Friends may call at the Jack Funeral Home, Blair, today after 4 p.m. and at the church Tuesday from 10 to 11 a.m.

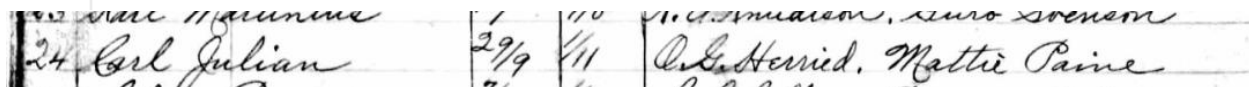

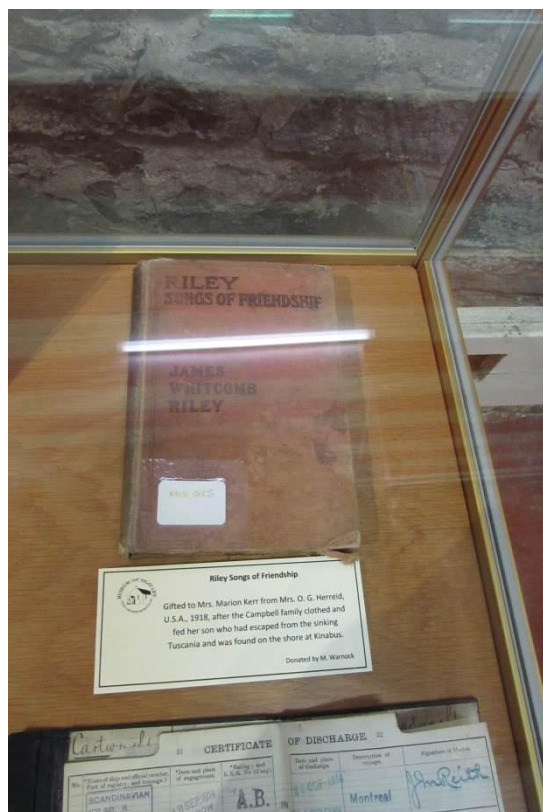

Farmer With Two Sons on Tuscania Awaiting Tidings

Seventeen Boys From His County Were Aboard Ill- Fated Troop Ship.

Winona, Feb. 10.—A little town in Trempealeau county, Wis.,—Ettrick, a few miles from Galesville—was in a frenzy Thursday when press reports carried information to the effect that the Cunard liner Tuscania, sunk off Ireland last Tuesday evening, had aboard, when the torpedo struck her, five of that village's young men.

"The knaiser is only strengthening the blow that will be delivered against him by such sneaking attacks," said Ole Herried, a farmer living near Ettrick, while in the village general store yesterday. Just then the telephone rang and the merchant was given the name of Corporals G. H. Herried and Earl J. Herried as among those aboard the ill-fated troop ship. That was the first information the father had. These two brothers although badly needed on the farm, were given to the colors by Ole Herried. Now, six months after they marched away with L company, Sixth Wisconsin, the parent is anxiously awaiting word whether the two boys are numbered with the victims.

Ettrick has only 200 residents. Five boys on the Tuscania were the village's offering to the cause of freedom. Business was suspended Thursday and the fate of the quintet will continue the one topic until the names of the missing are known.

Trempealeau county, with 17 men on the Tuscania's roster, is experiencing the wildest excitement.

Ettrick Trio Holds Vivid Recollection Of Tuscania Sinking

ETTRICK, WIS.— (Special) — Vivid in the memories of Carl and Gordon Herried and John Helleckson remains the night of February 5, sixteen years ago. For on that night, during the World war, occurred the sinking of the Tuscania, of which these men are survivors.

Sister to Lusitania

The Tuscania, a sister ship to the equally ill fated Lusitania, had been built a first class passenger ship. During the war she was used for transporting troops. At the time she was torpedoed by a German U-Boat, she was bound for Liverpool, with 2,700 men on board. Of these, 250 lost their lives. Many were from Wisconsin. She was nearing the end of her voyage; the British had sent a convoy of three destroyers to escort her safely into port. They were making good time between the shores of Scotland and Ireland about five miles at sea. Shortly before she was struck, a light house had been sighted on the Irish coast.

