Non-commissioned officers for Amarillo's first company of the Texas Defense Guard were appointed last night by Capt. A. Petersen. Frederick W. Dodson, Jr., is the "top kick."

Frank D. Rallsback is supply sergeant; Dave Peters, mess sergeant.

Glen A. Houston, Jack Rogers and Clyde A. Harris are line sergeants.

Among the corporals is Vernon Hogan, a World War veteran.

The company, which now has 28 officers and enlisted men, held its first drill last night and plans to be in the Armistice Day parade.

Physically fit men between the ages of 18 and 65 years may enlist.

Capt. Petersen hopes to enlist enough men for a battalion.

SEEK FUNDS TO EQUIP A SOCCER TEAM

Members of Hospital Corps, Wisconsin National Guard, Hear Valuable Lectures on First Aid, Physiology and Hygiene.

Theater parties will be given in the Merrill theater, Wednesday and Thursday, to obtain funds to equip a soccer football team for the First Regiment Hospital corps, Wisconsin National Guard, consisting of four medical officers and twenty-four enlisted men, and to make needed improvements in the corps' quarters.

The detachment meets each Monday night for work in first aid, litter and drill. Each year the hospital corps goes to Camp Douglas, having charge of the sanitary condition of the camp, as well as the health of the members of the First regiment.

The course of lectures on anatomy, physiology, hygiene, first aid, given by the medical officers throughout the year, is of great benefit to the members and an opportunity is afforded all young men to get this training, of great advantage to them, regardless of their occupation.

VERNON HOGAN WRITES OF HIS EXPERIENCE ON SHIP

Former Hartford Boy in Sanitary Squad Was on Ill Fated Transport, Tuscania.

Vernon W. Hogan, of Milwaukee, at one time an employe of Schauer Brothers, and who, as sporting editor of the Press, was familiar to our readers, writes to his sister, Mrs. W. F. Young, a description of his experiences on the Tuscania. The letter appeared in the Sunday Sentinel, and is copied below. Vernon was listed among the lost, but later was found to have been saved.

In his letter he tells of the ordinary routine they were going through preparatory to the expected landing in England. The story of a typical way in which many of them took the sudden accident follows:

All of a sudden we heard an explosion and all the lights went out. We felt our way down stairs to our bunks where we got our life preservers and felt our way up the stairs again. I helped a young fellow who had fallen down and hurt himself out on the deck and went up to our life boat. The fifth rope of the boat had been cut and as it was let down it was smashed to pieces. I slid down a rope, into the water and when I came up I was a block away from my boat. I then swam around and after being in the water for about an hour I

caught a life boat. We were finally picked up by a submarine chaser and all we could do when we got to shore was to answer questions."

Captain Petersen urged all in the muster roll to attend the drill tomorrow night at the Legion Hall, 1800 Harrison Street, at 8 o'clock. He also invited anyone else interested in joining to attend. "We are interested in getting World War veterans in the organization," he said.

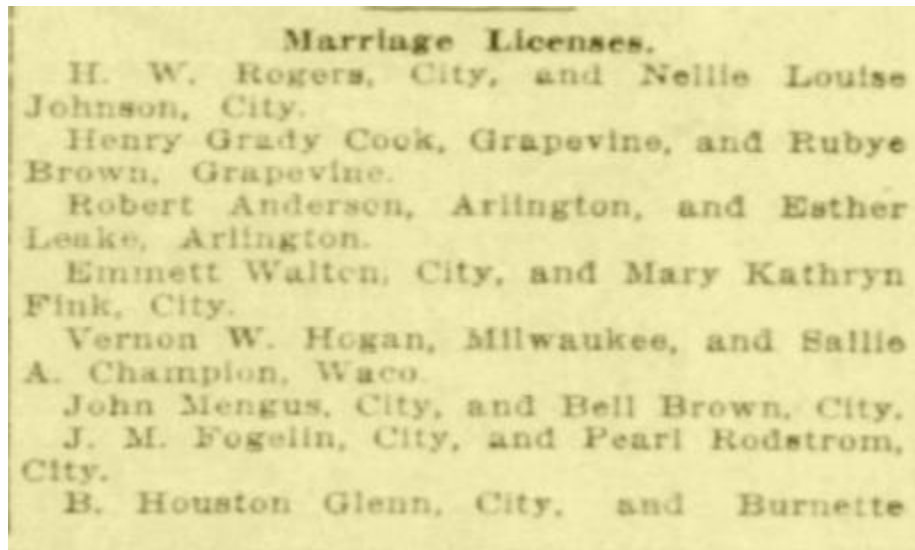

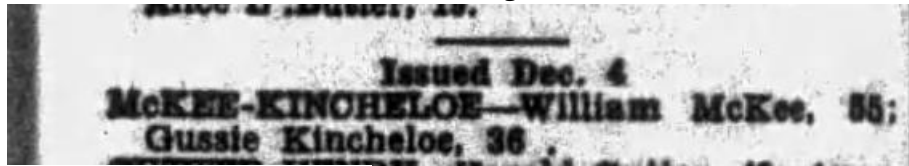

TWO LAND CASES

Two important land cases were heard in U. S. Commissioner Holt's court Wednesday and Thursday. The first one being the United States vs Gussie O. Kincheloe McKee, involving her homestead in the southern part of the county and Ann Galbraith Mach involving her homestead in the same region.

The U. S. was represented by Attorney F. W. Yoder of Albuquerque. The defense attorney for both cases being J. Benson Newell, former mayor and former District Attorney of Las Cruces.

Speaking of land cases, probably the most important and certainly a very interesting case is now pending before the Secretary of the Interior involving rights of licensees holding permits or allotments under the Taylor Grazing Law to mortgage their improvements upon the public domain. Under the Taylor law all public lands within the Grazing Districts have been withdrawn from homestead entry. Ranching facilities such as tanks, wells, windmills, houses, fences, corrals, are recognized by our law as "fixtures," i. e., a part of the real estate itself by virtue of its annexation to the freehold. The land department has recently held that a mortgage covering such improvements may be foreclosed and they will recognize such foreclosure as conveying title to such improvements.

From this decision an appeal was taken to the Secretary where it is now under consideration. The enigma presented by such a case is this: Assume that a rancher mortgages all such improvements which are scattered over many sections of public domain, he defaults and is foreclosed and the courts approve a conveyance purportedly conveying title to such improvements. How much land will be acquired by such a conveyance; will the Grazing Department (which is under the Secretary of the Interior) give its assent to acquisition of title to the public domain on which such improvements are situated; if so how much? Bankers and individuals lending money upon such security will watch with keen interest the outcome of this first case arising since the enactment of the Grazing Statute.

