George Hattle Dies Today

George Hattle, 40, one of Baraboo's 21 men to survive the Tuscania tragedy during the World war, passed away this morning about 4:30 o'clock at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hattle, near this city.

Mr. Hattle, who had resided in Beloit for the past twelve years, had returned to his parental home here about two weeks ago. He was a veteran of the World war and a member of the Beloit post of Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion.

Survivors include his parents, his wife, one brother and one sister, William A. Hattle and Miss Viriathus Hattle, both of Baraboo.

Funeral services are to be held Sunday afternoon at two o'clock at the Hattle home in North Baraboo. Burial will take place in the Baraboo cemetery.

Military Rites Held Sunday For Geo. Hattle

Last rites for George Hattle of Beloit were held Sunday afternoon at two o'clock at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hattle in North Baraboo, the Rev. E. C. Henke officiating.

A World War veteran and one of Baraboo's 21 men to survive the sinking of the Tuscania during the World War, the deceased was honored by many of his "buddies" who had gathered to pay their last respects. Members of the Reedsburg Company A, 128th Infantry, of the 32nd division of which Mr. Hattle was a member, and war comrades from Portage and Beloit attended the services in a body as well as the Baraboo Veterans of Foreign Wars and American Legion.

The entire force of employees of the Osborn and Klingberg firm, Beloit, where Mr. Hattle was employed, also attended the rites in a body.

The large floral offering testified to the deep esteem he was accorded by his friends.

The honorary pallbearers were Otto Bates, Randall Herfort and Herbert Steckenbauer of Baraboo, Horace Cahoon of Delton, Max Collins and Tracy Green of Milwaukee. Active bearers were Paul Stewart, Ed. Coughlin, Otto Arndt and James F. Bray of Baraboo, Richard Mahler of Chicago and Charles Kellogg of Janesville. All of the pallbearers were Tuscania survivors and with the exception of Mr. Collins and Mr. Green, they were members of Baraboo's "21."

The soldiers marched in a body from the home to the Baraboo cemetery where services were conducted at the grave by the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars organizations. A firing squad sponsored by the American Legion and comprised of Baraboo Company H men with Second Lieut. Hiller in charge fired a salute. Taps were blown by Emmett Dwyer.

The deceased leaves to mourn his loss his wife, parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hattle, one brother, William Hattle, and one sister, Viriathus Hattle. One brother preceded him in death about four years ago.

Baraboo's 21 a lucky bunch

Local boys survived attack on Tuscania

They're gone now, those eager young men of 1917 who set out on a noble cause, to "keep the world safe for democracy."

But by a quirk of the legendary fickle finger of fate, 21 Baraboo boys were spared when their ship was torpedoed. Some 200 of their shipmates never made it alive to European soil, despite their being within sight of Ireland.

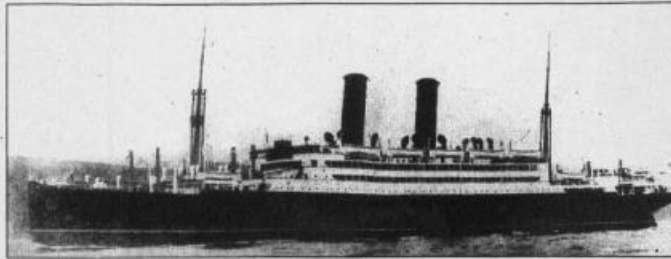
The 107th Supply Train

Their unit was the 107th Supply Train, formed from the Wisconsin National Guard on Oct. 15, 1917, and comprising six companies plus a headquarters company. Thanks to Capt. Oakley L. Parkhill of Fargo N.D., we have an excellent account of the unit. His story was printed in the *News-Republic* on Feb. 5, 1935, on the occasion of the National Convention of the Tuscania Survivor's Association held in Baraboo that year.

The local group of 21 called their chapter the Last Man Club, or something like that, with a bottle of whiskey saved and becoming the property of the last man to survive over the years. Why such devotion to an Army unit? The thing that they had most in common was that their ship, the *Tuscania*, was sunk by a German torpedo and all of the boys from Baraboo survived.

