Letters From Clive, McNiece, Clark and Holmberg Are Received.

Letters from Salt Lake boys who were on the transport Tuscania when it was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine have been received by relatives in this city. Some of the letters give graphic pictures of thrilling incidents in connection with the sinking and all remark on the hospitality of the Irish people who welcomed and cared for the survivors. Among those from whom letters have been received are W. C. Clive, Jr., son of Prof. W. C. Clive; Lieut. R. S. McNiece, formerly a high school teacher; and Carl A. Holmberg, who writes to his brother, Harry A. Holmberg.

Mr. Clive's Letter.

Mr. Clive's letter is, in part, as follows:

"Here I am, some place in England, after a rather eventful voyage being torpedoed—of which you have all read, of course. It was a real experience; our first knowledge of what war really meant. I was real lucky and saved my own coat and all the clothes I had on and what was in my pockets, my knife, razor and two handkerchiefs.

"The day we left the United States for here I received the package you sent but I'll need more of the clothing as that I got is in the bottom of the sea. Pack me a small box of toilet articles, tooth paste, brush, soap, also shaving soap, powder, and the like and some sweet chocolate, and occasionally a little candy.

"I along with a lot of our men from the ship Tuscania landed on the Irish coast. And, gee's it's a pretty country, everything so green and pretty and the people sure treated us royally. It is impossible to describe the hospitality that was extended to us by everybody over here.

"It is just like spring over here; everything is green and the weather is moderately warm, quite a change from New York weather.

"I guess it won't be long now until we will get some of the mail which has been forwarded, and how good it will seem to get a letter from home again; it seems ages since I have heard from you all. I am enclosing a card I was issued on the ship. Save it for a souvenir if it is not censored.

"Well, I'll write again real soon. I am well and happy. Everything is O. K. and there is no need for worry."

With the letter Mr. Clive sent home his Tuscania ticket. It is a red card about 2x3 inches in dimensions and reads: "Keep this card. S. S. Tuscania. No. 90. Your quarters are in No. 1, upper deck.

Lieut. McNiece.

"As I stood on the deck of the sinking ship, knowing that no boats could leave from the station to which I was assigned, I looked with envious eyes on those lifeboats which first put off," Lieut. McNiece writes. "They seemed so much safer than I was.

"But, after all, perhaps I was fortunate, for those boats were not rescued by the trawlers and were driven by the wind against the rocky Scottish coast, where they went to pieces in the breakers. About 146 men were

saved here and about 125 bodies were recovered along the beach. The men in those boats had a terrible experience, exposed to the cold and drenched to the skin, and no rescue until morning. Two captains were dashed to death on the rocks.

"Five trawlers took survivors into the Irish port where I landed, about 550 men in all. I said I had taken what seemed to be the last chance of escape from the sinking ship. I learned later that one of the destroyers had pulled alongside the Tuscania and about 200 men had slid aboard her. Unfortunately, she stove in her bow and had to pull away before more could escape, leaving men dangling on the ropes and crushing some.

"Later another destroyer pulled along the starboard side and lay by while 700 men went down the ropes to her deck. She stayed there until every man, so far as known, was rescued. A third destroyer picked up about 75 men from the water. The seamanship of the destroyers was wonderful and it was the splendid service of the royal navy which accounted for the comparatively low casualties.

"The lifeboat I was in was picked up by a trawler, one of the patrol boats of the British navy. It had received our S. O. S. call and had come about 25 miles to our assistance. We were about the sixth boatload it had rescued and every available space was crowded with refugees. A few moments after we were picked up another lifeboat was sighted and its single occupant, a soldier, was saved. He had had a singular experience. He was the last man on the sinking ship. He had sat down in a lifeboat—there were many boats not launched—and when the vessel sank he floated off.

"Then the trawler picked up two men in a piece of a boat, leaving behind two bodies."

Holmberg Letter.

Mr. Holmberg writes:

"We were hit at 5:47 o'clock in the afternoon and sank at 9:20 o'clock Feb. 5.

