

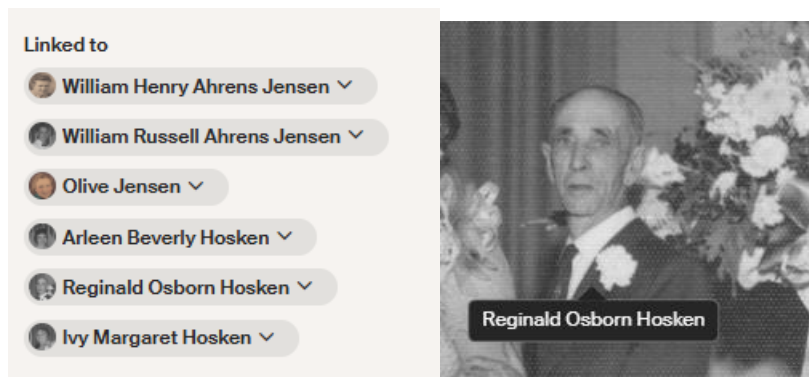

TWO MARICOPA BOYS ON WRECKED TUSCANIA

TUSCANIA SINKING IS DESCRIBED BY A MARICOPA SOLDIER BOY WHO SURVIVED

Harry Burpee and Reginald
Hosken From Oil Fields
on Vessel

Both Boys Now Safe in
England None the Worse
for Experience

MARICOPA, March 13.—Harry Burpee and Reginald Hosken, two Maricopa boys who were on the Tuscania at the time that that vessel was sunk by a German submarine, have been heard from by G. C. Murchie of this city who received a letter from Hosken on Tuesday from somewhere in England where he is with the 100th aero squadron on his way to France. The two Maricopans were rescued from the sinking ship, Burpee being taken off by a British destroyer and Hosken jumped from the ship and was in the sea for six hours before being picked up by a life boat. Burpee was later landed in Ireland and Hosken was landed in Scotland. Both are together again in England and expect to shortly leave for France. The men left Maricopa several months ago after having enlisted in the aviation branch of the army. They were well known among the oil men and rig builders having put in several years on the West Side and up to the present time have not been heard from since the news reached here of their leaving for France. It was known to most of their friends on the West Side that they were passengers on the ill fated ship but as their names did not appear in any of the lists they had almost been given up for lost. Hosken inclosed in his letter, a meal ticket which was issued to him on the Tuscania, to be kept by Murchie as a souvenir. His letter reads as follows:

"100 Aero Squadron, Somewhere in England, Feb. 14, 1918.

"Dear Murchie:

"Just a few lines to let you know that we are getting a little closer to the firing line at every move. You will be surprised to learn that Harry Burpee and myself were on the Tuscania when she was torpedoed and are still living and feel fine. Fritz hasn't got anything on me. I had a good bath in the sea and I got away in a life boat after spending six hours in the water. I landed in Scotland, then I did have a good time as the people sure did treat us well and we got plenty of "white horse" to drink. Burpee landed in Ireland. He got away on a

British destroyer. Never even got his feet wet. The English destroyers did some great work so Harry tells me. We are all back together again after being scattered like sheep all over the British Isles. It was a good thing that I could swim or I certainly would have had a wet grave. Harry told the boys that I would show up somewhere as they all thought that I was lost when the ship went down. The water was a bit cold but I got used to it before I was taken from it. The soldiers' life is surely a great one and you see all kinds of things in the army. The Tuscania stood on the surface of the water for two hours and fifty minutes before she went down. I saw her take the final dive and it was quite a sight. Well, old pal, this is all of the news for this time. Give my regards to Pete O'Rourke, Beck Bradley and Bill Hickman. Also to the rest of the boys. Give this letter to the other boys to read and remember me to them all. We can't get any good tobacco here and as we lost all that we had when the ship went down, are in a bad way for some. I hope this finds you all enjoying the best of health as it leaves me feeling fine. Burpee sends his regards.

CITIZENSHIP EXAMINATION DATE IS SET

Notices were mailed today by County Clerk J. M. Backs to 56 members of the naturalization class scheduled to come before superior court for semi-annual examinations December 9. The court department has not yet been designated.