Local soldiers in the 107th

including the 21 from Baraboo, in various companies. Only one Baraboo man, Donald Duncan, was lost later in Europe and that was due to pneumonia. By 1935 Parkhill listed five more as deceased in civilian life. They were Vernon Cafilisch, George Hattle, Arthur Bender, Ralph Sanderson and Russell Brody, who had died of pneumonia shortly after his return to the United States.

Those still living in 1935 were Richard Mahler, Wayland Kier, Edward Coughlin, Horace Cahoon, Earl Veerhusen, Otto Bates, Otto Arndt, Earl Powell, Charles Kellogg, John O'Brien, Randall Herfort, Herbert Steckenbauer, Paul Stewart, James Brady and Clarence Braun. Although he enlisted in Reedsburg, Arthur Thayer joined the group as one of the survivors. The material in this article comes from the Braun family WWI Scrapbook, and we thank them for the use of it.

Torpedoed!

Briefly, the 107th Supply Train was organized in Camp McArthur, Wis. (no longer extant) but with no trucks for their supply train! Immobilized for two days in

a snowstorm near Waco, Texas, they finally reached New York for embarkation after some 12 days of on-again, off-again train travel. Because the ship assigned to them was not ready, fate decreed that they should ship on the *Tuscania*, a better and larger ship but therefore a bigger target for the German submarines.

All men were ordered below decks for the Jan. 27 departure, not being allowed to even say farewell to the Statue of Liberty. An exception was a few officers who had portholes, but these were soon covered over for blackout purposes on the high seas. The *Tuscania* joined a naval convoy at Halifax, Nova Scotia, and zigzagged across the Northern Atlantic, a maneuver familiar to all of us who crossed in a later war. This writer's ship even crossed with no convoy escorting it.

The *Tuscania*'s crossing was uneventful, and the coasts of Ireland and a Scottish Island were visible, when without warning a torpedo from German U Boat 77 struck the ship at 5:45 p.m. Feb. 5. This was a serious matter, for the ship carried 2,174 men and 119 officers, and was 650 feet long.

It was struck slightly ahead of mid-ship, and very low. Immediately on impact the rest of the convoy scattered, leaving the wounded vessel to fend for itself for a time.

Daily lifeboat drills were effective for discipline, but unfortunately the explosion had destroyed many lifeboats, and as the ship soon listed badly, others were not readily usable. Men assigned to those boats were lined up and awaited assignment to other boats. One loaded lifeboat broke from its ropes, landing on another and killing some of the occupants. Somehow, 92 men in sick bay were evacuated safely and the human loss was held to about 200 soldiers losing their lives.

Survivors

Fortunately the boilers were shut down in time and did not explode, but the ship was in dire straits and would sink within four hours. By 7 p.m. all lifeboats had left and there were still 1,350 men on board the stricken ship! Parkhill says one lifeboat was commandeered by a few members of the

ship's crew, who abandoned the ship rather than aiding the soldiers.

Finally a couple destroyers, after dropping water concussion bombs, came to the sinking ship and took on the waiting soldiers. Parkhill says the Supply Train men remained cool through out the ordeal. Survivors were taken ashore in many Irish and Scotch locations, and it was a few days before the various groups were assembled and the body count began. The *Tuscania* was the first American troopship to be sunk. The country was outraged, but its loss helped to solidify opinion in favor of the conflict.

Eventually the Supply Train soldiers crossed the Irish Sea to Holyhead, Wales, thence to England and France. Here at last they were finally assigned convoys of trucks, such as Packards, Fords, Dodges, a Dodge Auto, and two motorcycles. Their history in WWI after this time is not given in the article, but it is assumed that the Baraboo 21 had already had their fill of adventure and danger. Happily they did not suffer any combat casualties. They were lucky young men indeed!

Baraboo Veterans Observe Tuscania Disaster Day

BARABOO — Eighteen Baraboo veterans of the World war who were aboard the Tuscania when the transport was sunk off the coast of Ireland will observe the 10th anniversary of the sinking of the vessel on Sunday.