"I cannot describe the sensation of being hit, but it was terrible. The lifeboats broke; some went down head first off the decks. The torpedoboats did great work and many of us owe our lives to them.

"The people of Ireland gave us a welcome, took us in and made it most pleasant. It is such a pretty country—everything is so green."

Three Salt Lake Men and 47 From Intermountain States Among Survivors

*Edwin J. Allen, Jr.; William C. Clive, Jr., and Lieut.
Renwick Sloan McNiece Are Saved From
Torpedoed Transport.*

Three well-known enlisted young men of Salt Lake and forty-seven others from points in Idaho, Nevada, Arizona, Colorado and Montana are among the survivors of the ill-fated transport Tuscania.

Their names are included in a partial list of survivors received from Washington last night.

Whether other soldiers of the intermountain country are among the survivors, or whether any from this section met the fate of those missing, cannot be established until a complete recheck by the war department releases the full, detailed list.

Telegrams all signed by McCain, adjutant general, received here from Washington yesterday, told of the safety of Edwin J. Allen, Jr., son of E. J. Allen, 335 Kensington avenue; William C. Clive, Jr., son of W. C. Clive, 116 N. State street, and Lieut. Renwick Sloan McNiece, artillery, unattached, son-in-law of Mrs. R. O. Storer, 1185 Blaine avenue, who were on the torpedoed transport.

TO DATE there are four known Salt Lake survivors of the Cunarder Tuscania, the army transport which was torpedoed off the coast of Ireland. These are Lieutenant Renwick S. McNiece of 1148 Blaine avenue, field artillery, unattached; William C. Clive, Jr., 116 North State street, mechanic in aviation; Edwin J. Allen, Jr., 355 Kensington avenue, in aviation, and Raymond D. Smith, 188 J street, in the non-flying section of the signal corps.

Lieutenant McNiece is a graduate of Princeton and taught mathematics and Latin at West high school. He graduated from the second Presidio training camp in field artillery, but was unassigned to any particular unit at the time of the disaster. His mother and other relatives were overjoyed over his escape.



William C. Clive, Jr., is the son of Professor and Mrs. William Clive. He enlisted in the aviation department of the regular army as a master mechanic and went to the Pacific coast for intensive training. He is 31 years of age and was formerly employed by the Utah Motor company. Mr. Clive's younger brother recently enlisted as a musician in the Forty-third infantry when that unit was stationed at Fort Douglas.

SALT LAKER ON TUSCANIA TELLS OF RESCUE FROM SEA

Edwin J. Allen, Jr., Is Aided While Struggling
in Water by William C. Clive, Jr.,
Also Local Man.

THE following letter from Edwin J. Allen, Jr., a member of the 100th aero squadron, who was on board the Tuscania when it was struck by a torpedo, was received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Allen, 355 Kensington avenue. The "Bill" Clive referred to in Allen's letter is William C. Clive, Jr., son of Professor W. C. Clive of Salt Lake:

England, February 10, 1918.

Dear Folks: This is about the third letter I have started to write to you, and before I could finish it something came up and I never could get it off. I know you are anxious about me, especially when you heard of the terrible experience we had off the Irish coast, last Tuesday night. I could make a very thrilling letter of this, but I must be careful of mentioning anything that would help the kaiser.

I have had my first experience with "Fritz," as the British call him, and the experience has put the fighting and winning "pop" into every one of us to get even.

The Tuscania was a large liner, comparatively new, I understand. We were quartered in the steerage part of the ship; the first and sec-

ond-class rooms being occupied by the officers and first-class sergeants and the men who were working on the ship as waiters and cooks. On account of being the first to embark we were put in the bow of the ship, which we occupied all the way across, except the last day or two, when they changed us to a place much lower, about midship. They were going to put some sick fellows in the place we had.

Soldiers Felt Safe.

We didn't sail for Europe the day we embarked, but proceeded to another port, where I saw the remains of that terrible explosion, that you heard of some time ago this winter. Quite a large number of ships sailed with us as escorts, and we felt quite safe. The sea was rough and heavy some days and every time she "ducked", the men, thinking something had happened, were out of bed and running, which shows we were not going to be caught sleeping. As we entered the danger zone we had to carry our life belts with us everywhere we went, at least for several days. Later we were ordered not to take any clothes off at all, but be ready any minute.