Among the current class is one who will gain citizenship merely by taking the oath of allegiance, the first case of the kind to be handled in Orange county. Mrs. Harry Alma Murray, American wife of a Canadian, lost her United States citizenship by her marriage. Her husband is now deceased, and she is regaining United States citizenship by taking the oath of allegiance.

Frank Holbrook Arrested Again

**VIOLATED PAROLE AND ONCE
MORE REPORTED TO BE IN
BOOTLEGGING BUSINESS**

Frank Holbrook, who has been arrested before for bootlegging, and Joseph Kanstrup were arrested by Deputy Constables W. B. Scott and Charles George at their supposed cache of moonshine near the mouth of Jenny creek between Middle Creek and Redding shortly after midnight Friday morning. They were locked up in the city jail.

Holbrook was arrested recently in the wholesale raid. Pleading guilty, he was fined \$200 by Judge Cunningham in Millville. He spent about a week in jail and then was released on probation, after paying \$150 of his fine.

It was not long until the officers heard that Holbrook was once more "in business" at the Middle Creek hotel, but they failed to "get the goods on him." Dr. Grotefend, owner of the building, banished the tenant Friday, but that did not appear to stop the business. A cache was established in the brush at Jenny creek and it was there that Holbrook and his partner, Joseph Kanstrup, were apprehended in the darkness after midnight. A revolver was found in the pocket of each automobile. No jack-ass brandy could be found in the cache in the darkness, but plenty of it was revealed when the officers went back to the spot in the light of day. They report having found at "the place of business" a jug full of moonshine and thirteen pint bottles charged with the same kind of fiery fluid.

Holbrook's parole was revoked Friday evening.

Farmer Accused of Killing Brother

A day and night of drinking and revelry, involving three Ventura county farmer-brothers, was climaxed today with the filing of a manslaughter charge against one of the trio.

The bizarre ending to the brothers' spree came early Tuesday when Paul Joseph Jones, 54, was found dead under mys-

terious circumstances in a bean field near Somis, and substantiated last night when John Jones, Somis farmer and brother of the dead man, told a coroner's jury that he "beat his brother with a pitchfork and kicked him several times in the side."

THIRD BROTHER STRUCK

An autopsy, performed by Dr. R. B. Armitstead, disclosed that Paul Jones had died from a ruptured liver, and the jurymen declared their belief that it was caused from the beating admitted by John.

A third brother, Bradford M. Jones, 53, also of Somis, while not directly testifying against his brother, told the jury that "John hit me twice with the pitchfork, but I ran and hid in a nearby dry wash."

District Attorney M. Arthur Waite filed the charge of manslaughter against John Jones this morning.

Revelation of the strange circumstances that climaxed the heavy drinking party came hesitantly from John's lips last night after Coroner Ted Mayr had admonished him that anything he said would be used against him.

Cool and expressionless, the 41-year-old farmer seemed to debate Mayr's warning, and then as if relieved, said: "I'll testify."

His wife sat with moist eyes, among newspapermen and witnesses in the small Oxnard justice courtroom, and heard her husband give the testimony which may send him to prison for 10 years if he is convicted.

DESCRIBES ARGUMENT

John told the jury that he and his brothers had been drinking heavily Sunday night and Monday and that they had purchased a quantity of whisky, wine and beer. He said they went to the McBean ranch late Monday where they were harvesting beans, to pay two men who had helped them. He said they then went to the fields where their equipment was situated.

In driving into the field, he testified, he drove his Chevrolet coupe "just for the fun of it" into a bean straw stack. He said the impact started a fire and that he could not back the machine out. He attempted, he added, to fork the straw away from the car, but the heat was too intense. He told the jury he pulled Paul from the machine and then persuaded Bradford to get out. By that time the threshing machine had caught fire, he said.

He said he asked Paul and Bradford to help him hitch a tractor to the thresher, but that they refused. He finally succeeded, he said, in pulling the big machine away from the flames by using a smaller tractor.

"Paul fell from the ladder of the threshing machine while I was pulling it," John said. "I think he was attempting to release the brake."

USED PITCHFORK

"After I put the fire out on the threshing machine," John related, "I guess I got mad at Bradford and Paul for not helping me, because I hit Paul about six times with a pitchfork and kicked him about the same number of times in the side. I also hit Brad twice, but he ran."