The weather was cold and skies were overcast; a strong wind was blowing. It was about 5:45 in the evening, and in that northern clime, darkness had fallen early. The men had had mess, and had gone below for the night.

Were Playing Cards

The Ettrick men, who were enlisted in Company F, 107th Supply Train, were playing cards. They felt safe with their convoy of destroyers, and so near their journey's end. They had ceased to worry over submarines.

In between the life boat and the Tuscania, causing the life boat to rise to a level with the deck of the Mosquito.

A cable stretched around the deck of the destroyer was grasped by the men in the small boat. The cable broke, letting some of the men fall back into the sea. Helleckson got his arm around a steel post and clung there until helped aboard by a British sailor. Looking down, he could see eight or nine men in the small boat which he had left. One, with his leg doubled under him, broken when he fell into the boat, was screaming for help. But no aid could be given and he and his companions were swept into the water.

Emergency lights had been placed on the deck of the Tuscania, and threw a little ring of light around the ship. Beyond that ring was utter darkness.

Gordon Herried Rescued

Gordon Herried, after floating about in the water for some time, was picked up by half a dozen men in a life boat. The boat was finally washed ashore on the coast of Scotland, near the humble cottage of two Scotch women. Herried, with uniform soaked, his hair standing straight up, stiff with the salt water, tried to make the women understand. He was so cold he could not talk, and the women, who had never before seen an American soldier, nearly fainted with fright. When they finally understood what had happened, they eagerly made the men welcome and gave them food, beds and blankets.

Without warning, the boat was struck. The concussion was so great that Helleckson, who was seated on a life preserver, was knocked completely from his perch, and suffered a violent nose bleed.

All was instantly dark. Guns were fired from the Tuscania, but the U boat was never sighted, and escaped scot free. The Tuscania, struck in the region of the boiler rooms, remained afloat three hours. The men, who had previously been instructed as to where to station themselves on deck in case of disaster, were scrambling upward in darkness. Temporary bunks had been built, one row above the other, with aisles between so narrow two men could not pass. Helleckson had forgotten his life preserver. He could not pass the hurrying men in the aisles and was forced to crawl back on hands and knees over the row of bunks.

There was some panic aboard, but for the most part, all were orderly. Having reached the deck, orders were given to lower away the life boats. All life boats on the side which was torpedoed were blown to bits. The men, unused to ropes and knots, lowered the first boat, filled with men. Half way to the water, the ropes became entangled, the men were dumped into the ocean, and the boat left hanging in air, midway. Helleckson and his companions then decided to lower their boat first, and get into it afterward. The boat was successfully lowered. Helleckson and Carl Herried, with a dozen others, slid down a rope and into the small boat. When Gordon Herried came down the same rope, the boat was gone, and he was thrown into the icy waters of the Atlantic.

Destroyer Comes to Aid

The destroyer, "Mosquito" swept

boats and blankets.

Helleckson and Carl Herried, on the destroyer, Mosquito, landed at Buncrana, Ireland, with 200 other survivors. The waters there were so shallow the Mosquito was unable to land, and the men had to be taken off on a side wheeler. They were taken to barracks, served with tea and hot soup, and given blankets to sleep on the floor. They remained a week before going on to Liverpool.

Helleckson, is now a rural carrier on route 1. Ettrick, and scout-master of Troop 56. Carl Herried is occupied with farming, while his brother Gordon is a carpenter. Henry Okanee, formerly of Ettrick, who is also a survivor of the Tuscania, now lives at Winona.

Wallace Amundson, 20, who was wounded in France on July 14 and died as the result of those wounds.

Tuscania Survivors at Galesville to Organize

Galesville, Wis. —(Special)— Formation of a unit of the national Tuscania Survivors group is planned for Galesville Thursday evening.

