Washington, Feb. 8.—Seventeen men from Virginia were passengers on the transport Tuscania, which was sunk by a German submarine. Up to an early hour this morning the names of only twenty of the survivors had been received by the war department out of about two thousand who have been rescued. The names of none of the Virginians appears among the first twenty survivors. The Virginians on the ill-fated transport were: Harvey Holland, Wakefield, private, 213th Aero squadron; Frank P. CULPEPER COUNTY BOYS ON TORPEDOED SHIP

Of Three Who Were On Board, Two
Are Known To Have Been
Rescued.

On board the British transport, Tuscania, which carried more than 2,000 Americans, en route for the battle front in Europe, which was torpedoed and sunk off the North coast of Ireland on February 5th., were three men from Culpeper county. They were:

R. M. Willis, son of E. O. Willis, of Lignum.

Howe D. Willis, son of J. S. Willis, of Rapidan.

Winston A. Hartsook, son of G. S. Hartsook, of Rapidan.

Word has been received in Culpeper that both of the Willis boys were among the rescued. At this time (Wednesday) no news has been received concerning Hartsook—either whether he was rescued or lost.

Later. It was learned last night, through advices from Washington, that the body of young Hartsook was found among those who were drowned, and that his remains had been interred in Scotland. Thus, the great war has claimed its first victim from Culpeper.

TUSCANIA'S DEAD

W. A. Hartsook, of Rapidan, Among
The Number.

The War Department began receiving Friday night the first official list of American soldiers who lost their lives on the transport Tuscania, sunk by a German submarine off the Irish coast.

Up to a late hours only 82 names had been received.

In this list of names there was only one Virginian, Winston A. Hartsook, of Rapidan.

Of the 2,179 officers and soldiers on board the Tuscania when she set sail for France, the War Department has received to date the names of only 1,894 who escaped death, including the 21 who were taken off the ship sick at Halifax on the way over. This leaves 264 still be accounted for, although the War Department has nothing official to show that the list of dead will be larger than its original estimate of 113.

Armistice Day Is Fittingly Observed

Large Local Parade In Which Six Hundred School Children Take Part

Armistice Day, November 11th., was more generally observed in Culpeper this year than ever before and the program held under the auspices of Culpeper Post No. 44, American Legion, was participated in by greater numbers and received more attention than ever.

Legionnaire W. L. Roy was named chairman of the Committee on arrangements for the day by the Legion at a meeting held the week previous and an extensive though brief program was prepared and carried out.

The exercises for the day commenced with a parade headed by the Culpeper Band, Legionnaires, Culpeper Volunteer Firemen, Auxiliary units and the entire student body of the Culpeper High School with the exception of the first and second grades. At 10:15 a. m. the parade assembled on Davis Street, east of East street, and headed by the Culpeper Band the line of march to East street and past the Culpeper High School was taken up. As the marchers passed the school they were joined by the students each grade being led by its teacher. The addition of the school increased the number taking part in the parade fully 500 so that it was one of the largest parades ever staged in Culpeper. Each child carried a small United States flag furnished by the courtesy of the Superintendent of the National Cemetery. The line of march was continued north on East street crossing over to Main, thence south on Main

crossing back to East, thence west on Davis to the Methodist Church where the indoor exercises were held.

Major John R. Kerrick, Jr., in full uniform, as marshal, led the parade. About thirty-five Legionnaires, led by Post Commander Charles E. Reams, Jr., were in line, some twenty members of the Culpeper Volunteer Fire Company and several Auxiliary units, the Red Cross and the Camp Fire Girls.

Arriving at the church the school children were withdrawn while the band and other units of the parade entered just before the hour of 11 when a one minute silence period was observed. This is a tribute by the Legion to their fallen comrades on Armistice Day.

Following the period of silence the exercises were commenced by Rev. J. M. Burton with an invocation. After a musical number by the Band, Mr. Charles E. Reams, Jr., Post Commander of the Legion addressed the gathering with a few remarks on the object of the meeting. Miss Irna Guinn then recited that pathetic yet firm and determined poem which was so characteristic of the Allied cause in the World War, "In Flander Fields." The Post Adjutant E. B. Gilmer called the roll of those who answered the call to arms from Culpeper county and giving their lives on the battle fields, died as a result of wounds, or from illness or accident while in the service. At the conclusion of the roll call "Taps" was sounded by the Legion bugler, J. J. Quinn.

After a recitation "Home Again," by Miss Alberta Hudgins, Rev. Thomas W. Hooper, who served as a captain and company commander of the 80th. Division during the war, was introduced by Mr. Reams. After a few remarks appropriate to the occasion and recalling some reminiscences in connection with his service Captain Hooper pinned the Southern

Cross upon the breast of Legionnaire George L. Green. This cross is an award made by the Daughters of the Confederacy to World War veterans who are sons of Confederate veterans.