Bradford Jones substantiated his brother's testimony of being intoxicated, saying "he didn't see how they could help it, considering the amount they drank."

He also told the jury that John had struck him with the fork and that he thought he had some broken ribs. This morning he was removed from the county jail, where he is being held on an intoxication charge, to the county hospital for treatment.

He told the jury that Paul was alive early Tuesday morning, but (See INQUEST, page 2)

that he did not know the time. He said he went to sleep and when he awoke, Paul was dead.

Both John and Bradford admitted to the jury that they continued drinking Tuesday prior to the time the body was found by authorities.

Other witnesses last night were John Hackney, who substantiated the Jones' visit to the McBean ranch to pay for labor and testified "John was too intoxicated to count his money."

FUNERAL TOMORROW

H. D. Crowell, a nearby rancher, who first discovered Paul dead, said he found John and Bradford Jones quite intoxicated Tuesday morning. He said John asked him: "Want to take a corpse to town?"

He said he replied, "Hardly," and went to the McBean ranch to notify authorities.

Deputy Sheriff T. B. Stephens, who investigated, said he found Bradford Jones in a drunken stupor and John driving a tractor aimlessly in the field.

The coroner's jury, consisting of R. B. Wimer, foreman, W. G. Cole, Claire Clarke, Myron Adams, Amelia B. Wimer, Bob Morris and Ben Verden, deliberated 23 minutes before returning its verdict.

Funeral services for the victim will be conducted from the Oliver L. Reardon and Sons chapel in Oxnard at 1:30 p.m. tomorrow. Burial will be at Ivy lawn.

Jones was a native of the Moorpark district and was a veteran of World war I.

He is survived by his father, J. J. Jones, Moorpark, his mother Mrs. Amanda Horton, Long Beach, and four sisters, Mrs. Charlsia Billingsley, Long Beach, Mrs. Rosalee Sisson, Tipton, Calif., Mrs. Maude O'Dell, Los Angeles and Mrs. Lila Buckley, Compton.

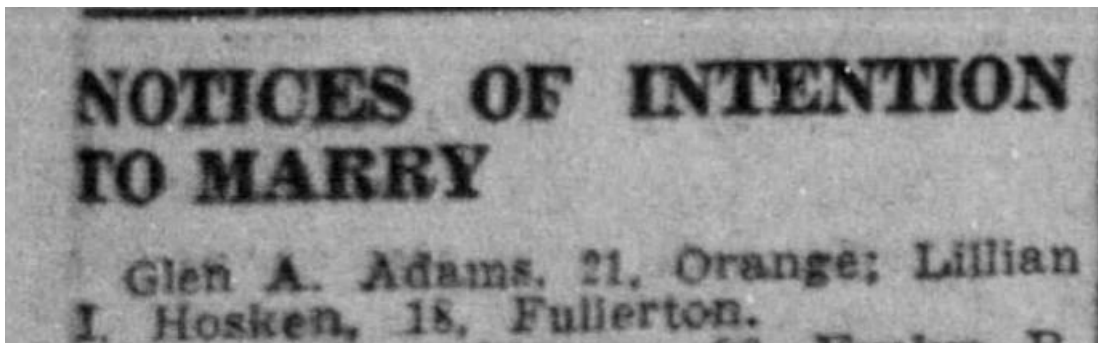

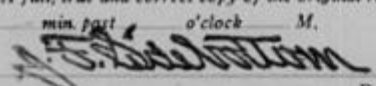

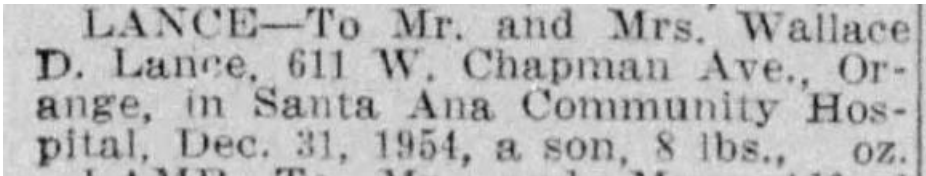

Parents Face Trial Following Death Of Child

COSTA MESA — A young father and mother today faced trial on child neglect charges stemming from the death of their 8-week-old infant boy.