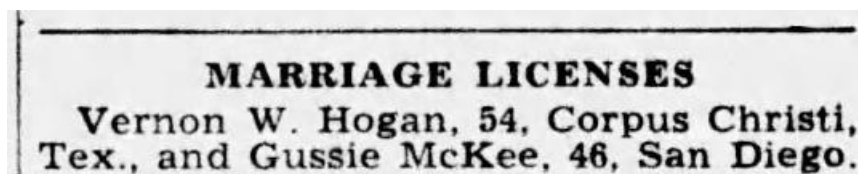

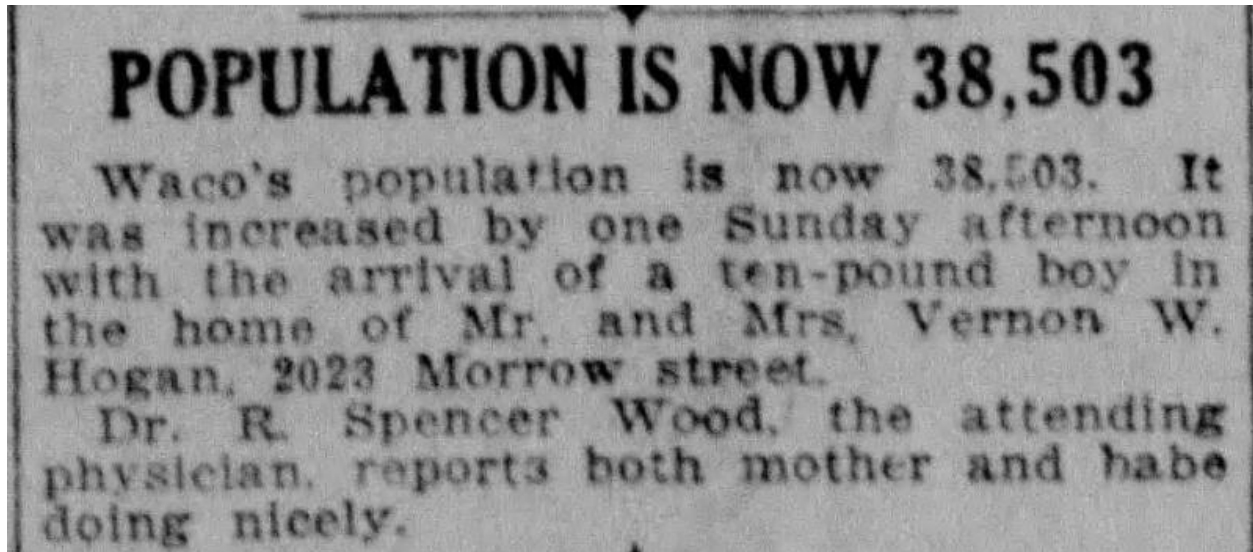

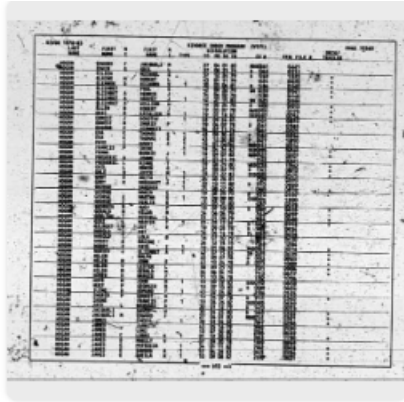

R. V. Hogan Appointed City Purchasing Agent

Richard V. Hogan, 506 Whitman place, Medford, assumed duties Monday as a new purchasing agent and airport superintendent for the city of Medford.

Hogan graduated this spring from the University of Oregon with a bachelor of arts degree in political and public administration. Previously he spent 14 years in the Army, most of them in administrative capacities.

Hogan's chief function will be to establish a central city purchasing agency, through which all city departments will submit orders and requisitions for supplies and equipment. The city water department and Medford library will continue to operate independently.

To Solicit Bids

City Manager Robert Duff said Hogan's duties will consist of soliciting bids from suppliers and consolidating requirements on supplies and equipment requested by city departments.

Previously each department head was in charge of supplying the department and did not have time to sufficiently study costs on equipment, according to Duff. Competitive bidding occurred only for a few large purchases, he said.

City purchasing will be centralized in order to economize on city buying with bulk purchases and competitive bidding

on all city equipment, Duff noted.

Manage Airport

Eventually Hogan will assume management of the Medford municipal airport. During the past nine months Gilbert Gutjahr, administrative assistant, has been acting airport manager. Hogan's new position will give Gutjahr more time to relieve the city manager of routine administrative work. Gutjahr was retained by the city late last summer to be an assistant to the city manager.

Hogan's immediate responsibilities will be preliminary consultations with city department heads on purchases, setting up purchasing procedures and writing a purchasing manual for the information of all departments.

Hogan was discharged from the Army in 1953 at the rank of captain. He was a veteran of World War II and the Korean war. Before graduating from the University of Oregon he attended Pacific university in 1955 and Amarillo college, Texas, in 1937-38.

Hogan Resigns From City Post

Richard V. Hogan, purchasing agent and airport manager for the city of Medford since July, 1957, has submitted his resignation, effective Nov. 27, according to City Manager Robert Duff.

Hogan said he is resigning to accept a position with the city of Portland in the planning department which will further his career in municipal administration.

Duff said Hogan assisted the city in setting up the purchasing department and was its first purchasing agent. Prior to that time purchasing had been done by departments.

Hogan arrived in Medford from Eugene where he was graduated by the University of Oregon's public administration school. He makes his home with his wife at 324 Hillhouse dr.

City Manager Duff expressed regret at Hogan's leaving Medford. He said Hogan had done a good job for the city.

Another old resident and pioneer settler has gone in the death of Michael Hogan, which occurred early Wednesday morning after a few months' illness. His death is attributed to diseases incident to old age. He was in his 86th year.

Arrangements for the funeral have not been definitely decided upon, but it is planned to hold the services Sunday afternoon. It is believed by that time that his children will all be able to reach here.

Michael Hogan was born in Ireland on June 10, 1831. He lived there until middle-aged, was married there, and in 1876 immigrated to America and lived at Eardley, Canada a short time. He and his wife then came to Wisconsin, landing at Ahnapee (now Algoma), where they remained nearly a year. Their next residence was in Forestville township near Maplewood, where they lived on a farm for four years before coming to Sturgeon Bay. While on the farm Mr. Hogan spent part of the time working on the Sturgeon Bay ship canal which was then in course of construction. During his long residence here he was employed principally in the sawmills.

Mrs. Hogan died in 1898. They were the parents of ten children, one son, Spencer, having died about ten years ago. The children surviving are: Mrs. James Fritz and Mrs. L. S. Cornell of Dallas, Texas; Mrs. G. W. Stoneman of Kenosha; Mrs. Willard Young of Milwaukee; Lenox R., of Tacoma, Wash.; Mrs. J. E. Molle, of Oshkosh, Wis.; Mrs. Ivy Hunt of New York City; Edward R., of this city; Vernon W., who belongs to a Milwaukee company of the National Guards and is at present stationed with the troops at Camp Douglas.

