us high beside the trawler the balance of us leaped for the rail, caught it and were pulled safely aboard.

It was some excitement. Things were moving about as rapidly those four hours as they ever have in my life before. It was a question on two occasions that night as to whether Davy Jones or myself would win. We picked up some other boats shortly afterwards, one with 70 men aboard, another with three, although they were both of the same size. Then we made for Larne, Ireland, where we were landed the next morning. Everything in the town was there to receive us and we were given warm drinks and clothing and good beds, and during our short stay there we were treated in such a manner that everyone was unanimous

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There is no snow here or anything like that. The wind is raw, but it isn't cold by any means. No one has a furnace nor even a large coal stove in their homes here. All burn coal. It would be interesting to some in our particular neck of the woods to see the people along the hedges in this country picking up twigs and little sticks for kindling. Each morning we have to have a man from each hut go to the coal and wood yard for a bushel of coal and a pound of wood, the latter consisting of a bunch of small branches. We never think of breaking up a box. They all go back just as the milk bottles do in Hurley. Of course everything is intensively worked around here. The ground between barracks and around them is all tilled. You'll note a contrast in the way of handling the ground at Camp Grant. However there is lots of both wood and coal in America to what there is here. But there's a little object lesson in all these things.

It would be very interesting now to get some mail from the states. We've had none since leaving. We are all hoping that no calamity has struck Iron county and that you are all well and happy. There's no telling how long we will be located here. We are pretty well equipped again however. Company D was pretty hard hit in the wreck; about 20 per cent of the company being dead or missing.

Gov. Philipp last week named Lieut. Cornelius L. Harrington, a well known Hurley young man, to succeed the late F. B. Moody as a member of the state conservation commission. Lieut. Harrington is on his way home from army service in France on the vessel Santa Paula and was expected to arrive in New York on May 27th. He holds a commission in the Sixteenth company, Twentieth engineers, a forestry organization that went overseas early in the war. He left Hurley early in the fall of 1917 with one of the first draft contingents from Iron county and was on the transport Tuscania when it was torpedoed off the Irish coast and barely escaped with his life, and like many others, lost all traveling and service equipment.

Until the forestry board was consolidated in 1915 with the conservation commission, Lieut. Harrington was assistant to the state forester. Previously he had been employed as field man. Since the creation of the new conservation commission he has been an assistant forester, generally assigned to field work in the forest reserve in the northern part of the state. He is a graduate of the school of forestry of the University of Michigan and is said to be the only technically trained forester at present in the state and the only man now with the commission qualified to succeed Mr. Moody. The position pays a salary of \$3,500 a year and his appointment will hold until Feb., 1923.

Anniversary of World War Disaster

Three Iron County Men Among Survivors when Tuscania Was Torpedoed off Irish Coast.

Next Tuesday, Feb. 5, will mark the 17th anniversary of the sinking of the troopship Tuscania off the coast of Ireland, a disaster incident to the World war that cost the lives of 281 American soldiers. Memorial services in honor of the soldiers and sailors who were drowned will be held in various sections of the country. In other instances survivors will gather and mark the anniversary of their escape from a watery grave.

The day, no doubt, will be an occasion for pause and reminiscences for three Iron county men who escaped the disaster. Neil Harrington, Hurley, now superintendent of parks for the Wisconsin conservation commission and residing at Madison, Oscar Peterson, Upson, and Arthur Evenson, Mercer, were among the

more than three thousand officers and soldiers on board the Tuscania as it neared the Irish coast on that fatal February morning. It was not known to relatives that the three Iron county boys were on the troopship until their names appeared among the names of the survivors in the official government list. However, Neil sent a cablegram to his father, C. L. Harrington, then a resident of Hurley, announcing his safe arrival, which was received here Wednesday evening, but at first Mr. Harrington thought that the message intended to appraise him of his son's safe arrival in France, and not until a few days later did he learn that the cablegram was sent from Ireland immediately after Neil landed there.

Local Man Recalls Sinking of Tuscania

JUST 12 years ago next Wednesday the Tuscania, transport ship carrying more than 2,000 American soldiers overseas, was torpedoed and sank in the Atlantic ocean.

That news, chronicled in startling headlines in the newspapers, brought the first actual realization to Wisconsin that her own men were in the thick of the "war to end war."

The memory of the tremendous crash interrupting a perfect sunset; of a ship's deck seeming to "hunch" up; of the clear, sea-washed air growing dusty is still vivid to C. L. Harrington.

