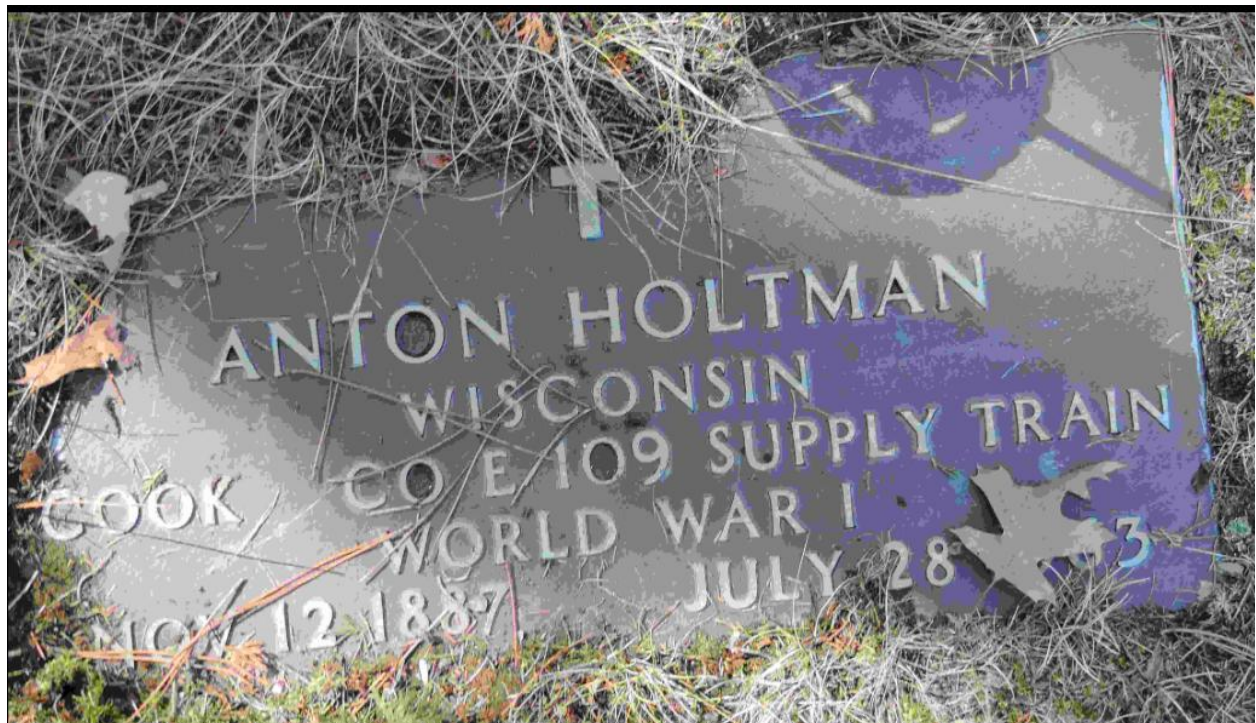

ANTON (Tony) HOLTMAN

Anton (Tony) Holtman was born in Milwaukee, Nov. 12, 1887. He was the son of Anton and Lena (Jungman) Holtman. His childhood was spent in that area. In his twenties, he moved to Wisconsin Dells and while there, he enlisted in the army. He saw action in four major battles, at Toul, Chateau-Thierry, St. Mahiel, and Verdun and was a survivor of the SS Tuscania.

On July 28, 1928, he married Lorena Koberstein and they made their home in Milwaukee. In 1936, they moved to Packwaukee and continued to make their home, there.

Tony had been in failing health for the past 18 years. On July 15th, he was taken to Divine Savior's Hospital and later transferred to the Veteran's Ad. Hospital in Madison. He passed away on July 28 at the age of 75 years, 8 months, 16 days.

He leaves to mourn his beloved wife Lorena, 3 sisters, Mrs. Elsi Lemberger, Mrs. Lillian Holdman, Mrs. Helen Dobratz of Milwaukee, many nieces and nephews and a host of friends. His parents and 3 brothers preceded him in death.