Wallace Dean Lance, 29, and Margaret Ellen Lance, 27, of 1725 Pomona Ave., were arraigned in Newport Justice Court under section 237-A of the penal code; unjustifiable punishment causing a child to suffer.

Hearing was set for next Thurs-
tensen at 2 p.m.

The Lance's baby, Scott, was found dead in his basinet two weeks ago when Mrs. Lance returned home from work, police reported.

After an autopsy, the coroner's autopsy attributed the death to "neglect and acute interstitial pneumonitis."

Police reports described "awful urine burns" on the infant and other evidence on which the neglect charge was based.

Mrs. Lance had fed the baby at 6 a.m. on leaving for work, she told police. Her husband unemployed, had just arisen and was shaving, when she returned at 2 p.m., police said she reported.

The mother told officers of the death of another infant a year ago when a nine-day-old daughter succumbed.

The Lances also have an 18-month-old daughter.

Costa Mesan, 29, Handed 180-Day Term In Death Of Infant Son

ESA—A bowler who evidence of lack of care given the

COSTA MESA—A bowler who told his wife "to wait until I'm through shaving" before seeking help for their dead baby begins a 180-day sentence today in County Jail for child neglect. The wife, found not guilty, is free to care for her surviving baby girl.

Laying the burden of blame on the father, Wallace Dean Lance, 29, an unemployed semi-pro bowler, Judge William Christensen didn't hesitate in finding him guilty and imposing the six-month term.

Police and coroner's witnesses had described the circumstances of the death of tiny eight-week-old Scott Lance on April 13, offering

evidence of lack of care given the sick baby.

Tall, crewcut Lance listened morosely as he heard testimony on the child's death. Officer Dudley Van Cleve and Officer Harold Arnold testified they broke into the Lance home at 1725 Pomona Ave. and "darted" through the house to offer aid. Fire dept. rescue units immediately administered oxygen to the tiny form lying face down in its bassinet, the court was told.

Lance refused to take the stand and only once during the hour-long proceedings deigned to question a witness. His wife, Mrs. Margaret Ellen Lance, 27, was also tried on the misdemeanor charge of neglect and took the stand in her own de-

fense.

Judge Christensen said he "found it difficult" — but absolved her of guilt in the death. Key exhibit in the hour-long trial was a set of police photographs of the body.

"My husband was there to take care of them," Mrs. Lance cried, breaking down at mention of her dead child. "What else could I do when I had to work, too?"

"There's one thing you didn't do for your children said Judge Christensen in delivering his findings, "you didn't recognize that you couldn't put any faith or trust in your husband. He is more interested in bowling and in sleeping and snoozing all day than in his child's life."

Lance offered no defense of his actions on April 13 when, the court learned, he had been left with a newborn infant and a baby girl—and slept all day. Evidence was offered that the dying Scott must have cried as he fought for life, but officers quoted Lance as saying he heard no crying.

Dr. Shirley Schneider, autopsy surgeon for the Coroner's Office told the court the child seemed well nourished although there was no sign of a "recent meal."

Dr. Schneider said tests were still being conducted to find the exact cause of death. She did relate that a virus infection, perhaps aggravated by lack of attention,

had possibly brought the pneumonia-like death.

Only at this point did either parent seek to cross-examine any witness. (They were not represented by an attorney.) Pink-clad, bespectacled Mrs. Lance leaned forward to quiz Dr. Schneider on the cause of death, seemingly more out of a mother's concern than for her legal defense.

In her questions, Mrs. Lance brought forth her efforts to find the cause — and cure—of a diaper rash which plagued the tiny baby for more than half its brief life. She said a doctor had told her she was "doing the best possible" for her child.

Mrs. Lance took the stand to relate her efforts to keep a job and take care of her children. She said she left home for work around 6 a.m. after feeding the infant and its 18-month-old sister.

Police reports and her story said she returned home to find the baby seemingly asleep on its face. She said she picked it up to feed and change it and noticed its stiffness.

"It seemed to be sweating," she related, "and I carried it in the bedroom. I asked my husband to do something. He said the child was dead. He told me to put it back in the bassinet and try and calm down while he finished shaving."

Corroborative testimony by Van Cleve, Arnold, Det. Sgt. Jack Iverson, Juvenile Officer Dorris Morris, Coroner's Dep. F. Shoemaker quoted Lance as explaining he hadn't called for help because he'd seen "lots of deaths and knew nothing could be done."