There were 21 Baraboo men on board when a German torpedo sent the Tuscania to the bottom, but three of these have died, all as the result of their service. Russell Brodie died of a pneumonia in southern camp, after his return from overseas, Donald Duncan died in France of the flu, and Clarence Sanderson has passed away within the past year in a Texas sanitarium.

The 18 men who expect to take part in Sunday's reunion are James F. Eray, Paul L. Stewart, Otto Arndt, Earl F. Powell, Arthur Bender, Otto F. Bates, Edward E. Coughlin, Vernon Caffisch, Herbert E. Steckenbauer, and Clarence Braun, all of Baraboo; George W. Hattle, Beloit; Horace C. Cahoon of Kilbourn; Randall H. Herfort of

Detroit; Charles M. Kellogg, Janesville; Richard Mahler of Maywood, Ill.; Earl W. Veerhusen, Milwaukee; Wayland Kier of Montana; and John T. O'Brien, Milwaukee. A banquet Saturday night has been planned as part of the anniversary celebration.

BARABOO—When a German torpedo sank the American transport, the Tuscania, off the coast of Ireland, Feb. 5, 1918, there were 21 Baraboo boys aboard.

While the number is no longer 21 and there are several vacant places in the group, Saturday of this week will see the boys, together with their invited guests, assembling at the American Legion hall observing the anniversary.

Baraboo Tuscania Survivors Reunite

100 Attend Annual Meeting of Veterans at Legion Hall

BARABOO — About 100 Baraboo men gathered at the American Legion hall Saturday night to attend the annual reunion of "Baraboo's 21," the group of local boys who were aboard the Tuscania when the American transport was sunk off the Irish coast by a German U-boat on Feb. 5, 1918.

Those honored at the reunion Saturday night were Otto Arndt, Paul L. Stewart, George W. Hattle, Beloit; Arthur Bender, Earl L. Powell, Otto F. Bates, Horace C. Cahoon, Madison; E. W. Coughlin, Herbert Steckenbauer, Randall M. Herfort, Charles Kellogg, Janesville; Richard

Mahler, Maywood, Ill.; Earl W. Veerhusen, Milwaukee; James F. Bray, Arthur H. Thayer, John T. O'Brien, Milwaukee, and Clarence Braun, Wayland Kier, who resides in Montana, could not be present.

Four of the original 21 in the group have passed away: Russell Brodie died of pneumonia on his return from over-seas; Donald Duncan died in France of influenza; Ralph Sanderson passed away in Texas three years ago, and Vernon E. Caffisch died in Baraboo a year ago.

This was the fifth annual reunion which the Baraboo boys have held.

12 Survivors of Sunk Ship Hold Meet

BARABOO — The 30th annual reunion of Baraboo's 21 Tuscania survivors was held on Saturday night with a dinner at the American Legion hall, attended by 12 of the veterans and a large number of friends.

Baraboo has one of the most active group of Tuscania survivors, there having been 21 Baraboo men aboard the ill-fated troop ship when it was sunk by a German torpedo off the coast of Ireland, Feb. 5, 1918. All of the Baraboo men were saved, and they have met every year since to observe the anniversary.

Of the original 21, seven are deceased: Russell Brody, John O'Brien, Ralph Sanderson, Vernon Cafilisch, George Hattle, Donald Duncan, and Arthur Bender.

Mrs. Loren Krueger, 36, wife of the vocational agricultural teacher in the Angola schools, is recovering at her home north of Angola from injuries received in an automobile crash in Beloit, Wisconsin, late Christmas night.

Mrs. Krueger had gone to Beloit to attend the wedding of her sister and with another sister, Mrs. Adelaide Hattle, of Beloit, was riding in a car driven by Vincent Charles Schaefer, 25, of Appleton, Wisconsin, who was spending the holidays with his parents in Beloit. Schaefer was killed in the crash and the two women narrowly escaped death.

Schaefer and his two passengers were enroute to the home of another sister of the women before returning to the Hattle home, when the crash occurred. Extremely cold weather made for bad driving conditions and the windshield of the Schaefer car was apparently obscured by frost, and the Schaefer car, going north, and a car driven east by Ivan Johnson, of Beloit, collided at an intersection. ROBERT HATTLE

Sometime during the early morning hours of June 14, 1937, Robert Hattle passed away, dying as he had lived, peacefully and unobtrusively.