Such survivors here are planning a 7 o'clock dinner at the Coffee Cup cafe, with an organization meeting at the city hall to follow. They urge all survivors of that ill-fated ship to join them if they are in Trempealeau county or the immediate area.

The day, February 5, is the 30th anniversary of the sinking of the troop transport with loss of 144 of the 2,500 soldiers it carried. Most of the men were of Wisconsin and Michigan, and many were of the 32nd division. The ship was torpedoed four miles off the coast of England at 8 p. m., sinking within two hours.

Ray C. Marsh, Galesville, told Monday of the experience, when those who survived swam the four miles to shore, escaped in lifeboats when picked up by British ships, or clung to wreckage until saved. Other local men among known survivors are Nat Carhart and Oakley Parkhill and Henry Okanee, formerly of Ettrick but now of Winona. Others mentioned by Marsh are Gordon and Carl Herreld, Ettrick; Martin DeBoer, now of La Crosse; Jack Hellekson, Blair; Oscar Jahr, Independence, and August Olerzan, Dodge.

Tuscania Went Down 30 Years Ago Today

Whitehall, Wis. — (Special) — Thirty years ago today the steamer Tuscania, hit by a German torpedo, went down off the Irish coast. Among the 2,179 American troops aboard were 15 from Trempealeau county, one of whom lost his life in the disaster.

Otis E. Hutchins, Whitehall, was killed then and later buried with other American soldiers in Scotland. The total loss of American servicemen was placed at 345.

The other 14 Trempealeau county boys aboard the ship were Gordon P. Herreid, John A. Hellekson, Henry A. Oksnee and Carl J. Herreid, Ettrick; Arthur Bidney, Joseph Marsolek and Henry Veum, Independence; Martin J. DeBour, Oscar Jahr and Ray C. Marsh, Galesville; Lee M. Matheson and Omer Houkum, Blair, and Henry P. Vandenburg and Nathan Carhart, Trempealeau.

Whitehall's first American Legion post was organized in the early 20's and was named after Hutchins, the first casualty from this city and area. After World War II another name was added to the title of the post, that of Stendahl, to commemorate Harold Stendahl who was the first casualty in this area.

Tuscania Club Holds Perrot Picnic Sunday

GALESVILLE, Wis. — (Special) —The Tuscania will be remembered Sunday, Aug. 7, when survivors of her sinking will reunite for their second annual picnic in Perrot state park.

Not that she needs remembering, but when word of her torpedoing on Feb. 5, 1918, reached Trempealeau, "remember the Tuscania" became a byword in the whole area, and enlistments jumped.

The sinking cost one man his life. Otis E. Hutchins, son of Dr. S. E. Hutchins, Whitehall, never reached the war in Europe, but was all the more dearly a war casualty.

Fifteen Trempealeau county men were aboard the submarine victim. They were, in addition to Hutchins, Gordon P. Herried, John A. Hellekson, Henry Oksnee and Carl J. Herried, Ettrick; Arthur Bidney, Joseph Marsolek and Henry Veum, Independence; Oakley Parkhill, Martin DeBoer, Oscar Jahr and Ray C. Marsh, Galesville; Lee M. Matheson and Omer Houkum, Blair; and Henry Vanderburg and Nathan Carhart, Trempealeau.

Oksnee now lives in Winona; and De Boer lives in La Crosse. Parkhill is president of the group.

Not all will be present for the reunion Sunday, although a majority of them are expected to be. Gov. Rennebohm was invited, but it was not known if he could attend.

There were 2,179 American GI's on the Tuscania that day. Of them, 345 lost their lives. They belonged to these units: Companies D, E and F of the 20th engineers; the 170th and 107th engineer trains; the 107th supply train; the 100th and 158th and 213th aero squadrons; replacement detachments 1, 2 and 3 of the 32nd division; and 51 casual officers.