Mr. Harrington is now superintendent of forests and parks of Wisconsin's conservation commission. He is also the only man in Madison, so far as is known, who actually went through that winter night adventure. About 21 Baraboo men were on board also.

2,300 on Ship

There were 2,300 men on the sinking ship. In their van, near enough so they could see, was the Baltic, another huge ship bearing American troops, going on steadily and unheedingly. No one on that large ship expected to stop to help the men on the torpedoed ship. No one on the doomed ship expected help. Delay might have meant two ships going down instead of one.

If it had not been for the "mosquito fleet," the destroyers, many of the 2,000 men who escaped might have died within sight of land, where the torpedoing occurred.

Mr. Harrington, who spent his first year of college study at the University of Wisconsin, and who finished his study of forestry at the University of Michigan, was living in northern Wisconsin, and was a member of Co. D, Sixth battalion, 20th Engineers, when the troop was ordered over there.

His company, of which he was a first sergeant, later a first lieutenant, started with others at New York, went to Halifax, where it joined the convoy. Almost one quarter of its number died on the coast of Scotland.

Twelve large boats, including the Baltic, were loaded with troops, and others consisting of freighters made up the convoy. Later they were joined by the "mosquito fleet."

Except for the torpedoing, the trip across was uneventful, except for a snow storm and several occasions in the night when the ship went over a wave with an unexpected jar that sent a hush of suspense and apprehension over untried men awakened from restless sleep.

Ten days and nights went by without a sign of war—the sea pounding in all its wintry vehemence—and the men had lost their tension of continuous suspense. They were landing at Liverpool in the morning, and all day long they sailed between the Irish and Scottish coasts.

The waves had calmed into settled swells which looked almost glassy—but which proved powerful and strong enough to small boats.

The sun was sinking, streaking the western horizon with a line of light, when suddenly a tremendous explosion seemed to heave up the deck of the ship. The torpedo struck it amidship, and the ship began sinking.

All about it the convoy took its uninterrupted course. The ships which looked like freighters went steadily on. The Baltic leading the Tuscania possibly rushed her engines a bit, hurrying out of the danger zone.

Knew What to Do

Men on the Tuscania needed to be told nothing about what to do. Each had been given his orders as to where to be sent and what to do. All of them didn't do exactly what they had been told, but many of those who did were the men who lost their lives.

Mr. Harrington had thought of the possibility of a shipwreck as well as every other man on board.

"Men were getting in each other's way in their hurry to get to their proper stations," he said. Many of them were wearing overcoats over their underwear. I dashed up to the officers' deck, feeling the ship going down by inches.

"The huge life boats were swung from the davits, the f-shaped supports, and the little group on that deck started getting down the first boat. We were to take on 20 passengers from the low-

er deck, and when we reached the water line we were to allow more men to come in to total 84 passengers," he said.

"The ship was listing to the right, and we were on the lower side. As a result, the life boat hung at an angle from the side of the boat, while from the higher side the boat wouldn't fall away, but kept striking the side of the boat."

The men lowering boats from the higher side had to shove them away from the side of the ship with their oars, but the life boats would spill their load of men before they reached the water.

Harrington's boat had been released at only one end. While passengers were being taken on from the lower deck the men on the officers' deck lost their entire grip on the other end, and the boat fell, dangling from one end in a vertical position, spilling every man into the water.

Caught Dangling Rope

"I caught hold of a rope in some way," Harrington says. "Another man had caught it a bit below me, and together we hung on. I tried to climb up, but I hadn't the strength. The ship seemed to be going, and suddenly, a small boat, floated by air containers at the sides, appeared from out of the darkness.

"I kept right on holding my rope until the Englishman with me told me to fall into the boat. That's what I did. We helped others into the little boat and we got about 14 in all together," he went on.

"We had an oar, a lantern that we managed to light, and we kept on going away from the sinking ship. Life boats kept spilling, and many of those

which got away safely were pounded to pieces on the Scottish coast.

"The torpedo got us while we were going between Scotland and Ireland. On the Scottish coast were two promontories, called by the Scots the Mull of Oa and the Mull of Cantyre. The life boats which drifted away from the ship eventually were dashed to pieces on those two mulls, and most of the 200 who lost their lives died there."

Meanwhile the majority of men remained on the decks of the sinking *Tuscania* without boats to embark in. The destroyers moved up as close as possible to its side, and hundreds of soldiers were removed "without even getting their feet wet."

