WEST LIBERTY MAN SURVIVOR OF TUSCANIA

**DALE C. HAZLETT WAS ON
BOARD VESSEL TORPEDOED
BY GERMAN SUBMARINE**

WEST LIBERTY, Ia., Feb. 8.—(Special)—Dale C. Hazlett of West Liberty is listed as one of the survivors of the Tuscania, the transport sunk by the Germans Tuesday night, but as yet no word has been received from him here. Mr. Hazlett's home is in Pennsylvania where his father, two sisters and one brother live, but he has spent the greater part of his life in West Liberty where he made his home with his brother, Harry. He enlisted in the Forestry engineering corps in November and was sent to

Jefferson barracks, Mo., going from there to Washington, D. C., where he had been until leaving for France. Friends here are anxiously awaiting word from him.

SURVIVOR OF THE TUSCANIA ENLISTED HERE

**D. C. Hazlett Joined Col-
ors at Local Recruiting
Station Dec. 15.**

Dale C. Hazlett, private in the engineers' corps, forestry, national army, listed among the survivors of the Tuscania, the transport sunk by a German U-boat, enlisted at the Davenport recruiting station, Dec. 15, 1917. Private Hazlett's home is at West Liberty.

He was sent from here to Jefferson Barracks, Mo., by Lieutenant E. C. Wright, U. S. A., commander of the post here, and after a course of training at the barracks, assigned to the unit to which he was attached when the Tuscania was sunk.

Private Hazlett is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Hazlett. The parents reside in West Liberty, the father superintending the operation of his nearby farm.

Mrs. Hazlett stated this morning that the last letter they received from their son was on Jan. 29. At that time the boy was in Washington, D. C. He wrote that he was expecting to sail for France soon, but did not know the date or where his unit would embark. The mother asserted that her son was confined to a hospital with measles part of the time he was stationed in the national capital.

The parents had not received any official word from the government pertaining to their son's name being listed among the survivors. However, it is altogether probable that they will receive no official word as only parents of those lost are officially notified.

MUCATINE BOY SAVED AS DOOMED SHIP SINKS

DALE C. HAZELETT OF WEST LIBERTY, WELL-KNOWN THROUGHOUT COUNTY, ESCAPES WITH LIFE, SAY REPORTS.

LANDS SAFELY ON SCOTTISH COAST

Youth Who Enlisted From This County Safe, Reports From Washington Declare in Today's Dispatches.

Facing death from out of the depths of the seas, Dale C. Hazlett, 25, of West Liberty, who has been a resi-

dent of Muscatine county for the past nine years, was among the survivors of the stricken Tuscania which was swallowed up by the waters after being struck by a Boche torpedo.

Dispatches from Washington today make mention of the fact that Hazlett was among various other survivors landed on the Scottish coast. Harry Hazelett of West Liberty, brother of young Hazelett who was on the ill-fated vessel, was overjoyed at the information given him today by the News-Tribune appraising him of the trooper's safety.

Hazelett, a private in Company E, 20 Engineers, had made his home with his brother for the past nine years, coming here from Georgetown, Pa. He enlisted at Davenport from this county.

The Hazelett family is among the best known in Muscatine county, having been pioneers in this locality.

LIEUT. MAKER FIRST TO LAND

Young Bridegroom and Mem- bers of Engineer Corps Safe At Scottish Port, Said.

WEST LIBERTY, Iowa, Feb. 8. — Early news of the rescued from the transport, Tuscania, was of great interest here. Lieut. Frank L. Maker, the first man to land at Islay, Scotland, was married in West Liberty on last Thanksgiving day. Dale C. Hazlett, of the Twentieth engineers, is also a West Liberty boy, and was among the first to land at Islay.

Lieut. Maker came here from his training camp to wed Miss Mildred Jackson of Oakland, Calif., the wedding taking place at the home of the bride's uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Anderson. He and his bride later spent several weeks here.

Dale Hazlett was in a hospital at Washington for some time, and was unable to sail for France with his comrades. The delay placed him aboard the Tuscania and gave him the big adventure. He had lived in West Liberty for several years and formerly was a railway mail clerk. He enlisted at Davenport a few months ago.

MUMPS AND MEASLES CAUSE OF HAZLETT'S SAILING ON SHIP

(Journal's Special Service.)

