Mrs. E. E. Benton, 813 W. Main, has returned from Tulsa where she attended the funeral of her nephew, Allen L. Hicks, World War I veteran, who died March 21 in a Tulsa hospital. He was 66.

Born in Ardmore March 9, 1894, he attended school here until he was 12 when his parents moved to Tulsa. He was an accountant for the Tulsa Water Co., more than 15 years, and a member of the American Legion and First Christian Church. He had been in declining health several years.

His wife, two sons, Eddie and Don, 3466, S. Delaware, Tulsa, survive. Other relatives here are another aunt, Mrs. Fannie Hicks and Mrs. Bessie Cook, a cousin.

Allen L. Hicks Rites Slated; City Employee

Services for Allen Lee Hicks, 65, of 3466 S. Delaware ave., an accountant in the city water department, will be held at 10 a.m. Thursday in Stanley's service room. He died Monday in a Tulsa hospital.

A Tulsa resident 45 years, Mr. Hicks had worked for the city since 1949 and was previously employed at Oklahoma Natural Gas Co. He was born at Ardmore and was an army veteran of World War I.

Mr. Hicks was a member of the First Christian church, Rock Masonic lodge, American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars here.

Survivors include the widow, Neta; two sons, Don and Edward Hicks, of the home, and his mother, Mrs. Maude Hicks, Ardmore.

Interment will be in Rose Hill cemetery.

Allen Lee Hicks, a city water department accountant, died in a Tulsa hospital today after a three-year illness.

Mr. Hicks, 65, had worked for the city 11 years. He had lived in Tulsa since 1915. He formerly was employed in the Oklahoma Natural Gas Co. accounting department. The family home is at 3466 S. Delaware Ave.

He was born in Ardmore, and was a member of the Rock Masonic Lodge and First Christian Church. He was an Army veteran of World War I and was a member of the Tulsa Veterans of Foreign Wars and Carson-Wilson American Legion Post.

Surviving are his wife, Neta; two sons, Don and Edward, both of the home, and his mother, Mrs. Maude Hicks of Ardmore.

Services will be held at 10 a.m. Thursday in Stanleys Service Room. Burial will be in Rose Hill.

LIST OF OKLAHOMANS.

Washington, Feb. 9.—Complete lists of passengers aboard the transport Tuscania which the war department finished making public yesterday show that there were 138 Oklahoma men among the 2,177 military passengers aboard the British liner when she was submarined off the coast of Ireland, Tuesday afternoon.

Whether any of the Oklahoma men are among the casualties is not known and probably will not be known for two or three days, until after the names of all survivors who have been landed at a number of Irish ports have been checked against the transport's passenger list.

Most of the Oklahoma men are from scattering units in the Twentieth engineers, 165th depot brigade and the 157th and 158th infantry.

Although first reports stated most of the Tuscania's passengers were from Michigan and Wisconsin, the passenger lists made public yesterday show the men were from at least a dozen states.

The following list of names of Oklahoma men aboard the Tuscania is taken from the passenger list compiled by the war department at the port of embarkation, and is complete. The names of the men, their next of kin and their emergency addresses are as follows:

Allen Hicks of Klefer and Ralph
R. Adams Of Oilton Among
138 Oklahomans Aboard
Torpedoed Transport

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 9.—Two Creek county boys were among 138 Oklahomans aboard the British liner Tuscania when she was submarined off the coast of Ireland on Tuesday.

They are: Allen Lee Lynn Hicks, son of Burwell L. Hicks, Klefer, and Ralph S. Adams, son of Mrs. Sarah Adams of Oilton.

Whether any of the Oklahoma boys were among the casualties is not known and probably will not be known for two or three days until after the names of all survivors who have been landed at a number of Irish and Scottish ports have been checked against the transport passenger list.

Most of the Oklahoma men are from scattering units in the Twentieth engineers, 165th depot brigade and the 157th and 158th infantry.

Washington, Feb. 10.—Names of many Oklahoma men were received by the war department Sunday in the list of survivors from the torpedoed Tuscania. Some of them did not appear in the original list of passengers.

The absence of a man's name from the list of survivors should not be taken as an indication that he is among the missing, as many hundred names are yet to come by cable, only 1,400 having been received.