He was born on the 8th day of March, 1860, at Hutton, Berwick, Scotland, from where he removed at an early age to Sunderland, England.

William Elliot, a foreman of bridge construction with the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad was an uncle of the deceased, and it was he who with the promise of a job persuaded Mr. Hattle to immigrate to this country on June 20th, 1887.

On December 31st, 1891, Mr. Hattle married Grace Pilley, and to them were born three sons and one daughter.

Mr. Hattle remained in the employe of the Chicago and Northwestern railroad on the bridge crew for approximately twelve years, and then he followed the trade of a painter. He was a workman who prided himself on his task well done, and he did not perform his labor with the mere monetary reward in mind. Scarcely a house built in Baraboo during the first two decades of the twentieth century, but what has known his labors, and during the winter months in those years he helped redecorate the circus wagons.

Although Mr. Hattle was not a native of this land, no one was a more staunch patriot than he. During the World war, two of his sons saw service across, and daily he followed the papers with zealous interest in the progress of the American forces.

No husband loved more ardently, more faithfully, more unchangeably; no parent could surpass the self sacrificing kindness with which he reared and cherished his children. God took him and spared him the unfirmities of age, the weakness and pain of prolonged illness, the dreary slow approach to the grave. God took him when he was facing the sunset with radiant contentment, a happy close to a life of consecration.

Two sons, George and Ellsworth had predeceased Mr. Hattle and he leaves as his mourners, his widow, a son, William, and a daughter, Verithus, four grandchildren, all of this city, also one sister, Mrs. Preston Carr of Sunderland, England.

He was laid to rest in Walnut Hill cemetery on June 16th, only a short distance and within sight of where he had lived since his marriage.

LAST OF FIVE ARRIVES HOME

Arthur Potter, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Potter, returned last night from Camp Grant where he just received his discharge from the army. The young man is the last of five brothers that were in the service to reach home. He left Baraboo in May 1918 and since December of last year has been with the army of occupation on the Rhine not far from Coblenz. By a peculiar coincidence he and William Hattle who returned home Monday night were the only two of the 107 that left Baraboo at one time that remained together throughout their service and came back together. They were both members of a machine gun battalion in the Third division, the division that helped to drive the Germans back at Chateau-Thierry on July 14 and piled the Teuton dead so high on the bridge across the Marne that further advance across the river by the enemy was impossible. This battle was probably the turning point in the war. Mr. Potter took part in the engagement in the Argonne forest and came through the fighting without a scratch. He is looking fine and says he never suffered any except for hunger for several days about Thanksgiving time when his division was marching through Luxemburg. The soldiers had gotten too far ahead of the commissary department and they subsisted on cabbage and water for a few days.

The return trip home was made in record time, the division leaving Germany August 5. On the same boat on which Potter and Hattle returned home was another Baraboo boy, Clifford Steinbrink, who expected to undergo an operation before returning to this city. As a result of the "flu" the latter has been suffering somewhat from a swelling on his neck which the army surgeons thought best to remedy before he was discharged.

**Robert Hattle Killed as
Waterloo Butter Car Hits
Ditch**

MILWAUKEE—(U.P.)—Robert Hattle, 31, Baraboo, was killed near here today when a 5-ton truck loaded with butter left the road, literally crashing through two large trees and overturned in a ditch.

The victim was the driver of the truck and its only occupant. He was pinned beneath the loaded vehicle and a derrick was required to release his body.

The truck load of butter apparently was intended for Milwaukee and had come from Waterloo, Wis. The accident occurred on highway 19 near Pewaukee.

Mr. Hattle is survived by his widow, three children, Audrey, 8; Keith, 7, and Donald, 5; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hattle, Baraboo; two brothers, William, Baraboo, and George, Beloit; and a sister, Viriathus, Baraboo.