SPENCER HOGAN EXPIRES; DEATH WAS UNEXPECTED

Veteran Barber Was Considered Convalescent After Long Illness.

(From Friday's Daily)

Spencer Hogan, proprietor of the Beaumont hotel barber shop, died at his home on Walnut street at 8:30 this morning after a prolonged illness. Death results from a complication of diseases. For seventeen years Mr. Hogan has been proprietor of the Beaumont hotel barber shop with the exception of two years of this time which he spent running another shop in the city and working in Chicago. The barbers of the city will attend the funeral in a body.

While Mr. Hogan's illness was a prolonged one and one from which there was little hope of recovery, his death was unexpected for a few days ago his physician said he was recovering.

He is survived by his wife, his father, Mitchell Hogan of Sturgeon Bay, and several brothers and sisters, mostly all of which reside at Sturgeon Bay.

Deceased was born in Canada 37 years ago and during the past seventeen years was a resident of the city.

The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon under the auspices of the M. W. A., of which society he was a member. Interment will be at Al-louez cemetery.

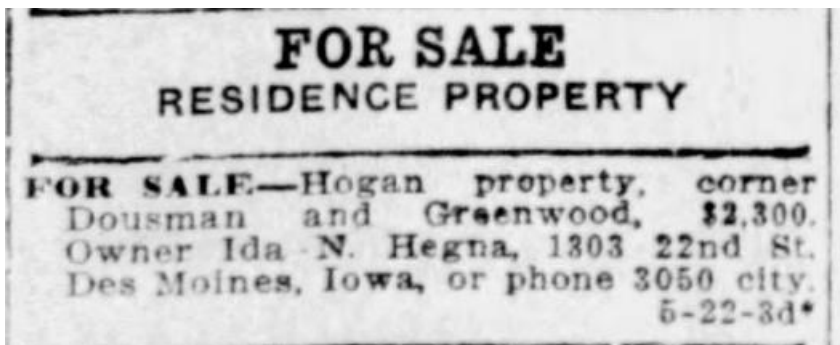

SUNDAY SHAVING QUESTION.

Several Shops Continue to Keep Their Doors Open.

It remains to be seen whether or not the threat made against Spencer Hogan to the effect that he would be prosecuted by the barbers of this city if he kept his shop open today will be put into effect.

In speaking of the affair Mr. Hogan, against whom war has been declared by the other barbers, stated that he proposed to run his business to suit himself. "I have always kept my shop open after midnight Saturday nights and from 8 till 12 o'clock Sunday mornings to accommodate my patrons from the hotel. When the shop is open I can't tell a man from the city I won't shave him simply because he lives in Green Bay while at the same time I am shaving outsiders. My shop has been open Sundays for two years and it will be open next Sunday as usual. Only a part of the barbers in the city have signed the agreement that was circulated and if they want to prosecute me I'll be right here."

Several of the barbers who were the leaders in the movement to compel Mr. Hogan to close his shop during Sundays refused to say just what they will do if that gentleman persists in his determination to keep his shop open, but intimate that things will be made warm for their fellow workman unless he obeys their requests. They claim that the keeping open of one of the leading shops in the city compels others to do the same or lose trade with the result that the barbers of the city will be deprived of their weekly holiday. If the barbers who have united in presenting this ultimatum to Mr. Hogan do not back down the chances are that Green Bay will soon be involved in a war beside which the Turkish and Venezuelan complications will sink into insignificance.

SPENCER HOGAN ARRESTED.

He is Charged With Keeping His Barber Shop Open Sunday.

Spencer Hogan, proprietor of the barber shop in the Beaumont house, was arrested today on the complaint of Julius Mars, a West side barber, the complaint charging Mr. Hogan with keeping his shop open for the purpose of doing barber work on Sunday, December 22. After the reading of the complaint by Justice Nys to Mr. Hogan in the police court, the defendant pleaded not guilty to the charge as made in the complaint, and asked for an adjournment until Thursday morning, January 3, at 9 o'clock, which was granted. It is very probable that Mr. Hogan will demand a jury trial on that day. The barbers in the city are determined that the several shops in the city that are doing business on Sunday shall not continue, and are determined to close them up. At their last meeting a committee was appointed, of which Mr. Mars was the chairman, to obtain evidence against Mr. Hogan, the result being the swearing out of this complaint.

WHAT THE BARBERS WILL DO.

Variety of Views Regarding Keeping Shops Open on Sunday.

When a number of barbers in the city were asked this morning what effect the dismissal of the case brought by them against Spencer Hogan, proprietor of the Beaumont house barber shop would have on the keeping open of all the barber shops in the city, a number of different views were obtained. Certain proprietors stated that it would have no effect whatever and that all the other shops in the city would remain closed on Sundays in the future as they had in the past. With possibly one or two exceptions they state that the barbers were taken unawares at the trial yesterday, supposing that it was a case where one of the laws of the state had been broken and that the matter was placed in the hands of the proper officer to prosecute, and that they would not be compelled to furnish security for costs of the case. Others stated that they would open their shops if the rest of the barbers did but that it was not their desire to do so. Next Sunday or possibly a week from that day will probably determine whether or not the barber shops in this city will be kept open Sunday morning or not, as it will depend on how many and what shops shave on Sunday.

Edward Hogan Dies Saturday

Funeral services for Edward R. Hogan, 70, of 127 N. Fifth av., were held Monday at 2 p.m. from Stephenson's funeral home with the Rev. George Warren of the First Methodist church officiating. Interment was at Dayside cemetery.

Mr. Hogan died Saturday at The Door County Memorial hospital. He had been ill for about four years after suffering a stroke.

Born in Elymorer, Canada, April 20, 1872, he was the son of Michael and Elmer Hogan. He came to Door county with his parents when he was about six years old. They settled first in Maplewood for a year and then moved to Sturgeon Bay.

He had been employed as a planer by the Halstead-Maple Co. for a time and then by the Seefield Co. During World War II, he worked as a tin-smith at a local shipyard. For many years, he served as a volunteer fireman here and was a long-time member of the Odd Fellows lodge.

In 1900, Mr. Hogan married Jane Baker, who died in 1908. In 1910 he married Mrs. Mary Rhode who survives.

Other survivors include a daughter by his first marriage, Mrs. Elmer Patton of Chicago, and another daughter, Miss Beulah Hogan of Etel, Ky.; two sisters, Mrs. Louis Cornell of Newark, N. J., and Mrs. William Hargen of Indianapolis, and a brother, Vernon of San Diego.