ALLEN L. HICKS WRITES HOME

The following letter has been handed us by Mr. D. C. Wheeler. It was written by Allen L. Hicks, who is at Camp Merritt, New Jersey, to his father and mother in this city on the eve of his departure for France. The letter is significant in the fact that it portrays the feelings of the young American soldier before going to face death on the European battlefields, and it is also typical of the tender regard the boy holds for his father and mother. Hicks is a nephew of Mr. Wheeler:

Camp Merritt, New Jersey,
Sunday, Jan. 20, 1918.

My Dearest and Beloved Ones:

Starting this letter with a feeling that it will be the last I will have the pleasure of writing to you in old United States, there are a few things I want to tell you before leaving.

First of all, I am feeling fine—no remarks to make at all concerning myself. As to my physical condition, I never felt better in all my life. I had to stop for inspection. This morning I shaved and shined my shoes, and now I am dressed up. (We have inspection every morning at 9 o'clock. We, or they, are organizing a company and forming corporals and sergeants).

There is a feeling in everyone's heart we will leave here tomorrow, Monday, Jan. 21, though we cannot tell for sure.

We are hundreds of miles apart now, and later we will be thousands. I feel like I can never leave, for it nearly breaks my heart when I think of you; to think how long it will be until I can see your dear faces. God is the only one who knows, and time is all that can tell how long I am to be gone.

But, nevertheless, I am going with a feeling that I will return some day, and one thing, dear ones, I am going to live a clean life, as I have always lived. You can expect the same of me, mother, as in the past, from my childhood days 'till I reached my manhood days.

If there is any fighting it will

my manhood days.

If there is any fighting it will be for you as well as Uncle Sam.

To you, father and mother, I can never, never repay you for my raising up. My gentlemanly manners all I owe to you, for I have been taught right from wrong from my birth until I left you on Dec, 10, 1917, and I can never go back on my raising.

My love for you can be not more than a son's love, and my heart nearly breaks when I think of leaving and not having a chance to see your dear faces before leaving. But, dear ones, I am thinking of you every day and night, and will do so until my death.

Now, dear ones, before I close let me say, never give up hope, never get discouraged if you do not hear from me often, for I will write often. I will mail you a card giving the correct address that will reach me all right after

I leave here.

Again, dear father and mother, your kindness and teaching will be obeyed away from home as well as at home.

Last of all, will say to you, dear father, above all take good care of mother. You are the only one now to look after her and see that she is not neglected.

When she needs anything, if you can spare it don't refuse.

Closing this letter, the next, no doubt, will come from "Over there."

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Water, Sewer Workers Vital to City Operations

High on the list of persons vital to the progressive operation of the city are the men and women of the city water and sewer departments.

They are doubly important because they supply the citizens with water and keep the city drained of sewage, and through their work

they bring more money into the city's operating fund than any other department.

In order to introduce these city workers to the people who pay their salaries, their names were taken from the payroll on file in the city auditor's office for the last half of July.

The auditor's records showed the water and sewer payroll for the last pay period in July came from seven separate funds and was listed on 16 separate vouchers.

The money for the payroll was taken from the general fund; 1952 sanitary sewer bonds, series A; 1950 waterworks bonds, series C; 1952 waterworks bonds, series A; 1949 sanitary sewer bonds, series B; special Owen park feeder cash fund, and the 1941 airport sanitary sewer bonds.

W. F. McMurry, superintendent of waterworks and sewerage, explained the payroll did not reflect the actual half-month wages, since the wages shown for hourly workers were for the period July 10 to 27. Wages shown for salaried workers were for the period July 16 to 31.

McMurry explained the long pay period for the hourly workers was due to the fact the previous pay period included July 1 to 9, or little more than a week.

Some of the hourly wages were for the long pay period and some were for the regular two-week period from July 16 to 31.

Listed below are the names of the workers as carried on the payroll, followed by the pay due them for their work. The wage figure includes money earned at straight time, overtime and any service or longevity pay due the worker:

Pioneer Lumber Dealer Is Dead

Thomas J. Carter in Business Here 30 Years

Thomas J. Carter, 68, pioneer Tulsa lumber dealer for 30 years and owner of the Carter Lumber Co., at 602 S. Frankfort av., died today in the Mayo hospital at Rochester, Minn., where he had been for three weeks undergoing treatment for a blood disease. The family home is at 1404 S. Frisco av.

Mrs. Carter and a daughter, Mrs. H. R. Crews were on their way to Rochester by train and were in Kansas City when word of the death reached them. They are now returning to Tulsa. Dale Carter, a son, who is associated with his father in the lumber business here, is on his way to Rochester.