Iowa City, Ia., Feb. 11.—Relatives and friends of Dale C. Hazlett, of West Liberty, a rescued soldier—escaped from death when the Tuscania was lost—are rejoicing over the cablegrams that tell of his safety. The young soldier is a brother of Harry Hazlett, a West Liberty farmer, and a nephew of Mrs. Newton Ansley. His father resides in Pennsylvania, but the young soldier has been making his home in Muscatine county for a number of years, as a farm hand. The "long arm of coincidence," berated by critics of the drama and novel, played a large part in young Hazlett's thrilling adventure with the Hun submarine. He had been scheduled to sail for France last year, but became a victim of mumps, at Washington, D. C., whither he had been transferred from Jefferson Barracks, St. Louis, after enlisting at Davenport, in November. He recovered—only to be stricken down by measles. Recovering once more, he became a victim of mumps on the other side of his face, and, in the meantime, his comrades sailed, and safely reached France. He recovered for the third time, and was sent to New York, whence he sailed in January seemingly (as a postcard, received a little more than a fortnight ago, stated that he was still there.) Since then the Hazletts and others heard nothing from him. It was not known he was on the Tuscania, until the tragedy was announced here, and the second day stories brought the news of Hazlett's rescue abroad. He was a close friend

of the family of Albert Whitacre, a prominent West Liberty farmer, and the townspeople, loving romance, believed he was to become a closer one after the war.

WEST LIBERTY BOY WRITES OF SHIP'S SINKING

**Was Aboard Tuscania and
Drifted All Night in
Small Boat.**

West Liberty, Ia., March 16.—
(Special.)—The first letters have
come from Dale Hazlett, West Lib-
erty soldier, who was aboard the
Tuscania when it was torpedoed off
the Irish coast. Hazlett and his
companions in their lifeboat were
on the water from 6 o'clock, on the
evening of the accident, until 5:30
the next morning, when they leave
the rocks of the Scottish coast and
effected a landing.

They experienced delay in start-
ing from the wrecked vessel while
rescuing the occupants of the first
lifeboat who were thrown into the
water when their boat was smashed.
The Scottish people gave every as-
sistance to the Americans, many of
whom were but thinly clad. Haz-
lett wore only a sweater, trousers
and shoes and these still form his
only American equipment.

On March 23, the two townships
adjacent to West Liberty will stage
an auction sale here for the bene-
fit of the Red Cross. Not only the
business houses but the majority
of town and country residents are
donating articles which will be sold
to the highest bidders. The entire
proceeds will go into the local chap-
ter's treasury.

A chance to soak the kaiser,
Hindenberg and others of their
group, via the baseball route, will
be afforded throughout the day, as
well as other opportunities to get
rid of spare change in favor of the
Red Cross. A parade will precede
the opening of the sale at noon.

"Lieutenant F. L. Maker, known in West Liberty by reason of his recent marriage at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Anderson, uncle and aunt of Mrs. Maker, has sent letters from France descriptive of his escape from the torpedoed Tuscania. Lieutenant Maker and Private Dale Hazlett es-

caped from the sinking ship in the same boat and Lieutenant Maker describes Dale's actions as most heroic. Hazlett stayed at the oars for ten hours, kept his spirits and did much good in sustaining his comrades."—West Liberty Index.

The following is a letter received by friends of Dale Hazlett, who is a cousin of Mrs. R. B. Moore of Solon. Mr. Hazlett had the pleasure of spending last Fourth of July with Dr. and Mrs. Moore in Solon and is known to many Solon people, having visited here many times. The letter follows:

"Somewhere in France.

"The steamer Tuscania was torpedoed and sunk on the night of Tuesday, February 5, 1918, at 5:40 o'clock. At this time I was just returning from my supper and was going out the corridor for a drink of water. Twenty other Company E men and myself had been lucky enough at the start of the voyage to be detailed as waiters and were accordingly assigned to second class cabins. We had not been required to work as there were men enough without us so we had it very

easy all the way across.

"The explosion sounded as though a gigantic bottle full of liquid had been fired into with a pistol. All the lights went out. As I had just returned from supper I had left my life belt and coat in my room. I started back to my room, but was met by the men rushing out the corridors and it was impossible to reach it. I turned and started for my boat station, which was on the deck above and toward the stern on the right hand side. I took a short cut I had marked out before hand to the upper deck. The corridor of course was full of men, but about every other man was calling out, 'keep cool and don't hurry.'

"The upper corridors were the same, and I found a number of men trying to break down the door out to the upper deck. I had examined this door previously and knew it opened inward, so I got through to the door by yelling that I could open it. I turned the handle and of course it opened easily, and I shot out on deck. I then made my way to my station and found a number of others there, all standing

Cleared the Raft.