A large number of British destroyers met us and helped escort us

through the most dangerous part, and when we saw those we felt absolutely safe. It seemed impossible for a submarine to even see us, because our escort searched around so well. The ship never kept the same course, but tried in many ways to fool the eye of any periscope that might be lurking around.

Tuesday afternoon, the day before we were going to dock at ———, about 2 o'clock in the afternoon, we saw the coast of Scotland. It seemed mighty good to the boys, because we had been on board almost as long as I was when I came home from my mission in Japan. We had a big boxing match on that afternoon and the boys climbed away up in the ropes and masts and crowded the ship's deck and some lifeboats. I am of the opinion this is what gave us away. It was a clear day and any submarine captain could pick us out there as a good mark.

Officer's Third Trial.

When the boxing was over it was almost time for supper, 5 o'clock, and I met one of the ship's officers standing near the rail. I stopped and talked for a minute, and during our talk he said: "If we are going to get it, it would be right around here." He had been on two ships that had been torpedoed, and the last one, as he told me afterward, happened a year ago on the very same day and month, except that it was in the morning. I left him and went to supper.

That very morning I rolled up my blankets and other things I had and got out of the hold in No. 4, up on the main deck, and put them in a stateroom one of the boys had. I decided I would never go down there again and was going to sleep in the hallway, between staterooms, on the floor. I had eaten and was standing near the staircase in the main hall, talking to a friend, and I didn't have my life belt with me. I was going for it and was prompted to several times.

but I never did get it, or my coat, overcoat, hat or puttees.

While we were talking and laughing, suddenly, with a big crash and stifled explosion, a torpedo hit us. The lights went with it, and then the fun started. The explosion seemed to take away some of the air or something, but everyone knew what had happened. Naturally, the first thing I thought of was getting my belt, only ten cards away; but I couldn't see my hand in front of me and I met the rush of men making for the nearest exit. It was useless to back it and I turned with the rest, and when we reached the deck outside there was another crowd surging and pushing, trying to get up a stairway where only one could go up comfortably, and there must have been four or five going up at once. One poor fellow got down, and I don't believe he ever got up again.

I made my way to the port side, where our squad was, and found only two other men there out of the full number—eight. I inquired where I could get a belt, as I didn't think I had much of a chance without one. The lights came on again and I ran back through the staterooms, looking for one. I found one and went back out on deck.

Men Fall Into Sea.

The lifeboats were being lowered, and the one that I was supposed to get into was almost full before it reached our deck, and just as it slowly went past us a rope on one end that held it gave way or the pulley was unhooked in some way, and one end dropped and almost all the fellows dropped down into the water. One or two clung on, and when they had it lowered a few moments afterward a boat from above must have slipped, because down she came on top of the other. I crowded back against the wall, because I didn't care to look, but I couldn't get away from their cries.

Other boats all along the line came and were lowered, but I didn't want

any of them. The boat was listing badly and it was hard to stand up without holding on to something. There wasn't a moment that I was afraid, but felt that surely one of those destroyers would come back and get us. It wasn't long before one came up alongside, but she couldn't get very close. After several attempts, ropes were thrown out and fastened and the men began sliding down them to the deck of the destroyer. By this time the boat had listed more and more to starboard, and on the port side we could scarcely make out the water.

Our lights had gone out and I was near the rail by a rope with Bill Clive, and as the last man left it I climbed on the rail, and, grabbing the rope, started down, the rising up and down of the destroyer with the waves tightened and slackened the rope, which almost threw me off. Before I reached her she suddenly pulled off without warning, breaking the rope close to the destroyer, which dropped me down into the sea. Ropes were hanging down the side and men on the deck were pulling them up, but the poor fellows didn't have the strength to hang on, and down they would go again.

Drawn Up by Foot.