The little destroyers, and there is a tone of almost affection in the way Mr. Harrison speaks of them, took off men until their decks were crowded. Those men reached Liverpool safely.

At 10 that night, four hours and 15 minutes after they had been torpedoed, the life boat in which Sergt. Harrington and his companions had been drifting was picked up by a trawler, the *Elf King*, and brought to the Irish town of Larne. The trawler had gotten the SOS 45 miles away, and reached the scene in a few hours.

They remained until the company could be reorganized, in the town of Larne, and clothed in British uniforms and clothing.

The Americans received the most wholehearted assistance from the villagers, and in the Scottish village of Isla, where the men who died were buried, the villagers saw to the matter of proper burial, and gave relatives in America full co-operation in identifying the victims.

In the Madison papers rumors of who might have been on the boat spread because of the lack of definite information, for days after the event.

Assemblyman H. H. Peavey, father of Lynn Peavey of The Capital Times staff, was reported among those on the ship, but because of the fact that he and several members of his company became ill several days before the ship set out, their departure was delayed to five days later.

Forestry Work Overlooked in Game Furore

By JOHN WYNGAARD.

MADISON.—Two of the veteran conservation workers in the state government are probably little known to the Wisconsin public, although that public includes many thousands of persons who call themselves "conservationists."

They are Fred G. Wilson and Cornelius L. Harrington, both of whom have been engaged in the state forestry program for about 35 years, having originally entered state service when that Wisconsin forestry pioneer and leader, E. M. Griffith, was state forester.

It is a peculiarity of the phenomenon that is called the "conservation movement" in Wisconsin that relatively little public attention is given to the basic forestry program of the state as against the extremely popular but largely incidental programs of fish and game propagation, stocking and management.

Perhaps Wilson and Harrington, both of whom have grown gray in the service of state forestry, sometimes smile a philosophical smile when they contemplate the wrangling and the intense public discussion about deer season, herring net regulations, pheasant planting, and trout bag limits, and the routine interest in the profoundly more important phases of their own work of forests and soils management and conservation.

But undoubtedly they know the reasons, and are content.

But it will be a long time, in generations, before that land will be sending saw-logs to the lumber mills. In some instances there is a crop today, but it is incidental and marginal, pulp sticks, etc. Their real end will not be realized until long after their own careers have been concluded.

Harrington and Wilson, and the dozens of rangers and foresters who work under their direction, will be succeeded by others, and still others, who will see the fruition of their work. Consequently, and only a shade less than Griffith who inspired them as young men, they are pioneers.

For game management is a program of the moment. The trout that is stocked in the spring, is caught that summer, or the next summer.

The forests that are planted today may not be harvested for 50, 75 or 100 years.

Work For Tomorrow.

The forester thinks not of immediate ends, except incidentally. He knows of course that a growing forest helps fishing and hunting, contributes recreational values to the land, beautifies the landscape.

But basically he is working for posterity. The fruits of his labor will be harvested by his grandchildren and yours.

Thus Harrington, state superintendent of forests and parks, and Wilson, superintendent of cooperative forestry, have been plugging along for all of their adult lives in a program which even today has scarcely begun—considering its ultimate goals and possibilities.

They have made, it is true, a definite beginning in the development of state forest preserves—the kettle moraine in eastern Wisconsin, the Flambeau in northwestern Wisconsin are among the notable examples.

During the years of the locust in the northland in the early 1930's, when counties sometimes had more wasteland tax delinquent than productive land on the tax rolls, they promoted a cooperative forestry program which today claims 2,000,000 acres of growing forest under the forest crop tax law.

Neil Harrington, Forest Superintendent, Is Retiring

The following story about Cornelius (Neil) L. Harrington, who was born and reared in Hurley, who is retiring after 45 years of service in the Wisconsin Conservation Department, is by Willard R. Smith, special writer for the Milwaukee Journal.

When Cornelius L. Harrington was a boy working in his father's livery stable and attending high school in Hurley, he observed that most of the men of means in his community were connected with either the lumber or mining industries. Consequently, he decided to study forestry and entered the University of Wisconsin for that purpose in 1909.

He didn't get rich but the state of Wisconsin is much richer in parks, state forests and forest protection and development today as the result of his efforts.

He Is Being Retired

"Neil" Harrington, 66, is being retired as superintendent of forests and parks in the state conservation department July 1. He has held the post since 1923.

Harrington started in the state forestry service in 1910. He spent his summer vacations from forestry school for three years as a laborer on the first state forest reserves in Vilas and Oneida counties. The work included fire fighting, lookout duty, collecting pine cones, nursery activity, burning brush, building roads and fire lanes and logging.