"As soon as No. 13 was cleared we at once set to work to get our raft cleared. It was held down by two heavy steel bars and we had a terrible time getting them loose. Some time previous to this, I should have said, the storage batteries had been turned on and we had plenty of light to work by. Some twenty minutes of strenuous work and all was clear and the raft swung out. Our lieutenant, sergeant, and myself had to fight continuously to keep the men out of the boat that did not belong there but succeeded and then there was only the ten detailed oarsmen in her when she started down. I was one of the ten and was standing up in the bow of the boat with a chap named Roberts. We had gone down about five feet and everything was going nicely but all of a sudden I thought the world had come to an end. The bow dropped about fifteen feet to the water and I was thrown violently to my knees and against the side of the boat. Roberts fell on top of me and into the water and every loose oar and plank in the

quietly awaiting orders.

Was Little Excitement.

"There was some confusion resulting from men going to their stations but there was very little excitement. Our boat was a large life raft, No. 13A built like the ordinary life boat but not so high out of the water and with folding canvas sides. On top of it was life boat No. 13 and we had to wait until that was launched before we could touch ours. A number of the boat's crew were supposed to direct the launching but as no one approached the boys attached to No. 13 started to launch. Ten men detailed as oarsmen were in the boat and it had gotten down about ten feet when in some way the rope on one end dropped or got away and that end of the boat dropped spilling the men who were in it into the water. The other end was quickly lowered but when she righted herself she was half full of water and was, I think, abandoned. @

boat were on top of me. Roberts tried to fight his way clear but could not succeed so dived down and took a few strokes under water and came up clear about ten feet from the boat. He called to me and swam to the boat and I dragged him in. The other end had been lowered and we were riding on an even keel but nearly full of water. We took our oars and fended her off from the sides of the ship while men were coming down the tackles and dropping into the boat like flies. We were supposed to take fifty but soon saw that due to the water we could not take any more so we pulled away as quickly as we could. There were only five oars as one had been lost when the boat fell. The cause of that accident it turned out was the breaking of the swivel pin in the pulley block. We discovered this the next day by finding the block in the boat.

Sight of Doomed Ship.

"It was a terrible sight we looked back upon. Flares were being burned and rockets sent up from the doomed ship. We could see boat after boat being lowered only to get part way down then crash to the water throwing the men into the water. British destroyers darted hither and thither in the darkness. We rowed steadily and aided by the wind and waves soon left the *Tuscania* behind. Men were set to bailing and then we discovered that the plugs were gone and water was coming in at the large holes. We plugged these with hats and handkerchiefs and then we counted noses. There were thirty-two men aboard including two officers, a member of the crew who was a poor old steward, crippled and helpless and whom we pulled out of the water and above all the gunner's mate who had been in charge of the 4.7 inch gun in the stern of the *Tuscania*. Both of our officers were sick and helpless so we turned the charge of the boat over to

the gunner. This fellow was a dandy. I can hear his cheery voice ringing out all through the long black night even yet.

"To the north we could see three light houses and we headed for one about six miles away that had a revolving light. The wind and sea had increased and our boat was half full of water all the time. Waves breaking over required constant bailing as the rotten canvas along the sides had since burst in many places. We had to stand up on the seats to row and it took two or three men to each oar. Every one was soaking wet the whole time. Just as a fellow by constant pulling on the oars had gotten himself somewhat warm and begin to kid himself that he was getting dry along would come a big wave and sweep over the boat and soak him again.

Sighted Rocks Ahead.

"Along about ten o'clock we sighted land ahead but it was a mass of rocks and the waves were crashing against them so it seemed the height of folly to attempt to land. The gunner and the majority rules against it. Then began the most terrific battle against wind and waves that men ever put up. By this time some of the men were thoroughly exhausted and would take their turns at the oars and stay until they fell exhausted then would rest a few minutes and return to their oars. Sometimes they were more of a detriment than a help. I was lucky myself and thanks for a strong constitution, I had been seasick for five days previous but had been feeling very good all the day before we were hit. I held the same oar for eleven hours and was off it only for a few minutes to help fill the holes in the boat. I think every man in the boat was rowing together, several times all hands had to jump to the oars and pull for our lives, to keep off the rocks. On more than one occasion certain death loomed, not more than twenty feet away but the men in the boat simply would not be denied and would not give up. Once we pulled steadily for an hour and never gained a foot, but finally a lull came and we were able to get far enough away to be comparatively safe. Try as we would in the darkness we could not see a suitable place to land. The only thing to do was to keep out from shore as far as we could until daylight.

"All night long we battled on until about four o'clock, when a call came for all hands to the oars. This time it seemed there was no hope for us, as rocks appeared on all sides of us.

Thanks to Providence.