An interested "observer" in the trial was an attorney representing the grandparents. He said Mrs. Lance's parents were concerned for the welfare of the surviving baby girl in case the Lances had both been jailed.

The couple lost another newborn baby a year ago, testimony also revealed. Police said the freed mother is pregnant with her fourth child.

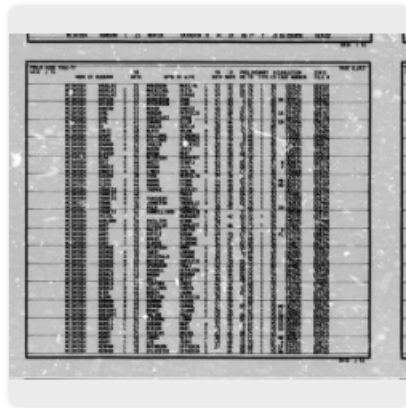

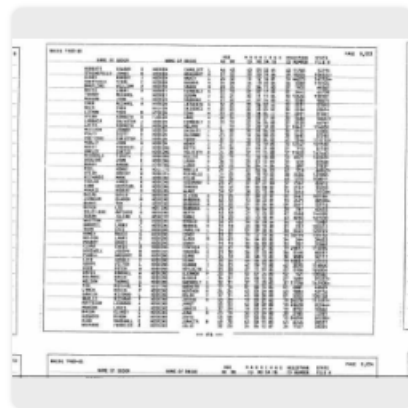

RIVERSIDE, Calif. (AP) — James B. Stringfellow, 66, owner of a leaking toxic waste dump that led a morass of litigation and cost him a fortune, died Sunday.
The cause of death was not immediately available.
In 1955, California officials persuaded Stringfellow to convert a 17-acre quarry in the Jurupa Mountains into a hazardous waste dump for the aerospace industry. The Stringfellow acid pits began to leak.
A lawsuit seeking damages for injuries allegedly caused by the leakage is under way.
When Stringfellow closed the dump in 1972, its ponds contained 34 million gallons of toxic waste that, so far, has cost \$120 million to clean up. The cleanup and the court battles ultimately cost Stringfellow most of the estimated \$1.5 million he made off the dump.

RIVERSIDE — James B. Stringfellow, owner of a toxic waste dump that inspired a morass of litigation and cost him a fortune and his reputation, has died. He was 66.

Stringfellow, who had moved out of the Riverside area to avoid notoriety surrounding his involvement with the dump, died Sunday at the FHP Skilled Nursing Facility in Westminster. The cause of death was not immediately known.

The continuing cleanup, controversy and court battles over the hazardous-waste dump that Stringfellow founded ultimately cost him far more than the estimated \$1.5 million he made from it. In just one 1991 case, he agreed to pay a group of Glen Avon residents \$8 million.

Environmental activist Penny Newman, one of the 3,800 plaintiffs in that case, told The Times at the time of the settlement that Stringfellow was “kind of one of the victims--but not an unwilling victim.”

On Monday, she added, “The sad saga of Stringfellow is a lot of innocent people who didn’t know any better were sucked into this fiasco.”

In 1955, Stringfellow was operating a quarry in the Jurupa Mountains, blasting out granite blocks for coastal jetties, when he was approached by California officials who wanted him to create a 17-acre hazardous-waste dump for the aerospace industry.

He refused at first, but agreed when they returned later that year and assured him the quarry area was leakproof.

The Stringfellow Acid Pits operated from 1956 to 1972 as a state-approved dumping ground where about 200 companies and individuals dumped nearly 35 million gallons of chemicals, some known to cause cancer, into unlined ponds.

The pits did in fact leak, and rain washed toxic chemicals into nearby Glen Avon on several occasions. Although Stringfellow, major defendant companies and Riverside County have settled that case against them for more than \$96 million, the complicated lawsuit seeking damages for injuries allegedly caused by the toxic leakage is still pending against the state of California.

So far, cleanup costs since the dump closed in 1972 have totaled \$120 million.

For the remainder of his life, Stringfellow suffered from having his name linked to the toxic dump.

“When we went to restaurants,” his wife, Margaret, said Monday, “he would use the name String instead of Stringfellow because people would glare at him.”