Members of the Odd Fellows participated in the service. Ingve Bevy, George Smith, Conrad Stran, John Bagnall, David Machia and Floyd Knuth were pallbearers.

REVOLVER MISSES FIRE AND OFFICER ESCAPES

Woman Arrested After Shooting Attempt and Accused of Being In- toxicated

Patrolman Peter Moe owes his life to the failure of a cartridge to discharge, early Saturday morning, when an alleged drunken woman pulled the trigger of a revolver which she is said to have held within two feet of the officer's body.

Mrs. Mayme Hogan, 43, 1208 South I street, was arrested by Patrolman Moe and Walter Roberson after the reported incident. She was booked on a charge of being drunk and for investigation. Shortly before noon Mrs. Hogan was released from the city jail on \$25 bail.

Shortly after 4 o'clock Saturday morning, police received a call of a "shooting scrape" in the residence at 1208 South I street. Patrolmen Moe and Roberson, in a prowler car, were sent out to investigate the report.

The officers walked to the front door, opened it, announced themselves as police officers and then walked in, according to their report to superior officers.

officers.

Mrs. Hogan was on the floor just inside the door with a .45 caliber revolver, according to the officers, and as they stepped inside the house she raised the weapon. She is alleged to have pointed it at Patrolman Moe's abdomen and then to have pulled the trigger. The gun failed to respond to the attempt to fire it, according to the officers, and a moment later Patrolman Moe grasped the woman and disarmed her.

The officers then lifted the woman from the floor and placed her on a couch. She was under the influence of liquor, the officers allege.

Mrs. Hogan then told the officers that she returned to her home after a short absence to find a prowler. She fired two shots at the prowler, she said.

Claims Many Robberies

A bullet hole in the hallway wall was evidence of one of the shots Mrs. Hogan had fired before the arrival of the officers, but they could not find where two other shots, which she said she had fired, lodged.

She stated that her husband was away from home on a hunting trip and that she was alone in the house.

Five hours after her arrest she denied to Captain of Detectives John S. Strickland that she had attempted to fire a shot at any officer. She said that she fired at a man who was ransacking the pantry of her home. Mrs. Hogan also said that she had been robbed so many times that she decided to have a gun handy for protection.

Answer was received in Appleton this morning by Attorney F. S. Bradford, chairman of the committee appointed to investigate the Molle typewriter patents, from the patent attorney at Washington, D. C., who was engaged to search the records to see if any of the patent devices used on the Molle machine are infringements on patents owned by other typewriter builders. The reply is in detail and in effect says that a careful investigation has been made and no infringements have been found.

A meeting of the committee appointed to authorize this investigation at Washington and the officers of the Appleton Merchants' association will be held tomorrow evening. Mr. Molle will probably be at that meeting. It is expected that on Thursday a meeting of the stockholders of the Molle Typewriter company will be called, directors elected and things placed in readiness for the early operation of the plant.

The letter received from Washington this morning reads as follows:

"Washington, D. C., May 7, 1910.
As to the outcome of my investigation of the Patent Office records to ascertain whether any or all of the constructions for use in connection with typewriters invented by Mr. John E. Molle infringe any claim or claims of any unexpired U. S. Letters Patent, I direct your attention to the following:

"There are four constructions of devices for use in connection with typewriters invented by Mr. Molle and these constructions are as follows:

"Connecting rod for typewriters forming the subject matter of Letters Patent 744, 931, Nov. 24, 1903 and such construction has for its object to provide a detachable connection between the type bars and key levers so as to permit the connecting rod to be easily and readily removed to facilitate the repairing of the key levers and type bars without dismantling the entire machine and which consists of a connecting rod formed of a continuous piece of wire provided at one end with a type bar engaging hook, the

opposite end of the rod being formed with coincident loops or eyes adapted to receive a spring-actuated rod or pin, which acts in conjunction with a hook on the lower end of the rod to engage the key bar and detachably secure the same to the connecting rod.

"This construction I find new from a specific standpoint and I was unable to find any unexpired U. S. patent or patents containing a claim or claims which would be infringed by the construction disclosed in Letters Patent 744,931. The construction disclosed by Letters Patent 744,931 does not infringe any unexpired U. S. Letters Patent.

"Connection between the keys and the type bars forming the subject matter of Letters Patent No. 813,570, Feb. 27, 1906, granted to J. E. Molle and which has for its object to provide a prompt and positive response of the type bars to the operation of the keys and to effect cushioning of the key action, so as to prevent breaking of any of the parts thereof should the action become jammed in any manner and at the same time to cushion the depression of the keys thereby preventing sudden jars upon the fingers of the operator as is usual with the ordinary form of typewriting machines when the type strikes the platen, and briefly described the connection consists of a fixed supporting rod carrying a rock bar having each end provided with a crank, one of the cranks attached to the key and the other of the cranks yieldingly connected to the type bar, the rock bar being formed of spring metal and

capable of being torsionally twisted whereby the key action will be cushioned to prevent jamming and breaking of any of the parts thereof.

"This construction I find specifically new and I was unable also to discover any unexpired U. S. Letters Patent which would be infringed by the construction disclosed in patent No. 813,570. Therefore, the construction disclosed by patent 813,570 does not infringe any claim or claims of any unexpired U. S. Letters Patent.

"Ribbon Positioning Mechanism forming the subject matter of pending application No. 446,678 in the name of J. E. Molle. This mechanism constitutes a means which is actuated by the type bar for shifting the ribbon in position in operative relation with respect to the type so as to cause an impression and for immediately removing the ribbon so that the impression made by the type will be visible. This mechanism is

new and I could not find any unexpired U. S. patent which would be infringed by the ribbon positioning mechanism disclosed in pending application No. 446,678. Therefore, the ribbon positioning mechanism disclosed in pending application No. 446,678 does not infringe any claim or claims of any unexpired U. S. patent.

"Platen Shift forming the subject matter of pending application No. 446,677 in the name of John E. Molle. The function of the platen shift is to vertically elevate the platen and also lock it in one position when shifted or to interrupt the shift of the platen so that one of the type of a series of type on the type bar can make an impression. This platen shift comprises a pair of shift keys, one, operated independently of the other and adapted when operated to shift the platen to one position and the other operating the first key whereby the platen is shifted and the locking mechanism thrown into the path of the shifting mechanism for the platen to raise and shift the movement of the platen. This mechanism I find specifically new and when set up in the manner as disclosed in the application it would not be an infringement of any unexpired U. S. patent as I was unable to find any unexpired U. S. patent which would be infringed when setting up a platen shift in a manner as disclosed in the application. Therefore, the specific construction disclosed in pending application No. 446,677 does not infringe any claim or claims of any unexpired U. S. patent.

"To sum up will say that no infringement exists of any unexpired U. S. patent when manufacturing and selling any one of the constructions referred to herein and I see no chance where the manufacturing and selling of any one of the constructions would involve you in litigation and therefore no one could prevail in a suit at law for damages in case of infringement, if a suit was filed.