When he graduated from the University of Michigan with a degree in forestry in 1913, he took a civil service examination for forestry assistant and received a permanent appointment.

manent appointment.

Parks Are His Monument

Wisconsin had six state parks in 1919. Today there are 32 scenic-recreational, roadside and historic-memorial state parks, totaling about 18,000 acres. There were no state

forests then. Now there are seven, numbering nearly 275,000 acres, that also furnish recreational facilities for the public.

These developments stand as a monument to the man who has given 45 years of leadership to such achievements. His monuments are measured in millions if the trees turned out by state nurseries under his direction are counted.

When he was placed in charge of the first Trout Lake nursery in 1916 its output was listed in thousands. This year the state nurseries are expected to produce nearly 70 million trees for planting. Their total output over the years is estimated at nearly 500 million, a figure which will grow rapidly in the next few years if the present rate of production is continued.

Proud of Protection

Harrington himself finds greatest satisfaction in having developed the basic forest protection system, responsible for the protection of 16 million acres of forest from uncontrolled fires. He considers his spadework—and forest fires called for a lot of spadework—in this field his most valuable contribution.

This protection system now is under trained forest rangers with organized districts. Airplanes, trucks, tractors, fire plows, pumper trailers and other mechanized equipment are used in place of old hand methods of fire suppression.

In his first years of full time work with state forestry, Harrington conducted farm wood lot surveys in Vernon, Crawford, Trempealeau, LaCrosse, Jackson, Richland, Barron, Polk, Washburn, Ashland and Bayfield counties, traversing every town in them—mostly on foot.

Torpedoed on Tuscania
He entered the army in 1917, sur-

vived the torpedoing of the troopship *Tuscania* in the Irish sea, and served with Co. D, 6th battalion, 20th engineers. This outfit, equipped with saws and axes rather than guns, engaged in logging and saw-mill operations in the pine forests of France. Harrington was a first sergeant and later lieutenant of the unit.

While still overseas, he was named to the state's three man, full time conservation commission by Gov. Philipp. He was the forestry representative on the commission, which also had representatives for fish, game and for business serving on it. When the 1923 legislature changed to a six man, part time commission, Harrington was placed in charge of parks and forests. He has served in that field ever since.

The list of accomplishments in this post, in addition to expansion of the state park and state forest programs and development of the forest protection service, is a long one. It includes directing a successful campaign to amend the state constitution to provide for a state tax for reforestation, and for a specialized program for taxation of forest lands.

"The most persuasive man I ever knew" is the characterization given him by his younger brother, John T. Harrington, Madison attorney. No doubt there is a strong link between his accomplishments and this persuasiveness.

persuasiveness.

Brother John recognized this trait early and tried without success to get Neil to leave the conservation department and develop this ability to the fullest by joining him in law school in 1924.

"He would have been better off personally today if he had, but maybe the state is a lot better off because he didn't," John acknowledged.

Neil Harrington is not rich. He and Mrs. Harrington, who was a coed from Ironwood, Mich., when they first met, have a comfortable home in Madison.

Half Century of Service

They have traveled widely, visiting mostly state and national parks and are now on vacation in Hawaii. They have two sons, Timothy, graduate of Harvard law school, now practicing in Milwaukee, and Richard, a graduate of the University of Wisconsin commerce school, with the Gaylord Corp. in Racine.

But Harrington has rich memories of nearly half a century of service to Wisconsin parks and forests, and millions of monuments—if you count the trees.

Harrington to Quit as Head of State Forests

Special to the Freeman

MADISON — One of the best loved and most important figures in the Wisconsin state government is going to pick up his hat and coat for the last time next June 30, and retire upon the slender benefits of the state government pension fund.

Cornelius L. Harrington, known throughout the state as "Neil," will give up command of the state forest and parks program which to a considerable degree is a monument to his own dedicated service to the state over a period of nearly half a century.

It is difficult sometimes to appreciate the swift race of time. This man, now 66, is as vigorous and active today as when this reporter first grew to know and respect him, at the prime of his life more than two decades ago.

It was said recently that Harrington has the kind of personality and ability that would probably have brought him a financial fortune — had he chosen to enter the competitive business or professional world rather than public forestry after he left school. Yet riches cannot always be measured in bank entries. Harrington in fact is one of the richest men I know and ought to be among the most contented.