“It’s unfortunate he had to live the last 25 years of his life with this cloud hanging over his head that was not of his making,” said Chris Bisgaard, Stringfellow’s attorney. “That really was a tragedy.”

The Stringfellows left Riverside County and settled in Newport Beach in 1977, later moving to Costa Mesa. Stringfellow spent his last few years cleaning and restoring boats.

Besides his wife, Stringfellow is survived by two children.

Community forces acid pit to close

GLEN AVON (P) — The operator of an acid disposal pit, said to be the only one of its kind in Southern California, has yielded to community pressure by closing the facility.

James B. Stringfellow, operator of Stringfellow Acid Disposal Pits, said he would close the facility which handles chemical and industrial wastes, many of them highly toxic, from industries in Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside and San Bernardino counties.

Stringfellow said community opposition to the facility prompted his decision. A group called Mothers of Glen Avon had collected more than 600 signatures of residents requesting closure of the pits. It was not immediately clear on what grounds they opposed the pits.

Monster in small town leaks poisons, making residents question their safety

GLEN AVON — The beige stucco Southern Baptist Church, next door to the elementary school, is 1 mile downstream from the largest toxic waste dump in California.

There are seven more churches in town, most of them small, most of them fundamentalist. For some, it takes a supreme act of faith to continue living in Glen Avon: faith in God, faith in politicians, faith in health officials, faith in experts and faith in each other. That much faith does not always come easily.

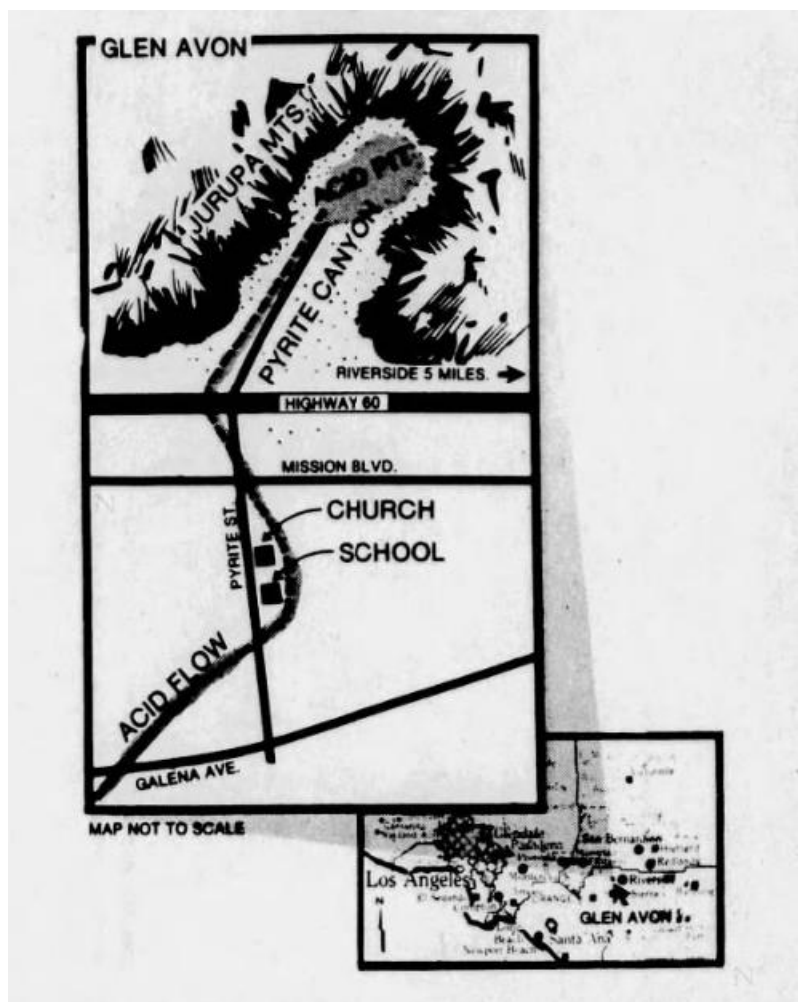
The Rev. Larry Blair, pastor of the Baptist Church, reflects an undercurrent of conflicting opinion in this town of 5,000 five miles west of Riverside.