"What hapened can only be laid to the intervening hand of a Divine Providence. You must remember that our craft was unwieldly with no steering gear of any kind, and three oars on one side and two on the other. No sooner did we dodge one rock than another would loom up out of the darkness, to menace us. For the next hour this continued until suddenly there appeared a light ahead of us, being waved as a signal. The clouds overhead broke

away ahead toward the light. We put all our remaining strength into a few more strokes of the oars and glided into smooth water and out of the wind. We knew we were saved.

"Right here a comical thing happened. We pulled up within ten feet of the dock. Then every body started to talk about it and congratulated each other, when the wind caught us and before we came to we were a hundred yards away again.

"Another weary pull but this time we could not make it, so the man on the shore ran down a short distance from the dock and we pulled in there to the quiet water and a shelving rock. The boat grounded in a foot or so of water and we jumped overboard and waded to shore.

"We found that we were in a small village and they took us into a hotel, where we were supplied with dry clothing, given a hot meal and went to bed. It seemed we could not sleep, as everyone was up and around the town by noon.

A Tribute to the Scotch.

"We were at Port Ellen on the island of Islay, Scotland, a typical Scotch village and Scotch people. Nothing could be more beautiful than the way they treated us. They would not take our money, and even the barber shaved free of charge all the boys who went into the shop. I always heard that the Scotch were a close people, but I know they can be as generous as any race on earth.

"The above is only the barest outline of what happened. Some day I may be able to tell you more about it. Before I close this narrative I want to pay tribute to some of the men in that boat, some of them my pals and all of them my friends, who exhibited a courage and a determination in the face of danger that has seldom been equaled. Men of iron will and marvelous physique and strength, who remained at those oars all the night long without a rest or respite and through their efforts made our safe landing possible.

Lieut. F. L. Maker, who was recently married in West Liberty, while on a leave of absence, has written of his escape and Sergeant Hazlett's from the Tuscania. He declares that the Iowa boy was a true hero, and that he stuck to the oars in his lifeboat ten solid hours, cheering his comrades and others in the craft, until rescue came. The

young warrior himself, modestly touches his experiences in so far as acknowledging his bravery is concerned. He is a cousin of Mrs Moore, wife of Dr R. B. Moore, formerly of Iowa City and Cedar

Rapids, and now a resident of Solon. To Mrs Moore the heroic young Haweke writes from "Somewhere in France," a thrilling description of the torpedoing of the vessel, and his subsequent escape with many others.

WEST LIBERTY BOY WRITES OF TUSCANIA BLAST

HE WAS ON TORPEDOED SHIP
AND GIVES INTIMATE DE-
TAILS OF LOSS

IOWA CITY, Ia., June 24.—Sergeant Dale Hazlett of West Liberty, who is now in France with an engineer regiment, has written to friends here a graphic description of the sinking of the transport Tuscania, some weeks ago. Hazlett was a passenger on the ship and it was so long before he was heard from that he was given up as lost by his friends.

Among other things he says: "The explosion sounded as though a gigantic bottle full of liquid had been fired into with a pistol. All the lights went out. As I had just returned from supper, I left my life belt and coat in my room. I started back to the room but was met by the men rushing out of the corridors. I turned and started for my boat station which was on the deck above. Every other man was crying out 'Keep cool, don't hurry.'

"There was some confusion, but little excitement. We had a terrible time getting the iron bars holding our boat, loose, but after twenty minutes' work we had her clear and swung over. Our lieutenant, sergeant, and myself had to fight continuously to keep the men out of the boat that did not belong there. I was one of the ten men selected to oar. I thought everything was going nicely when the bow of the boat dropped fifteen feet. Every loose plank in the boat fell on us. The boat was supposed to hold fifty persons, but the men were leaving the sinking ship like flies and dropping into our boat and we were compelled to pull away as quickly as we could to keep our boat from being swamped.

Terrible Sight

"It was a terrible sight we looked back on. Flares were being burned and rockets sent up from the doomed ship. We could see boat after boat being lowered only to get part way down then crash to the water throwing the men out. British destroyers darted hither and thither in the darkness. We rowed steadily on and aided by the wind and waves soon left the Tuscania behind. Men were set to bailing and then we discovered that the plugs were gone and the water was coming in at the large holes. We plugged these with hats and handkerchiefs and then we counted noses.

IOWA SOLDIER WAS ON THE TUSCANIA

**West Liberty Man Near Death
Twice, Once in Prosaic
Way.**

WEST LIBERTY, Ia., June 10.—Special: Twice near death is the war record of Dale Hazlett, just home from France, and yet both escapes took place miles from the firing lines.

A prosaic kick from a Missouri mule landed full in Hazlett's face, while his engineers were camped in France, and this injury for a time was thought quite grave. And before that he was tossed on the Atlantic for many hours after his boat, the Tuscania, was torpedoed off the coast of Ireland.