CAREER

By any civilized test, he has had a successful, productive, distinguished life.

One of the great stories in Wisconsin during the last

brief 40 years has been the emergence of the conservation idea — and its most brilliant manifestation has been in the forestry program.

Far-sighted men early in the century dreamed of repairing the ravages to millions of acres of the Wisconsin forest country that had been cut over in earlier times, by men whose ethical concepts were those of their own age and who cannot fairly be judged by the rules conceived by their posterity. Harrington was one of the farsighted.

It was his fortune to become one of the leaders of these, and a prime force in the conservation program staff during almost all of his professional career. The campaign was not easy. The conservation idea today is accepted almost without thinking by the body politic. Rarely is there even a question raised, for example, over a generous rate of taxation paid by the people for the financing of what is one of the best forestry enterprises by any state. But in the earlier years the effort was primitive, public response was negative or non-existent and the goals seemed dreary ages removed from realization.

THE SATISFACTION

Anyone with any appreciation of the primitive appeals of forest conservation can imagine the satisfaction felt by Harrington and some of his colleagues recently retired when they visit a state forest they created earlier in their lives.

Forestry is concerned not with years, but with generations. The forester must be a dreamer. He is creating not for his own time, but for the remote future. Yet in a span of 50 years man's curative efforts on the forest land can be seen — and it is a rich reward to these Wisconsin pioneers to visit a state plantation today that was only a gleam in their eager-

ly ambitious eyes 45 or more years ago.

There have been some cruel disappointments along the way for Harrington, in spite of his distinguished life. Only a few years ago he had hoped to become head of all the state forestry services. He would have been chosen, inevitably and naturally and with public acclaim — save for a cowardly assault upon him by a self-nominated guardian of the conservation idea who was in short pants when Harrington was making Wisconsin history. It was characteristic of him, however, that he smiled through the ugly episode with a tolerance achieved out of a long and useful life.

Ex-Conservation Foresters Given Service Awards

Awards for distinguished service to the state of Wisconsin have been presented to two retired Conservation Department foresters who were instrumental in establishing policies that have guided forestry and park activities in the state during the past 50 years.

They are Fred G. Wilson, 5403 Tonyawatha trail, who retired in 1952 as superintendent of cooperative forestry after 41 years of service, and C. L. (Neal) Harrington, 136 Lathrop st., who retired in 1958 as superintendent of forests and parks after 48 years of service.

Wisconsin's chief forester, John A. Beale, 441 Caromar dr., was named vice-president of the association. Francis H. Raymond, Sacramento, Calif., is president.

Park Creation Given Priority

MILWAUKEE (AP) — The State Conservation Commission has given top priority to creation of a 637-acre state park on the Lake Michigan shore about six miles north of Port Washington.

The commission endorsed the project 6-0 Monday despite protests from some Ozaukee County residents, and approved a \$53,760,000 budget for the 1967-69 biennium — about 7.6 per cent greater than the current budget.

At a hearing preceding the commission meeting, the proposed Harrington Beach Park was opposed by persons who called the project a waste of taxpayers' money, and said it would be only 11 miles south of another state-operated lakeshore facility.

The Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission and the conservation commission's recreational advisory board endorsed the park.

Named after the late C. L. Harrington, former chief of the state's Forest and Parks Division, the park would have a mile of sandy beach and a 23-acre quarry lake for swimming and fishing.

The park land's purchase price has been estimated at \$750,000.

The commission authorized immediate action for the purchase of about 650 acres of land in Ozaukee County, six miles north of Port Washington, including a generous slice of Lake Michigan shore-line, for what will be known as Harrington State Park.

The late C. L. Harrington, who died last summer, was a half century employe of the Conservation Department and has been called the father of the state park system. The Lake Michigan shoreland tract has been described as the last lake shore-line south of Manitowoc suitable and available for development as a park to meet the recreational demands of a Southeastern Wisconsin population triangle which is expected to add 1,000,000 inhabitants in the next 25 years. The land will cost nearly a million dollars. Development costs have not yet been estimated.

State Approves Ozaukee State Park

MILWAUKEE (Special) — Despite strong protests from area residents, the State Conservation Commission gave unanimous approval here Monday to a 637-acre state park in northern Ozaukee County.

By a vote of 6-0 the commission gave top priority to the park which will be located immediately east of Lake Church along the Lake Michigan shore; the site is at the far end of County Trunk D about two miles east of Belgium and about seven miles northeast of Port Washington.