DEATH OF J. E. MOLLE

Inventor of Molle Typewriter Died at

Illness.

BROUGHT HERE FOR BURIAL

John E. Molle, president of the Molle Typewriter Co., of Oshkosh, and a former resident of this city, passed away last Friday noon at his home at 141 Otter street, Oshkosh. The end came at 12:30 o'clock and followed an illness of three months, believed to have been brought on by overwork in getting the typewriter industry started at Oshkosh. He suffered the weakening effect of hemorrhage from the first although there had been an improvement in his condition for a time.

Mr. Molle was born in the town of West Kewaunee on March 17, 1872, being in his 46th year at the time of his death. He resided with his parents on the family homestead until

seventeen years of age and then came to this city to learn the jewelry trade in the jewelry store conducted by Mr. W. Heck.

He mastered the trade in two years and with a brother, Anton, went to Algoma where they purchased a jewelry store. John continued in the business there for several years. Bicycle riding was a popular pastime in those days and Mr. Molle entered contests in riding which were held at the county fairs here, winning a number of good races. In 1898 he removed to Sturgeon Bay and conducted a jewelry establishment in connection with a bicycle sales agency and a general repair shop. The repair end of the business included the cleaning and overhauling of typewriters and the cumbersome construction of the machines at that time prompted his idea that a simpler and more compact machine could be constructed.

He was married on October 22, 1901, to Miss Lillian Molle of Sturgeon Bay.

In 1902 he started work on a new model typewriter, known as the "Molle Typewriter." He worked on the same until 1907 and at that time had a complete model. Most of the work on the machine was accomplished during nights and very frequently he worked eighteen hours and sometimes more, each day. At the same time he continued to conduct his jewelry store and repair shop.

In 1907 he sold his stock and fixtures and removed to Antigo where he interested his brothers, Anton and Otto Molle, and a number of others in a company to perfect and simplify his working model. This took nearly six months and at the end of that time his health failed and he came back to the old homestead to recuperate. It was evident that considerable capital would be needed to put the machine on the market and a company was formed at Appleton for the purpose, but the undertaking fell through on account of the financial panic of 1908.

In the fall of 1911 Mr. Molle was fortunate in getting Wausau capital interested in the organization of a company. The same year Mr. Molle suffered a severe nervous shock in a railroad accident at Warrior's Ridge, Pa., while on his way to Washington, D. C., to have his patents investigated thoroughly. He never completely recovered and his health failed. Under these conditions the Wausau organization was discontinued.

For two years after Mr. Molle

worked in model and tool shops in Chicago to acquire the necessary experience to run a factory. His wife also worked in department stores to help him along during this time. In 1914 he completed another and better model which it is claimed has a touch and speed superior to any typewriter on the market.

With this model he interested Chicago capital and on Feb. 8, 1915, sold the first shares in which is now the Molle Typewriter Co. of Oshkosh. The company was incorporated under the laws of the State of Wisconsin on September 1, 1915, for \$500,000. A shop was operated for eight months at Chicago and on December 15, 1915, the equipment was removed to the new three story brick factory building built for the Molle Typewriter Co., at Oshkosh. The first floor is now equipped with up-to-date lathes, presses, drilling jigs, etc., to manufacture the new typewriter. At this time about 150 dies are completed.

Since the organization was started Mr. Molle has been constantly handicapped by war conditions in selling stock and getting material, machinery and help. The constant grind and worry undermined his health and on Feb. 18, last he suffered several hemorrhages. His condition took a turn for the better at one time, but he suffered a relapse on April 19 and gradually grew weaker until the end came on Friday last.

Besides his wife he is survived by his aged mother, Mrs. H. Molle, and four brothers and five sisters, namely: William of Oshkosh, Otto and Anton of Antigo, and Herman of Kewaunee, and Mrs. George Reinhart of DePere, Mrs. Frank Seidl of Menominee, Mich., Mrs. John Smith, Mrs. Martin Brezinsky and Mrs. H. Seeman, all of Kewaunee.

The body was brought here from Oshkosh last Saturday evening and the funeral was held on Sunday afternoon from the home of his brother, Herman.

Besides the brothers and sisters, those from out of town who were in attendance were Mr. Geo. Reinhart of DePere, Mrs. Wm. Molle of Oshkosh, and Mr. Frank Seidl of Menominee.

The last will and testament of John E. Molle, who died in this city April 27, has been admitted to probate by the county court and letters of administration issued to Mrs. Lillian Molle, widow of the deceased, as administratrix with the will annexed, under bonds of \$3,000. The bonds have been filed and approved. The testamentary instrument was executed April 19, 1917, just eight days before Mr. Molle passed away, and it is very short. It directs that all of the testator's property, including his interest and stock in the Molle Typewriter company, shall go to his wife, Mrs. Lillian Molle. No executor was named in the will.

MOLLE COMPANY GROWING.

**Steps Are Taken to Increase the Value
of Stock and a Big Year Is in
Prospect.**

The Molle Typewriter company of this city has extensive plans in view for the coming year, with the prospects decidedly bright for a substantial increase in production and a big business, not only in foreign countries but in America as well. This outlook for a record breaking year as soon as business conditions become settled after the presidential election in November was developed at the annual business meeting of the stockholders, held at the city hall. The present board of directors was by unanimous choice of the stockholders reelected to serve for

the ensuing year. These directors are: E. A. Durler, William Molle, Mrs. Lillian Molle, Frederick Pischel and R. D. Wynn.

The question of finances to meet the expansion of business was voted on and the directors were authorized to increase the company, or reorganize it, from 500,000 shares of stock at \$1 par

value a share, to 500,000 shares at \$10 par value. In this extension of the stock, the present shareholders will receive an allowance of \$3 extra for each share of old stock in exchange for the new stock.

HAS LARGE SURPLUS.

Over 500 of the 1,650 stockholders were at the annual meeting and 4,000

shares more than the majority of stock were represented by owners or their proxies. R. D. Wynn is president and Mrs. L. M. Mølle secretary of the concern at present. The directors will choose officers for the year, in a short time.

Reports of the officers of the company showed that notwithstanding

strikes and freight embargoes, the concern came through the year with \$31,000 surplus. Of this amount \$15,000 has been set aside for depreciation, leaving a net surplus of \$16,000, which the company will use in taking care of

its growing business. The additional stock issue and exchange of stock at a premium is considered in the nature of a dividend to the shareholders.

The Mølle company in the last year manufactured approximately 6,000

typewriters, it was stated at the annual session, and of this number over 5,000 were sold and delivered, 1,000 being delayed in shipping on account of embargoes. Only sixteen returns of machines were experienced and it was

pointed out that these would not have come back if those receiving them had known how to properly adjust them. The local factory is so well equipped that it will be able to push production to 1,000 typewriters a month as soon as that output is warranted. The company is sold ahead to the extent of from 12,000 to 15,000 machines.