"My gut feeling is we ought to be rid of it," he said. "But in three years I've not seen anyone with any illness that they even thought came from the acid pit. If it's not a problem, let's quit talking about it."

The chances that Glen Avon residents will stop talking about it are slight. The Stringfellow acid pit's problems loom too large.

There are six times as many chemicals in Stringfellow than were dumped at the infamous Love Canal, the dump in New York that first forced the nation to confront the issue of toxic waste disposal a decade ago.

Consulting firms have submitted bids on a \$1.74 million contract to plan the cleanup at the dump, which has long been on the Environmental Protection Agency's list of the worst 419 dumps in the United States.

The winning company gets a year and three months to finish the plans. After that, officials expect to take another two years to clean up the dump.

Glen Avon has lived with Stringfellow for 27 years. Thirty-four million gallons of chemicals — the most of any toxic waste dump in the state — have been dumped at the pits, including substances suspected of causing cancer, birth defects and reproductive problems in humans. All of it was dumped legally.

This past winter, while heavy rains caused dangerous levels of saturation at the dump, Stringfellow became the focus of congressional investigations into the EPA.

Several top officials, including EPA Administrator Anne Burford, quit after accusations that the agency delayed spending on the Stringfellow cleanup so that then-Gov. Jerry Brown could not claim credit for winning the money during his U.S. Senate campaign.

EPA officials said the delays were caused by negotiations with former dump users to get them to pay for the cleanup.

Ironically, Burford was replaced by William Ruckelshaus, whose firm, Weyerhaeuser Co., was the 11th largest user at the dump,

prompting the new EPA administrator to excuse himself from decisions on Stringfellow.

The pits pose a very real threat to the people of Glen Avon, according to every official involved. The bedrock below the dump is cracked and crumbled, allowing chemicals to leak into the underground water table.

The dam that was supposed to hold the chemicals back has a gaping hole on the east side. Hidden underground is a creek that flows with acid water. The pollution carried by the creek is moving inexorably toward houses about a mile away.

One out of five homes in Glen Avon get their drinking water from their own wells. The chemicals will be underneath those homes in five years — or less.

That prospect is enough to spark large neighborhood meetings on short notice. When a group of congressmen and state legislators visited Glen Avon in April they were greeted by 600 residents who packed a stuffy junior high school gymnasium, hooting and jeering the politicians.

Glen Avon, a decidedly country town where people fly the American flag year-around outside their homes, was unaccustomed to the limelight brought by the hordes of reporters and politicians that have descended in the last few months.

"Glen Avon is a pretty nice place," said Blair. "I would hate to

see Glen Avon become an area people want to avoid living in."

The monster in their midst has unleashed its poisons at least three times. The chemicals in the dump spilled out in 1969, 1978 and 1980. The most serious spill, in 1978, came after the earthen dam holding the chemicals back threatened to burst during heavy rains.

To keep the dam from breaking, state officials released chemical-laced water down the canyon, and by some residents' reports, it spilled past the church, onto the school yard and over lawns.

Officials say they didn't see the water spill onto the school yard. The National Guard was called in to help sandbag the pits, and Riverside County health officials went door-to-door warning of the danger.

No one knows for sure if anyone has ever gotten sick from Stringfellow but there are hints. Birth certificate records showed that, proportionally, twice as many birth defects were recorded for residents near the dump than in the rest of Riverside County in 1980 and 1981, the only two years with complete records.

The birth certificate analysis cannot be dismissed as a statistical fluke, according to Dr. John Harris, the chief of the state's birth defect monitoring program based in Berkeley. But he and other health experts cautioned that birth certificates are a notoriously inac-

curate record of birth defects.

A team of researchers from the the University of California at Los Angeles is conducting an extensive health study in Glen Avon, collecting medical histories on 400 families selected at random and performing medical examinations on the town's small children — theoretically the group whose mothers might have been pregnant during Stringfellow's chemical spill in 1978.

The study is supposed to be finished by September.

The Stringfellow pit, named after its owner, Orange County developer James B. Stringfellow, was opened after geologists in 1955 concluded that the bowl-shaped canyon where it is located would be leak proof. Riverside civic boosters wanted the toxic dump to attract heavy industry to the area.