The Whitehall American Legion post was named for Otis Hutchins, the first casualty of World war I from the area. Harold Stendahl, first casualty of World war II, became linked in living memory with Hutchins when the post added his name to become the Hutchins-Stendahl American Legion unit.

The picnic is to be a family affair, eaching bringing its own lunch.

Tuscania Club Holds Dinner

Galesville, Wis. —(Special)— The second annual meeting of the Trempealeau county Tuscania club was held at a dinner meeting in the city hall here Saturday evening.

Fourteen members who survived the ill-fated American troop transport Tuscania formed a club last year. The ship was sunk by a German mine off the coast of Scotland February 5, 1918. At that time 174 soldiers were lost and 53 of the crew drowned.

Club members were at one time living in Trempealeau county but now have scattered. Ray Marsh, formerly of Winona and later Galesville, now living in California, was unable to attend. He was one of the club's organizers, and was a former secretary and treasurer.

Oakley Parkhill, Galesville, was re-elected president; John Hellekson, Blair, vice-president and Nat Carhart, Galesville, secretary and treasurer.

Other members present were Oscar Jahr, Independence; Lee Mattson, Blair; Carl and Gordon Herreid, Ettrick; Henry Oksnee, and August Clerzan, both of Winona; Sigurd Simonson, Chippewa Falls; Henry Veum and Clarence Jaquish, both of Eau Claire and Martin De Boer, La Crosse.

A telegram from Governor Oscar Rennebohm was read at the meeting. Greetings of the Wisconsin state legislature were brought by G. M. Wiley, Galesville assemblyman. Lon Tubbs, Whitehall, county veterans service office, brought greetings from the county. Clarence Brown and Bert Gipple, both of Galesville, represented the city.

Trempealeau Tuscania Club Holds Reunion at Whitehall

WHITEHALL—(Special)— Thirty-one persons attended a banquet of the Trempealeau County Tuscania club at the Walgett hotel Sunday evening on the 32nd anniversary of the sinking of the largest of American troop ships torpedoed by German U-boats in World War I.

The group included nine Tuscania survivors, Nathan Carhart of Trempealeau, secretary-treasurer of the club; Oakley L. Parkhill of Galesville, president; Lewis B. Rist and Henry Veum, Eau Claire; Otto F. Bates, Durand; Oscar Jahr, Independence; Lee Mathson and John A. Hellekson, Blair, vice-president; and Martha J. DeBoer, La-Crosse.

Guests included Col. George Sherman from the adjutant general's office, Madison, speaker for the evening; Assemblyman G. M. Wiley, Bert A. Gipple and Clarence E. Brown of Galesville, honorary members; P. M. Paulson of Whitehall city council who welcomed the group; Mrs. Guy E. Carlson of Trempealeau, sister of Otis E. Hutchins, the only Trempealeau county boy lost in the sinking; Carlson, Lon F. Tubbs, and wives or lady friends of the men.

Reviews 32nd Division

Col. Sherman gave a history of the Wisconsin 32nd Division since World War I when it was organized. He praised the example set by this famous division, called "Les Terribles" by Clemenceau during the war, and the success of it in the Pacific theatre in World War II, the division to which the Japanese general Yamoshita surrendered.

Cards received from Tuscania survivors and friends throughout the state, unable to be present, were read. Among them was a card from Governor Rennebohm.

All officers were re-elected and the group voted to hold its annual summer picnic on July 23 at Irvine Park, Chippewa Falls.

Club Three Years Old

The Trempealeau County Tuscania club, unique organization although there are reunions in Minneapolis, Green Bay and at other places, was organized three years ago by Parkhill and Ray Marsh, now of Puento, Calif. Marsh retains his membership here, while Olin Thompson of Rib Lake and Jake Cramer of Medford are also members. The club has a membership of 15 although it started with six.