The encounter with the mule had no thrills, Hazlett declares, but the explosion of the Tuscania was rich with them. The small boat in which Hazlett found himself after the Hun torpedo struck, was manned entirely by green men, and after a short time Hazlett was the only one in the group who contrived to keep his place at the oars. He had had no previous experience on anything larger than an inland stream, but he assumed the leadership of his bunch. By strenuous efforts he contrived to keep the boat from drifting too badly, and after nine hours at the oars brought the craft to a landing, where the rocky shore was lined with countryside residents. He suffered greatly from exposure but after a few days was fully recovered.

His lieutenant recited these facts in a letter to local friends, Hazlett being decidedly reticent in the matter of his experience.

Sinking of Transport Tuscania Ten Years Ago Was Army's First Great Disaster in the World War

Early in the evening of Tuesday, Feb. 5, 1918, ten years ago, the Cunard liner, Tuscania, in army transport service, was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine while in the midst of a great convoy of ships carrying American soldiers to France. News of the loss did not reach America until Thursday of the same week, when

newspaper headlines blazed the terrifying message that the army had suffered its first great disaster.

The Tuscania carried 2,179 army officers and men mostly from the Thirty-second national guard division, made up of troops from Iowa, Michigan, Wisconsin and other states. Fortunately for the greater number of these, the great ship floated for nearly two hours after being struck, and many ships were on hand to aid in the rescue. However, when the final count was made, nearly 200 soldiers were found to be missing.

Sinking of a transport was the event most feared by relatives of the Americans who went over to France. Any concern over their welfare after reaching the battlefield, was dwarfed by the fears of enemy interference in the passage across the ocean. Germany boasted that her submarines would stop the Americans before they reached Europe. Accordingly, the loss of the Tuscania came as a terrible blow to those who remained at home.

Renewed War Efforts

However, the prophecy of an English newspaper relative to the disaster seems to have been fulfilled when the American people recovered from the shock in short order, renewed their efforts to place an army in the field, and assumed a sterner attitude toward the aims and purposes of the conflict.

The liner Tuscania was in charge

of Capt. Peter McLean, according to news dispatches concerning the disaster. Proceeding to France in the midst of a number of transports convoyed by American destroyers, the ship was the target for two torpedoes fired by a German submarine. The second struck it. Destroyers took after the enemy submarine and reported that it had been sunk with depth bombs. It was 7 o'clock in the evening when the Tuscania was struck. Soldiers and crew were taken off in boats and landed in Scotland. Graves for 164 dead recovered from the ocean were dug on the Scottish coast. A vast crowd of the inhabitants of that section attended the funeral services.

Dale C. Hazlett of West Liberty was among the Iowa men reported to have been on the Tuscania and his name was mentioned among those who were saved from the wreck.

BIG RAIN AT WEST LIBERTY

Creek Overflows Banks;
One Farmer's Loss
\$1,000

WEST LIBERTY—Due to the heavy rainfall in this vicinity Saturday evening, the Wapsinonoc creek overflowed its banks and flooded the land near the D. C. Hazlett and L. A. Whitacre dairy barns at the east edge of town. The men spent the greater part of the night trying to save their livestock from drowning. Sunday morning Mr. Hazlett missed 12 of his milk cows. After an all-day search they were found but five, including two of his finest registered Jerseys, were dead, having drowned in the flooded area. The loss, estimated at \$1,000, was not covered by insurance.

The concrete bridge over the same creek a short distance south of West Liberty on road No. 76, was washed out. Other bridges in this vicinity, west of town and near Moscow, were under water and were unsafe for traffic. A number of persons who had driven to Iowa City in the afternoon on returning home came as far as the bridge near Hormel's hill. When they found it unsafe to cross they went back and detoured around by West Branch.

WEST LIBERTY — Dale Hazlett, one of the American soldier survivors of the transport, Tuscania, torpedoed February 5, 1917, en route over seas about 27 miles from the coast of Scotland during the World war, accompanied by Mrs. Hazlett and Mr. and Mrs. Clair Brooke, went to Chicago Friday to join other survivors of the Tuscania at a reunion at the Sherman hotel.

There were about 2,400 men on the transport when it was torpedoed late in the afternoon. Many of the men were lost, between 240 and 400. Mr. Hazlett was one of 32 men on the lifeboat who rowed all night and was first to land on the shores of Scotland at Isley. Here 247 bodies which had floated to the shore, were buried.