The first dumper was the U.S. Air Force, which on Aug. 31, 1956, deposited chemicals used for refurbishing missiles at nearby Norton Air Force Base in San Bernardino.

In the years that followed, chemicals were hauled in from all over Southern California, deposited by some of the largest corporations and defense contractors in the country.

The county land permit for the dump lapsed in 1972 and it has been closed since. For 11 years, state agencies have grappled with how to clean up the pits, but officials still have no firm idea how to do it.

Finding a workable idea will cost \$1.7 million.

Conservative estimates put the final cost at \$35 million. That amount would cover a combination of solutions that include chemically neutralizing the waste and leaving it at the dump. But some of those solutions are unacceptable to Glen Avon residents.

Removing all the waste and trucking it elsewhere could cost the EPA \$90 million, requiring the removal of more than 1 million cubic yards of rock and dirt.

Stringfellow's cost to taxpayers is already staggering in comparison to other toxic dumps. The average cost of cleaning a dump is about \$6 million, according to William N. Hedeman, the manager of the EPA's toxic dump program in Washington, D.C.

At Stringfellow, that amount would not even cover reimbursing the state for work already done and the cost of planning the final cleanup strategy. The state spent \$4.5 million alone to bulldoze a clay cover to keep the dump from overflowing last year.

Just maintaining the status quo is expensive, costing California taxpayers about \$5,500 a day — more than \$2 million a year — to keep the chemicals from again spilling into Glen Avon.

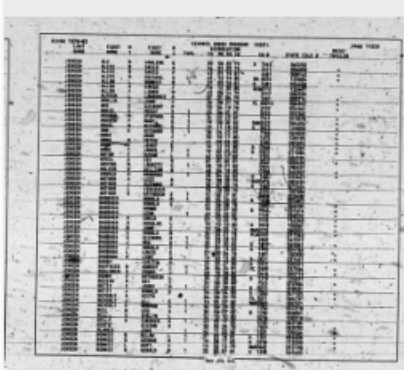

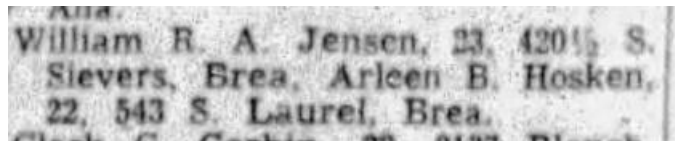

Married by pastor Dow Hoffman of the Methodist Episcopal Church. – Glen Adams died as a "minister of the Gospel" & is buried in Llano Cemetery, Amarillo, Randall TX, F: 152413860. - She married **Robert Lafollette Tuller** (26 Dec 1919 Beloit WI-17 Mar 2000 Waldron, Scott OR) on 26 Oct 1944 in Los Angeles Co. Eberhard on 18 Feb 1967 in Los Angeles, Los Angeles CA. – She was married to **Wallace Dean (Wally) Lance** as of 1959 when he was arrested for negligence in the drowning death of their infant son, 8-month-old Scott Lance, in Apr 1959. Another infant had died before Scott; they also had a 18-month-old daughter at the time. Margaret had gone to work at 6 a.m. while her husband stayed sleeping until rising shortly before Margaret returned home at 2 p.m. whereupon she found their baby boy dead. He was the son of James Bankhead Stringfellow Sr. & Irene E. Diehl. - Much is available online about James B. He had been assured the chemicals dumped there would not leak, but they did. He made \$1.5 million by operating the Stringfellow Acid Pits from 1956-1972, but spent much more cleaning it up and ruined his reputation. For example, the residents of Glen Avon CA were awarded \$8 million dollars.

"Santa Ana [CA] Register" 1 Nov 1923 p 11 - interlocutory degree of divorce granted Mrs. Lila Hosken & \$25/month alimony. She & Reginald Hosken were married 5 Jan 1920 Bakersfield CA & separated 26 Jul 1923

On 27 Aug 1937 Reginald Osborne & Margaret Ivy Hosken were assigned oil & gas lease on 5 acres from Pac Coast Land Co Ltd.

On 9 Dec 1936 he was scheduled to take citizenship examination in court in Santa Ana, citizen of England. [Reginald said on his 1917 WWI draft card that he had become a declarant – and in the 1920 census he reports being naturalized.]