Baraboo Man Killed In Truck Crash

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USE DERRICK TO MOVE BODY FROM WRECK

Remains Brought To Baraboo From Mil- waukee Today

Ellsworth "Bubby" Hattie, 31, of this city was killed near Milwaukee today when a 5 ton truck which he was driving into Milwaukee left the road and literally crashed through two large trees and overturned in a ditch.

Mr. Hattie was employed as driver for Otto Arndt of this city, who operates a trucking business. The young man had left here about two o'clock, carrying a load of butter from the Excelsior creamery, and he was due to arrive in Milwaukee about six o'clock. He was alone in the truck and just what caused the accident has not yet been ascertained.

Pinned Under Machine

Mr. Hattie was pinned beneath the loaded vehicle and a derrick was required to release his body. The accident occurred on highway 19, near Pewaukee. The dead man was not at first identified, and word did not reach Baraboo until several hours after the accident. Mr. Arndt and others left for Milwaukee at once.

Surviving Mr. Hattie are his wife, formerly Miss Catherine Johnson, and three children, Audrey, 6, Keith, 7, and Donald, 5; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hattie, of this city; and the following brothers and sister: William Hattie and Miss Viriathus Hattie, Baraboo, and George Hattie, Beloit.

The remains were to be brought to Baraboo this afternoon by Schetble & Dyrud, local undertakers.

Sometime during the early morning hours of June 14, 1937, Robert Hattle passed away, dying as he had lived, peacefully and unobtrusively.

He was born on the 8th day of March, 1860, at Hutton, Berwick, Scotland, from where he removed at an early age to Sunderland, England.

Awarded \$6,000 Compensation in Death of Husband

Mrs. Catherine Hattle Wins Settlement in Railroad Commission Decision After Accident

BARABOO—The industrial commission has awarded Mrs. Catherine Hattle of this city \$6,000 in the death of her husband, Robert Hattle, killed on Nov. 25, 1929, as the result of an automobile accident. The commission award is against the Great Atlantic and Pacific tea company and under the workmen's compensation act. Mr. Hattle was engaged in trucking butter from the Excelsior creamery to the tea company in Milwaukee, driving a truck for Otto Arndt, who held a contract for transportation with the tea company. The firm of Hill and Miller of this city represented Mrs. Hattle in the matter, while Quarles, Spence and Quarles, Milwaukee, represented the tea company.

This is an action reviewing an award of the industrial commission requiring the plaintiff Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company to pay certain sums as death benefits and burial expenses to defendant Catherine Hattle because of the death of her husband Robert Hattle while in the employ of Otto Arndt, a contractor under the plaintiff company.

The primary question for consideration is as to whether, under the law and facts of this case, the plaintiff tea company, who is subject to the compensation act, is liable for the payment of compensation for the death of the employee of Otto Arndt as an independent contractor, not subject to the compensation act, the accident occurring in hauling butter at irregular intervals.

It seems that an arrangement was made whereby the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company took all the butter produced by the Excelsior Creamery Company. The butter was purchased f. o. b. creamery at Baraboo. Otto Arndt had been in the trucking business for several years at Baraboo.

He succeeded one Burrows, and hauled the butter to Milwaukee at 48 cents a hundred pounds, paid him by the tea company. Robert Hattle, age 31, who had been employed by Arndt to drive the truck, was killed while hauling butter for the tea company. Because Arndt had only one employee, he was not subject to the compensation act and he did not carry insurance.

The provision of the statute (Sec. 102.06) applicable, in part provides:

"An employer subject to the provisions of section 102.03 to 102.34 shall be liable for compensation to an employee of a contractor or subcontractor under him who is not subject to sections 102.03 to 102.34, or who has not complied with the conditions of sub-section (2) of section 102.28 in any case where such employer would have been liable for compensation if such employee had been working directly for such employer.

"The contractor or subcontractor shall also be liable for such compensation, but the employee shall not recover compensation for the same injury from more than one part. . . . The employer who shall become liable for and pay such compensation may recover the same from such contractor, subcontractor or other employer whether or not such contractor, subcontractor or other in section 102.4, for whom the employee was working at the time of the accident."