Carter had not been actively engaged in his business for more than a year and had been in partial retirement. He had been in good health until the extreme heat of last summer caused him some discomfort. Three weeks ago he became seriously ill.

Carter was born in West Fork, Ark., March 22, 1866, where he was reared. As a young man he joined the Presbyterian church there and had kept his membership in that church since. He married Miss Olive McKnight in 1888. In 1904 he came to Tulsa, after having engaged in the lumber business at various points in Arkansas.

He founded the T. J. Carter Lumber Co. immediately after his arrival here. At one time he maintained yards at Jenks, Bixby, Leonard and McPerson but later confined his activities to Tulsa. Besides his lumber business he was also interested in real estate and had considerable holdings.

Survivors, besides his widow, include three daughters, Mrs. H. R. Crews of 1116 S. Cheyenne av., Mrs. Allen Hicks of 1228 S. Galveston av., and Mrs. Fay Hamm of 1404 S. Frisco av., and three sons, Dale, Emmett of Grove, Ok., and Roe, also of Tulsa. Three grandchildren, Marilyn Hamm, Tommy Hamm and Priscilla Jane Carter also live in Tulsa.

The body will be brought to Tulsa for burial.

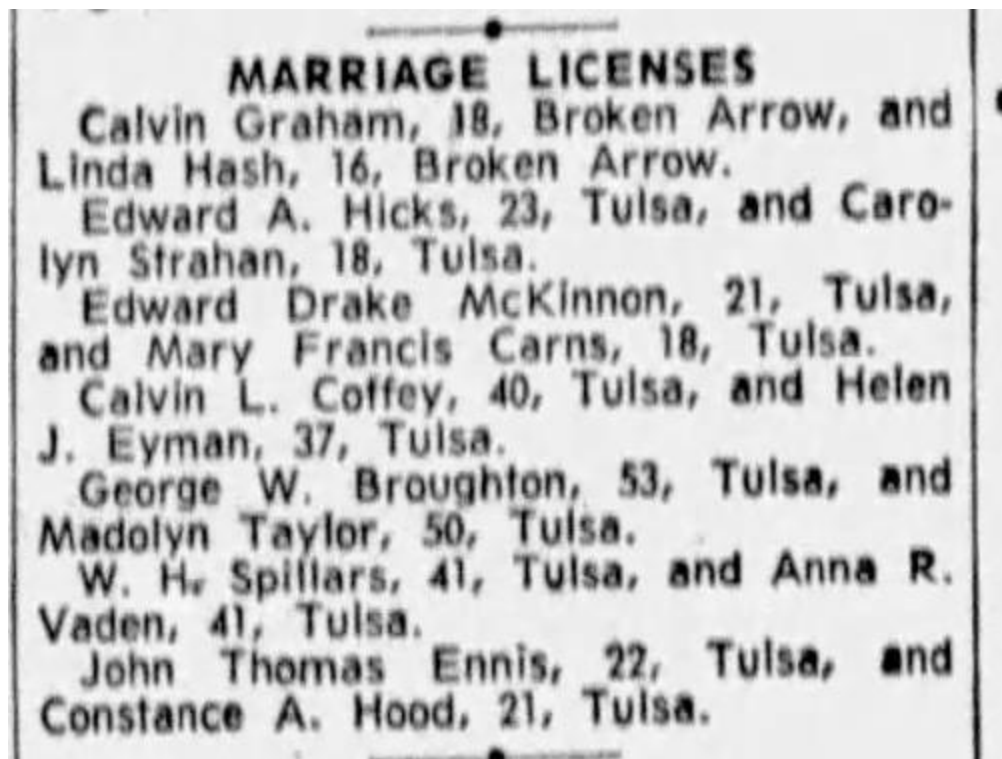

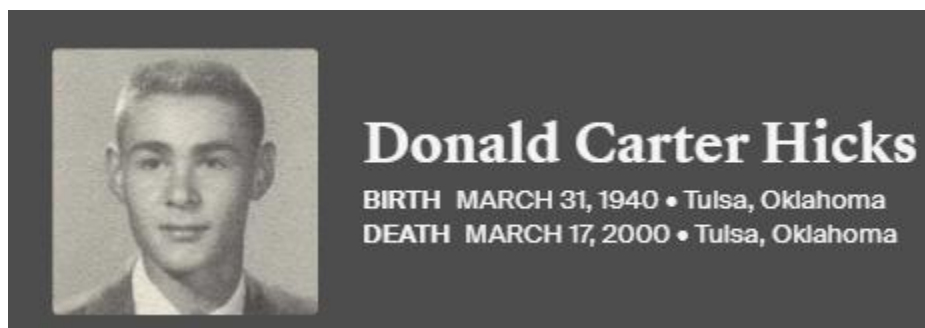

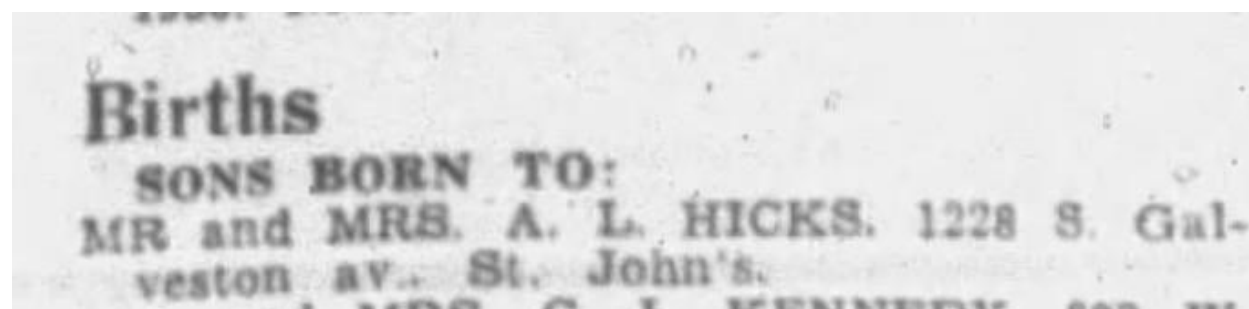

THE 'LAST MAN'S CLUB'

Born on April 1—They Miss the Census—But Here Are Last Ones

Tulsa will have a new club as soon as its members are old enough to organize. It will be the "Last Man's Census Club."

Members will be those children born in Tulsa hospitals between midnight, March 30, and 12:01 a. m. April 1. Their only distinction is that they will be counted in this year's decennial census, while those born after 12:01 a. m. April 1, will not be listed as "statistics" for another 10 years.

The club's membership will include the daughters of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Kropacek, 1123 N. Main st., Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Jones, 1718 S. Louisville av., Mr. and Mrs. S. R. Waldrip, 1103 S. Lawton av., Mr. and Mrs. Charles Brown, 1132 E. Eighteenth st., and Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Mason, 1123 E. Evanston av., as well as the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Hicks, 1228 S. Galveston av.