The record shows that 14 of the 15 Trempealeau county boys on the Tuscania survived. They were Gordon P. Herreld, Hellekson, Henry A. Oksnee and Carl J. Herreld of Ettrick, Arthur Bidney, Joseph Marsolek and Veum of Independence, DeBoer, Jahr and Marsh of Galesville, Mathson and Omer Houkom of Blair and Henry P. Vanderburg and Carhart of Trempealeau. These were their addresses when they enlisted in the company organized by Capt. William F. Rowles at Galesville. At Waco, Tex., where they were sent for training the boys were separated.

Otis E. Hutchins, the victim from this group, was a sergeant in the 107th supply train. That he died a vallant death was later told by his commanding officer and members of his company, including Sgt. Parkhill and Cpl Houkom, who wrote to his parents, Dr. and Mrs. S. E. Hutchins of Whitehall, telling that Hutchins sacrificed his place to another buddy.

The life boat assigned to his group was destroyed and the men waited on board the ship for two hours before a boat was available. Hutchins' absence was not noted until the life boat was clear of the ship.

Buried In Ireland

His body was later washed up on the Island of Islay off Lorne, Ireland, and he was buried there with the other 172 American soldiers lost. Later his remains were moved to Arlington cemetery.

The men recalled the torpedo striking at 5:35 p.m. Feb. 5, 1918, and they didn't need the whistle signal to tell them that the Germans had "packed a wallop."

DeBoer said he had been playing poker. He held a royal flush. Like the others he rushed to the top deck, and discovered that he was still holding the cards.

All remained orderly until the men reached the deck and were awaiting their turn into life boats, with the ship listing heavily.

All but 173 of the 2500 American soldiers and 54 of the crewmen survived. They were drenched,

cold and near despair before being picked up by fishing trollers off the Ireland coast.

Oakley has a diary of the events that he wrote on the stationery of the Kings Arms inn at Lorne, County Antrim, Ireland, where he rested after the disaster.

Hutchins-Stendahl American Legion post at Whitehall is named for Otis E. Hutchins, and the or-

ganization loaned its Legion and American flags to the club for the banquet. A 10-second pause before the dinner was observed while all faced the east in respect to the Tuscania passengers who did not survive.

Paulson of the city council and Mrs. William M. Rogers, present on behalf of the press, were made honorary members of the club.

250 SOLDIERS LOST LIVES

Ettrick Area Brothers Survived Tuscania Sinking 48 Years Ago

ETTRICK, Wis.—Carl Herreld, 69, and his brother, Gordon, 71, who live in the North Beaver Creek area, are survivors of the ill-fated SS Tuscania, which was sunk the night of Feb. 5, 1918, during World War I.

The Tuscania, a sister ship of the equally ill-fated Lusitania, had been built as a first class passenger ship. During World War I she was used for transporting troops, and at the time she was torpedoed by a German U-boat she was bound for Liverpool with 2,700 American soldiers on board. Of these, 250 lost their lives, many of them from Wisconsin.

She was nearing the end of her voyage, and the British had sent a convoy of three destroyers to escort her safely into port. They were making good time between the shores of Scotland and Ireland and were about five miles at sea.

☆ ☆ ☆

The weather was cold and skies were overcast, with a strong wind blowing. It was about 5:45 p.m. and in that northern clime darkness had already fallen. The men had had mess and had gone below for the night.

The Ettrick men, who were members of F Company, 107th Supply Train, were playing cards. With them were John Hellekson, now dead, and Henry Oksnee, 75, who lives in Winona. They felt safe with their convoy of destroyers, and so near their journey's end. They had ceased to worry about submarines.

Without warning the ship was struck, and all was instantly dark. The Tuscania guns were fired, but the U-boat was never sighted and escaped.

The ship, struck in the region of the boiler rooms, remained afloat three hours.

There was some panic aboard, but for the most part the men remained calm. Orders were given to lower lifeboats, but the boats on the side which was torpedoed had been blown to bits.

The men, unused to ropes and knots, lowered the first boat filled with men. When the boat was halfway down, the ropes became entangled, the men were dumped into the water and the boat left hanging in air.