SALES IN AMERICA.

Special attention is to be given to sales in America, as the foreign business is now well established. The sales

department shows orders for 100 machines a month to Spain, 120 a month to English and 24 a month to the Dutch East Indies. There is an order for 1,000 machines for France. Greece and Turkey are also ordering quantities. The American demand is about 150 a month, with the prospects for about 1,000 a month before New Year's.

Under the plan of expansion for the Oshkosh factory the present plant is a tenth unit of the whole and when the third tenth unit is provided, this industrial institution of Oshkosh will be in a position to manufacture 3,000 typewriters a month.

The Molle No. 3 is a rare, mid-sized antique manual typewriter invented by Wisconsin jeweler and watchmaker John E. Molle.  Xavier University +3

**On This Day in Typewriter History:
Unearthing the Molle**

PART 213



I have previously paid little heed to the **Molle typewriter**. Perhaps, instinctively, I sensed there was something deceptive about it, something of which I should be wary. Now that I have devoted many hours today to researching the man and his machine, I have come to fully appreciate why **John Edward Molle** was one of the **great mystery men of typewriter history**. But **Molle's** true story, until now buried for more than 94 years, can finally emerge.

In my quest, I soon became aware that other typewriter historians had hunted in vain, over the very same territory, before me. Ancestry.com and FamilySearch had been peppered with enquiries, but to no apparent avail. As in so many such cases, an incorrect date can throw the most dedicated searcher off the trail. For example, in an article by Ed Neuert in the March 2007 edition of *ETCetera* (No 77), Ed writes, "Interestingly, **John Molle** is not mentioned in any of these **Molle company** documents of 1919 to 1922. It is known that he died in April 1921, but his final illness clearly had removed him from a role in the company long before that."



What had removed **Molle** was the finality of death, not mere illness. He wasn't able to report to his stockholders, or anyone else for that matter, on September 15, 1919 - he had been dead and buried almost 17 months by that date.

So let's start with the end. **John E. Molle** died in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, on April 27, 1918, not on June 9, 1920, nor on April 27, 1921, as other sites and histories have it. He was 46 when he died. The final version of his typewriter, the **Molle No 3**, had not yet been launched when he died - it would be first described in the June 1918 edition of *Typewriter Topics*.

THE MOLLE TYPEWRITER

The Molle machine employs the fundamental principles of all typebar machines, although in many ways it represents a radical departure.

The unit type of construction is embodied in the Molle. It is built in three separate self-contained units, viz.: Base, action and carriage, any one of which may be detached by an operator, without the use of tools or removal of working parts, on a moment's notice.

By the use of aluminum instead of cast iron, pressed steel in place of forgings and castings, the "Molle" is made extremely light, strong and durable, and is capable of withstanding severe usage. Significant to note is the claim made by the manufacturers that the Molle typewriter contains 65 per cent. less parts than most machines.

The paper holding device is distinctly new and eliminates the usual paper fingers found on other typewriters. This device makes it possible to hold all sizes of paper and cards from a postage stamp to a 10-inch sheet of paper without changing finger adjustments. It also acts as a tearing-off device, especially appealing to reporters, press operators and other literary persons, and as a ruling device for pen or pencil without cumbersome attachments.

Although the "Molle" is not a portable typewriter in the strictest sense of the term, it can be easily carried

in its carrying case, the weight being 11½ pounds. It is entirely visible in writing, possesses a perfect ribbon movement and feed, which does not move when spacebar or tabulator is used, and has interchangeable parts and bearings hardened for long wear.

The Molle typewriter is a ninety-character machine and is therefore greatly adaptable for use by doctors, druggists, lawyers and other professional men, as well as appealing particularly to over-sea markets, where the demand for extra-character machines is particularly keen.

The typebar has been designed to eliminate piling of letters or injuring of type when more than one key is struck at a time; the touch is sensitive and light, the carriage and shift action being mounted on ball-bearing rollers.

The Molle typewriter will be sold in the United States at a retail price of \$50. A front-view illustration of the machine accompanies this description.

This model calculating machine has been previously described and illustrated in "TOPICS" and since has met with universal favor. The "Ad-a-Grip" attachment for screwdrivers was devised for quickly putting screws in difficult and inaccessible places.

It's possible **Molle** died before he saw *any* of his typewriters go into production. But **Molle** *did* have a factory, at 53 Ceape Avenue, Oshkosh, a three-story brick and stone structure between State and Court streets, built in 1915.

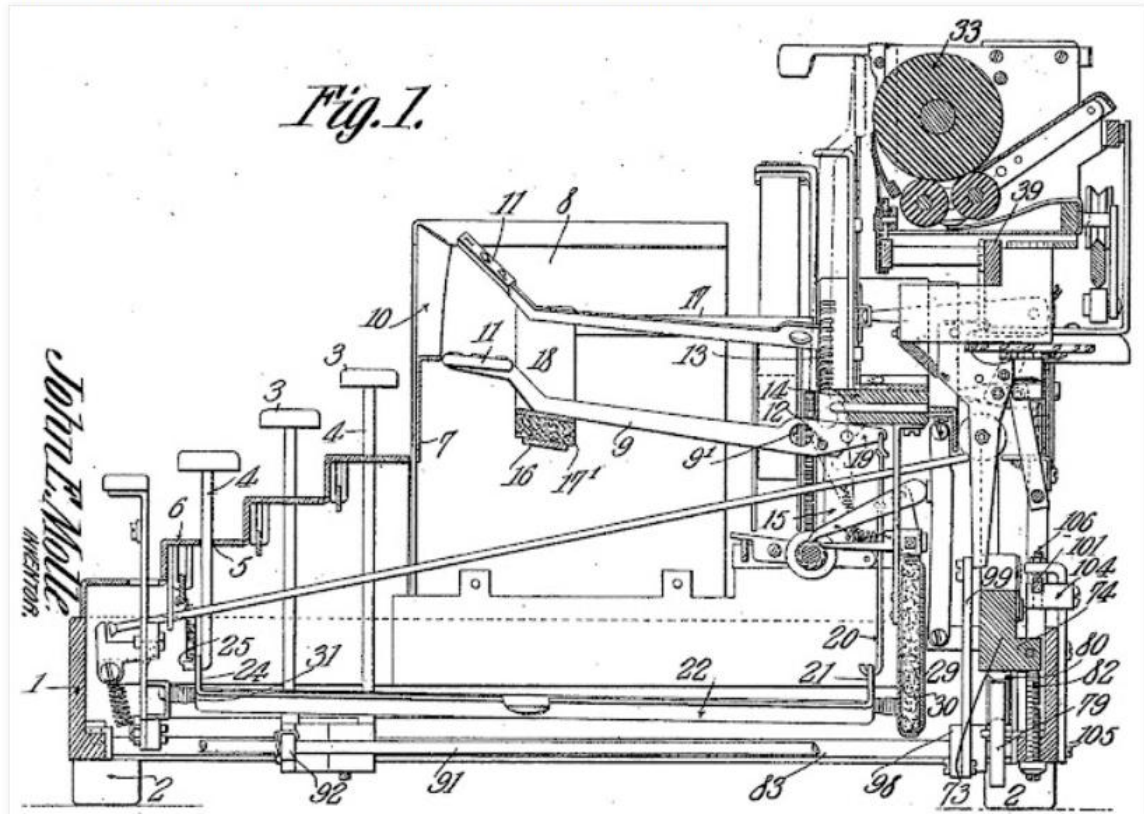
After **Molle's** death, the **Molle Typewriter Company**, incorporated in December 1911, was completely restructured. First Molle's widow, long-serving company secretary **Lillian Mae Hogan "Lottie" Molle**, and his brother, **Wilhelm Franz Molle** (1878-1971) took control, and appointed **Robert D. Wynn** to run the company. **Wynn** moved in with **Mrs Molle** as a lodger at 141 Cottes Street, Oshkosh. She was 37, he was 54. The company went public in 1920 and sold common stocks. See Lillian Molle's and Robert Wynn's signatures below.