Capt. Hooper said he was not fooled into the war; he knew this was not a war to end wars for as long as human nature existed there would be war on this earth.

Capt. Hooper also called attention of the audience to the lack of respect for the colors, the national flag, as they passed through the streets. Only three individuals exhibited the usual honor or reverence and two of these were ex-service men. Practically everyone else failed altogether in this respect. The custom is that civilians shall face the colors at attention bareheaded with the headdress over the left breast as they pass and that individuals in uniform shall raise the right hand in salute; the salute is optional with civilians in the place of uncovering.

Following another musical number by the Band, Mr. Reams introduced Prof. T. W. Hendrick, Division Superintendent of Schools of Culpeper County, who made the principal address of the occasion. Professor Hendrick is a favorite with the Legionnaires, as he is clear, thoughtful and forceful speaker and it was through his hands that a large number of Culpeper World War veterans passed, while he was principal and instructor in the Culpeper High School for nearly twenty years.

Professor Hendrick received close attention. After acknowledging his introduction he said that the American Legion stood first for peace, but also stood for preparedness for war. The World War, he said, did not banish war, but it overthrew absolutism, substituting for it democracy; a democracy he declared was slower to declare war than an autocracy. The wars of today are different from the wars of former years in that the romance and chivalry have been extracted and in their place suffering and horror have been substituted, the speaker said.

At the conclusion of Prof. Hendrick's address the audience rising to the "Star Spangled Banner" by the Band, was dismissed by Rev. Kensey Johns Hammond.

It was a co-incident of the exercises that Rev. J. M. Burton who opened the exercises with an invocation and Rev. K. J. Hammond who closed them with a benediction each lost a son during the War. J. Marvin Burton, the son of Rev. Burton, and his namesake, was a member of the 6th Division and died while on duty with his organization during October of 1918, just before the Armistice. His remains lie in one of the American National cemeteries in France.

Kensey Johns Hammond, the son of Rev. K. J. Hammond, and his namesake, was a member of Air Service and lost his life in a fatal airplane crash in this country shortly after the Armistice.

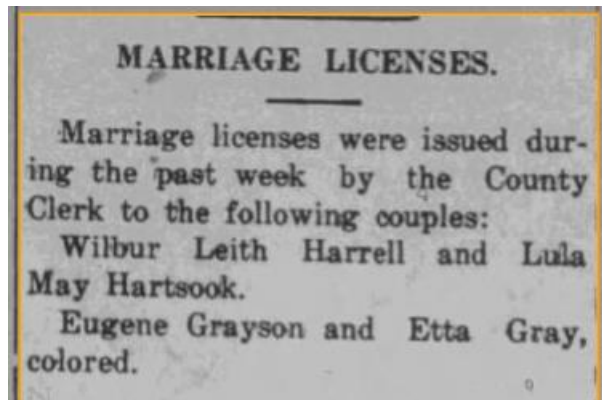

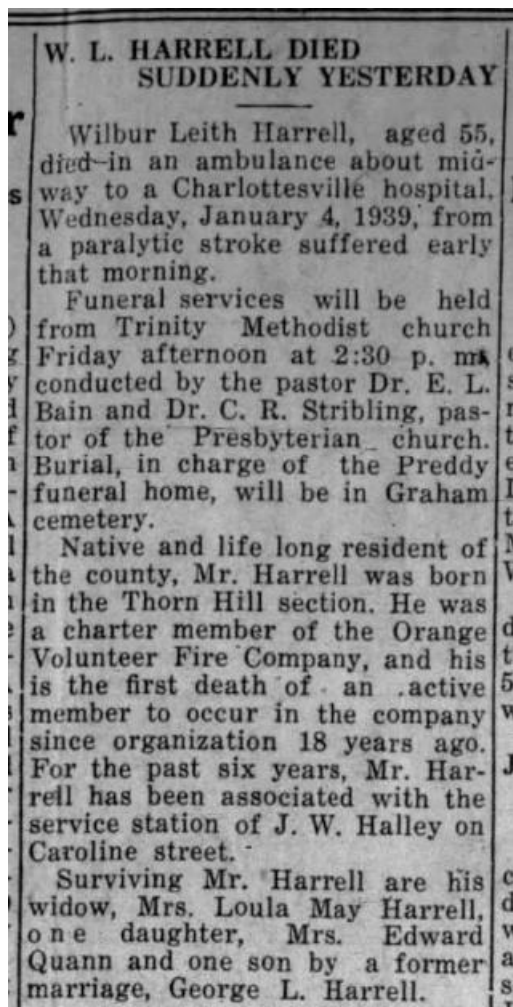