The park, which is to be named Harrington Beach State Park in memory of the late C. L. Harrington, former conservation commissioner and long-time chief of the forest and parks division, will include a mile of sandy beach and a 23-acre lake — a former quarry.

A. N. Ansay, Belgium, a member of the Ozaukee County Board and Park Commission, was one of those opposing the park during the public hearing.

He called it "a waste of taxpayers money." He pointed out that it would be only 11 miles south of another state-owned lake shore area including Terry Andrae and Kohler parks.

Other objections were based on greater traffic, law enforce-

ment needs and loss of a considerable tax base in the Town of Belgium.

Support for the park was given by the Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission, the Conservation Commission's recreational advisory committee and some area citizens.

Estimated purchase price of the park area is \$750,000. The land is now owned by a number of persons, but the greatest share of it is owned by A. E. Nelson of Chicago.

Preliminary timetables for improvement of the park gave top priority to laying out of

roads and paths and about 20 years for complete development of the area which has been called "the best remaining park site in a seven-county region which will contain 3 million persons by 1990."

In other action Monday the commission:

- Approved an agreement with Door County's zoning committee for development of a park on the east shore of the county, to be known as the Whitefish Bay Dunes state park. The plan, if approved by the county board, calls for designation of the dunes as a state scientific area, and a minimum of 10 years delay in establishment of camping and beach facilities on the land.

- Authorized department personnel to begin negotiations for land for a new state park along the Willow River near Hudson.

- Ordered a detailed plan drawn for establishment of a recreational area and lake on Turtle Creek in Rock County.

- Agreed to write the attorney's office, expressing dissatisfaction with delays in the eviction of cottage owners in Devils Lake State Park, and to request appointment of outside counsel by the governor if "positive action" is not begun within 10 days.

Harrington Likely to be Busiest Park

**637 Acres of Beach
Probably Will be
Costliest Tract**

MADISON — The new Harrington Beach State Park on the shore of Lake Michigan between Sheboygan and Port Washington will probably become one of the most heavily used in the state park system and is likely also to be one of the most costly.

Officials have explained that the acquisition of the 637-acre tract, including a mile of sand beach of 100 to 200 feet in width, is based on the inevitability of higher recreational opportunity demands in the growing southeastern triangle of Wisconsin and the fact that suitable Lake Michigan shoreland is otherwise unavailable between Manitowoc and the southern Wisconsin boundary.

Purchase or condemnation of the land involved is likely to approach \$1 million in cost and may take several years. Ultimate development expenditures may equal that amount. State and federal financing will be involved. Eligibility of the project for a federal grant is virtually assured because of the urging of the National Park Service as far back as 1958 for public ownership of the Ozaukee County section locally known as Quarry Lake.

Abandoned Quarry

The 23-acre lake within the designated park zone was formed by an abandoned limestone quarry. It is deep, and is stocked with bass and panfish. The lake can be adapted for public swimming use.

The park has had the strong backing of the Southeastern Wisconsin Planning Commission, many other local groups and private citizens, but also encountered some opposition from neighboring residents and local rural governments officials

concerned with potential traffic and law enforcement problems resulting from the attraction of park visitors, and the erosion of the local government tax roll. But state conservation department officials reply that commercial income in the neighborhood generated by park visitors easily overcomes the loss of local revenue through the removal of park lands from taxable property values.

The park will be named in the memory of the late C. L. Harrington, one of the founding officials of the conservation commission, who was head of state parks service for many years until his death last summer.

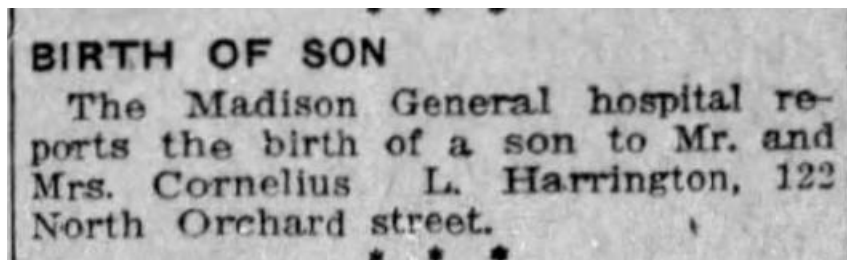

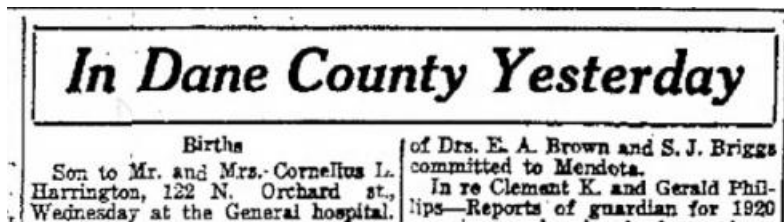

"Si" Walworth Killed.