Clive knew I was down, and in their anxiety to get me up they pulled on the rope, but my strength in my hands was gone, skin blistered and "rope burned" from my first slide. But I had not lost my head: I can say that much. I yelled up for them to wait until I got a fresh grip, and I wound the rope around my foot and they pulled me up, but I left a lot of poor fellows down there. After I got up I looked around and found a round buoy and threw that over to some of them.

All the lifeboats had gone and I decided I would stick to the sinking ship until the water came up over the first deck and then take my chance

in the water with whatever I could find.

In a few minutes another destroyer pulled up alongside on the starboard side and we all got on. The boat had listed so that we didn't need any ropes, and we were soon on our way to some port on the coast of Ireland—a four-hour ride—getting there in the early morning. As we moved down through the towns and cities of Ireland, the people cheered and greeted us with—some of us in rags, or scant clothing—brass bands and the warmest kind of hospitality. I don't know how long we will stay here, but we will be a long time getting reorganized and fitted up again. Everything was lost. I didn't come away with a thing, besides what I had on. No telling when we will get paid, and at present I am going around in half British and half American uniform.

If needs be, I am not afraid of death. I expected it that night, but never once shuddered. It is coming some day in some form. I lost some of my best friends. I saw two brothers go over, and one had to see the other go, too weak to help. Such things are hard, but when I listen to some of these British boys coming home with their muddy helmets and packs on their backs, with gold braid on their coat sleeves—one for every wound, and some with seven or eight, it makes a person feel confident and different.

British Confident.

They talk and joke about dodging bullets, and standing in muddy trenches for a couple of days. They have been doing it for three or more years, and it has come to be part of their lives. We aren't used to it in America, but we over here, and you over there, must be strong and persevere like these people. They don't go around with scared and drawn faces, as we would imagine, but laughing and confident, bent on one thing.

We aeroplane men won't have the

adventure of trench fighting, being kept busy behind the lines working on machines. All the honors are due the men of the artillery, infantry and flyers, who are mixing it with "Fritz" every day.

Some time when I can give you a settled address and you decide you would send me a package put in a bar of toilet and shaving soap, and tooth paste. They are extremely expensive over here. I only go away with a handkerchief and a comb. I am feeling fine and being royally treated, so I hope you will always know that I am getting enough to eat and looking out for myself, fully expecting to be home again in a short time.

I took out \$10,000 insurance, which costs me \$6.60 a month, and if I should happen to "get it," the government will send it to you in monthly payments for twenty years, \$57.60 a month.

I lost all the letters, recommendations, Japanese books and everything.

Miniature Aeroplane Sent From France by William Clayton Clive

One of the most unique souvenirs from "over there" yet to be received, has lately been sent by William Clayton Clive to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William C. Clive, 116 north State street. It is a miniature aeroplane made from pieces of a German aeroplane, which was brought down in England during an air raid. Mr. Clive is in the mechanical corps, and at the time of making the souvenir was attached to the Royal Flying corps of England acting as an expert mechanic. By hand he hammered pieces of the machine into a small model of a metal aeroplane, using a German bullet found in the aviator's ammunition carrier, for the body, while the wings are made of parts of the metal. Two English sixpence are soldered to the top of the machine, showing two pictures of Queen Victoria. The propeller, wheels and tail of the machine were carefully handcarved from metal by Mr. Clive. He also sent home several rings, made from other metal parts of the ruined German plane.

One bore a little heart upon it, and each of his brothers received one as a memento. For his father he carved a "chin rest" out of the light wood of the machine, and Prof. Clive says it is one of the most comfortable and light chin rests for his violin he has ever had.

Mr. Clive seems to bear a charmed life, for he was on the "Tuscania" when she was sunk, but was rescued with other survivors although he lost everything. He speaks in the highest terms of the Irish and English peoples for their royal treatment of the survivors. At present he is fighting near the front in France. Two brothers, Joseph Clive at Camp Logan, Texas, and Clifford Clive, at Jefferson Barracks, Mo., are also in the army, and hope soon to join their brother "over there." In a recent letter from France, Wm. C. Clive begins to relate another interesting adventure, but the censor stops him. Previous letters tell of his interesting life in England and France.