"We had to set an arbitrary date on which the census was to be 'taken,'" District Director Malcolm Hevenor said, "and census officials chose to take it as of April 1."

"Children born on or after that date will not be enumerated until the next census in 1950."

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Dunten, Sand Springs, for example, will not be enumerated this year, since she was born at 5:40 a. m. April 1.

So far none of the club's members have done any commenting outside of an occasional "goo" or "da."

Hevenor explained that because



of the deadline, the census will list dead persons pointing out that the dead counted and the living missed will nearly equalize one another.

All persons who died on April 1 will be enumerated. The enumerator might not get around to their homes for a week or two but they will be listed as living on April 1.

CENSUS TAKING IN TULSA should end by midnight Tuesday, but it probably will not be completed before Wednesday night, Malcolm Hevenor, district director, said Saturday.

Hevenor estimated that approximately 60 per cent of the enumerations had been turned in to the district office.

"We will check up Sunday to see just how we stand," he said, "and then clean up holdovers and others next week."

Enumerators will be shifted to aid others whose districts have more people in them. There are 121 districts in the city.

Hevenor said figures on Tulsa's population will not be available before May 1, the date the county census is to be completed. Both city and county censuses started April 2. Hevenor's job of tabulating the results will last until around June 1. His only immediate plans are "taking a rest."

Penelope Sue (Penny) Kropacek, two-week-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Kropacek, 1223 N. Main st., isn't much concerned over her membership in the mythical Last Man's Census club as she squirms in her mother's arms. Penelope was one of seven children born in Tulsa hospitals on the eve of the census.

Don's obituary

Father

B. I. HICKS ENDS LIFE LAST EVE

Despondent Cafe Owner Wrote Notes to His Family Before He Fired Fatal Shot.

A farewell note to his wife and son at Kiefer explained the suicide motive of B. I. "Curly" Hicks, Kiefer cafe owner who shot himself through the heart at the Frisco freight depot here at 7 o'clock last night. Hicks was depressed over an investigation of a fire which had occurred at his cafe Monday night.