"Si" Walworth, proprietor of the road house recently constructed north of town, was killed Monday night about ten o'clock, while driving across the C. & N. W. tracks near the depot by a south bound freight. Walworth and Dan Hanley, driver for T. S. Harrington, were in the rig and they attempted to drive across the tracks while the freight was switching back and forth. The horse took fright it is thought from the head light on the street car which was standing on the Marble Hall corner at the time and the driver lost control of the horse. The rig was struck by a gondola just as the horse had safely passed the rails and was dragged for about sixty feet, with both Hanley and Walworth in it. Walworth was cut up pretty badly, though he did not go under the wheels. His left hand was badly smashed, one of his legs broken in three places and the top of his head badly scalped. He was taken to the Ironwood hospital as soon as possible, but only survived a few hours. Hanley escaped with only a few bruises, and he escaped serious injury probably owing to the fact that he was on the side of the buggy which was struck by the car and when it overturned would be near the top of the car, while Walworth was being dragged underneath near the rails and ties.

Walworth was well known in Ashland, having kept a saloon there for a number of years and his body was shipped there Tuesday. He leaves a wife and adopted child. He was the son of a well-to-do Stevens Point lumberman and his body was shipped there from Ashland for burial.

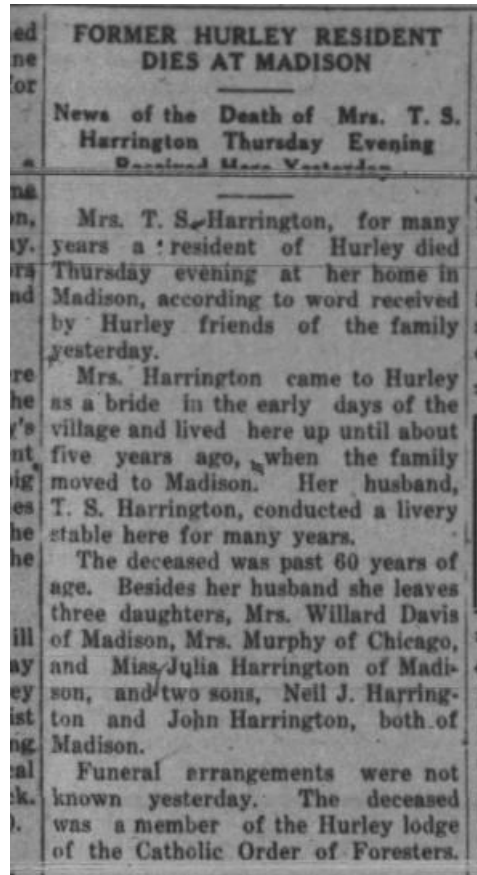

L. B. Murphy To Retire at U. of Illinois

Prof. Lawrence B. Murphy, a former staff member of The Capital Times and a native of Madison, will retire from the University of Illinois journalism faculty on June 15.

Murphy was graduated from the University of Wisconsin with a bachelor's degree in journalism in 1921. He began his newspaper career in 1914, and worked for the State Journal, the Madison Democrat, and The Capital Times. He then joined the staff of the Watertown Daily Times.

* * *

After studying at Wisconsin, he went to the University of North Dakota, where he received his master's degree in journalism and where he served as head of the Department of Journalism from 1921 to 1924.

He joined the University of Illinois faculty in 1924, was head of the journalism division of the English Department there from 1925 to 1927, acting director of the School of Journalism from 1927 to 1929, and became its director in 1929.

Prof. Murphy was a founder and early editor of the Journalism Quarterly and also edited the "Quill," magazine of Sigma Delta Chi, journalism fraternity.

He is a former president of the American Association of Teachers of Journalism, now known as the Association for Education in Journalism; is past president, American Association of Schools and Departments of Journalism, and was chairman of the National Council on Education for Journalism from 1935 to 1940.

The University of Illinois chapter of Kappa Tau Alpha, national scholastic journalism honorary society, has been named in honor of Prof. Murphy, an organizer and first national president of the society.

Prof. Murphy married the former Alice Harrington of Madison.