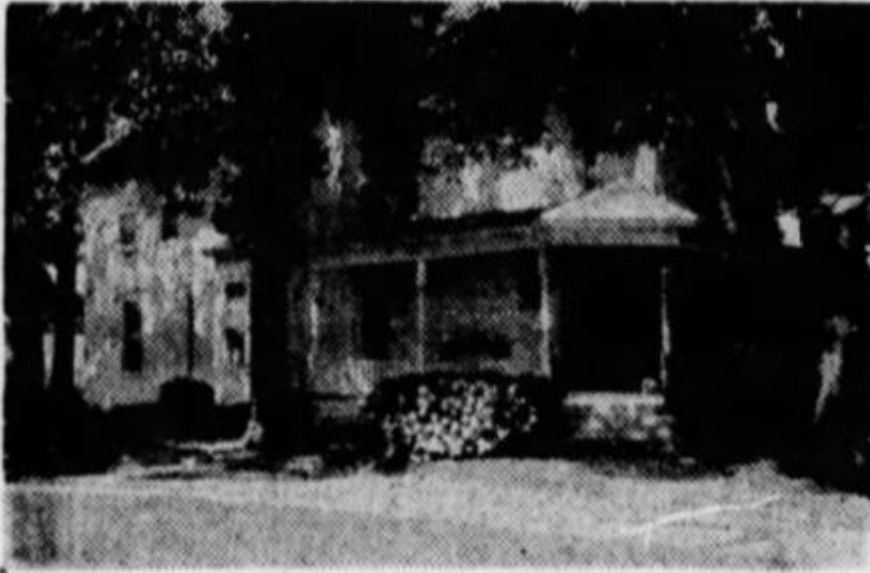

Richard C. Hazlett, West Liberty, Working in Vienna — Returns 5,000 Miles for Draft Call

WEST LIBERTY— Richard C. Hazlett had to travel 5,000 miles to answer his presidential "greeting."

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Hazlett, of West Liberty, he was called back from Vienna, Austria, by his draft board late in February for induction.

Hazlett, 22 graduated from the University of Iowa with a major in political science in June, 1949. Because of his high scholastic achievement, he was awarded a French government fellowship and a Fulbright travel grant to study at the Academy of Political Science, University of Paris.

After finishing his scholastic year in Paris, he traveled about the European continent and from August, 1950, to this month worked in Vienna. His European so-

jour brought him in contact with most of the nationalities on the continent.

Before entering the University

of Paris, he visited with an English family in Bedford, 40 miles from London. After his year in Paris, he traveled to Germany, Switzerland, Norway, and Denmark before going to Vienna.

In Vienna Hazlett worked as a news writer with the Blue Danube network, an English language radio network designed to serve American occupation forces in Austria and Central Europe. It works in close cooperation with the Armed Forces network in Germany.

Hazlett claims he was surprised by his first sight of Russian soldiers in Vienna because they seemed to be very young, not over 16 or 17 years of age.

"They seemed like unkept kids carrying big guns," he says. "They like to parade around the streets with guns slung over their backs and look menacing. They are forbidden all contact with foreigners."

"Vienna, surprisingly enough," Hazlett says, "has a large supply of luxury goods for sale. It is amusing to see the Russians looking at these items in the shop windows. First they glance furtively around to see if they are being watched, then look longingly at the clothing or leather goods on display."

Because of its military position partially in Russian hands, and its general history, Hazlett terms Vienna the most fascinating city in Europe.

Hazlett reviewed his experiences abroad this week at a meeting of the Rotary club luncheon in West Liberty.

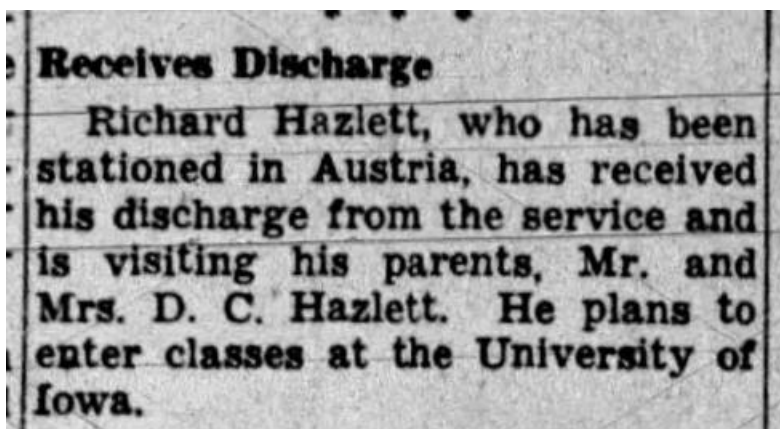

Puerto Rico Publicized by Native Iowan

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico — A native of West Liberty, Ia., Richard Hazlett, is press agenting the Puerto Rican story as an employe of Hamilton Wright, an international public relations firm with head offices in New York City.