John E. Molle was born on March 17, 1872, in West Kewaunee, Wisconsin. He was NOT born on April 27, 1876, nor in Rapids on July 11, 1866. His father was **Charles Molle** (1838-1912) and his mother **Johanna Luise Schultz Molle** (1845-1927). Both parents were born in Pommern, Cochem-Zell, Rheinland-Pfalz, Germany.

John E. Molle was indeed a watchmaker before he started dabbling in typewriters. He was granted his first typewriter patent in 1906, while living in Sturgeon Bay, Wisconsin. His second design was patented **on this day** (December 23) in 1913, and is for what became the **Molle No 3**. But is it 3 for three-bank, or for his third attempt?

Before the **Molle company** went bankrupt in July 1922, as few as 6126 typewriters had been produced.

At the time the deal was made with the Government, Mr. Drane, buyer for the War Department, remarked as follows:

"If the 'MOLLE' Typewriter will stand up one year, you have the largest and best proposition in the world's markets for a typewriter."

At the signing of the Armistice we were released from further Government sales. We then opened up a campaign for the markets of the world. This was the psychological moment as the world was hungry for typewriters and was willing to pay for samples of the new machine.

Two thousand "MOLLE" Typewriters were manufactured and sold during 1919. Most of these were as samples to the dealers all over the world.

Repeat orders from these samples commenced to arrive in June of last year.

Our English agents, who purchased 20 machines in March of 1919, followed up with 100 machines in June which arrived in England August 26th. The first day's sale was 84 machines. They then cabled for the second hundred. November 1st they increased their order to 100 every ten days. This we could not furnish at that time, but we did agree to give them 40 every ten days with a promise of 100 every ten days commencing May 1, 1920.

Thirty days ago they again cabled us to start 100 machines every ten days promptly after May 1st. This we accepted. This week we have a letter from our exporters for England stating that our English Agent would like our lowest figure for parts for 500 machines per month, they to assemble the machines in England. This we cannot accept at the present time as we are using all the parts we can make for our present orders.

France started with 10 samples in April of last year. In August they signed up with us for 50 machines per month. In December this was increased to 100 per month. They now cable for 1,000 "MOLLE" Typewriters to be shipped in lots of 250 per month in addition to their regular order for 100 per month.

Dutch East Indies started with five machines early in 1919. In October they ordered 144 machines, 72 shipped at once and 72 thirty days later. January 1st, this year, they booked an order of 24 machines per month as a minimum, subject to an increase. Last month we received an order for 50 extra machines, which we have taken care of in addition to the regular order for 24 per month.

Three shipments of 30 machines each have been made to Buenos Aires, S. A. The exporters for this country report their requirements will be from 50 to 75 machines per month.

Sample orders of from 3 to 30 machines have been made to Portugal, Switzerland, Santiago, Chile, India, Spanish Africa, Canary Islands, Australia, Africa, Federated Malay States, China, Japan, Egypt, Morocco, Algeria, Columbia, Norway, Cuba, Mexico, Austria, Cyprus, Madagascar, Malta, Poland, Russia, Spain, Venezuela, Greece, Turkey, Balkan States, Holland, Germany, Canada and Iceland.

From an estimate made by our exporters on the above mentioned countries the possible total "MOLLE" Typewriters for the coming twelve months exceeds 40,000.

To date we have not expended any amount introducing the "MOLLE" in the United States. We have, however, over forty American agents, who collectively are moving 150 machines per month. One agent in Minneapolis has sold over 500 "MOLLE" Typewriters since August.

Our production is increasing every month. The following gain is shown in finished typewriters:

First three months last year	224
First three months this year	1,410

What we need is floor space and added equipment. Our complete set of dyes is made and with added floor space and equipment we could manufacture parts for 1,000 machines per day.

We have ordered additional machinery that will commence to arrive in June, July and August.

We have optioned the adjoining lot 100x168 ft. east of the present factory.

We also will retain the present factory for assembling.

As a start to this end, we are now offering the unsold balance of the company's stock at \$2.00 per share.

We are asking our salesmen to offer this stock to the "MOLLE" Stockholders first, as we have promised many of you to keep you advised when the issue is about to close.