Third Son Arrives Home From Service; Was Tuscania Survivor

First Class Chauffeur William C. Clive, Jr., of the American Expeditionary Force, a survivor of the Tuscania, arrived home last evening after 16 1-2 months of service overseas. Since the disaster in the Irish sea Mr. Clive has been attached to the first and second day bombardment forces and has driven the car of the lieutenant-colonel of the army in the vicinity of Barleycorn and St. Mihiel. He has been within the sound of the big guns almost constantly and has been on duty driving the army officials until his ship sailed for America. In speaking of the big ocean disaster today Mr. Clive said:

"It was a pitch dark night with heavy seas when it occurred. I knew nothing of it until a shot at the submarine told us that something was wrong. I escaped from the sinking boat with others in an English destroyer, 17 men from our squadron going down. As we escaped from the ship we could see soldiers floating about the water clinging to their life preservers. We landed on one of the Irish islands. Most of those who were lost I believe encountered heavy seas near the shore of the Irish coast and were battered to pieces on the rocks.

"The people of the island where we landed were most hospitable. The soldiers in the camp on the island got out of their beds and made us take their places. They fed us hot muligan so we wouldn't catch cold and did everything to make us feel comfortable."

There is a happy reunion at the Clive home today for this is the first time that the three sons of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Clive have been at home for many months. All three sons, William, Joseph and Clifford were in service, but the last two have been mustered out for some time.

I had to drive the colonel around all day in his Cadillac, and coming back to our quarters at Dun Sur Meuse I had only five or six punctures. But I didn't care. It was Christmas. For dinner I had a can of "corn willie" beans and a can of tomatoes." Clive was a member of the 100th aero squadron, and was special chauffeur for the colonel.

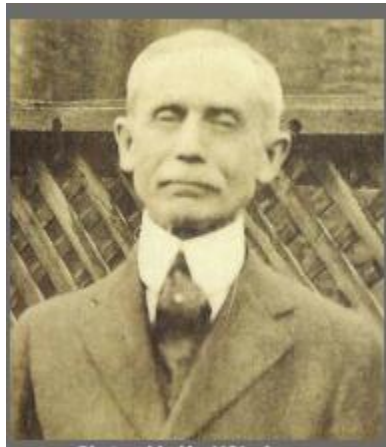

Well Known Utah Violinist Dies at 84 in Nevada

Professor William C. Clive, 84, violinist, one of the most important figures of Utah's early music history and musically active for many years, died of a heart attack Saturday at 11 p. m. in Overton, Nev., according to word received in Salt Lake City Sunday.

Most of Mr. Clive's life had been spent in Salt Lake City until 1939, when he retired and went to Overton because of his wife's declining health.

Born in Salt Lake City April 15, 1860, a son of Claude and Mary Pullen Clive, he began his musical career at the age of 8. In his early youth he began composing, completing many musical numbers. His overture, "The Golden Harvest," probably was the first ever written and played in Salt Lake City.

Two other overtures, "Evening Thoughts" and "Zita," stand to his credit, and other compositions, notably "Come Into the Fold," an anthem, and a piece for violin and piano, "Melody in F." He also was a maker of violins, and many of them are cherished possessions of members of his family and friends.

Mr. Clive studied music in Boston under eminent teachers. He was concertmaster of the Salt Lake theater orchestra and leader of the orchestra of the old Grand theater for many years. He taught violin and piano some of Salt

theater for many years. He taught violin and piano, some of Salt Lake's most prominent citizens being among his pupils, and was a soloist with the L D S tabernacle choir on its memorable eastern trip.

A few years ago, because of his achievements as musician and composer, Mr. Clive was elected to honorary membership in Kappa Gamma Psi, national musical fraternity.

In 1885, Mr. Clive married Isabella Stewart Campbell. He is survived by his widow and five sons and daughters, William C. Clive Jr., Overton, Nev.; Clifford C. Clive, St. Anthony, Idaho; Mrs. Alvin Anderson, Venice, Cal.; Joseph C. Clive, Salt Lake City; Mrs. Carl R.