Hazlett is the son of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Hazlett of West Liberty, where his father operates a real estate business in addition to farming. He was graduated from the University of Iowa in 1949 and took graduate work in political science as a Fulbright fellow, studying in Paris.

Service in Vienna.

When his year's Fulbright study was completed, Hazlett landed a job in Vienna, Austria, as a writer for the Blue Danube radio network. With the outbreak of Korean hostilities, he was called up for military service and, quite by happenstance, was assigned to Vienna.

The Iowan worked in New York City for a time before going to San Juan, Puerto Rico, 17 months ago as a writer and assistant director of the public relations activities being carried on there by the American firm in an attempt to promote the island.

Both Vienna and San Juan offer special opportunities for Hazlett because of his interest in languages. But probably the thing that fascinates him most about

Puerto Rico is the "feeling it gives you of being a frontier."

The island which on July 25, 1951, became a self-governing commonwealth, associated with the United States freely and of its own volition, is making economic strides with eye-opening rapidity. The development of the island is attracting capital from the United States, in particular, with the result that, as Hazlett puts it, "things are happening all the time."

"You drive down a street one day," he explains, "and when you return there a week later you find it has completely changed."

Hazlett, who last visited his West Liberty home in July, 1955, says that Americans who live in Iowa or any of the 48 states are "continentals" to the Puerto Ricans. A person, wishing to distinguish between a native of the island or of the States, speaks of a "Puerto Rican" or "a continental." Puerto Ricans, however, under the unique commonwealth status of their government, enjoy United States citizenship and have the entire say-so in their internal political affairs.

Statehood Issue.

Some Puerto Ricans advocate statehood for their island, but many potent political leaders prefer to remain as they are in their relationship to the United States government. They point out, for instance, that the island can't afford the tax responsibility of a state.

Among those holding this view is the self-made woman who has served for 10 years as the mayor of San Juan. She's Felisa Rincon de Gautier, known throughout the island as Dona Felisa, and easily one of the most colorful personalities Hazlett has to press agent when he's telling the world the story of Puerto Rico.

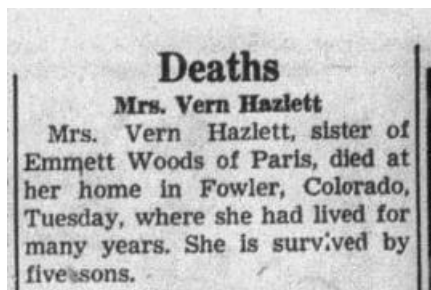

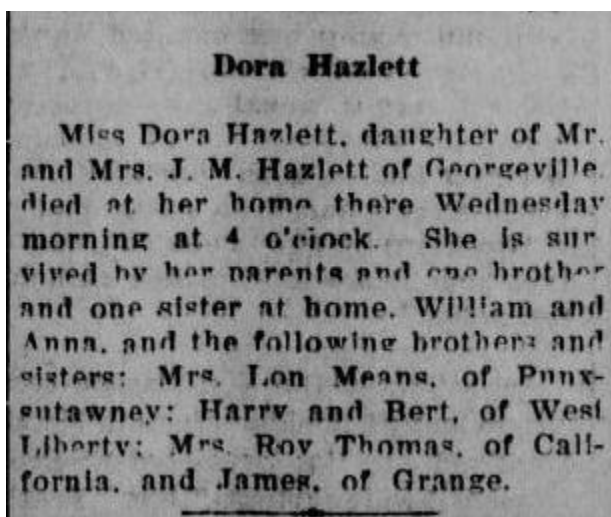

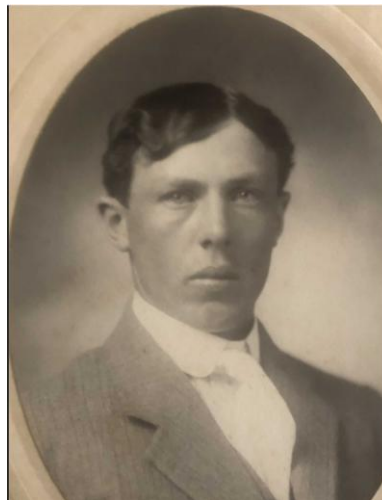

- In the 1900 census, Dale Hazlett (age 7, b. PA) is listed as the grandson of Mack [John] (58) & Catherine (57) Hazlett of North Mahoning Township, Indiana Co. PA. Living in the household are John & Catherine's children: Della (24), Laverne/Vern (22), Dora (20), William

(17) & Annie (age 14). Except for William & Annie, one of the children could have been Dale's biological parent. Also, there were older Hazlett children not present in this household.