Veteran Dean Of Writing Dead at 74

URBANA, Ill. (UPI) — Prof. Lawrence W. Murphy, first director of the school of journalism at the University of Illinois, died today at Carle Hospital in Urbana. He was 74.

Murphy, who had been ill for a month, was active in journalism education at Illinois and in several national journalism organizations for four decades. He retired as head of the university's journalism department in 1964.

Murphy was born Oct. 18, 1895, in Madison, Wis. He began his journalism career in 1914 on the Wisconsin State Journal at Madison. He also worked for the Madison Democrat and the Capital Times in Madison and for the Watertown (Wis.) Daily Times.

Murphy was a correspondent for the Milwaukee Journal, Chicago Tribune, Fargo (N.D.) Forum, and United Press.

Murphy earned degrees from the University of Wisconsin and the University of North Dakota. He received an honorary doctorate in 1933 from Marquette University in Milwaukee.

MURPHY DIES; 1st HEAD OF U. I. JOURNALISM

Active in Education for Four Decades

Urbana, Ill., Nov. 25 [Special]—Prof. Lawrence W. Murphy, 74, first director of the University of Illinois school of journalism, died in Carle hospital here today. He had been seriously ill for a month.

Prof. Murphy had been active in journalism education at the U. of I. and nationally for more than four decades. He con-

tinued to live in Champaign after his retirement in 1964.

He was born in Madison, Wis., Oct. 18 1895, and began his journalism career in 1914 on the Wisconsin State Journal. He was an army officer in World War I, earned degrees from the University of Wisconsin in 1921 and from the University of North Dakota in 1923. He received an honorary doctorate from Marquette university in 1933.

Went to U. I. in 1925

In 1921 Murphy became head of the journalism department at the University of North Dakota. In 1925 he came to the U. of I. to head journalism teaching in the English department. He became director in 1927 on establishment of the journalism school, now the college of communications.

Murphy was an organizer and the first national president of Kappa Tau Alpha, national scholarship honor society in journalism. In 1931 he was president of the American Association of Teachers of Journalism, now the Association for Education of Journalism.

Editor of Quarterly

He was a founder and early editor of the Journalism Quarterly and at one time edited the Quill, magazine of Sigma Delta Chi, national professional journalism society.

He is survived by his widow, the former Alice Harrington of Madison, whom he married in 1931; a son, Lawrence Jr.; a brother; and three sisters.

Funeral services will be held at St. Raphael cathedral in Madison. Burial will be in Resurrection cemetery, Madison.

Details regarding the funeral arrangements were not disclosed.

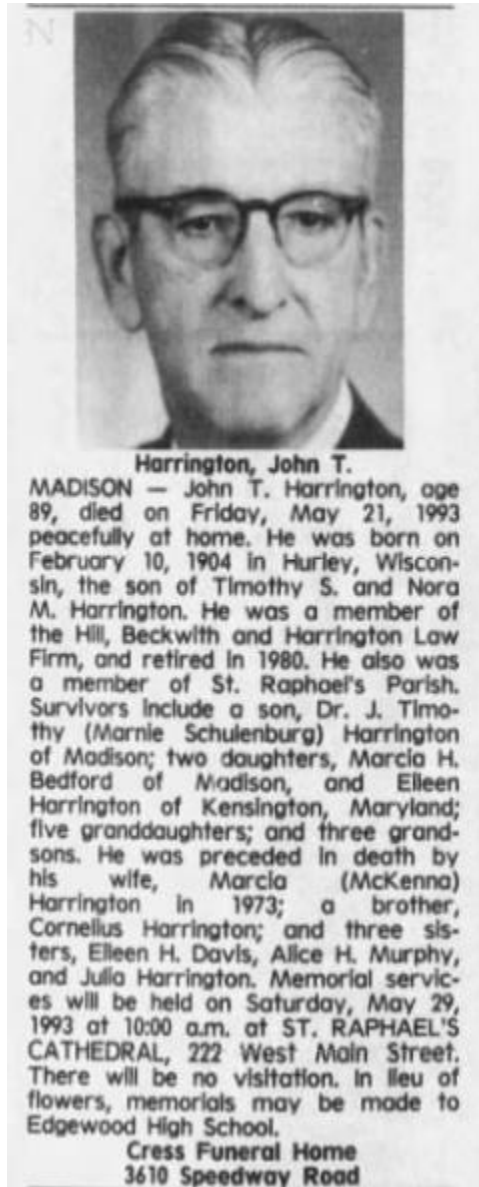