Hicks was brought to Sapulpa yesterday by E. G. Cooper, deputy state fire marshal and A. O. Rankin, deputy sheriff, and was questioned about the fire at his cafe. It had been reported that gasoline was found sprinkled around the place after the fire, discovered soon after it had started, was extinguished.

Had Been In Court Here

The case was talked over with the county attorney and no complaint was filed. Hicks was released in the afternoon. His body was found on the steps of the freight depot after Chief of Police Ralph Morey and Officer C. P. Lloyd heard the shot fired. The police station is located near the freight depot, where Hicks died. The chief and Lloyd rushed to the dying man, but found that he was unable to talk. He died before assistance could be given him. Dr. P. K. Lewis, who examined him, said that the bullet pierced his heart, causing almost instant death.

After Hicks' death it was learned that when he was released yesterday afternoon, he went to the Geetah Clothing and Jewelry store and purchased a .38 calibre Colts revolver. He purchased also a tablet and wrote a farewell note as he sat on the steps of the freight depot. The gun had five unused cartridges in it, after Hicks killed himself.

Note Left In Tablet

Several pages in the tablet had been written on. At the top of the first page, he wrote, "I left home about 4 o'clock." Then he wrote "5:30 o'clock May, Wednesday 2, 1928." The letter was addressed to "Maude and Allen, my wife and son."

"You may think I was crazy," he wrote, "but I am not." "From the way Mr. Cooper and Mr. Rankin talked to me this afternoon, they told me they had the goods on Mr. Marshall. I told them Mr. Marshall and I were good friends. I don't believe he tried to set fire to my house. I believe he is too good a friend of mine to do a trick like that. I don't believe he did it."

The Marshall referred to here is V. R. Marshall of Kiefer. Marshall and Hicks had some business transactions, officers here said.

Blamed Pair for Suicide

On another page of the tablet Hicks wrote: "Mr. Cooper and Mr. Rankin is the cause of me doing this deed. They are to blame. They said that they were going over and arrest Mr. Marshall this afternoon."

"They seemed to want to talk me into having the house set on fire," he continued in a scarcely legible script, "but I did not. I told them I did not. Well, Allen, after they went away I told your mother what they said, and it liked to killed her. Then I came down town, got me a bite to eat, and then I went back to the house and your mother was almost grief stricken. Then I came to the phone office and called you up for the last time. Allen I think I have been a good father and Maude I have been a good husband."

He instructed his relatives about his burial before closing the note. He says "bury me in my light suit. Have a Masonic ceremony and K. K. K. Also put my robe on me, too, and have Brother Waggner bury me in Sapulpa. Have Mr. Buffington the undertaker."

Instructions Written

Without signing his name he wrote a post script.

"Take this gun back to the man I bought it off of, and get what you can out of it. Pay Harry for what hauling he has done. I left the key to the store with the carpenter up to West Tulsa. Pay him too."

After the post script follows another date line, "May 2, 1928." Beginning again on a new sheet of the tablet he wrote, "Maude Hicks and Allan Hicks: Don't have no court proceedings over what I have left. You and your mother are the sole heirs. Nobody else but you two, split everything half and half. B. I. Hicks. I owe Mr. Cartain \$38.74. Pay that right away. Hays the grove attended to in June and September and maybe you can get a good price for it this winter. It is now three minutes to seven o'clock."

After closing the tablet, he shot himself through the heart. It was just three minutes before seven that the police chief heard the shot fired, and rushed to the dying man.

Brother of Bristow Officer

The dead man is a brother of E. H. Hicks, deputy sheriff at Bristow, formerly of Kiefer. Hicks came here from Bristow yesterday afternoon and talked to his brother about the fire which the fire marshal was investi-

gating. Wiley Hicks of Dallas, is another brother of Hicks.

Rankin said this morning that he did not wish to talk of the affair. He said that when Hicks left yesterday after being discharged he seemed to be in good spirits, laughing and exchanging jokes with officers. When Rankin returned from Kiefer after the investigation he found Hicks dead.

Hicks body was taken to the Lewis-Landrith funeral parlors but was removed to the Buffington Funeral Home in compliance with the request of the dead man in his last note.

Funeral services for Hicks will be held Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the First Christian church of this city. Rev. Sam Wagoner of Bartlesville, an old friend of the family will officiate at the services and interment will be made in the South Heights cemetery with the Buffington Funeral Home in charge of the arrangements.