- Catherine would have been 49 years old when Dale was born in 1892 & so that makes her an unlikely mother. References by his "uncles" to Dale as a brother may mean they considered him like a brother, or they shared the same father: John Hazlett, who could biologically have fathered a child in 1892 (at age 50).
- Dale might have also been adopted or a foster child, or the birth child or another relative. Except he is specifically noted as a "grandson" in 1900.
- His PA birth record cannot be located. This may be because birth certificates of illegitimate children are sealed.
- Several records list the 8 children born to John & Catherine; this would not include Dale. The obituaries of John & Catherine do not list Dale as a surviving son, nor do obituaries of uncles/aunts list Dale as a surviving brother, except for the Sep 1931 obituary of Harry Hazlett & the Sep 1962 obituary of Della Hazlett Means.
- Dale lists as his WWI next-of-kin his "brother" Harry Everett Hazlett of Iowa. One newspaper article does list J.F. Hazlett as his father.
- In the 1910 census, Dale is living in Madison, Polk Co. IA with Vern S. Hazlett, identified as Vern's brother.

"Muscatine (IA) Journal" 28 Dec 1951 p 34 - the March 1951 quota for military personnel from Muscatine Co. IA includes Richard Carlton Hazlett of West Liberty IA. - The "Muscatine (IA) Journal" 5 Feb 1986 p 3 notes the death of Richard C. Hazlett on 25 Feb 1985 in NYC. The Muscatine newspaper notes the probate of the estate of Richard Hazlett in Dec 1993. - Richard worked in public relations, in Puerto Rico & in NYC (where he took a new job with Sontheimer Runkle in Nov 1962, moving from Puerto Rico). - Not on Find A Grave as of 22 Jul 2026.

- **Harry Everett Hazlett**, 5 Jul 1867 [found as 1868 in error] Georgeville, Indiana PA – 12 Sep 1931 Iowa City, Johnson IA. – His birthdate of 5 Jul 1868 is impossible if his sister Jennie was born 28 Dec 1868. The 1880 census indicates Harry is age 3 & Jennie age 1. In the 1900 census for Wapsinowoc, Muscatine IA, his birth is listed as Jul 1867. - Listed as Dale's brother & wartime next-of-kin in WWI. - The informant on Harry's IA death certificate was D.C. Hazlett. Dale reports that Harry's father was McFarland Hazlett (b. Georgeville PA) but that his mother's name & birthplace are "unknown." Center St. Roy is a young farmer who resides near Malcom IA. – Jennie was a resident of La Mesa CA at time of death. – in 1900 Jennie Thomas, age 30, b. Dec 1869 PA resided with husband Ray Thomas, age 21, b. Apr 1879 IL. They had been married 1 year; he was a farm hand. – In 1920, 1930 & 1940, the couple lived in San Diego, San Diego CA. In 1930 their divorced daughter Vera P. White (27 IA) lived with them, their son Arthur J. (22 MO) & Vera’s son Thomas White (3 CA). "Muscatine (IA) Journal" 28 May 1917 p 4 – when Miss Wilma Walker married Benton R. Anderson on 27 May 1917 in West Liberty IA, Wilma's bridesmaid was Miss Martha Whitacre while Dale Hazlett was the groom's attendant.

"Muscatine (IA) News-Tribune" 31 Oct 1917 p 3 – Dale Hazlett returned home on Friday after 2 weeks visiting relatives in PA.

"Davenport (IA) Daily Times" 18 Mar 1918 p 12 - writes to friends in the Albert Whiteacre family. Has been in an English rest camp since rescued. Resident of West Liberty IA. Was in a lifeboat 20 minutes after ship was hit. helping pick men out of the water who had been thrown out of their boat. He rowed 11 hours until they landed. "The worn, wet and hand-blistered soldiers were royally received by Scottish folk, who gave the visitors the best their village afforded." [the Scots on the isle of Islay] He had only a pair of trousers, a sweater & pair of shoes but the English & Scottish folk equipped him well & warmly.

"Quad City Times" (Davenport IA) 10 Jun 1919 p 12 – Dale Hazlett, West Liberty IA soldier home from war. He had 2 narrow escapes, one of them on Tuscania. In the lifeboat's "impromptu crew" Dale was the only 1 who could remain at the oars & they had a 9-hour struggle, being close to exhaustion when they landed on Islay. He had only commanded a 16-foot rowboat before that, but he assumed command & got them ashore. His 2nd escape: he was incapacitated when a Missouri mule kicked him in the face in France