The Herreids and their companions then decided to lower their boat first and get into it afterward, and the boat was successfully lowered.

Carl Herreid, with a dozen others, slid down a rope and into the small boat, but when Gordon came down the boat was gone and he was thrown into the icy waters of the Atlantic.

The destroyer HMS Mosquito swept in between the lifeboat and the Tuscania, causing the lifeboat to rise to a level with the destroyer's deck.

After floating about in the water for some time, Herreid was picked up by men in a lifeboat, and the boat was finally washed ashore on the coast of Scotland near the cottage of two elderly Scotch women.

Herreid, with his clothing soaked, his hair standing on end, stiff with the salt water, tried to make the women understand, but he was so cold he could not speak, and the women nearly fainted with fright. When they finally understood what had happened, they eagerly made Herreid welcome and gave him food, bed and blankets.

Harry Vanderburg, 71, of

Mukwanago, was a chaplain on the Tuscania and was the last man off the ship. He is married to the former Gertrude Halder-son of Galesville. In a recent letter to his sister-in-law, Mrs. Alvin Young of Galesville, Vanderburg wrote that he had recently attended the 48th reunion of the Tuscania survivors in Milwaukee. ☆ ☆ ☆ According to Vanderburg, the captain of the U-77 which sank the Tuscania was located many	years after the war and came to Chicago in 1932 to speak to the survivors. He is Capt. Wilhelm Meyer, who had a crew of 35 on his U-boat. The captain and the Tuscania survivors exchanged greetings annually until 1940, when the captain's notes became less cordial. A cairn has been erected on the Isle of Ismay in Scotland and the Tuscania victims whose bodies were washed ashore are buried in Kilnaughten Military Cemetery.

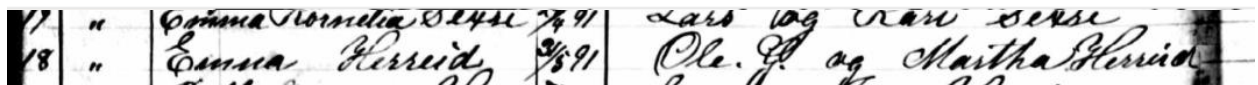

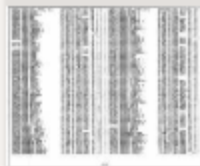

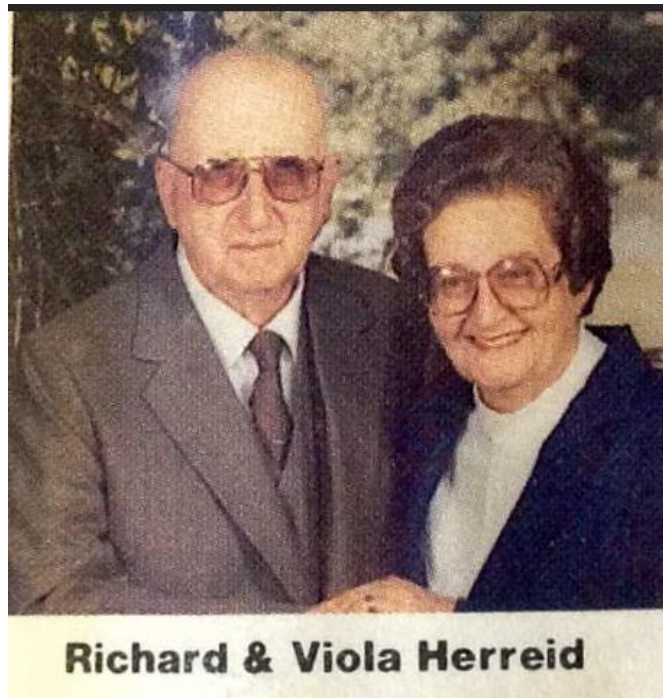

Ole was the brother of John Hellekson’s mother, Sena Herreid Hellekson.

The parents of Ole & Sena Herreid were Gilbert Olson Herreid & Ingeborg Torgesdatter (Twinde) Herreid, Carl, Julian and John’s grandparents.