Tony was a member of the V.F.W. in Portage. Interment at Underhill Cemetery.

GREEN BAY YOUTH SAYS SOME

"Safe in Ireland," is the message brought to several Milwaukee homes in letters from boys who were on board the Tuscania when she was sunk on the night of Feb. 5. The letters tell of the disaster and the safe landing of the survivors, and of the hearty welcome and hospitable treatment received from the warm-hearted Irish people.

Tony Holtman writes to his father, Anthony Holtman, 3709 Lisbon avenue: "I am at Sunnyland camp, near Belfast, this is just to let you know I am safe."

COMPANY RETURNS FROM ENCAMPMENT

LOCAL UNIT PRONOUNCED BEST
HEADQUARTERS CO. AT SUM-
MER MANEUVERS

MAKE GOOD AT EVERY POINT

Encampment Closed All Too Soon—
Recruits Given Taste of Real
Soldiering—Incidents of
Camp Life

Headquarters Co. returned home last Saturday afternoon from a two weeks' stay at Camp Douglas where the boys participated in the summer maneuvers of the 1st Wisconsin Inf. of the Wisconsin National Guard, they being assigned to the 2nd battalion. As the boys filed out of the troop train and fell in at the station platform they presented a fine appearance, and the soldierly bearing of the old-timers was plainly distinguished from the rigid attempt of the recruits, or newer members of the company, to come to attention.

The two weeks of camp life had left its imprint on the faces of nearly all of them, and while some of the old "war dogs", who knew how to take things easy, had really taken on a little flesh, due to the generous portions of the appetizing viands Chef Tony Holtman dished up for them, the boys who had gone to camp for the first time showed the tell-tale marks of their brief experience at campaigning.

Yet it was a great experience for all of them because the duties incumbent upon the headquarters company were new to all of the boys. But they made good at every point, and before the encampment closed were highly complimented by the commanding officer for making the best appearance and for the most efficient discharge of its duties of any of the Headquarters companies in camp. The two weeks ended all too soon for many of the boys.

Incidents of Camp Life

The following contribution dealing with interesting incidents of camp life was received last week after our issue had gone to press:

Serg. Major Henry Buelow had an idea that it was necessary to be slicked up all the time and he was frequently seen using his powder puff, rouge and chamois. It must have been the large chevrons on his right arm that made him shine. Anyway the girls seemed to notice the chevrons more than they did the powder.

"Doc." Nulph spent one whole day showing pa and ma around the camp. He said that it seemed good to be back with ma for a few hours as it had been so long since he had seen her, nearly a whole week.

Corps. Lindenberg and Felske were sent out on patrol with a squad of men one day up around target bluff. Corp. Lindenberg was to be the get-away man, but it appears that Corp. Felske got away with Fot Huntley some place in the woods. The report at headquarters was: "two men lost in action." Headquarters sure has a lively lot of get-away men, if there is any work to be gotten away from.

Private John Babb seems to think that all he joined the army for was to eat. He don't seem to like the idea of working, either in the army or out of it.

Private Will Stolte, "Pelican", developed a disposition not to move after he had been tucked into bed at night. One night we had a thunder storm and he called to Corp. Lindenberg to "get up and shut the tent so it wouldn't rain into the door." Private Stolte hated to come home and said he "wished camp lasted the rest of the summer so he could keep right on getting a letter every time the mail man came around."

The "Prince of Killarney", Joe Connor, got into a scrap with the M. P.'s down town one evening. They were finally convinced that Headquarters Co., 2nd Bn.-1st. Inf. had a hard Irishman in its outfit.

Tailor Ora Smith made a trip home one day to get some training from his wife in the way of sewing on buttons.

Corp. Cooper evidently didn't "fall for" camp life. He frequently said he wished he was home where he had a good bed and could stay out as long as he wanted to at night.