Without detailing the evidence, it seems to the court that the record shows sufficient credible evidence to justify the commission's findings, and that under the evidence and the law applicable,—

The Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company, under arrangements entered into between it and the Excelsior Creamery Company and Otto Arndt, was responsible for did provide for and pay for the trucking of the butter by Arndt, as an independent contractor.

This makes the tea company liable under the statute for compensation in this case, Arndt not being subject to the act, and Hattle having met with accident while in Arndt's employ.

It does not appear necessary to consider various questions argued at the hearing. Whether or not Arndt was a common carrier does not appear material. As to this contract the hauling does not appear to have been done as a common carrier, and even if it was, it does not appear that any other statute would interfere with the holding here.

The plaintiff complains about the refusal of the commission to make Arndt a party here. While it might have been proper and possibly advisable to have made Arndt a party, yet it does not appear that such inclusion was at all mandatory, or that the applicant here should now be required to litigate any question that may be at issue under the statute as between the tea company and Arndt.

The statute makes the tea company directly liable to the applicant, and she is not concerned as to Arndt's liability and should not be subjected to expense and delay in litigating concerning his liability to the tea company. In any event, Arndt not being subject to the compensation act, it is questionable whether the commission had any jurisdiction over him.

It may be further noted that even

if Arndt were not an independent contractor, but a mere employee of the tea company, the latter would still be liable in this case, because subsec. (4) of section 102.07 makes the employer liable "for all helpers and assistants of employees, whether paid by the employees or employer, if employed with the knowledge, actual or constructive, of the employer."

On the whole record the award of the commission must be sustained.

It is so ordered.

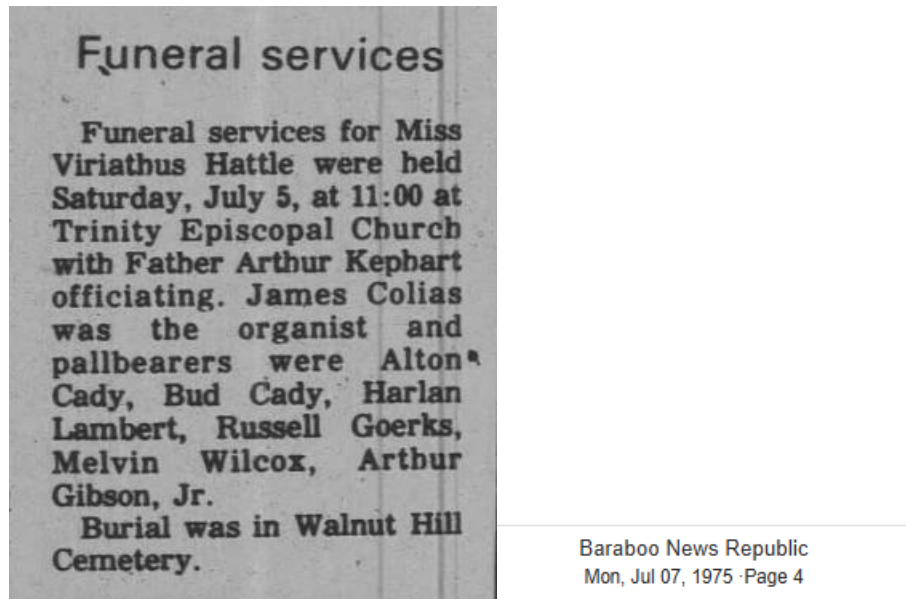

WI] & left on a wedding trip to Milwaukee WI. They will return about 13 Oct & reside in the Hugh Hughes home on Fourth St. - Killed when the truck he was driving from Excelsior Creamery Co. in Baraboo WI to Milwaukee left the road & overturned in a ditch, on Highway 19 two miles west of Pewaukee WI. The 5-ton truck was owned by Otto Arndt, who had survived the Tuscania along with Ellsworth’s brother George. His father suffered a heart attack upon learning of his death. His widow Catherine then sued Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co. which argued that Robert was a contractor. She was awarded \$6,000; the award was upheld in court. - Buried in Walnut Hill Cemetery, Baraboo, Sauk WI. F: 118113574