Body to be Taken to Brownsville, Ind., for Rites on Wednesday

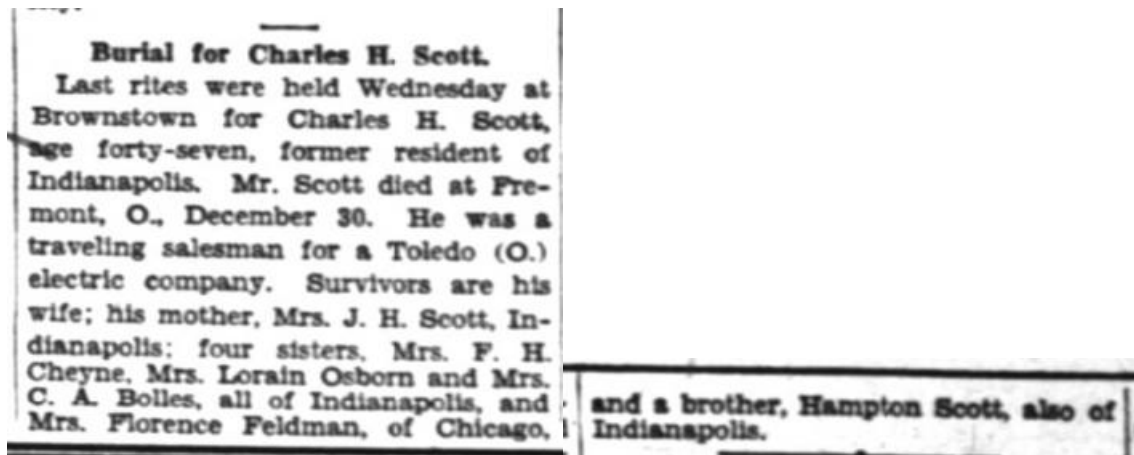

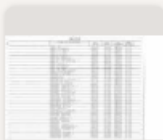

WI – 20 Aug 1960 Franklin, Johnson IN (in the Masonic Home). – Documentation of her marriage could not be located, but a newspaper account reports she is on her honeymoon in Oct 1901. In her husband John Molle's obituary, his marriage to Miss Lillian "Molle" is reported on 22 Oct 1901 in Sturgeon Bay, Door WI. - Listed as Mrs. J.E. Molle of Oshkosh WI in Jun 1916. Married to **John E. Molle** (1872-1917, F: 92886769), son of Charles Molle & Johanna Luise Molle, F: 92886769. John was the president of the Molle Typewriter Co. of Oshkosh WI. – Married on 6 Nov 1920 to **Charles Henry Scott** in Canton, Stark OH (see article in "Oshkosh Northwestern" 24 Dec 1920 p 3 copied above). Charles Scott was b. 30 Jul 1881 in Brownstown, Jackson IN & died 31 Dec 1928 in Fremont, Sandusky OH, son of James Henry & Hattie M. Scott, F: 19717294. Charles had married Georgia Gough (d. 1973) in 1904 & Bertha M. Fields (1891-1919) in 1915. – "Oshkosh Northwestern" 16 Sep 1921 p 14 notes the reorganization of the Molle Typewriter Co. Named to the board of directors is Mrs. Lillian Molle-Scott. – Married **William Patrick ("Pat") Hargon** (b. Marion IL, died at age 78 on 4 Mar 1957 Franklin Co. IN, buried in Washington Park East Cemetery, Indianapolis, Marion IN, F: 129255391) on 9 Mar 1946 in Marion Co. IN. "Indianapolis (IN) News" 13 Mar 1946 p 32 – marriage license for William Patrick Hargon & Lillian May Scott. Resident of Indianapolis IN in Jan 1942. Mrs. William Hargan/Hargen of Indianapolis IN in 1948 & Jan 1952. – William Hargon was the son of John Mal Hargon & Martha C. Perkins. - Her IN death

record lists her as Lillian Molle HARGON, widow. She died of an acute myocardial infarction. - Buried in Greenlawn Cemetery, Franklin, Johnson IN on 23 Aug 1960. F: 21457774

- Violet Marie Hogan Cornell**, 4 Jan 1884 Sturgeon Bay, Door WI – 15 [also found as 18] Nov 1960 Newark, Essex NJ. - Wife of Lewis/Louis Serril Cornell (26 Jan 1868 IL – 29 May 1972 Kirkland, Kings Co. WA), the son of William Henry Cornell & Elizabeth M. Noleman. He is buried in Sunset Hills Memorial Park, Bellevue, King WA, F: 107381012. Lewis had previously married Lois I. Willard in Cook Co. IL on 16 Aug 1893. – In the 1900 census for Chicago, Cook IL, conducted 4 Jun 1900, Louis S. Cornell (31 IL, b. May 1869, stenographer for an express company, divorced) lived with his widowed mother Elizabeth (63 OH, father b. MD, mother b. OH, b. Apr 1839, a boarding house keeper & divorced twin sister Rebecca Porter (b. Apr 1838,) & divorced sister Carrie Cornell (35 IL, stenographer in a law firm) plus 2 servants & 9 boarders. - Violet Hogan, age 22, single, married 10 Apr 1901 in Chicago, Cook IL to Lewis S. Cornell, age 33. - Resident of Dallas TX in Jun 1916. Resident of Newark NJ in Jan 1942, 1948 & Jan 1952. Violet is listed as Mrs. Lew Cornell of Washington DC in Nov 1938 when her sister Ida Stoneman died. – In the 1910 census for Dallas, Dallas TX, conducted 25-29 Apr 1910, Lewis M. Cornell, 42 IL, father b. RI, mother b. OH, was a clerk for an express company. Violet (31 WI) had no children; her father was b. England & her mother b. Canada. Both were in their 1st marriage & had been married 9 years. - In the 1920 census for Salt Lake City, Salt Lake Co. UT, conducted 8 Jan 1920, Lewis S. Cornell (51 IL, father b. RI, mother b. MD, a clerk for an express company) lived with wife Violet M. (41 WI, father b. Ireland, mother b. NY. – In the 1930 census for Salt Lake City, Salt Lake Co. UT, conducted 9 Apr 1930, Louis F. Cornell (61 IL, father b. RI, mother b. MD, clerk for an express company, not a veteran), lived on Hubbard St. with wife Violet (51 WI, father b. Northern Ireland, mother b. Canada [French]. He said he was 1st married at age 24 & she said she was 1st married at age 23. - In the 1940 census for Newark, Essex NJ, Louis P. Cornell (73 PA) lived at 106 N. 9th St. with wife Violet (62 WI). He was an expressman. In 1935 he had lived in the same house while she lived in Newark, Essex NJ. – In the 1942 Newark NJ city directory, Louis S. & Violet M. Cornell lived at 106 N. 9th. – In the 1957 Newark NJ city directory, only Mrs. Violet Cornell is listed, living at 106 N. 9th. - Violet was a resident of Newark NJ in Aug 1960 when her sister Lillian died; Violet died 3 months later. - Buried in Rosedale & Rosehill Cemetery, Linden, Union NJ. F: 104182367
- Iva/Ivy Eleanor Hogan Hunt Collins**, Jan 1885 [according to 1900 census, also found as 1884] WI – 27 Mar 1931 Rochester, Monroe NY. – Listed as Iva E. Hogan of Sturgeon Bay WI in Dec 1898. Was listed as Mrs. Ivy Hunt of NYC in Jun 1916 in her father's obituary. – Died with surname Collins; married in Sep 1913 in Manhattan NY to Maurice Laurence Collins, 25 Oct 1876 Rochester, Monroe NY-3 Nov 1943, buried with Iva, F: 173943402). In the 1940 census, Maurice L. Collins (63 NY) was a resident of the Monroe County Infirmary & Home for the Aged in Brighton, Monroe NY. - Not mentioned as a survivor in the obituaries of her siblings Ida (Nov 1938). Emeline (Jan 1942), Lenox (Jan 1948) & Edward (Jan 1952). – Buried in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, Rochester, Monroe NY. F: 174060800.