HICKS FUNERAL IS HELD TODAY

Funeral services were held at 3 o'clock this afternoon at the first Christian church for B. I. Hicks, Kiefer man who ended his life here Thursday. Rev. Sam Wagoner of Bartlesville, presided at the services, in accordance with a request made by Hicks in a farewell note to his wife and son.

The Masonic ceremony was used at the service. This was also in accordance with the instructions he left in the tragic last note. The arrangements were in charge of the Buffington Funeral home. Burial was made at the Southern Heights cemetery.

Funeral of his father Burrell Hicks – gives death date of 3 May 1928 - "Sapulpa (OK) Herald" Saturday, 5 May 1928 p 2

The Hicks Confectionery, owned by Curley Hicks, suffered the next greatest loss which was estimated at \$8,000. He carried insurance of \$3,500. The entire contents of his confectionery were destroyed and the fixtures of his restaurant in the adjoining structure were also destroyed. Hicks conducted a news stand in connection with his business and a branch office for The Herald.

A building owned by Lew Wilder that had been divided into two sections, one of which was occupied by Dr. R. L. Artz and the other by Mrs. Berts Beauty Parlor, was damaged to the extent of \$2,500. Very little damage was done in the section occupied by the beauty parlor, but the interior of the doctor's office and the roof of the building were destroyed.

Carr's Candy Shop, owned by a widow, Mrs. Carr, who had established the small shop to provide an income with which to care for herself, was completely destroyed and she was left almost penniless. The building in which she conducted her store was owned by Curly Hicks.

The seventh store room, the interior of which was damaged considerably, was empty. It, too, was owned by Curly Hicks.

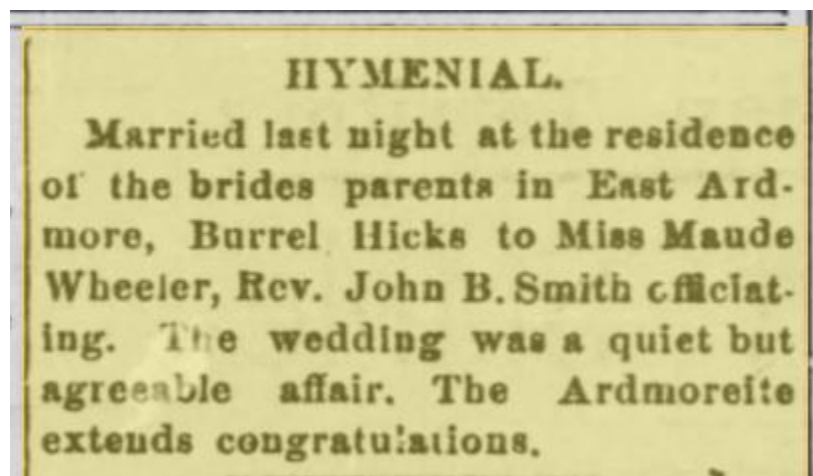

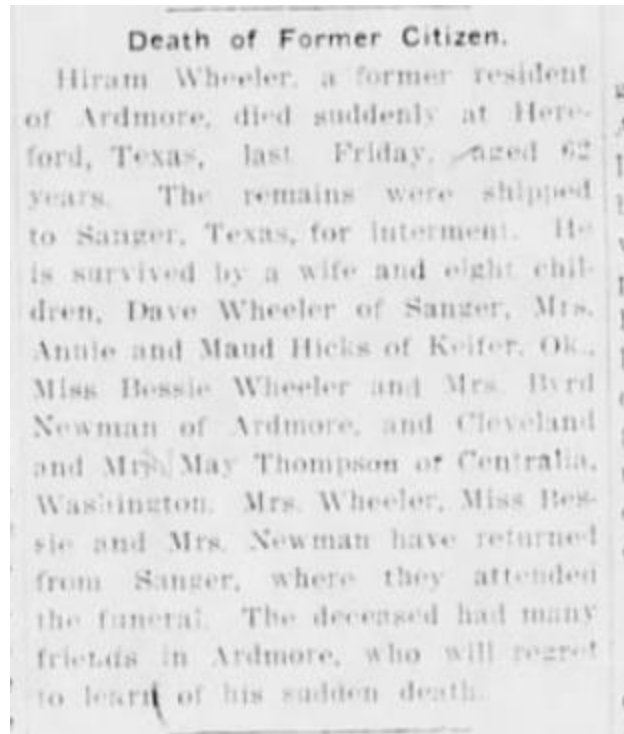