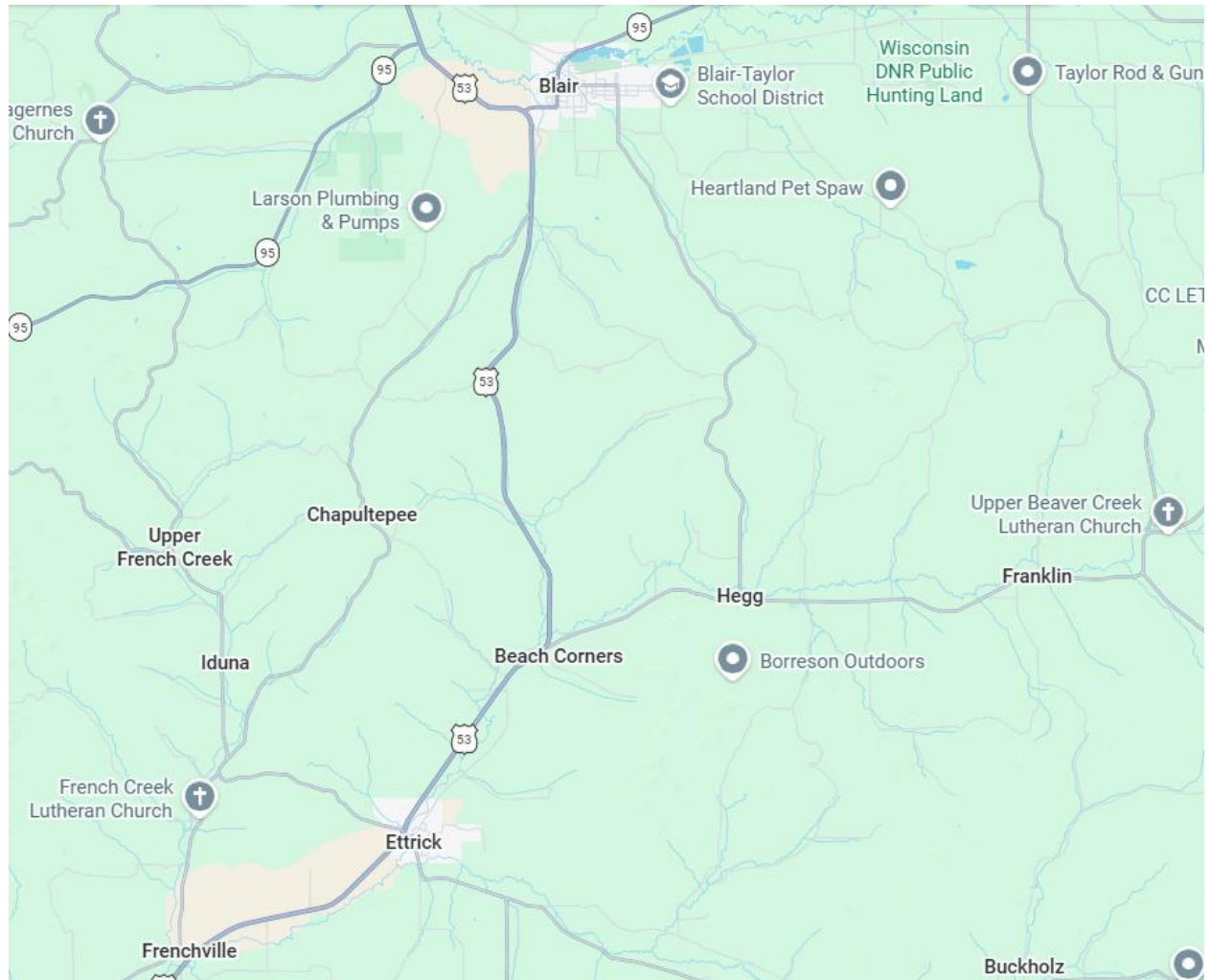
