## *Crooked Corn Rows Are a Sign of Good Farming*

With the third year of planting now under way, progress on the vast tree belt, running from Canada to Texas, is speeding up. F. E. Hausherr, inspector for the United States forestry service, declared. Mr. Hausherr came to St. Joseph yesterday with Dr. H. N. Wheeler of the forestry service, who spoke at a Chamber of Commerce luncheon. Today they were to go to Kansas City, Mo., for another address.

"The public seemed to get the impression that the trees were going to bring rain for the drouth-stricken area," said Mr. Hausherr. "That decidedly was not the intention.

"The main purpose is to break the velocity of the wind that sweeps over the Plains states and dries out the farm crops. By breaking that wind we will conserve the moisture to the leeward side. Then, too, the trees will serve as a trap to hold the snow and store up more moisture."

Mr. Hausherr told how the service started with no nursery stock and has worked up until it now is the largest seed purchaser in the nation just for the purpose of constructing the tree belt.

### **Tracts Ten Rods Wide.**

The trees are set in tracts 10 rods wide from 1/4 to nearly 2 miles long. The land is first surveyed, the topography of the farm is studied and then the soil is examined to determine which type of a tree is best suitable. Many choke cherries and wild plums are set out.

The value of the belt was shown by Doctor Wheeler in his illustrated lecture. He showed pictures taken on a Nebraska farm showing how corn had prospered when grown near a road which was lined with tall trees.

"We are continually cutting down trees and not replacing them. In the neighboring state of Iowa alone, the farmers imported from \$6,000,000 to \$8,000,000 worth of fence posts last year. Yet those same posts could have been raised on their farms without cost."

#### 600 Acres for One Cow.

Then turning to land that has been overpastured he showed pictures of Western land nearly barren. "It takes 600 acres of this land to pasture one cow and you know that it's not worth a cow's time to meander over 600 acres," he said jokingly. "In the early days they figured a cow needed fifty acres."

Erosion of soil came in for a strong attack and he touched on the contour farming now being done around Bethany, Mo. "Figures will show that in the past three years one pasture near there that was properly farmed lost but .9 of an inch of rainfall and one-third of a ton of soil from washing. Yet a nearby field, barren, lost 31 inches of rain and 113 tons of soil."

"And when we lose that rich, black top soil it really is a loss. They say it takes 400 year to recover one inch. That is the purpose of our work. We want to save that soil and save the forests in this nation."

#### Erosion Destroys Fertility.

across the river from here, there is one field that used to raise seventy-five bushels of corn per acre. Now it can raise but fifteen because of the loss of top soil.

"We thought that the farmer whose rows of corn were in a perfectly straight line was a real farmer. Now the farmer who plants his crops in straight lines is a poor

farmer. He is inviting the loss of his crop-growing soil.

"Near Clarinda, Iowa, we studied some more contour farming. On one field of regular farming over a three-year period 10 per cent of the rainfall drained away and 40 tons of top soil were lost. On an adjoining field, where contour farming was practiced, only one-tenth of 1 per cent of the rain was lost and there was no loss of soil."

Doctor Wheeler closed his lecture by explaining how public forests, different from national parks, attracted 70,000,000 tourists last year and told of plans to make eight of the forests in Missouri.

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#### SIXTH WARD REPUBLICANS.

##### They Fail to Agree on Certain Matters

A preliminary caucus of sixth ward Republicans was held at 477 Grand River avenue last night for the purpose of suggesting candidates for delegates to the county and city conventions. George C. Lawrence was made chairman of the meeting and M. E. Welch, secretary. John G. Gutekunst and James Clark were presented as candidates from the lower precinct of the ward. Clark received 53 votes to Gutekunst's 34 and was declared elected. A surprising change came when the ballots were cast for delegate from the middle precinct. Although five men had left the hall after balloting for the first delegate, the count of votes for the second delegates showed that 191 had been cast, divided as follows: Charles W. Hausherr 55, Alfred Gibson 36, D. M. Butler 19. The chairman suggested that more votes had been cast than there were voters present, but Hausherr's nomination was carried through and several more of the crowd deserted the meeting as a result. The result for the selection of a delegate from the upper precinct resulted: James T. Little 38, D. G. Darling 32, W. L. Wild 25. Some of Wild's friends entered a strong protest against the acceptance of Little under the circumstances, but Little's name went through. The work of suggesting candidates for delegates to the city convention followed. Two names had been offered from the first precinct and five from the second, when someone jumped up and declared that the meeting had no business to force any set of men on the eight precincts of the ward. He thought the precincts were capable of selecting their own delegates. Another retorted that if the meeting did not select the delegates, experience had shown that the precincts would not, and the duty of so doing would then devolve upon the ward committeemen. Ward Committeeman John Hoffmann thought the meeting had better select the delegates as the ward committee had held but one meeting in three years. Some of the rest of the ward committee resented the imputation of inactivity, and the squabble ended in Hoffmann announcing that he would resign from the committee. It was finally decided that it was best for each precinct to hold its own caucus and the matter was left to the precinct committees.

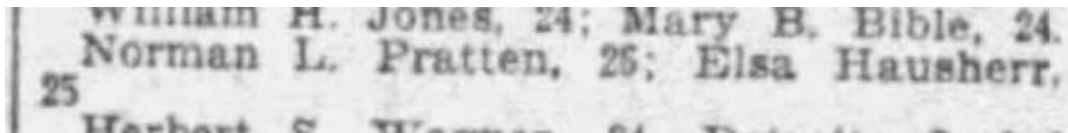
